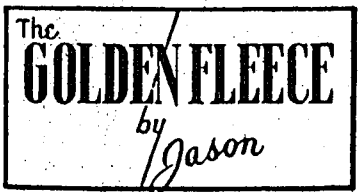

Parties Go; Books Return

Idaho students put away their party hats this morning and returned to classes after about the biggest weekend since the Ad Building burned in 1906.

When Idaho upset the Cougars for the first time since 1925, Acting President D. R. Theophilus gave the student body a free Monday. Said Theophilus:

"It's a little bonus, something I've been waiting for for 29 years."

The Saturday night post game rally, attended by over 1500 students saw the team and coaches march through the main street of Moscow. In the middle of town the groups stopped while ASUI president Flip Kleffner introduced the coaches and team over a portable loud speaker system.

No Violence
According to the Idaho State Patrol, the Moscow Chief of Police and the Latah County Sheriff, not one case of violence connected with the football rally occurred.

Last night the students rallied once more, this time using signs and posters relating their victory. The rally not only boosted the win but helped kick-off this week's Blood Drive.

Argonaut — Oct. 20, 1925 — "Outplayed in midfield, but never outfought, the Idaho Vandals battled for the breaks this afternoon against Washington State College, took them, and won the 29th gridiron battle between the two schools, 7 to 6. It was Idaho's third straight victory."

Vandal Blood Drive Is Underway Today

We can give our nation more than a winning football team, and we can do it in a four-day period starting today through Friday by giving blood, said Dale Carlisle, drive publicity chairman.

"Blood is the one gift you give straight from your heart," expressed James Rock, Campus Club, in his winning slogan. Rock will

have Clara Armstrong as his slave or the slave of his living group for one day this week. Sally Spence, Delta Gamma,

with her "Part with a pint; your pint is a part" wins Flip Kleffner as her slave. The winners were announced last evening at the Kickoff dance in the SUB.

The regional blood mobile unit was set up in the SUB ballrooms at 9 a.m. today. The unit will take blood from 8 a.m. through 4:30 p.m. until Friday.

Used Nationally
"The blood, which will be used nationally, can be given in anyone's name," said Dale Carlisle, publicity chairman. Some students expressed a desire to give blood in Ray Fife's name. Fife was burned last week in a fire at the ATO House.

Each living group has a designated time to give blood, however, if it is inconvenient to donate at that time, the unit welcomes students to give anytime.

"Our quota of 2,000 points or 80 per cent of the student body is high, but if we hit our goal, we'll challenge other colleges throughout the nation," Carlisle said. They (meaning Idaho students) are trying to set a record for the state of Idaho, printed the Boise Statesman last week.

Low 1953 Donation
One thousand pints was the quota for the 1953 blood drive, and donations totaled 655 pints. The blood drive, however, was de-emphasized because it followed the week of Homecoming festivities.

Idaho was named the "bloodiest campus" and got national recognition in magazines and newspapers with 1184 pints, beating Harvard by 80 pints. Over 1000 pints were donated in three days.

With a larger student body, the quota was set up to 2,000 pints for the 1954 drive.

World University Service Praises Idaho Graduate

"Few American graduates have made as distinguished a college record as Miss Winegar." In these words the World University Service describes a 1954 graduate of the University of Idaho, Elizabeth Ann Winegar.

Formerly a pre-medical student at the University, she is now working with WUS in an effort to improve student health around the world.

Elizabeth was one of 15 American students to receive a scholarship to Harvard University this last summer where she attended the National Students Association International Students Relation Seminar.

Supported by the Ford Foundation, the 15 American students spent six weeks discussing international relations and foreign student organizations so that they can represent NSA at student conferences abroad next year.

Trips were made to Tanglewood and Cape Cod, Mass., during the seminar. Toward the end of the summer, students were required to write a paper on some aspect of international student relations.

At the conclusion of a busy summer, she came home for a short visit before leaving for Portland, where her home office is located. En route she spoke to the student body at the University of Montana about World University Service.

Speaking engagements since then have taken her to Washington State College, Reed College and Lewis and Clark Junior College in Vancouver, the University of Oregon and Oregon State College, in addition to her Alma Mater.

