He also sparked the idea of having three private dining rooms. He thought all the ASUI offices should be grouped together in one building. Dean Lattig plugged for recreational facilities in the basement. As a result, we now have eight bowling lanes and five pool tables downstairs.

He was vitally interested in all phases of student affairs during his "27 years of faithful and effective service." 
HOME EC TEA GIVEN






YOU NAME IT BY REDDY
