While his topic has not been announced, it will deal with the current problems of the Arab-Israeli difficulties. Following his address, the meeting will be thrown open to questions from the audience.

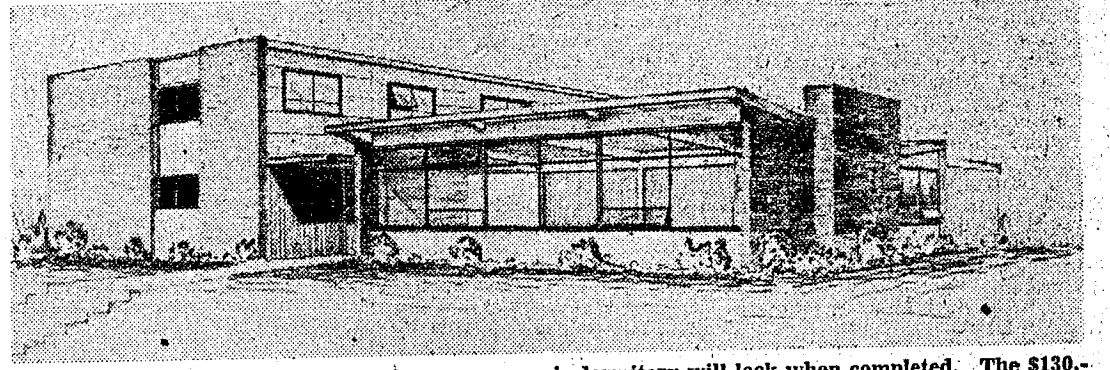

New Women's Dormitory Approved For Beginning By Board Of Regents

Plans for the construction of a new \$130,000 women's dormitory at the University of Idaho were announced today by President J. E. Buchanan, following approval by the Board of Regents. The building will be financed in part by a note issue to be paid off by income from room rentals from dormitory buildings.

Housing 60 women, the dormitory will be a frame structure, with certain areas of the exterior being in brick veneer and the rest of the exterior in transitite veneer.

One wing of the dormitory will be two stories, containing the women's living quarters. The kitchen, dining and living rooms are planned in another one-story wing. An automatic sprinkler system will be installed to eliminate hazard from fire as was done in the Ethel Steel House.

The new dormitory will be located on Blake Avenue south of Ridebaugh Hall, out-dated women's dormitory now being used for music practice rooms. Site of the new building is now being developed by University buildings and grounds employees.

Buchanan said that it is tentatively planned to call for construction bids late this month if all other arrangements are completed by that time.

Construction is scheduled to begin early this summer, with the dormitory ready for occupancy by the fall of 1955.

"The dormitory is part of the University's building program to insure living quarters for the steadily increasing number of Idaho youths who will seek education at the University," Buchanan said.

He pointed out that the increased enrollment of students now in high schools, and the even larger wave of pupils now in elementary schools will soon be University students and will need proper housing.

"Therefore, there is an imperative and immediate need for a new women's dormitory at the University of Idaho," the president added.

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Last ASUI Movie Will Be Mexican Film On Violence

The last film in this semester's ASUI movie series will be the first Mexican picture to be shown at the Borah Theater in a number of years. Thursday at 4, 7, and 8:30 p.m., "The Young and the Damned," a violent story of juvenile delinquency in Mexico City, will appear.

Filmed in Mexico as Los Olvidados (The Forgotten Ones), "The Young and the Damned" tells about the ravages of an adolescent gang in a way which Time magazine calls "nakedly authentic." Commonweal describes the film story as painting "a picture of black depression and misery." A "keen camera" examines piles of rubble, squalid hovels, and garbage heaps "where people scrounge for food like animals," says Time. Director Luis Bunuel adds, "There is nothing imagined in this film. It is all merely true."