At Idaho Liz was active in campus activities. She belonged to Mortar Board, Phi Beta Kappa, Alpha Lambda Delta, of which she was president.

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would have us. It is usually claimed by these people that the engineers are not qualified for managerial and administrative positions because they have not studied, in college, the humanities. To correct any misconceptions that these people may have, let me quote some statistics published recently by General Motors Company. These are: "A recent survey found that 40 percent of the top jobs in industry are now held by men with engineering training. In General Motors the chairman of the board, president and 19 vice presidents are engineers. The President of the largest steel company started as an engineer and the heads of 13 of its subsidiary companies are engineers." This indicates that the engineers are better qualified for the managerial and administrative positions than are people with a so called general education.

It is also necessary to remember that engineers get a bachelor's degree from college for their undergraduate work, but to get this degree it is necessary for them to do an average of 15 semester hours more work than the political science major or teacher. This extra 15 hours is required to turn out people qualified in engineering alone. To introduce the humanities courses that some people feel are so badly needed would make the bachelor of science degree that an engineer receives the equivalent of a masters degree in any other field. If this is what an engineer should have why not require some 30 hours of engineering subjects of the business or sociology major.

We all agree that it would be nice to have some group of people that are qualified in every field, but due to the complexity of our society this is not possible, because we are limited by time. To study and become proficient in all the different phases of our modern industrial and business world would take 2 or 3 lifetimes which we do not have at our disposal.

Also it is recognized by our engineering educators that an engineer who finds himself in need of further training in the liberal arts will, on his own initiative, provide himself with this training. In view of this, it is my contention that the time being spent by

undergraduates obtaining bachelor's degrees in engineering is being used to the best possible advantage in the engineering curriculums of today.

Law Volumes Are Donated To University

Three-hundred volumes of law books and a mounted Pacific sailfish were among gifts recently accepted by the University Board of Regents, it was announced by Acting President D. R. Theophilus.

Mrs. Lucille Ailshie McHarg, Avondale, Colo., and William K. Ailshie, Washington, D.C., presented the "Trinity Series," a set of American law reports, to the University from the library of their father, the late Justice James F. Ailshie of the Supreme Court of Idaho.

The sailfish was given to the biological sciences vertebrate collection by Professor Earl Larrison of the faculty.

The electrical engineering department received equipment valued at \$216 from the Western Electric Company, and obsolete telephone equipment from the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Monetary gifts to the University included \$150 from the Cache Valley Breeding Association, Hyde Park, Utah, to assist the dairy husbandry judging teams, and \$100 from the Idaho Wool Growers Association to provide travel expenses to the National 4-H Club Congress for the Idaho 4-H Sheep Club champion.

Twelve books of fiction were presented to the University library by Dr. Harold McIlvaine of the faculty.

Yes — the Drive committee has made an appeal to all students to support this drive. Off-campus students are urged to give.

More?
This year's quota of 2,000 pints is twice that of last year's drive. The drive last year was de-emphasized due to a cold bug which hit the campus during the drive.

Houses Compete
Living groups are competing on a percentage basis. Students who feel they cannot give should contact their living group representative so they can be cleared on the percentage list.

