

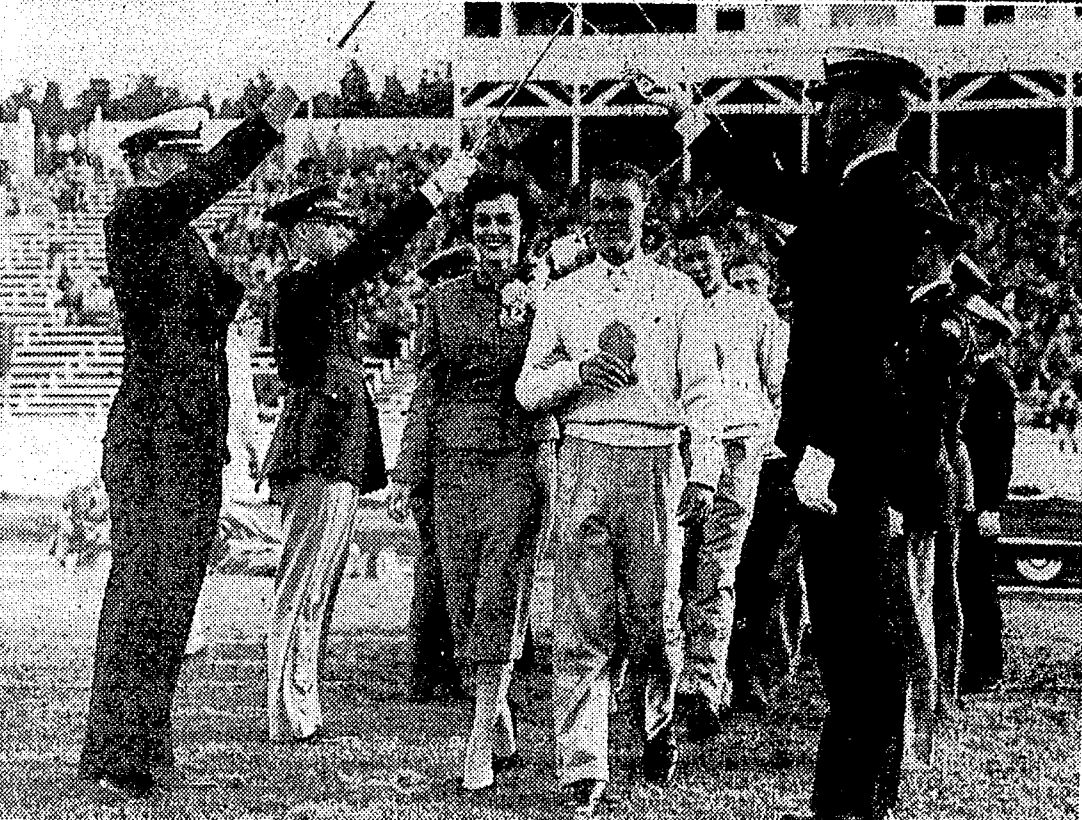
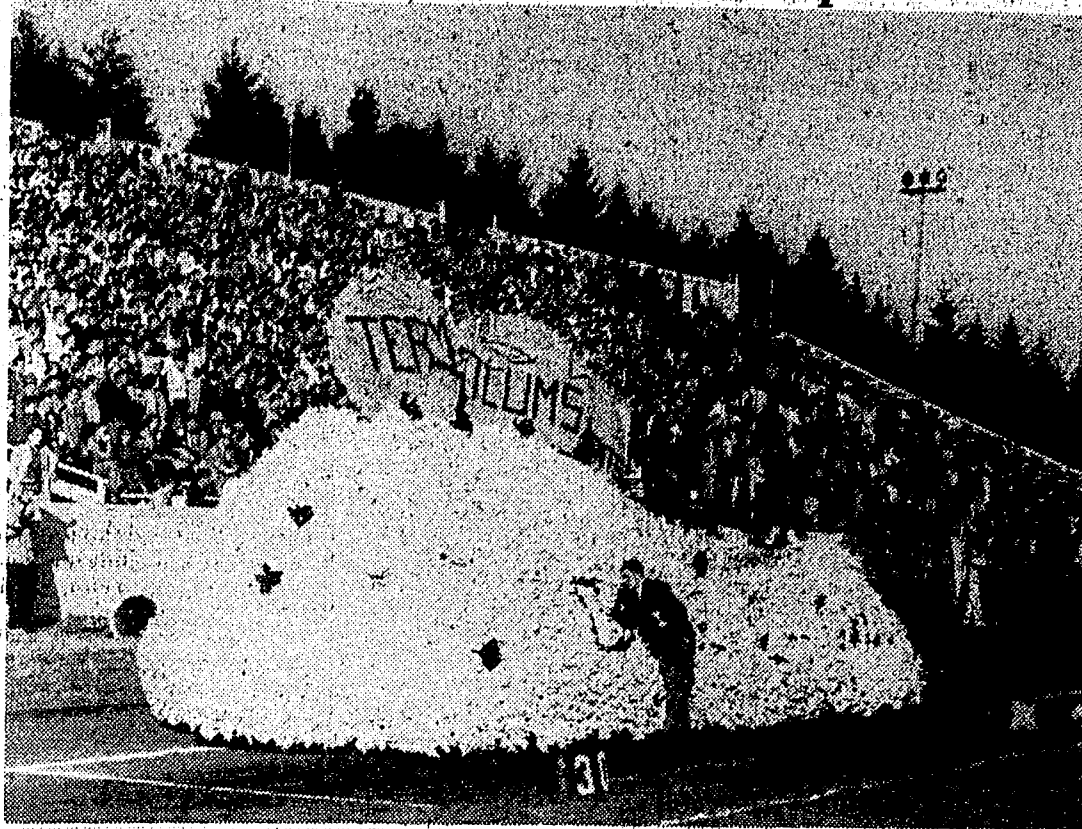