The teen-age gang is led by Jaibo, played by Roberto Cobo, a physically and mentally sick creature of the slums of Mexico City. He has committed two murders and has no redeeming qualities. As Jaibo is finally shot down, a blind beggar, Miguel Inclan, intones his hate for the juveniles, "One less, one less." Plenty of violent sadism and brutality reeks from the motion picture when the boys lie, steal, and beat up an old man and a legless cripple.

Little Pedro Caught One ray of light is little Pedro who is caught and sent to a state farm. There, the boy receives love and understanding from the farm director. But Pedro is ambushed and robbed by Jaibo and becomes a bitter, disillusioned young man. Typical of the scenes in this realistic story of juvenile delinquency in the raw is this scene: A body of a murdered boy is carted to the city dump on a small wagon. The boy's mother passes by the cart, not knowing that the corpse of her son lays upon it.

Winner of the Cannes Festival award for best direction, "The Young and the Damned" is hailed as also expertly acted. It is in Spanish with English sub-titles.

"You gave me a bum steer," said the milkmaid as she came away with an empty pail.

The Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit budget was discussed and approved. While attending the meet, Wohletz and Dalke conferred with department personnel on a research project to be undertaken here.

Arrangements were also made for a field meeting at the University's experimental forest where white-tail deer research is now in progress.

One of the Idaho delegates, Rod Holoois, Phi Tau, pulled Idaho to a third place win in the Saturday morning Paul Bunyon contests by placing first in the chopping contest and second in the birling contest.

The contest winner was University of Washington, with Oregon State College taking second. Attending the meet from Idaho were Lawrence (Swede) Johnson, Idaho vice president of AWFC, Ralph Kizer, Ed Kautz and Holoois. Kizer and Johnson were the official Idaho delegates.

The foresters attended meetings on club activities, student-faculty relationships, state conservation programs and forestry school publications.

They also heard Lyle F. Watts, former chief forester of the United States, as guest speaker at a AWFC banquet Saturday night. Watts spoke on "Future of Youth in Forestry."

The meeting next year will be held at Colorado A and M at Ft. Collins, Colorado.

Range Weed Is Discussed By Tisdale

Dr. E. W. Tisdale of Range Management traveled to Boise April 24 to speak at the annual meeting of the Owyhee County Cattleman's Association.

He spoke on the range weed problems, emphasizing Halogeton and Medusa, and on range reseeding.

It was the association's 78th meeting. Although Owyhee County is the largest county in Idaho and consists largely of rangeland, it is troubled very little by Halogeton and Medusa.

Dean E. Wohletz and Dr. Paul Dalke of the College of Forestry will be in Boise April 28 to meet with the State Fish and Game Commission. Budgetary matters and the research program for the Wildlife Unit will be discussed.

Dean Wohletz and Dr. Dalke will also meet with personnel of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. On the return trip they will stop at the forestry summer camp to prepare for its opening in June.

Many members of the Idaho College of Forestry staff and several forestry students attended the Inland Empire section meeting of the Society of American Foresters held Saturday, April 24, at Washington State College. The WSC and Idaho forestry students worked together to put on the program.

Harold Hironaka, a graduate student in research range management at Idaho, presented a paper on the goat weed problem in Idaho.

John Sullivan, a graduate student holding a Potlatch Forest Incorporated fellowship, gave a paper on volume studies in slash disposal.

Previously unbeaten, Oregon State had its best pitcher in Norb Wellman on the mound but Wellman, who chalked up three straight wins, allowed the determined Idaho crew safeties when they counted with the first pair coming in the second inning.

Flip Kleffner started the fireworks in the second with a sharp hit to center and moved on to second on Reg Frazier's line drive to left field. Jack Stephenson, Oregon State catcher, let one of Wellman's pitches slip through him and both runners advanced. Larry Morrison got credit for the first RBI on an infield out.

The Vandal half of the fifth frame saw the second Idaho man across the plate following two miscues and a wild pitch. Hallett got to first on Bob Boub's error. Bob Falash obtained first when third sacker Ery Heinrich bobbed a slow roller down the line. Wellman's wild toss advanced the runners to second and third and Frank Teverbaugh drove in Hallett with an infield ground ball.