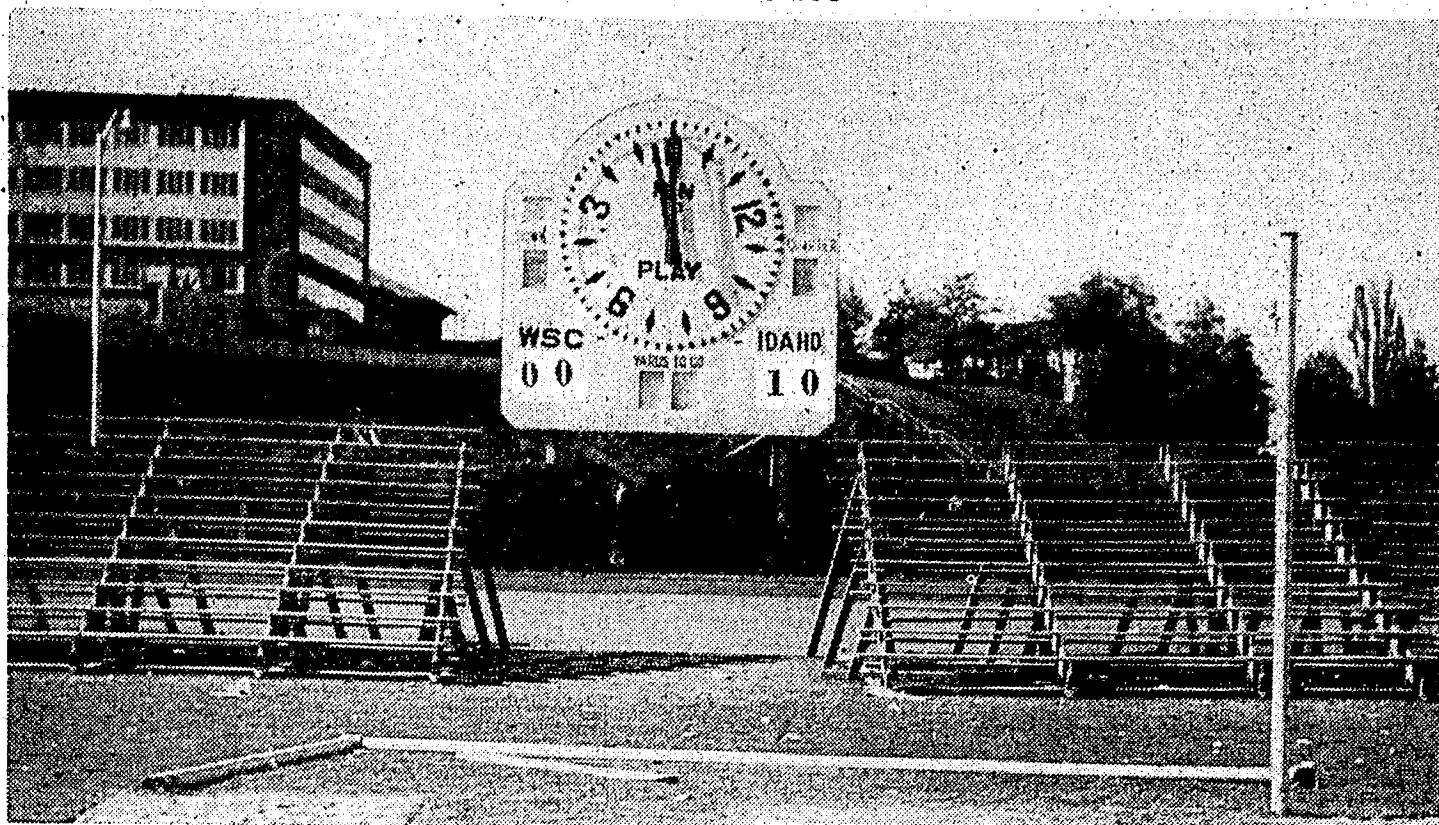

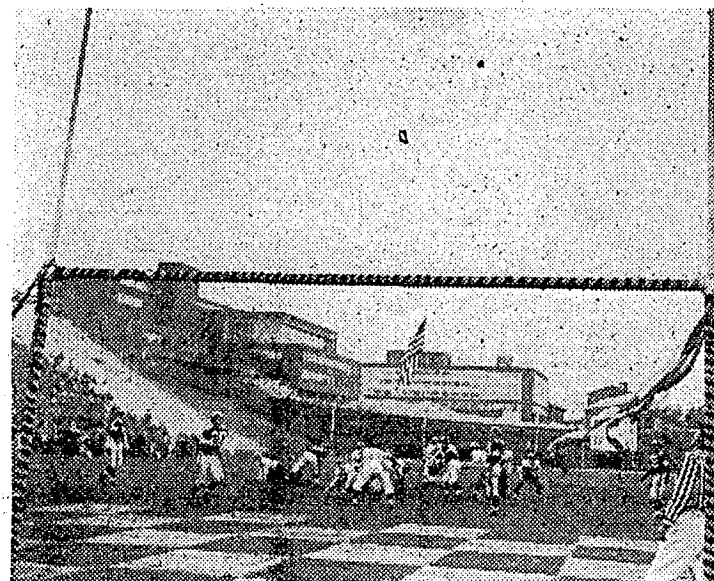

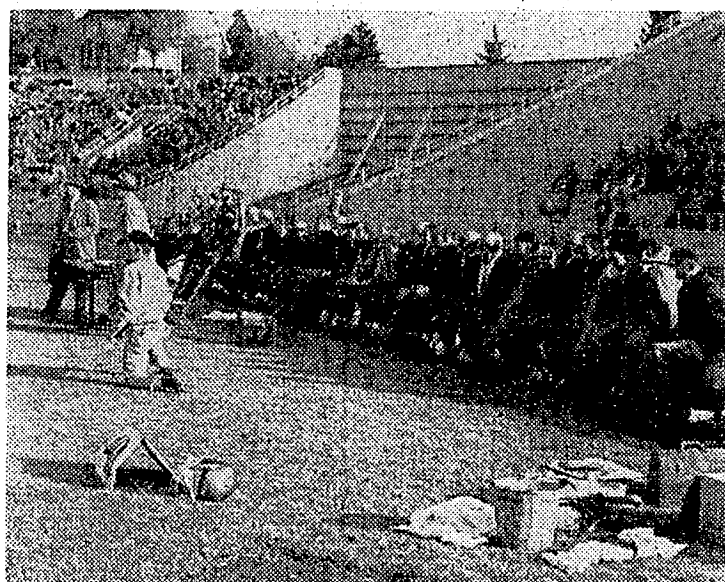

