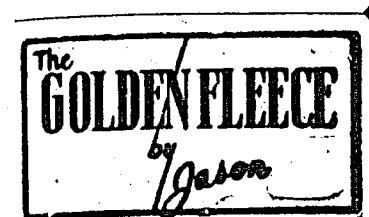


HERE'S TO A COOL YULE; LET'S ROAR IN '54!

Letter Asks Funds To Aid Capt. Thomas

Approximately 700 copies of a letter requesting contributions for the Captain Thomas Defense fund have been placed in the mails, according to Mrs. A. Stephens Lowrie, Lindley Hall hostess. She said about 300 more will be sent out in the next few days.

Mrs. Lowrie is one of four members of a citizens committee which organized last week to promote a fund-raising campaign on behalf of Captain T. C. Thomas, professor of Naval science.

Thomas is named co-defendant with two area newspapers in two \$75,000 libel actions brought against him in federal court by former Moscow Justice of the Peace John Borg.

Others in the citizens committee are: Mrs. Earl Clyde, Route No. 1; Dr. William M. Howard, associate professor of insurance; and Dr. Robert E. Hosack, associate professor and chairman of political science.

"We do not presume to judge the merits of this case," the letter states. "That must be decided by the courts."

"But, we do feel that the cost of fighting this case is a community matter," the committee said. It was pointed out to an Arg reporter that Captain Thomas was not informed about formation of the fund committee and has not asked for contributions.

The committee wrote, "whether or not these charges are successfully defended, of course, there will be considerable legal expense for the defendant."

"Will you contribute to a fund to help meet those expenses?" the letter asked.

The committee requests that checks be made payable to the CAPTAIN THOMAS DEFENSE FUND and may be deposited with or mailed to any member of the fund committee.

Scholarships Are Offered By France

The French government is offering 40 assistantships and 35 fellowships, according to word received here today by the Rhodes, Fulbright and Foreign Scholarship committee.

Assistantships, which are offered through the Office Nationale des Universites et Ecoles Francaises, are open to unmarried students under 30 years of age.

Assistants are appointed to French secondary schools and teacher training institutions for part-time positions consisting primarily of conducting English conversation classes. Those situated in or near university towns are entitled to enroll in the nearest university where tuition is usually waived.

The 35 fellowships are offered through the Direction Generale des Relations Culturelles for study in French universities and other state institutions of higher education. Eligibility is limited to unmarried students not over 30 years of age. Awards provide a monthly stipend of 20,000 francs and a waiver of tuition fees. Closing date for applications is February 1. Further information on the fellowships and assistantships may be obtained from the Rhodes, Fulbright and Foreign Scholarship committee, Professors Cook, Graue, Wolfe and Brockelbank.

Vandaleers' Concert Is Tomorrow Evening

Idaho Gets \$20,000 PCC Contract

Rumors that Idaho would pull out of the Pacific Coast Conference received a blow last week in San Francisco as the annual winter meeting ended with Idaho officials pocketing a re-negotiated television contract for \$20,000. The contract will be covered by receipts from the Rose Bowl game.

T. S. Kerr, dean of the College of Letters and Science, was re-elected president of the conference. Washington State college's Professor Moore was elected secretary and Professor Glenn Seaborg from the University of California was chosen head of the Advisory committee.

Idaho's contract was only part of the main order of business which was the national and regional problem of television in collegiate athletics. The situation will be discussed again at the NCAA meeting on January 6.

Highlighting the convention was a demonstration of television in color.

The PCC delegates will meet again next June 13 in Spokane.

The annual Christmas Candlelight concert will be presented in Memorial Gymnasium tomorrow under the direction of Glen R. Lockery.

The first concert of this type was held about eighteen years ago. It has increased in popularity yearly, and has become an Idaho tradition. There have been no extensive alterations since the first concert, and every effort is made to repeat most of the pieces from year to year.

