Possibility Of Peace Discussed

"The US is attempting to help the dependent peoples of the world who are looking for security, peace and happiness in the hope that they will come to realize the soundness of our economic and political institutions," stated Dr. Boyd A. Martin, chairman of the development of social sciences in a speech delivered to the Rotary club of Wallace last Monday.

Dr. Martin discussed this under his topic, "Is Peace between the USA and the USSR Possible?" He went on to compare the growth of communistic imperialism with that of the growth of the US from the 13 colonies to its present status in the world.

"We now have an approximate balance of power on the world basis," said Dr. Martin.

He analyzed the problem of the possibility of peace from the standpoint of resource distribution and political and economic ideas.

"We must prove to the world that we are sincere," he stated.

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

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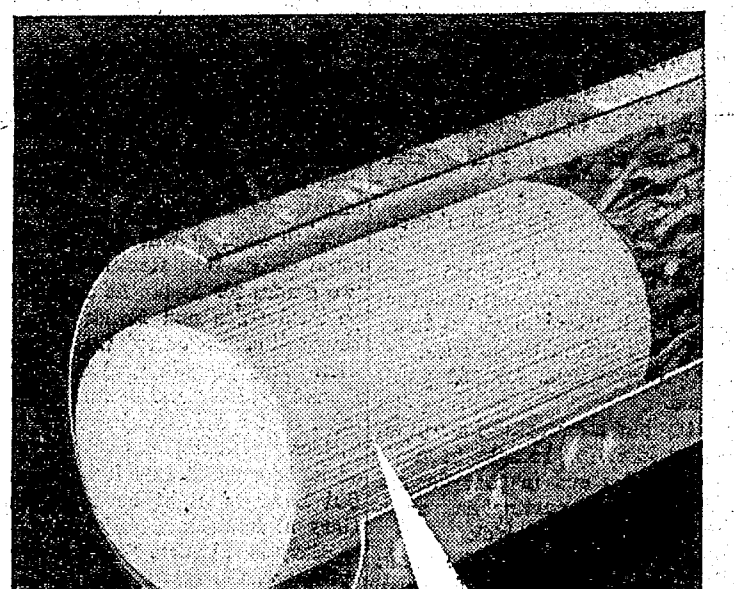

EAGER VANDALS TRY FOR WIN NUMBER FOUR

Rain Threatens Game

Win number four is the main goal of 35 Idaho Vandals tomorrow when they take the field against the dangerous Brigham Young University Cougars in Boise.

Having won three in a row, the Vandals find themselves favored for only the second time this season. Coach Skip Stahley has worked the team hard this week to keep them in that role.

Gary's Mark Best In PCC For Rushers

Wilbur Gary has officially set a new Pacific Coast Conference rushing record for a single game by averaging 26.6 yards every time he carried the ball Saturday against North Dakota University.

Gary picked up 160 yards from scrimmage in six carries to boost him to the conference's third best rusher.

His 160 yards against the Nodaks moves him ahead of Washington State's Duke Washington by three total yards of 535 to 532. Gary's average per carry for the season is now 6.3.

His performance for the Idaho Vandals ranks him as 11th in total offense, which includes both passing and running. Gary does not pass.

Vandal quarterback George Eidam is the conference's number five passer according to official statistics released this week by the commissioner's office for games of Friday and Saturday.

Eidam has a completion average of .370, 119 passes and 44 completions, two of which went for scores. Eidam's key pass target, Frank Teverbaugh remains in the top fifteen Coast receivers with 17 receptions for 150 yards gained.

Gary has intercepted four passes for Idaho to remain in a tie for second place in that department. Eidam's punting has averaged 33.9 yards per kick.

As an offensive unit Idaho stands third in rushing behind Southern California and UCLA. From scrimmage, the Vandals have averaged 201.6 yards per game and a net gain of 1,613 yards for the eight contests.

The Vandals place seventh in total offense, third in pass interceptions, seventh in punting, second in punt returns, fifth in kick-off returns and sixth in rush defense.

Idaho is last in two departments, passing offense and defense.

Volleyball Teams Scrap

Intramural volleyball got off to a flying start this week with a total of 32 matches being played to date. Competition has been very keen with many close matches reported.

In Thursday's action eight teams emerged victorious. Delta Tau Delta d. Alpha Tau Omega, Sigma Chi d. Delta Sigma Phi, Pine Hall II d. Campys II, Lindley Hall II d. Chrisman Hall II, Tau Kappa Epsilon d. Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Sigma Nu d. Phi Kappa Tau, Lambda Chi Alpha d. Phi Gamma Delta by forfeit, Phi Delta Theta d. Latter Day Saints.

Standings for action to date will be announced Monday. Willis Sweet Hall 1 has proven themselves a powerhouse in the Independent Division, winning both their matches by considerable margins, and they threaten to win another 1954 intramural sport championship.

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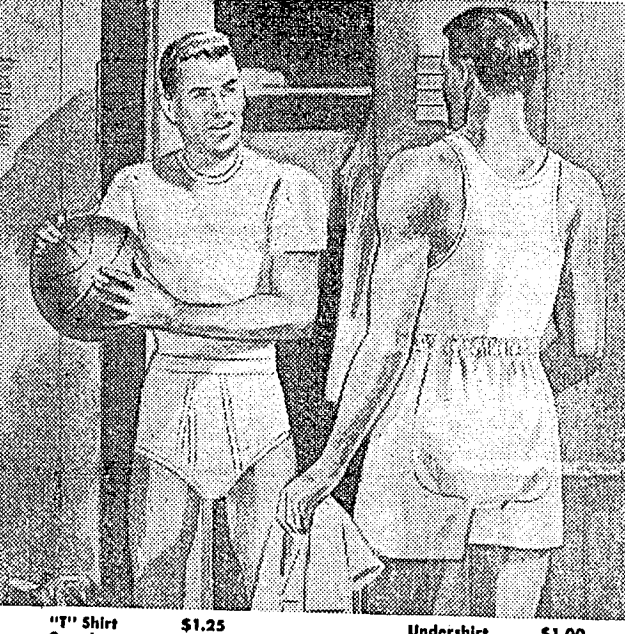
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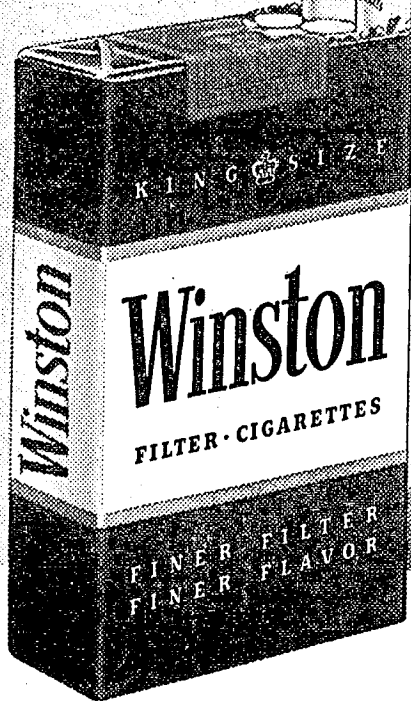