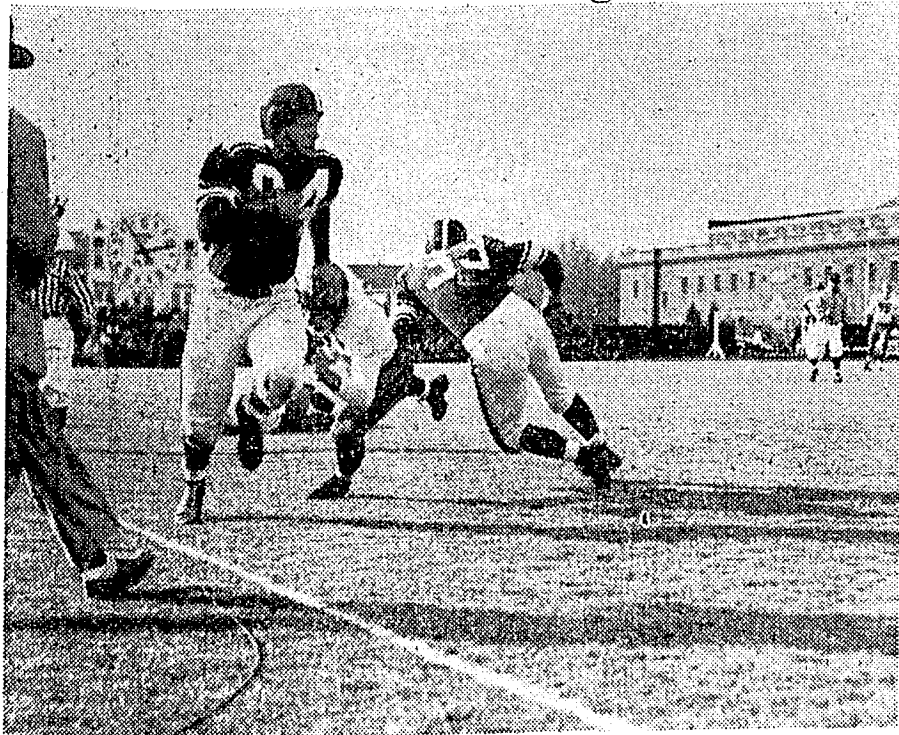
The Idaho bench looks too calm in this shot — even Coach Stahley has both feet on the ground.