Carols from the Memorial gymnasium tower will be performed by the brass choir prior to the concert. Shortly after, a Candlelight Processional—"Adagio in A Minor" by J. S. Bach will be played by Hall M. Macklin on the organ.

Other numbers of the Processional will include "All Men, Now Sing, Rejoice" by J. S. Bach; "Adoramus Te, Christe" by Mozart, and "Hodie Christus natus est" by Palestrina.

Solos to Be Heard
Part two of the program will include "He Shall Feed His Flock" (from "The Messiah") by G. F. Handel with solos by Leah Jensen, alto and Phyllis Goecke, soprano.

Part three will contain "Ave Maria" by S. Rachmaninoff; "Clasp Your Hands" by F. M. Christianson, and "Festival Te Deum" by Benjamin Britten with Margaret Fox, soprano soloist.

Parts of the concert will be televised by KXLY-TV on Thursday night, December 17. Art direction will be by Alfred Dunn and organ music by Hall Macklin. Other members of the cast will include John Mix, Warren Peterson, Jim Sanberg, Arizona Vandervort, Jane Rensberg, Jim New and Don Broughman.

In part four, Ruth Krieger, cellist, will play "Elegie" by G. Faure.

Part five is comprised of "Tourolou-lou" (17th century Provençal) by Saboly; "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming (17th century German) by Praetorius, and "Fum! Fum! Fum!" (Catalonian) arranged by Schindler.

Part six has "The Twelve Days of Christmas" arranged by Nightingale; "Hecia Balen vs un Borrico" (Spanish) arranged by Shaw-Parker which will be sung by Giles Godfrey, baritone soloist, and "Sledge Bells" by Hugh Robertson.

The final part of the program includes "O Come All Ye Faithful," arranged by J. Reading; "Away in a Manger" — Luther's "Cradle Hymn"; "Joy to the World" by G. F. Handel; "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear" by S. Willis; "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" by F. Mendelssohn, and "Silent Night" by F. Gruber which will be sung by Caroleigh Gittins, soprano.

The Brass Choir is composed of members of the University Concert Band, and will be directed by Warren Bellis.

Decorations are under the direction of Bob Huntley, and ushers will include members of Sigma Alpha Iota and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia.

Many of the arrangements for the concert were made by Vandaleers, namely, Bruce Sweeney, president; Margaret Trefren, secretary; Caroline Bailey and Robert Wells, robe chairmen; Sally Landers, historian; Donna Bray, social chairman, and Ernestine Gohrband, librarian.

Old Custom Gets New Treatment

Glen R. Lockery, Vandaleers conductor, has announced that artificial candles will be used in the Vandaleers Christmas Candlelight Concert on Wednesday night. The candles will closely resemble real candles, and will be operated by a battery cell. This has been done as a precautionary measure against any fire which could result if genuine candles were used.

Lockery states that many problems were encountered to make the artificial candles look real, and the product finally came after long and careful planning.

It is customary for many people to carry candles in churches and homes during the festive season. Candles lighted the little cradle of the Christ Child many years ago. The practise is most extensively used by the Irish and the Norwegians.

All Irishmen display candles to light the way for the Christ Child who is deserted in the coldness of night, and the Norwegians carry candles because a legend says that anyone who is radiated by candlelight will receive many blessings.

Two Areas Authorized For Parking Student Cars

It is imperative that students who plan to leave their cars on the campus during Christmas vacation park them only in authorized areas. The purpose of this arrangement is to facilitate snow removal from the streets.

Two areas have been designated for the purpose of parking of student cars over vacation periods:

1. Idaho street west from Willis Sweet hall to the gym annex.
2. The area across Third Street and north of the prefabs.

Cars Will Be Removed

Therefore, those students who plan to leave their cars on the campus during Christmas vacation should park them in the authorized areas before leaving the campus. Otherwise, if it snows, the cars will be towed to the authorized areas and the student owners will be charged for the towing costs. The University will not be responsible for any loss of or damage to moved vehicles.