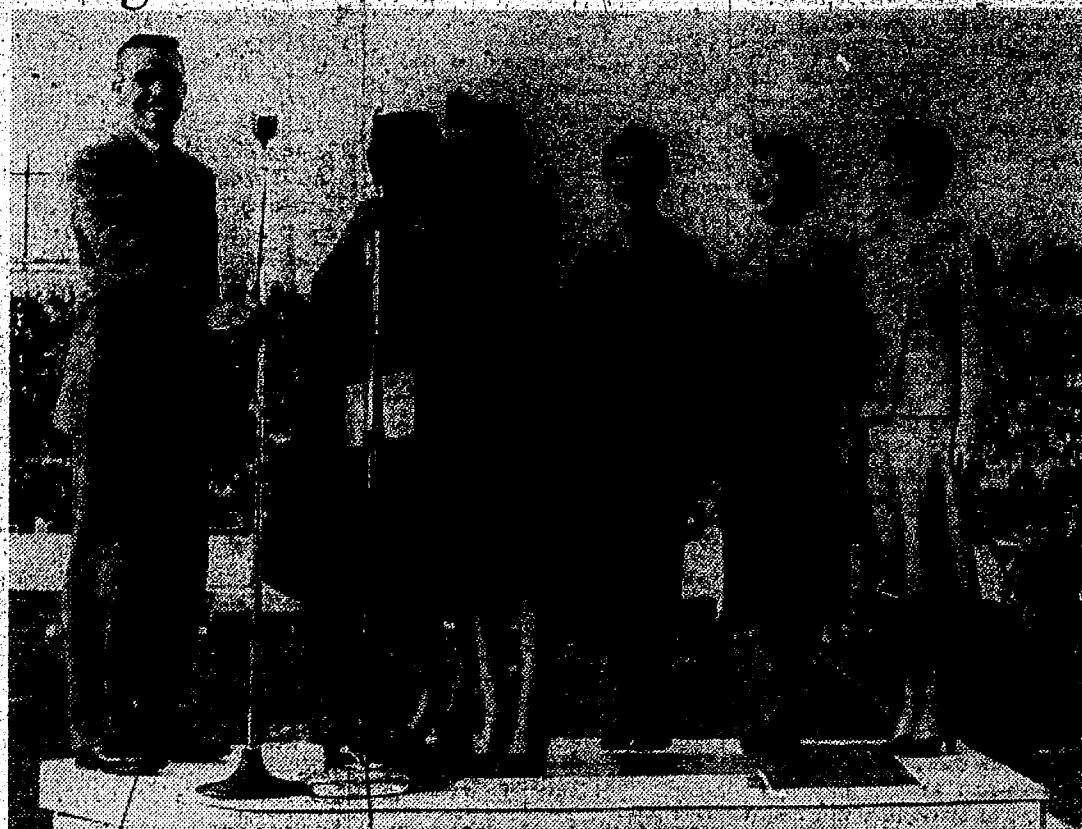

Homecoming Draws 6,000

More than 6,000 alums were in Moscow for the Homecoming weekend festivities, according to James Lyle, Alumal secretary. Of the approximate 40 floats in the parade Saturday morning the winners were Alpha Phi, with their "Lick 'Em," in the women's division. Tri Delta placed second with "We're Re-lion on You."

In the men's judging Sigma Nu won first place with "Three Coins in the Fountain," and Beta won second with a float carrying the theme, "Have a Whale of a Time." The business trophy was awarded to the float built on a steamboat theme.

Contrary to an article published by the Daily Idahoian no floats were disqualified because of height in the judging, according to Harry Brenn, 1954 Homecoming chairman.

The parade's Grand Marshall was F. L. Blomquist, president of the Idaho Alumal Association.

Clara Crowned
During the game halftime the winning floats were announced; Clara Armstrong was crowned Queen of 1954 Homecoming, and Earl Bullock of Lewiston, was awarded the "I" blanket by the "I" club for being the Outstanding Idaho booster.

After the game there was a class reunion held on the field, followed by open house in all of the living groups on campus. Each of the houses had decorations by the front entrance for this last occasion.

Card Tricks
The Sandpoint High School band marched and played as the winning floats paraded around the track. The Vandal band also marched while the student cheering section did card-tricks. These tricks included a red feather on a grey background for community chest, a gold crown on a grey background and a blue horse shoe on an orange background.

Over 1,200 attended the Homecoming dance, that night in the Student Union ballrooms. During the dance intermission trophies were awarded to the Queen and the winning float representatives.

Flip Klefner, ASUI president, expressed his congratulations to the various committees; today, and to the whole student body in general for their backing of the Homecoming activities.

He stated that it showed a trend toward a better-than-ever school spirit, and that "Despite the fact that Idaho is judged on football to a certain extent, other things count, and a big one is student participation."