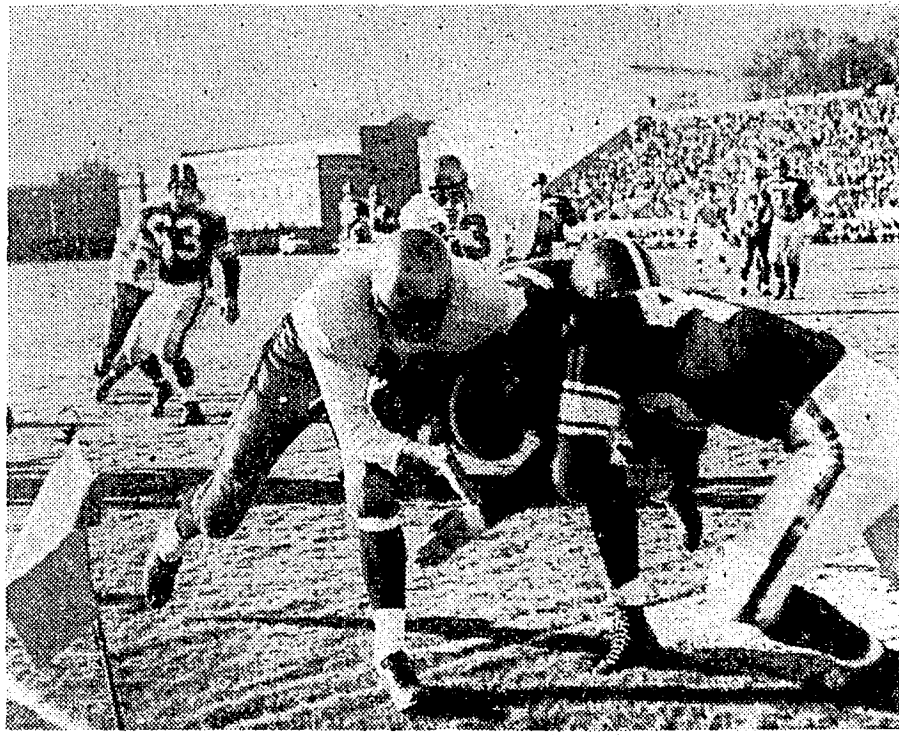
Idaho rooters make the day complete by taking home a little Cougar property. Vandal booster Dick Gaskins took a little more home when the whole works tumbled on him.

Workshop Opera Is Nov. 4, 5, 6

The November Operas are progressing on schedule, according to S. Keith Forney, director of the two chamber operas, to be performed on November 4, 5 and 6.

The Opera Workshop productions, co-sponsored by the Music Department and ASUI, are being performed in the Recital Hall of the Music Building, with the Thursday performance being an "open dress rehearsal," to which students will be admitted by showing their ASUI cards.

Friday and Saturday's shows will cost students an additional 25c, while all others will be admitted for 50c. Tickets go on sale Saturday, October 30, at the ASUI office on campus, and at Hodgins Drug, on Main Street.

Forney and Edmund M. Chavez of the Dramatics Department pointed out that the first opera to be performed, Alec Wilder's "Sunday Excursion," is entirely sung in English, of course, as are all Opera Workshop productions here; while the second W. A. Mozart's "The Impresario," has both spoken and sung lines.

Last year's Opera Workshop production, Mozart's "Marriage of Figaro," also contained both spoken and sung lines. Because of this difference, one opera being entirely sung, while the other has spoken lines also, the actions called for are somewhat different.

The fact that the setting of the first is in 1910 America, while the second is in 18th century in Salzburg, also makes a difference in the style of acting. Chavez is the dramatic and technical director for the workshop.

Alec Wilder's opera, composed last year, is classed as a "curtain-raiser," or short work to be followed by a longer opera. Mozart composed "The Impresario in 1786, to a libretto by Stephanie the Younger, with the English adaptation being used in these performances made by Giovanni Cardelli. The first performance took place during an entertainment given by the Emperor Joseph II for the Governor General of the Netherlands.

United Nations Week at the University of Idaho was climaxed Sunday with a Cosmopolitan Club meeting and program at the Student Union Building. Later that afternoon, an open house was held at the International House to give all students, faculty and townspeople an opportunity to meet the foreign students.

