Through the facilities of the Campus Radio Network, KUOI will broadcast the Blue Key Talent Show tonight direct from the Memorial Gymnasium.

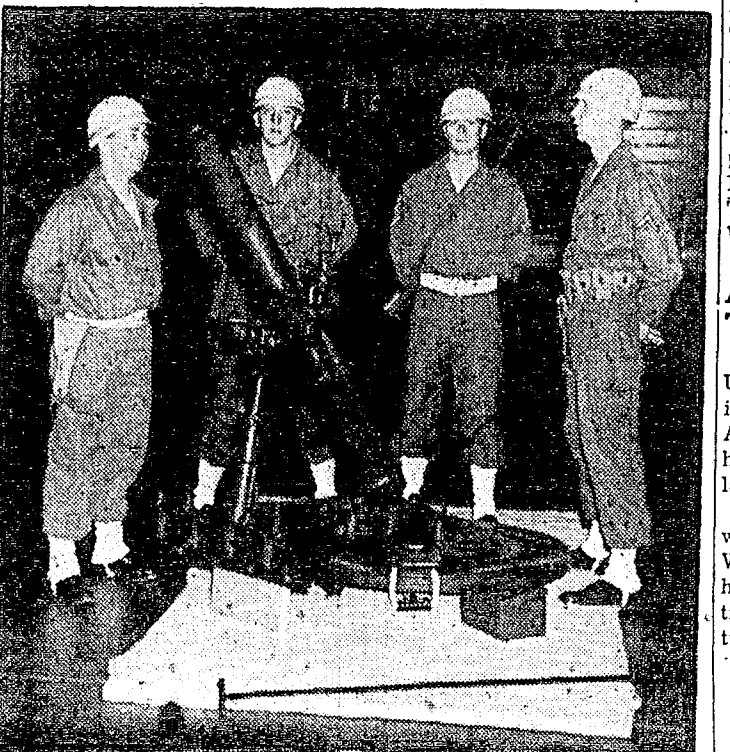
The contest will be re-broadcast tomorrow at 1 p.m. to enable participants to hear the show.

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## Men's Dorm Scheduled For Completion In 1955

Construction work for the new men's dormitories, Upham Hall and Gault Hall, scheduled for completion in 1955, is progressing satisfactorily, according to Robert F. Greene, Director of Dormitories. January, 1955 is the date set for construction completion and Greene estimates the halls will be furnished and ready for occupancy for the fall term, 1955. Located on West Sixth, Gault and Upham Halls will accommodate approximately 277 men. Pine Hall will be torn down. The dorms are being named after former presidents of the University, Franklin B. Gault, Idaho's first president during the years 1892-1898, and Alfred H. Upham, president from 1920-1923.

## Ford Art Collection On Display

Now on exhibit at the Art and Architecture Building are 87 paintings and designs of sports, wildlife and nature belonging to the collection of the Ford Motor Company publications. The exhibit will be housed at the University until April 1. These paintings, by leading American artists, have been selected from a collection of more than 2,000 master watercolors assembled in recent years by the firm. The company's complete collection is larger than the combined collections of the three or four largest city museums. Among the works of art on display here is "Backyard Boat Dock" by Richard Brough. A native of Salmon, Brough is currently an associate professor of art at the University of Alabama. Also in the collection is "School Children on the River Bend" by Paul Sample. Artist-in-residence at Dartmouth college, Sample's works are in the Metropolitan Museum, the White House, and Brooklyn Museum. Rudolph Zallinger's "Pre-Dawn Preparations for the Fishing Derby" is another painting in the exhibit. Winner of the 1949 Pulitzer prize in painting, Zallinger has paintings that were reproduced in the "Evolution" series published by Life magazine. "Floundering at Herring River Bridge" is the title of a work of art by George Yater. He has had exhibitions at the National Academy of Design in New York City, and has had one-man shows at the Babcock Galleries in New York and the Grace Horne Gallery in Boston.

## Northwest Collection Adds Grace Jordans New Book

Of all the copies of the book, "Home Below Hell's Canyon," which will be autographed in Moscow Monday and Tuesday by the author, Grace Jordan, probably the most significant will be the one that goes in the University of Idaho's Northwest collection. "In the collection are books dating back more than a hundred years," said Librarian Lee Zimmerman, "but this book will be the first by a governor's wife." An open house will be sponsored Tuesday night by the American Association of University Women at University House—the residence of President and Mrs. J. E. Buchanan. The public is invited. The hours are from 8 to 10 p.m. Mrs. Jordan will also speak at a Kiwanis Club dinner in Moscow Monday night. She will autograph copies of her book at the Paper House Book Store from 3 to 5 p.m. Monday and Tuesday.

Jay Bates, a junior in law school, Dwight Sutton, a graduate student in education, John Paterson, a graduate student in education, and Manoocher Souronshiam, a graduate student from Iran, composed the panel.

