

Are Monday Polls for class officer elections will open at 8:45 a.m. Monday morning. Both Independent and United caucuses have slated a list

of candidates. Polling places will be the Ad Building, Student Union and Engineering Building.

Names of all candidates will be placed upon the same ballot. The Australian ballot will be used. The polls will be open from 8:45_to 4:15 p.m. on November 8 only. No proxy votes will be valid, and

no nominee will serve as an official in the election. In case of a tie, a new election for that office will be called within one week, the constitution states.

In voting for class officers, each member of the ASUI may vote only for the officers of that class to which he has been assigned by the registrar of the University.

All disputes or irregularities will be decided solely by the Election Committee and will be subject to judicial appeal. All election statistics will be certified by the chairman of the Election Board and recorded in the minutes of the Executive Board following the election.

No member shall vote without first presenting to the Election Committee his or her ASUI card, which has been signed by the owner.

Plans On Printing Local Story


Word was received here yesterday that next week's Life magazine will carry some feature pictures of the celebrations held on the Idaho campus after the WSC football upset.




