FOOTBALL THROUGH THE AGES

The football frenzy is upon us. But let us, in the midst of this pandemonium, call time. Let us pause for a moment of tranquil reflection. What is this game called football? What is its history? Its origins? Its traditions? These are not idle questions, for when we have the answers we will appreciate even more fully, enjoy even more deeply, this great American game of football.

First of all, to call football an American game is somewhat misleading. True, the game is now played almost exclusively in America, but it comes to us from a land far away and a civilization long dead. Football was first played in ancient Rome. Introduced by Julius Caesar, it became one of the most popular Roman sports by the time of Nero's reign.

Another date dear to the hearts of all football fans is September 29, 1442. It was on this date, according to the eminent historian Sigafos, that a sixteen year old lad named Christopher Columbus tried out for the football team at Genoa Tech. He failed to make the team because he was too light. (He weighed at that time only 12 pounds.)

The end of football in Europe came with the notorious "Black Fox Scandal" of 1687, in which Ed Machiavelli, one of the Pisa mob, paid off the University of Heidelberg Sabres to throw the championship game to the Chartres A. and M. Gophers. It was a mortal blow to football on the continent.

When on December 16, 1771, the British ship docked at Boston, a semi-pro football team called the Nonpareil Tigers, coached by Samuel (Swift) Adams, was scrimmaging near the harbor.

Gridder Seek Scoring Punch

The Idaho Vandals will work for win number one tomorrow afternoon at Neale Stadium as they face an experienced San Jose State College Spartan football team at 2 p.m. in the annual Homecoming clash.

The Vandals worked all week on improving their pass defense and drilled continuously on preparing a penetrating offense. Idaho has failed to score in its first two outings but will be looking for a win tomorrow rather than merely breaking the scoring ice — according to coaching staff and player reports.

Qualifying Ends Sunday

How can you explain it? That campus-wide pep and optimistic feeling creeping around that the Vandals are coming through tomorrow.

This corner is no pro at predicting games but if we were to make a guess at the outcome tomorrow—we would certainly look at the enthusiasm that has built up among the student body this year. It has not only been noted by the faculty, students and townspeople and alums, but by the ball players themselves.

We cornered Burdette Hess, the Vandal captain, when the Idaho players were preparing to start workouts Monday, and Archie said that the fan support was one of the most thoughtful gestures that could have been done before the game Saturday at Corvallis.

Living groups and individuals combined to send well-wisher telegrams to the team before they faced Oregon State. Hess said it was "really a great thing for the fans back home to do. It made each one of us know that the fans back home were pulling for us."

The entire team is fired for the game. Barring injuries and if the Vandals can hang onto the ball and get a few breaks that are due — San Jose will know it's been through a real battle.

The Spartans lost badly to California last week and undoubtedly will not be up for this game since they suffered a few injuries and might be taking the game too lightly.

San Jose will be without the services of star fullback Joe Elm, who presented a one-man crusade to overcome the Vandals at San Jose last year by a lopsided score.

Speed and passing are the main attributes San Jose possesses. A strong line with all players except one weighing over 200 will also give Idaho a rough time.

Our prediction—Idaho in an upset (we hope).

It's too bad that the varsity coaching staff can only smile upon what looms to be the top fresh ball club in Idaho's history. (At least it will be the biggest).

Fresh practice begins Oct. 11 under Coach Clem Parberry. Assisting him will tentatively be King Block, a former Vandal fullback, and Flip Kieffner, the present ASUI prey and a Vandal suffering from a back injury.

Expected to be around when the first call comes are Bill Skinner, center from Holyoke, Mass., Jerry Kramer, 220 pound Sandpoint tackle and incidentally one of the most sought after prep players in the state of Idaho last year.

Jim Green, a classy quarterback from Delta, Ohio and Gary Kenworthy, Spokane signal caller, are expected out. The boy who won the state high school 100-yard dash last spring, Larry Norby, Rupert, will weigh in around 190 at fullback.

Although hampered by bad weather, intramural football got off to a flying start Monday and with three days completed, 11 teams remained in the undefeated ranks.

Lindley Hall, No. 1, Idaho Club and both Willis Sweet teams were undefeated through games of Wednesday to rank on top of the Independent division.

In the Fraternity league Sigma Nu, Delta Tau Delta, Phi Delta Theta, Kappa Sigma and Delta Chi rolled to wins to stay in the unbeaten ranks.

Scoring was high in several games as Lindley 1 rolled over Chrisman 1, 33-0, Tau Kappa Epsilon routed Sigma Alpha Epsilon 39-0 and Delta Tau romped 27-0 over SAE.

Highlighting the week was a hard fought defensive battle between the Sigma Chis and Delta Chis. The game ended in a scoreless tie but Delta Chi was awarded the game on the most penetrations made. (Penetrations are drives that are stopped within the opponent's ten-yard line. The penetration rule is enforced to eliminate tied games.)

The team with more penetrations is declared the winner in event the game is tied at the end of the regular playing time.

Two forfeits occurred with Phi Kappa Tau and Chrisman failing to field teams. Victors were Lambda Chi Alpha and Lindley Hall.