Students' Rally
Homecoming begun with a pep rally on Friday night which was preceded by a co-ed pajama parade through the men's living groups. At the end of the parade, a giant serpent wound its way through the campus, gathering students, signs and noise as it went. The serpent went on to McLean field where the rally was held.

Chest X-Rays Available To All U Of I Students

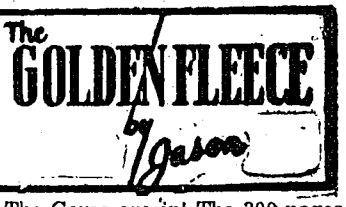
Today and tomorrow will be the last time available this year to have a chest X-rayed for tuberculosis. The Idaho Chest X-ray mobile unit is located on the north side of the SUB, ready to X-ray students.

The program is sponsored by the Idaho Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated county associations. There is no fee for having a chest X-ray, and it may possibly save your life later on.

As ASUI President Flip Klefner put it, "It's really painless and harmless; just like having a picture taken, but you don't even have to smile; it couldn't help but turn out better than most ASUI pictures."

Don't Wait
It is recommended by the program to have a chest X-ray at least once every year. Tuberculosis is easier to cure when found early.

"Symptoms" for tuberculosis are not easily found. When signs or symptoms do appear, it usually means that TB germs have been at work for some time. Some people feel perfectly well and yet have TB.
Today, there are 400,000 Americans who have TB. Over half may be spreading it because they do not have proper medical care, or

Idaho Law Student Is Injured Friday In Auto Accident

Condition of Robert Walker, University of Idaho student, was reported "fair" Monday by his attending physician.

Walker was injured Friday night in an automobile accident on the Pullman-Moscow highway. He received serious head injuries.

A first-year law student from Tekoa, Wash., Walker received serious head injuries, including a skull fracture, and other multiple cuts and bruises on his body and legs.

Also injured was John Lazovich, Reno, Nev., a WSC student.

The two were riding in a late model convertible which rammed into the back end of a truck and skidded into a ditch just east of the Half and Half tavern inside the Moscow city limits. They were driving toward Moscow.