Scoring two runs in the bottom of the eighth, the Vandal squad started the frame with two safeties. Mike Cygler started off the inning and obtained a free pass to first. Kleffner followed and rapped out his second hit of the day. Frazier sent a line drive into center, scoring Cygler and Kleffner crossed the plate after the ball went through Jay Exley.

The Vandals first saw trouble in the fourth when Exley lined one out for a double. Jay Dean rapped out a single and Exley came on around attempting to score. Frazier's peg in to Jerry Quane, Vandal catcher cut off the threat to give the Vandal fans their first look at the tight defense employed during the afternoon. Jack Pinion filled the pads with a single after Chuck Fisk reached first on a fielders choice. Dean was caught sleeping at second and Kleffner tossed to Cygler and Pinion was stranded when Morrison tossed to Cygler for the third and final out of the inning.

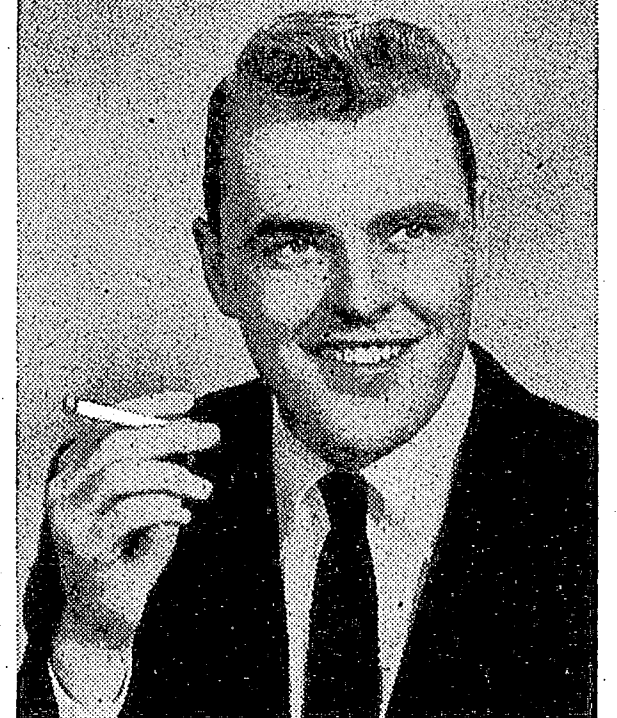
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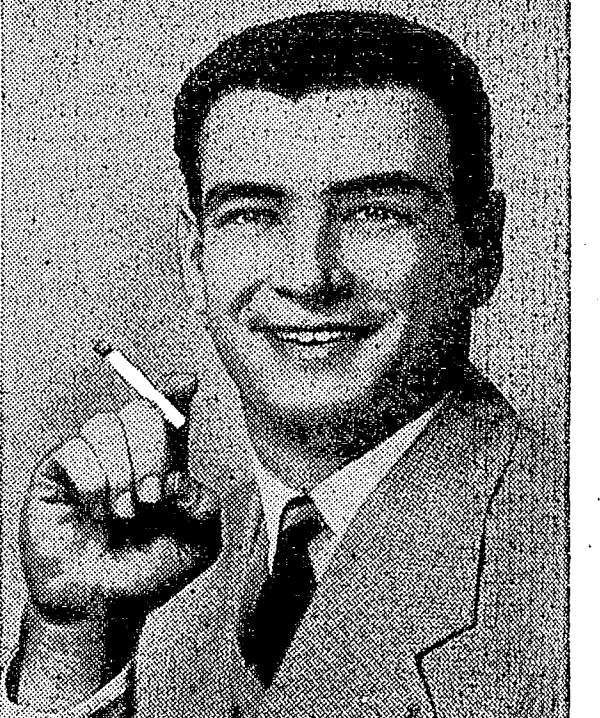
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