 The four story building will be of red brick finish and is located across from the Campus Club. Contrary to some thoughts, according to the Director of Dormitories, Campus Club and Idaho Club will not be abandoned. Instead they will be needed in addition to the new dorms to handle the expected increase in male attendance by 1955 and 1960.

Figures compiled based on current Idaho state birth rates reveal that by 1960 the total gain in attendance at the University will be 654 men. In 1955 the school attendance will jump some 147 men.

## Enrolled Students May Vote

Any regularly enrolled student, graduate or undergraduate, having paid his student fees and possessing a valid ASUI card, is eligible to vote in the spring elections and shall not be deprived of the right, the Executive Board decided last Tuesday evening. Last year a graduate student was refused the right to vote because his name appeared in the student directory as a graduate student. Gale Mix stated that in the past "such a student who had an ASUI card could vote in the annual elections in April each year, but could not vote in the class elections in the fall as such students are not listed or associated with any of the four specific classes." The Executive Board decided that depriving any student of the right to vote is also depriving him of his right to participate in ASUI activities. On April 7, 8, and 9 students who have lost ASUI cards may be able to apply at the Cashier's window in the Ad Building Annex for a "permit to vote."

## Halogeton Problems Discussed

Dr. E. W. Tisdale, professor of range management, went to Salt Lake City March 18 and 19 to a halogeton research meeting. The meeting was held to review work being done on the halogeton problem by the various state and federal agencies involved. The control and research phases were covered by the delegates. Also attending the meeting was Howard L. Morton, assistant agronomist here.

Halogeton is an annual range weed which is poisonous and overgrows the other range growths. The University is cooperating in its research program through the Range Management Staff and the Weed Specialists in the Agronomy Department.

While the largest areas infested with halogeton are in Nevada and Utah, there is a considerable area, estimated at 340,000 acres, mostly in the Raft River Valley, where the University of Idaho research unit has been studying this problem.

F. W. Pitkin, Manager of the Forest Nursery Department, delivered the first order of trees to farmers in Washington, Payette, Gem, Ada, and Canyon counties last week. He also transported 43,000 trees to the Idaho Fish and Game Department for windbreaks and wildlife planting.

"Maybe he's trying to tighten and create stricter observance of security movements. Don't condemn the man until you have something better to come up with," added Paterson.



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
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# Forney Hall Feeds Faculty; Serenades Are Numerous

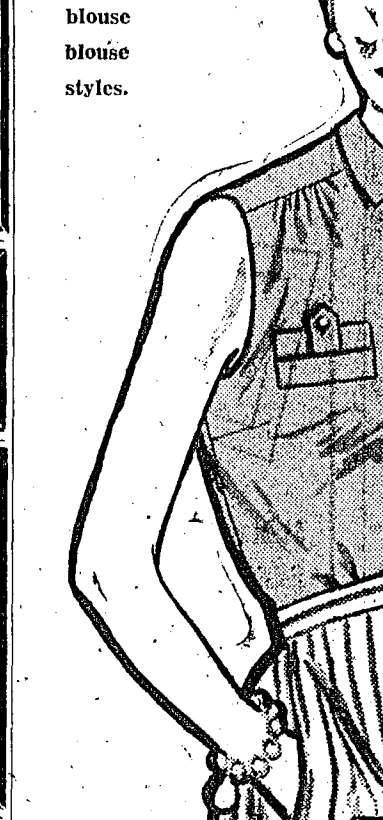

EMMETT SMITH, E. E., '50, never heard of telephone traffic work, but what he saw of the job intrigued him. He explains how it worked out. (Reading time: 40 seconds)

Emmett Smith supervises operation of this training switchboard, which he originally helped to design.

"Communications have always been one of my main interests—in the Navy and at the University of Michigan. So I was very happy when the Michigan Bell Telephone Company invited me to visit their headquarters to talk about a job.

"In Detroit I had a chance to look at a number of departments, including one I'd never heard of before, the Traffic Department. I found that, in addition to the engineering of switchboards, its work involved the supervision and the actual handling of customer calls. It struck me like a wonderful opportunity to combine staff engineering and field management.

"My first impression was right, too, because my work covered both. First, I had on-the-job training assignments in several different kinds of offices—local, Long Distance, dial and manual. Then

I worked in engineering, translating estimates of future growth into the actual number of circuits and switchboard positions required.

"Now I'm supervising the operation of one of the boards I helped engineer. Briefly, my job is to see that my district gets the kind of equipment it needs and that what we have is functioning properly. Working with people is another major part of my job, too, because I serve in an advisory capacity to the supervisors of the Long Distance operators.

"Needless to say, I'm happy with my job. A job I didn't even know existed."

Emmett Smith's job is with a Bell Telephone Company. There are similar opportunities for college people with Bell Telephone Laboratories, Western Electric and Sandia Corporation.
