Work Slated For Sunday On Ski Run

Work on the new Skyline Drive ski run is on the schedule Sunday for all interested students, according to Helge Gagnum, Ski Club member.

Anyone who can handle a chainsaw or an axe will be put to work cutting down the trees that are blocking the run at present, according to a member. The ski group hopes to get one of the area mills to take the larger trees. Small trees will be burned.

The run is about half finished at present. Gagnum explained that any work done this fall will have to be finished before it snows.

The finished plan would include a beginner's run and an expert's run. At present it is impossible to tell whether there is a good place to build a ski jump.

Skyline Drive is about 20 miles north of Moscow on U.S. Highway 95. The land for the ski run belongs to Virgil McCroskey, who has donated its use to the students for a ski area. He is at present bulldozing a road from the drive to the proposed run for easier access.

This run will be more convenient for student skiers since it is about 20 miles closer than Emida. A rope tow is being installed and a cabin to serve the area is a possible future addition.

Gagnum said that a hot dish and coffee will be furnished Sunday. He urged students to bring cars if possible. Any interested coeds can help with burning small trees, he added.

Ray Fife Flown Home; Plans Return To Idaho

"Be good you guys. I'll be back next semester." That was the promise of Ray Fife, ATO pledge from Idaho Falls, as he boarded an Air Force C-45 Tuesday morning for the long flight home to recover from burns he suffered when his room caught fire about three weeks ago.

Accompanying him on the flight home was his mother, Mrs. Arthur R. Fife. Piloting the plane were Capt. W. M. Talbot and Capt. F. E. Baker, AFROTC instructors from the University.

Fife's father left Tuesday afternoon by car for Idaho Falls. Before leaving he said that the burns on his son's chest were nearly healed. "He'll undergo a lot of skin grafts when he gets home," Fife's father said, "but when he comes back the doctors say he won't have any scars on his body."

"Ray has helped himself quite a bit by his own attitude," the elder Fife said. "His doctors here in Moscow told Mrs. Fife and myself that he 'certainly has a lot of courage!'"

The elder Fife concluded by expressing his thanks to Dean C. O.

Decker, who originated the idea for the flight; Major J. M. Hughes, who arranged with Fairchild AFB for the plane; Col. Phillip Main of Fairchild; Nancy Benfer, who visited Ray nearly every day and sometimes often; the members of Alpha Tau Omega and "every-one up here who has done something to make the load a little easier for us."

Fife stated earlier that the family's original plans had called for flying Ray home on a commercial airliner, but had been changed when they found that this would be impossible.

"If Dean Decker and the others hadn't come up with this plan," Fife said, "we would have had to make a two or three day trip by car to Idaho Falls."

Ray's mailing address is Sacred Heart hospital, Idaho Falls.

This charge is necessary, according to Forney, because of high production costs which include royalties and costumes.

Four To Go To Meeting In Portland

Idaho will be represented by Roger McPike, Charles Oldham, Andrew Field and James Kruger at the seventh annual Northwest Intercollegiate Town Meeting Tournament in Portland on November 8 and 9.

This event is sponsored by the Portland State Extension Center, Oregon System of Higher Education. This will be the first time the Idaho team has competed in this tournament.

The two-day program consists of a series of panel discussions on the topic: "The United States and the United Nations: On What Basis Should America Continue to Participate?"

The aggregate audiences will total over 2000 and will consist of high school, college and adult groups.

Representatives from 15 other Universities will participate. Each man has written a thesis statement of his position on the resolution. He will be paired with two other students whose point of view is different. Along with a student moderator each participant will appear before five different audiences to discuss the proposition. At each panel discussion, 15 minutes has been allotted for an audience forum.

Contestants must make a real attempt to adapt themselves to the variety of situations the tournament provides, according to Dr. Albert E. Whitehead, debate coach.

They will have different kinds of audiences, the points of view of other panel members will be varied and the length of the speeches will be varied. Ten members of each audience will rate the panel members, and members of each panel will rate the moderator.

Social Science Honorary Elects Barbara Taylor

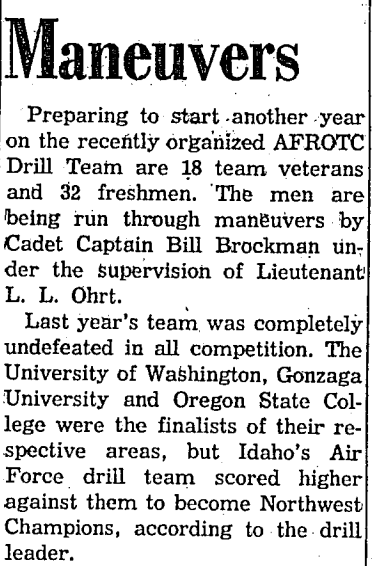
Phi Gamma Mu, social science honorary, met last week at the home of Dr. Sverre Scheldrup, professor of economics.

