Speed Demons, Take Care

Nearly 1500 cars are plying campus streets daily, accord-ing to latest reports. This fact alone creates a serious traf-fic problem, but coupled with the large number of students

Inc problem; but coupled with the targe number of students using trosswalks and instances of speed violations by student drivers, the situation assumes explosive proportions. The campus speed limit is 15 miles per hour. This applies to the self-styled skillful driver as well as to the beginner. Campus regulations go further in their desire to reduce acci-dents by specifying that speed be REDUCED when approach-ing crosswalks. The absolute maximum in the vet villages is 10 miles per hour.