Unauthorized areas which must be cleared include all University parking lots (such as those behind the Music building and all dormitories) and the following streets in the campus area:

- Sixth street, Seventh street, Idaho avenue (east of Line street), University avenue, Sweet avenue (between Blake and Deakin), Deakin avenue, Blake street, Elm street, Ash street, Pine street, Line street and Rayburn street.

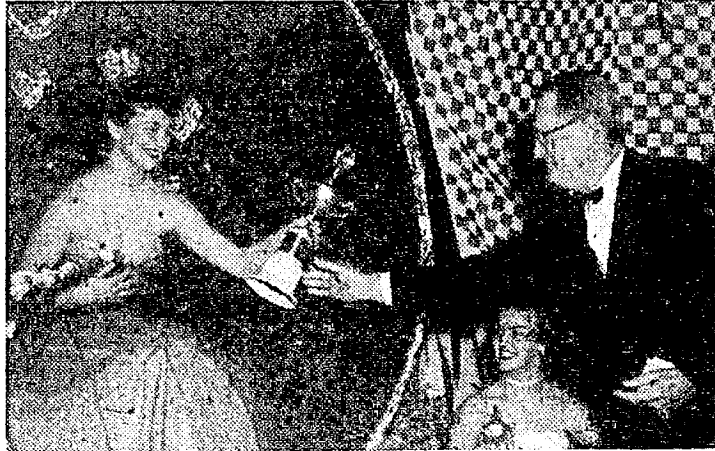

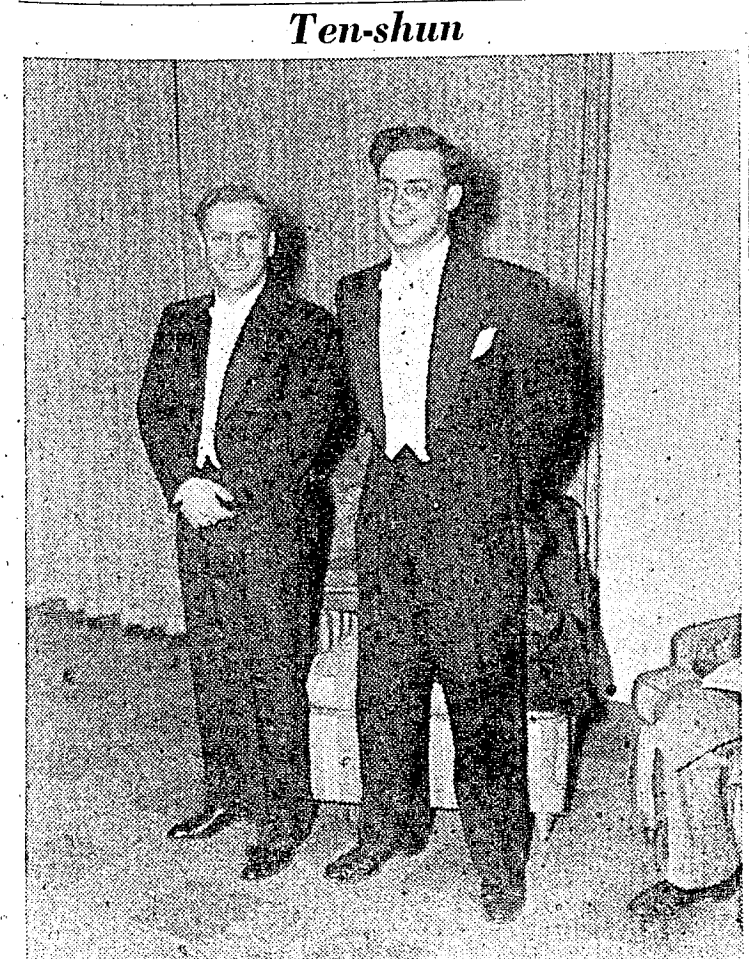

Radio Band To Be Tested By U. Of I.