Top man in the Intercollegiate judging contests at the Grand National Livestock exposition in San Francisco was Duane Sharp, U of I animal husbandry senior.

Sharp, who is active in Alpha Zeta, agricultural honorary, and the Ag Club, was high-point man among 45 entrants. Represented were the University of Idaho, University of California, California Polytechnic, Fresno State College, Utah State Agricultural College, Brigham Young University, University of Arizona, Washington State College and Oregon State College.

The University of Idaho team, which also included Darrell Empey, Robert Seaquist, Milford Vaught, and Norman Walker, placed second in beef cattle, tied for second in horses and placed fourth in overall team judging.

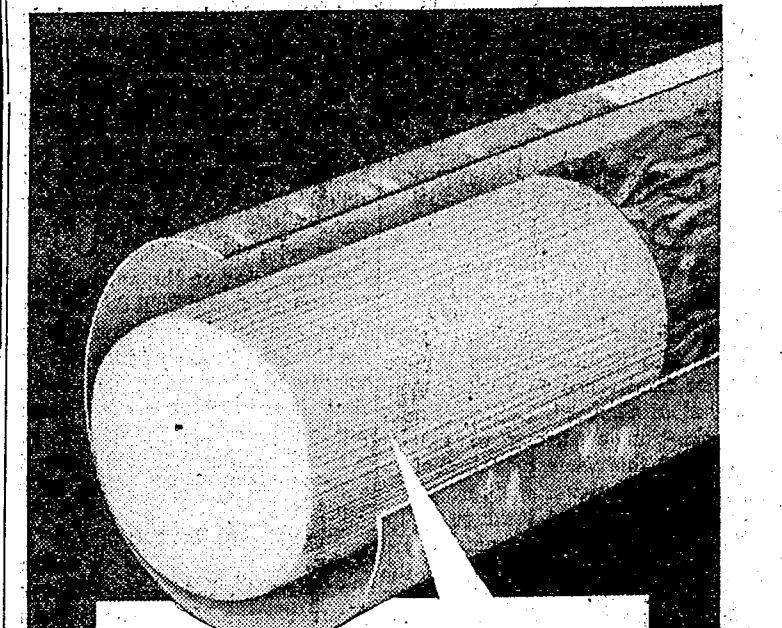

Coach Parberry reports his charges still are suffering from some ailing spots but that nothing new in the way of injuries. Except for two changes, the same club will start that went last week. The changes are George Pugh at fullback and Gary Kenworthy at quarterback.

Vandals Get Week's Rest From Battle

The Idaho Vandal varsity will take a "day off" tomorrow from the football wars of the Northwest in the midst of one of the hottest football seasons Idaho has had in several years.

Coach Skip Stahley worked the Vandals all week, except for Monday, when Stahley decided the crew deserved a reward from an upset victory over Utah Saturday.

Stahley worked the Vandals Tuesday through last night in hour scrimmage sessions stressing defense, both air and ground. Tonight the griders will workout for an hour, then knock off sessions until next Monday, when Stahley and staff will begin preparing plans for stopping Idaho's Dad's Day opponent, North Dakota University.

Practice sessions for next week are indefinite, Stahley said, until we get a full scouting report from this week's Montana State-North Dakota game. Then we will know what to work on, the head coach said.

Ray Bittner and Ralph Kendley are still on the Vandal disabled list. Kendley is recovering from a concussion suffered in the WSC game. Bittner from a pulled leg muscle that has hampered him for several weeks.

Stahley said the Vandals should be in top shape for the practice grind next week. Idaho winds up its season at home a week from tomorrow with the North Dakota club then ends the season at Boise with Brigham Young a week later.

Idaho Ranks Among Best In Rushing

The Idaho Vandals have taken over fifth position in the Pacific Coast Conference in rush offense ahead of Stanford, California and Washington according to figures released this week by the conference commissioner's office.

Idaho has a net yardage of 1,139 and 162.7 yards gained per game for fifth place. UCLA is the leader in rush offense with 312.9 yards gained per game.

Idaho is third in pass interceptions with a total of 10. The UCLA Bruins lead in this department also with 22. The Vandals are sixth in punting and third in kickoff returns.

The Pacific Coast's top offensive threesome, Paul Larsen, California; George Shaw, Oregon and Duke Washington of WSC, maintained their leadership in the weekly statistics.

Larsen threatens to rewrite several conference season records with his throwing arm and last weekend set a new one-game record of 25 completions.

Wilbur Gary of Idaho is sixth in rushing in the PCC with a net 375 yards for seven games and has an average of 4.8 yards per carry. Gary's yardage puts him among the top 15 in total offense.

Idaho's Frank Teverbaugh is sixth on the coast in pass receiving with 16 completions for 127 yards. Gary leads the Vandals in pass interceptions with three, good enough for a tie for third in the PCC.