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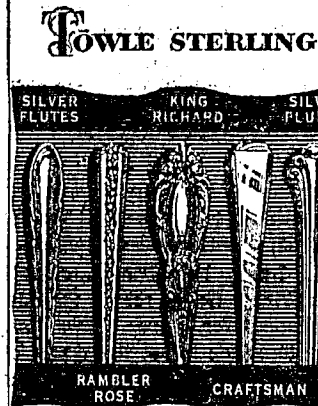

Defending Champ Down Five Strokes At End Of 1st 18

Frosh Bob Adamson has taken a five-up lead over the defending champion, Bob Campbell, in the final round of the annual ASUI golf tourney. Adamson leads by the score for the first 18 holes with the last 18 holes scheduled to be played this weekend.

In the President's Flight Jerry Riggers downed Tom Gibson and will meet the winner of the Solomon-Ashworth match for the finals next week.

Ralph Hill took Lou Langness for the 1st flight honors, Mary Beguhl stopped Mort Hiller in second flight action and Dean Bent edged Jim Hanzell in the third flight.

PULLMAN — A gallant University of Idaho football team upset the apple cart Saturday and broke a long-standing gridiron jinx that dates back to 1925 by stunning the Washington State College Cougars 10-0 at Rogers Field in Pullman. The upset of the century, as far as the University of Idaho is concerned, was played before a comparatively small, 12,000 estimated, crowd that came with little hope that the Vandals would even make a good showing.

The Vandals, under-manned and beaten in their first five 1954 starts, fought courageously, not giving up at anytime and held the Cougars scoreless while racking up 10 points and having four TD drives halted short within the Cougar 10 yard line.

Idaho scored its first and only touchdown in the closing minutes of the first half as halfback Bill Lawr galloped 61-yards to set up the score. After the Vandals tried three times from the 12-yard line of the Cougars and could gain only to the eight against a stiff WSC line. Quarterback George Eidam hit Frank Teverbaugh with a jump pass at the ten and he raced to the end zone for the score.

Hess added the extra point.

Midway in the third quarter the Vandals plowed deep into Cat territory to be stalled at the nine. Center Ron Leppke came into the game to calmly boot a perfect strike through the uprights and the Vandals had an insurance measure.

Idaho completely dominated the ball game on both offense and defense. The Cougars were able to shake their big threat, Duke Washington, loose but once and that was for 20 yards, the longest pickup by any Cougar.

At the final gun fans streamed from the stands to swarm the "miracle team" and carried the coach and escorted the players to their dressing room. (See pictures on page three.) Not until the Vandals got the ball on downs with a half minute remaining did the crowd sense a sure victory, the first since 1925 when Idaho won its last game over WSC, 7-6.

Vandals Start Slow

WSC kicked off to the Vandals and three scrimmage plays later Eidam was forced to kick into a strong wind and the ball rolled dead on the WSC 37.

The Cougars picked up a quick first down on a pair of end skirts by Halfback Dennis Rath and a pass from Bob Iverson to end Arnie Pelleur then lost the ball on a fumble.

Iverson quickly intercepted an Eidam pass intended for Lawr, who had gotten back of the Cougar safety man. The Cats began to roll as they took the ball from the Idaho 31 to the 20 on a run through middle by halfback Milk Purnell. Purnell carried again for two but end Ed Hilder broke through on the next play to smear Washington for a five yard loss. A pass play gained a yard but the Vandals held on fourth down on their own 16.

Idaho's defense stiffened as the Cougars started a drive from the Idaho 42 to the 14 on the running of Purnell and Rath. Iverson, at-

tempting to pass, found a mad Idaho line breathing down his neck and lost the ball on downs after two passes were broken up.

Gary Cozian came in at quarterback for Idaho and on the first play pitched out to Wilbur Gary who skirted right end for 47 yards and a first down. A holding penalty against WSC gave Idaho a first down at the Cat 20 and marked the first time the Vandals had pounded at the WSC goal.

A screen pass netted four yards and Gary ran to the eight yard line for a first down as the quarter ended.

On the opening play of the second quarter Lawr fumbled and the Cougar's Iverson pounced on the ball. The WSC eleven failed to move and kicked from their end zone. Idaho began to move from the WSC 37 but fumbled on two plays to WSC.

Exchange Kicks

WSC exchanged kicks with Idaho and the Vandals took over after the second Cougar boot on their own 24. Two plays were stopped for no gain when Lawr took an Eidam handoff at his 20 and with vicious blocking motored 61 yards to the WSC 19.