How much help farm, ranch, irrigation, mining, forest, recreation and construction people of the state of Idaho can expect from the new citizens' band radio equipment will be determined in a special research project at the University of Idaho.

"The federal communications commission has allocated the citizens radio band for private or personal radio communications," explains H. E. Hatrup, head of electrical engineering.

"Commercial hand-portable transceivers meeting the FCC requirements for this band have just been developed. Information on the practical use of this equipment and the radio propagation characteristics of the citizens' radio band are not presently available."

Under the research plan, approved by the University regents, this project will evaluate the equipment as to reliability, operational ease and cost of operation.

Second phase of the study, to be carried on next spring and summer, will involve field testing in each of the seven spheres of potential use. How far can people talk in the mountainous and forested country of Idaho will be one of the main questions.

General supervision has been assigned Lloyd B. Craine, assistant professor of electrical engineering. Assisting him will be other electrical engineering staff members and student assistants.

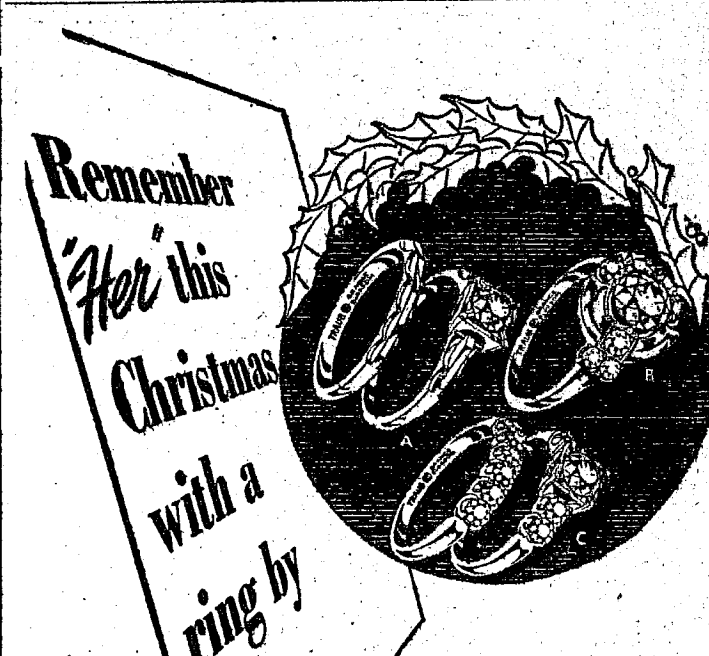
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KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA The exchanging of gifts at the annual Christmas exchange with the TKE's was the source of much humor on Saturday afternoon.

Chuck Finley used his entire squad without any mid-quarter substitutions. Starting off the game and going through to the end of the first half, the Vandal first stringers racked up a 45-22 lead before turning the court over to the second squad for the entire third period. The beginning of the fourth saw Finley's third team take to the floor with a 60-30 edge on the Grizzlies, who started out the game by drawing first blood with a quick 2-0 lead.

Harlan "Lefty" Melton led the scoring for the Vandals with a 14-point total to his credit for the first half. He was closely followed by Tom Flynn and Dwight Morrison.

Second squad Vandals, led by C. W. Totten, who found the range for 11 points in the third quarter, held the Grizzlies down, giving third team men Tom Keith, Dick Dodel, Orin Fulton, Carl Swanson and Bud Nelson a 30-point advantage with which to finish off the final period.

It was then the Grizzlies began to pick up a few, as the Idaho reserves were unable to find their mark, scoring only points to the Montana five's 19.

Ed Argenbright, Grizzly guard, and George Samuelson, center, were high men for the visitors, splitting honors at 11 points each. But the Vandal defense proved too much for the short team who found it hard to break in under the basket and had to take the majority of their shots from behind the keyhole and on the sides until the fourth period when they began finding a few holes to sneak through.

Idaho had a .346 field goal percentage to Montana's .246.

