Law Students Get Practice

On Friday, April 17, 1953, at 2:30 p.m., in the Federal court room on the third floor of the local Post Office building the final argument on appeal of the case of John Doemura v. Ezy Munny et al will be held.

The court sitting on this case will be composed of Paul W. Hyatt, formerly a Justice of the Supreme Court of Idaho, Edward S. Stimson, Dean of the College of Law and Weldon Schimke, a Moscow attorney.

Counsel for the appellants in the case will be Ray Cox and Thomas Mitchell and counsel for the appellees will be Ben Shuey and Archie Service, all senior law students.

The question presented to the court for determination involves the validity of the Idaho Alien Land law in view of the human rights clause of the United Nations Charter and the Due Process clause of the United States Constitution.

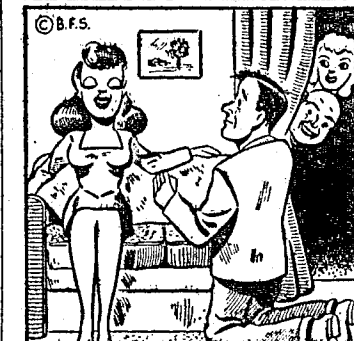
Honorary Group Elects Officers

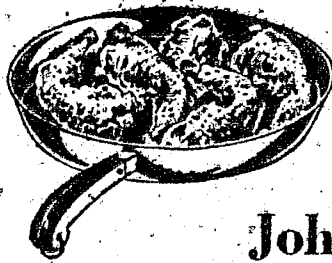

Regents OK Award Fund

An Inter-Fraternity Council Trust fund to provide awards for the annual talent show has been formally approved by the Board of Regents, Dean H. E. Lattig, director of student affairs, said today.

The fund, amounting to about \$500, was built up prior to World War II from surpluses accruing from \$25 rushing fees charged fraternities. By council action, it was decided to place the money in a trust fund with the University bursar, and utilize the income to purchase talent show trophies. The council reserves the right to draw out money from the fund for other purposes if needed.

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Dr Doan Speaks On Atomic Energy

"The next decade should be exceedingly fruitful in advancing our knowledge concerning nuclear structure and nuclear fission," stated Dr. R. L. Doan in a recent address before Idaho's chapter of Sigma Xi. Dr. Doan is manager of the Atomic Energy division of the Phillips Petroleum company. Phillips operates the materials testing reactor under contract with the Idaho Operations office of the Atomic Energy commission at the national reactor testing station near Arco.

All of America's fund of knowledge and development in nuclear energy has stemmed from the discovery of thermal fission reaction which was smuggled out of Germany just prior to the inception of World War II, Doan said.

"Since about 1941," added Dr. Doan, "almost all of the research, engineering, construction, and operational activities in the field of atomic energy have been financed either directly or indirectly by government funds." The activities themselves, are for the most part carried out by a large number of contractors and subcontractors.

Dr. Doan highlighted his talk with a series of slides which illustrated the development of the five divergent types of atomic energy reactors located on the North American continent, four in America and one in Canada.

His talk was the first of a series of three on the theme, "Atomic Energy in Retrospect and Prospect" which he prepared for Sigma Xi groups at the University of Idaho, University of Oregon, Oregon State college and Portland on successive speaking engagements.

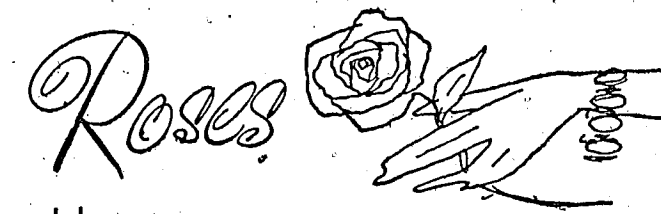
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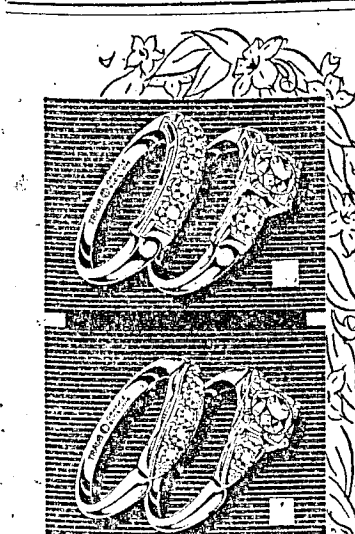
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Track And Field Squad Travels To Oregon Meet

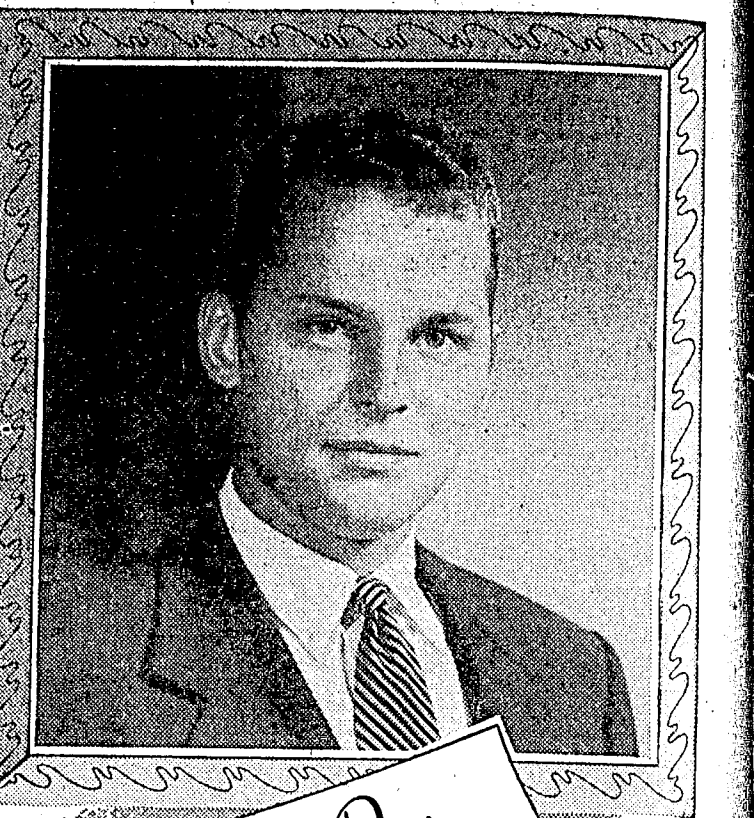