Lawr carried on the next three plays off tackle to pick up another first down at the seven. After three line plays netted little, Eidam connected with Teverbaugh for the score.

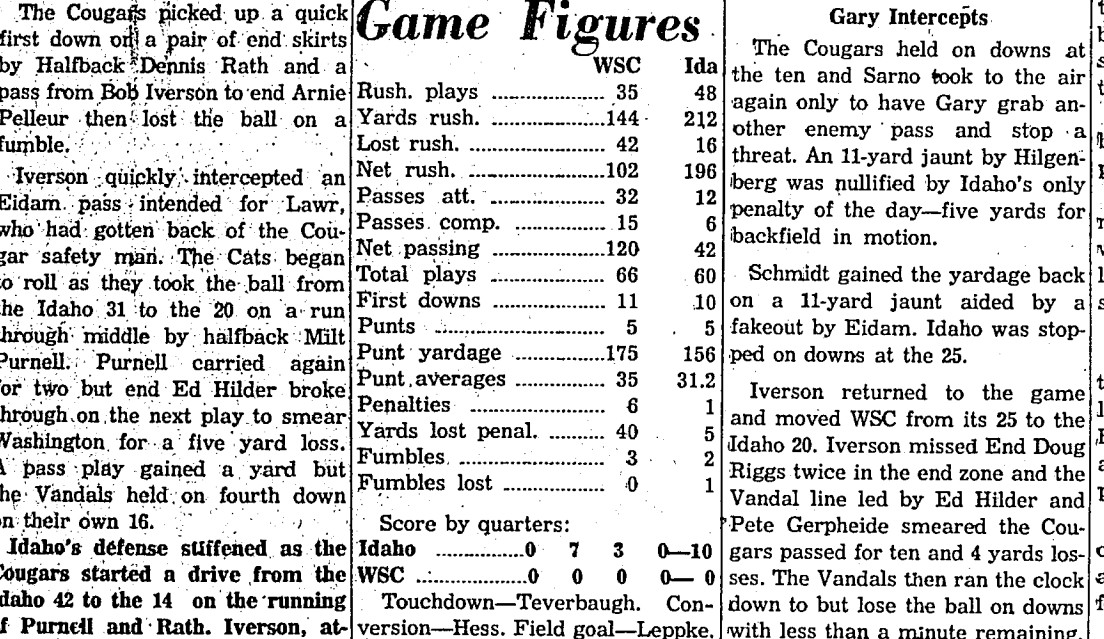

on an interception to Wilbur Gary. Idaho marched from the Cougar 32 to the 2 where the stalwart Cougar line held on downs. WSC got to the ten on two carries by Washington but the right side of the Idaho line broke through to nail him for a three-yard loss, and Iverson kicked out.

Idaho pounded again at the Cougar goal going from the 37 to the nine on the running of Ted Frostenson and Cal Hilgenberg. The Vandals picked up a pair of first downs before Leppke booted the field goal from the nine on fourth down.

The Cougars took to the air at that point with Frank Sarno at the reins. Sarno gathered in a pair of first downs with tosses to Pete Toomey and Bob Miller but the Idaho line kept coming back to haunt him and after he missed two completions sophomore Pete Gerpheide hurtled a blocking half-back and pounced on Sarno for a nine yard setback as the third quarter ended.

WSC frantically tried to get back in the game by throwing 14 passes in 24 plays. The Vandals stuck to the ground 20 times.

After Idaho booted to the WSC 40 Cal Hilgenberg nailed a Sarno pass for Idaho and ran it back 30 yards from the 37 to the WSC 34. An Eidam to Teverbaugh pass gained eight yards at the ten followed a 15 yard carry by Mel Schmidt.

Gary Intercepts

The Cougars held on downs at the ten and Sarno took to the air again only to have Gary grab another enemy pass and stop a threat. An 11-yard jaunt by Hilgenberg was nullified by Idaho's only penalty of the day—five yards for backfield in motion.

Fans lingered in the stands, unbelievable that it had actually happened.

"This year is the rebuilding year—most Vandal backers felt Idaho would play a good game, but few looked for the first Cougar beating since 1925.

