Along with the drills, the Utah coach has been stressing the fact that the Utah-Idaho game is a traditional contest and rivalry runs high between the two schools. Although Utah is a strong favorite, Curtice doesn't want to take any chances of his team slacking up because they are the favored squad.

Coaching the "most married" team he has ever coached, Curtice hopes that signal calling quarterback, Carter Cowley, will be able to keep his mind on the game this week better than he did against Arizona. Vandals Ready For Redskin Battle Saturday Night

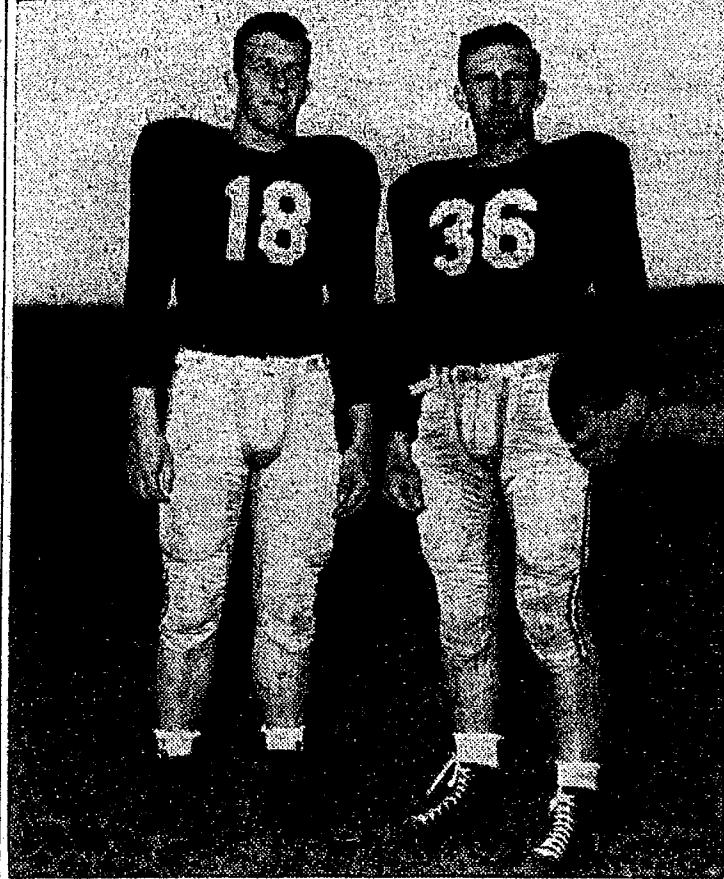
Babe Curfman, Vandal football coach has been holding extensive drills building up his defense in preparation for this weekend's game with the University of Utah Redskins.

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One-Platoon Gains In Popularity Poll

"The return to the one-platoon system of football is gaining in popularity," according to Fritz Crisler, director of athletics at the University of Michigan. The one-platoon system, shortly after the rules were changed, only received about 50 per cent encouragement, but that it now is favored by a five-to-one ratio.

Crisler said that there are still many coaches who at first strongly disfavored the one-platoon type football but who now are in favor of it although they won't openly admit it.

The NCAA rules committee chairman said that not only coaches but also players and fans have switched opinions since the abolishment of the two-platoon game.

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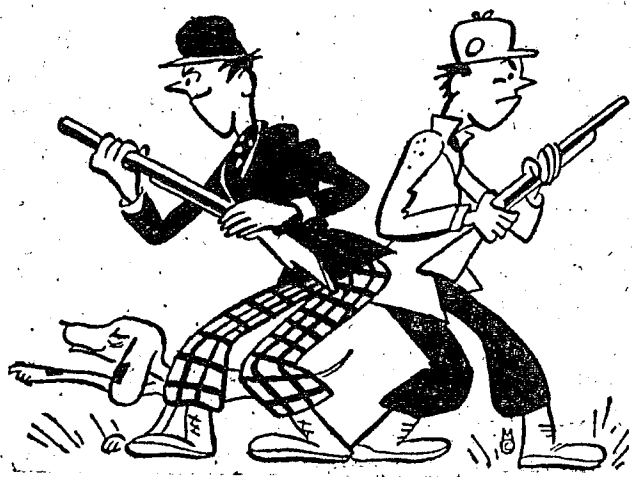

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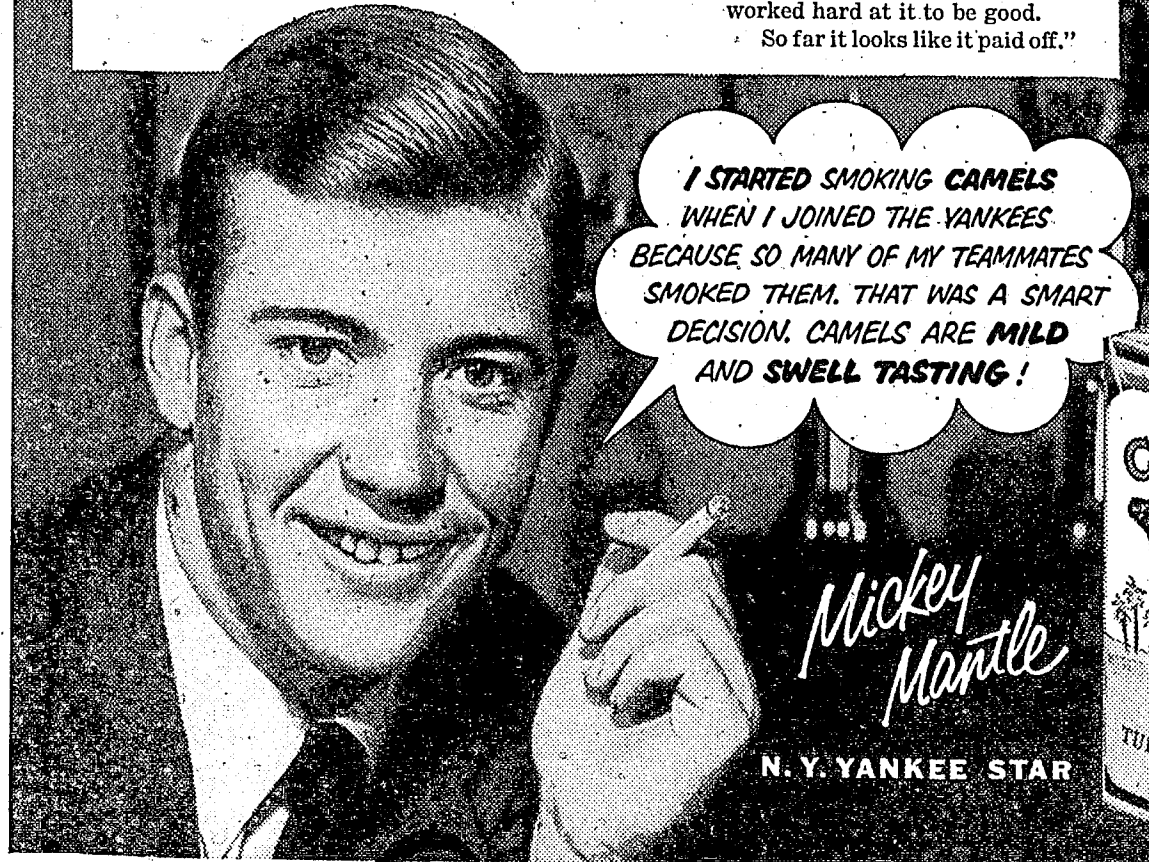
