

Managing Editor On February 16, 1904 at a mass meeting of the students of the University of Idaho a constitution was ratified that has affected every University of Idaho

student's life since then. The constitution led to the setting up of the Associated Students of the Uni-versity of Idaho of which the students delegated supervisual powers to the Executive Board, ASUI president and general manager in order to promote and maintain those activities

which have been delegated by the Board of Regents to student control.

According to the revised 1948 constitution, membership of the Executive Board consists of nine members chosen for a period of one year at the annual April

It is the ASUI president's job to preside at all meetings of the Executive Board and act as chairman of the

The nine members of the board are chosen by proportional representation from the incoming junior and senior classes each spring. The first official act of each new Executive Board is to elect from its own membership the vice-president and

secretary of the ASUI. Four other members of the Board who preside exofficio are the editor of the Argonaut, the president of the Associated Women Students, the General Manager and the Director of Student

Affairs. The duties of the central governing body as outlined by the constitution are that it is to be in charge of the departments of the ASUI and that it has full control of all ASUI funds and property. This is subject to provisions by the Board of Regents.

It has the power to make appointments to fill any vacancies occurring in ASUI offices. It also keeps a check on the accounts of all officers and managers of the ASUI. In conjunction with this it also has the power to authorize in full or in part any expense incurred by students organizations not represented in an official department of the ASUI, provided that the General Manager is consulted before such authorization is made.

The Executive Board must pass on all student body, class and organization functions and it has the duty to exercise supervision and control over the same. The Board also grants all ASUI awards.

To compensate for all these duties the ASUI has provided to every person who has served as a regular member of the Executive Board a five year pass to all ASUI activities.