It is interesting to note that in the official game program, the athletic news director of Idaho, Ken Hunter, published the following about the coming game. It reads in part:

Coach Skip Stahley was commenting after the game—"that ought to fix 'em for a while over there."

That kind of talk and inspiration he, Earl Klapstein, Jay Pattee, Gene Stauber and Clem Parberry embodied in the entire team is what probably lies as one big factor in the Idaho win.

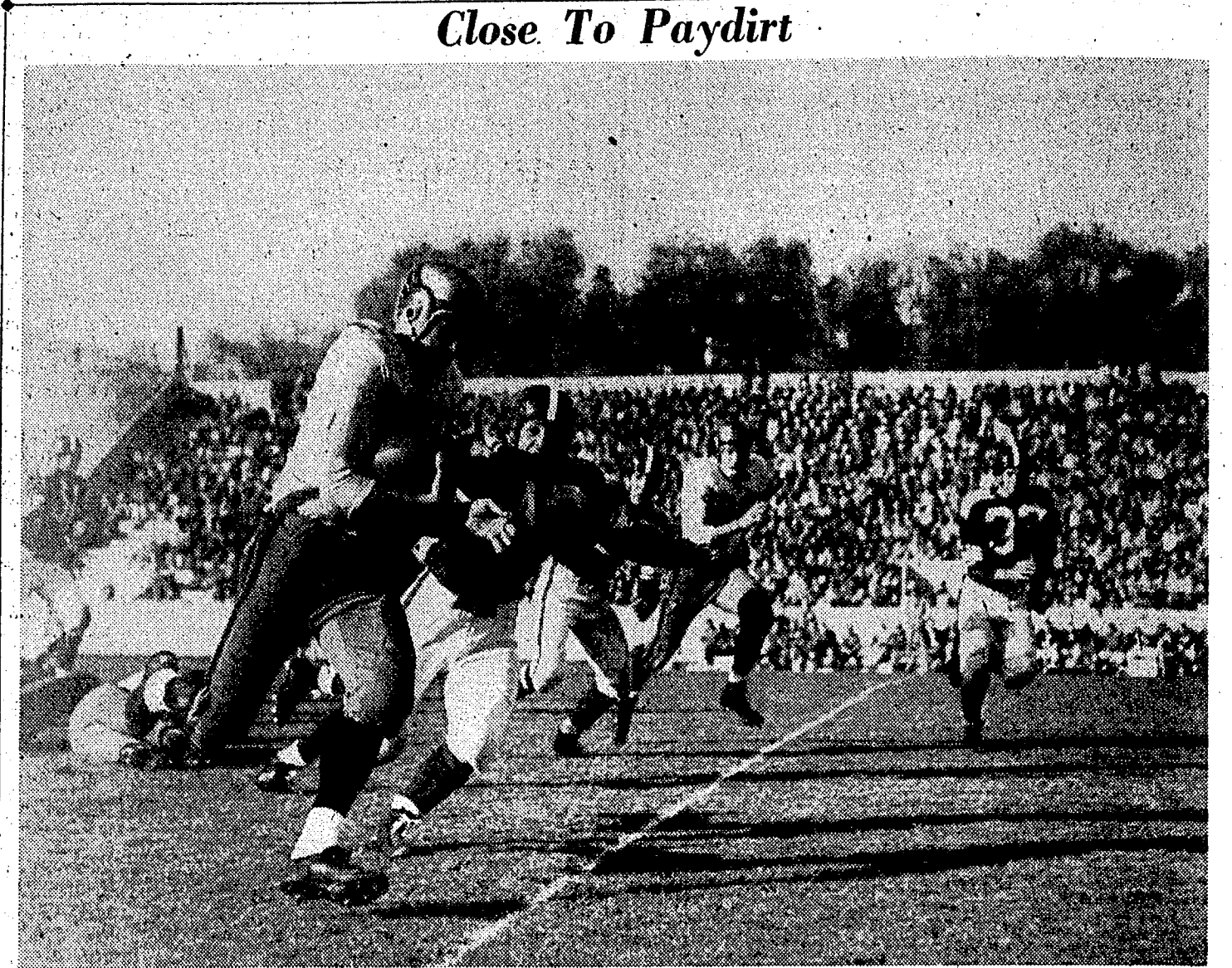
