


How many of you know that the University of Idaho, School of Forestry, operates an experimental forest of over seven thousand acres-7,120 to be exact. Located in the vicimity of Moscow mountain the forest consists of three units. These are Meadow creek unit north of Troy, the Hatter creek unit south of Princeton and the Flat creek area between Deary and Harvard.


A wide variety of forest and site conditions is represented on the three units. This is a point of high value for experimental and demonstration purposes. The forest is serving increasingly as a place to study forest and other related problems such as wildlife. Field laboratory classes can travel to the experimental forest and return to the campus with sufficient time to get things done in the course of an afternoon or day. Travel time is from one half hour to the closest units to three quarters of an hour to the more distant.