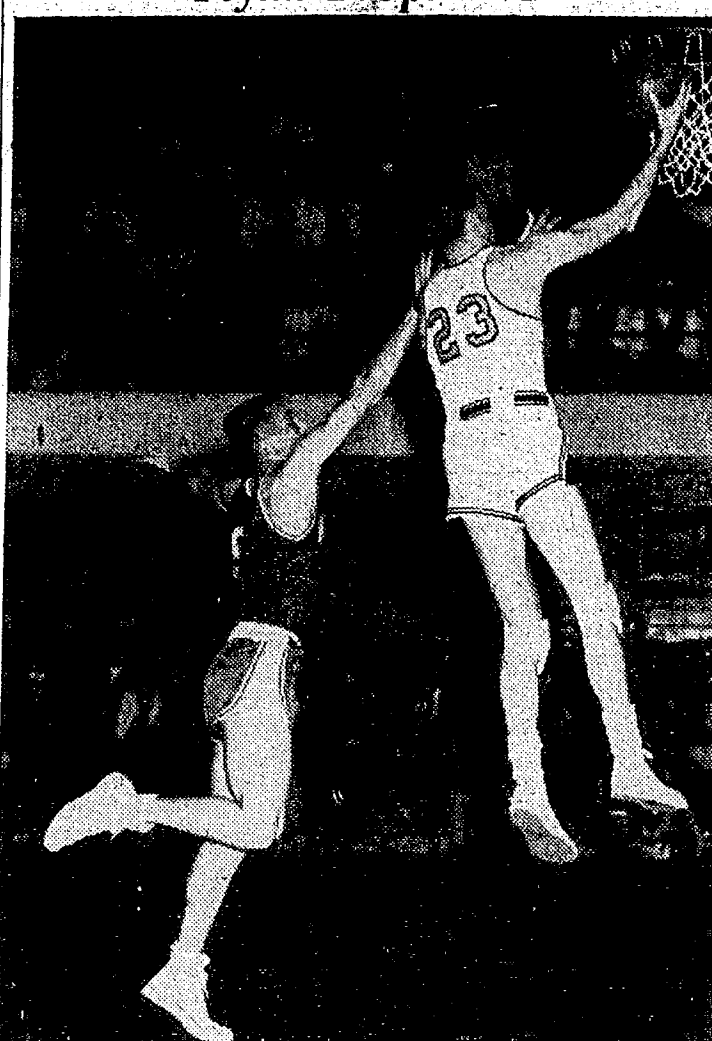

Vandals Look For Win From Loyola Quintet

Successfully repelling four Memorial gymnasium invaders to date the University of Idaho Vandal basketball team is busy preparing a warm reception for the fifth this coming Saturday night at 7:30. This will be Loyola of Los Angeles, now touring the Pacific Northwest. Loyola is said to have a veteran ball club and gives promise of doing what none of the previous opponents have accomplished thus far in the season—press the Vandals all the way. To date the Vandals have turned in an offensive average of 66.8 points in defeating Gonzaga, Hawaii and Montana twice in that order.

On the other hand the Vandals have limited the opposition to set up a defensive average of 48.8 points a contest.

On the scoring side the Vandals have dumped in 104 field goals in 237 flips for a shooting percentage of .362 and they have been converting their free throws for a .659 average. Their control of the backboards has averaged the Idaho squad at 43 per game.

Harlan "Lefty" Melton, junior forward, off his single game effort of 31 points in the opening contest with Gonzaga, tops the individual scoring with 59 points. His field goal average of .418 is topped only by the runner-up, the veteran center and senior, Dwight Morrison. Morrison has canned 22 goals in 40 attempts for a .550 floor average and a total of 51 counters. Morrison's best night was the second Montana game with 22 points.

As a team Idaho's best offensive game was with Gonzaga by scoring 76 points, while the best defensive night was with the University of Hawaii as the visitors hit but eight field goals.