Quarterback George Eidam of the Vandals ranks as the coast's fifth passer with a .374 average and a total of 346 yards.

Both clubs have one game behind them as the Couababes romped over Centralia Junior College 44-17 and the Vandals fell to a powerful Washington Huskie-Pup club 19-7.

The Couababes showed their class as they walloped Centralia as every member of the squad saw action in the victory which among other things, unleashed the hard-running of fullback Bill Steiger. The Olympia, Wash. flash scored two tallies, had one kickoff touch-down return called back and came close to adding another six points with a second long gallop.

Not only showing their might on the ground the Cougar Kittens rang up two scores on passes thrown by Dwight Hawkes and Bob Newman. The other five, of the seven TD's, were scored on the ground as they displayed one of the mightiest and most varied attacks seen at Pullman in a number of years.

Here at Idaho, Coach Parberry has been running his charges through heavy scrimmages this week working on both offense and defense in an effort to see if the club can follow in the path of their big brothers, the varsity, and make a clean sweep over WSC this year.

The Babes lost the opener to Washington last week 19-7 in a ball game that saw them improve consistently as the game progressed. In the last period the squad looked like an entirely different club than the one that started the game as both ground and pass offense began to click.

According to scouting reports the Couababes are the best in the school's history and have two of the best backs in the Northwest in Steiger and a Mexican fullback by the name of Alvaradez. Steiger was all-state in his last prep year and Alvaradez is said to pack his 218 pounds a hundreds in ten seconds flat.

The Vandals will place a major part of its chances on the shoulders of lineman Jerry Kramer and Bill Skinner and backs Danny Davis and Larry Norby as these boys were outstanding in last week's game with the Huskies.

Commenting on the game, Coach Parberry stated "We'll do our best. They are tough and there is no doubt about it. We're just like the varsity in that we've got a fine first time, but lack depth. According to reports they are terrific, but we've been coming along fine in practice and we're going to be tough too."

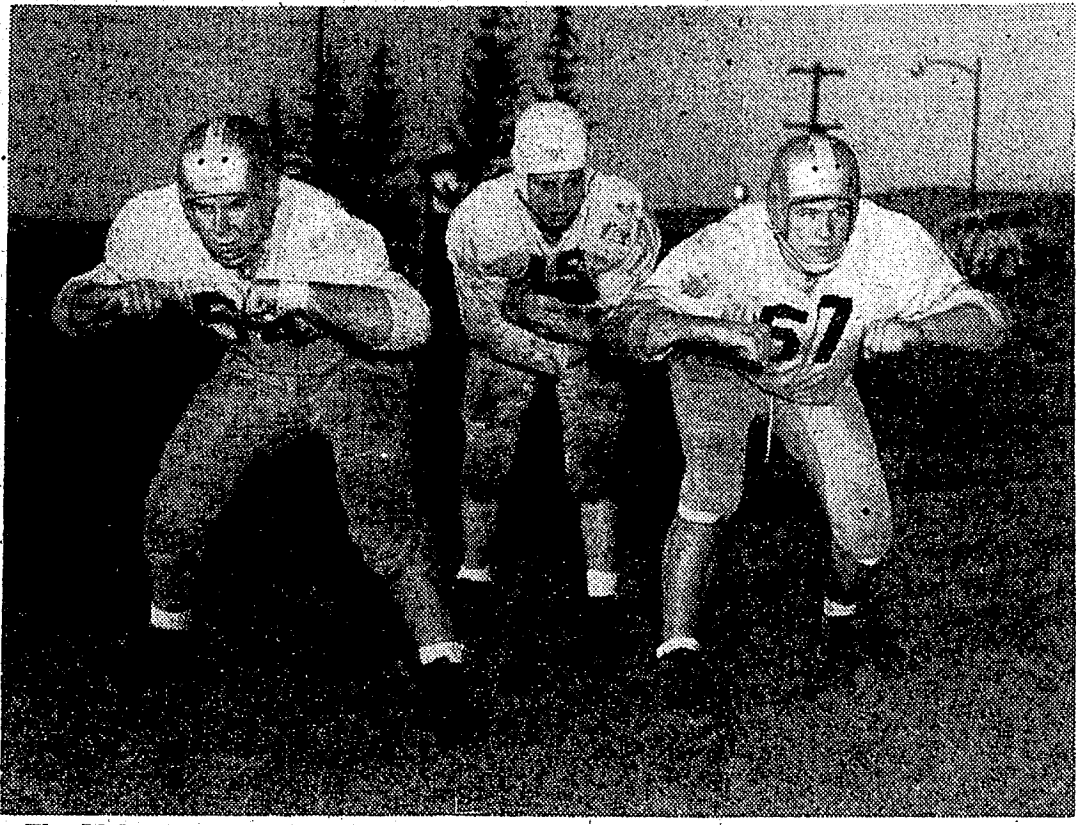
Delts Top Olympic Drive Donations
