\$42,645.70 Suit Filed By Student In District Court

A \$42,645.70 damage suit of John Lazovich, a Washington State College student, has been filed against Madison Lumber and Mill Company and Roy Hargraves, 19, a University of Idaho student. The case is being tried in U.S. District Court here.

The action stems from an auto-truck accident on Pullman road October 1, inside Moscow's city limits. Lazovich charges Hargraves, operating a truck owned by the lumber firm, with negligence, and claims the lumber company should not have entrusted use of the truck to an "inexperienced and incompetent" driver.

Lazovich, another WSC student and an Idaho student, all occupants of a convertible, were injured J. H. Felton is the attorney for Lazovich. He said he would prove Hargraves had obtained the truck for use in a Homecoming float and that the truck was subsequently taken to a tavern near the west of Moscow's city limits the evening of October 1.

Dorm Rent Rates To Be Increased Next School Year

Dormitory board rates at the University of Idaho are scheduled to remain the same for the next academic year, but room rents will go up from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per semester, it was announced today by President D. R. Theophilus.

The increases were approved by the regents after a review of deficits in the Idaho dormitory building and operation system, and of charges made at other institutions throughout the West and Midwest. The rates adopted for 1955-56 were based on recommendations by the University Operations Council, which conducted a detailed study of the problem.

"Raising of our dormitory rates has been inevitable for some time," said Business Manager Kenneth A. Dick. "Our outgo has simply been too much greater than our income. We have long taken pride in the fact that our dormitory costs have been among the lowest in the nation—and they will be with the increases—but increases had to come."

The recommendations of the Operations Council approved by the Regents point out that further increases will be necessary for 1956-57 and 1957-58 in the long-delayed closing of the gap between income and expenditures. It was decided, however, to keep increases for the coming year to a minimum.

Smallest increases will be at the Campus Club, \$3.50 per semester, the Idaho Club, \$5 and Lindley Hall, \$6. Rates for all other dormitories will go up \$10 a semester. Charges for the new men's dormitories, Gault-Upham, will be \$80 a semester, and for the new women's dormitory, French House, \$70.

Dr. Hall Will Address 60th Commencement Class

Dr. Clarence W. Hall, New York City, executive editor of the Christian Herald magazine, will give the baccalaureate commencement address at the University of Idaho's 60th graduation exercises at 10 a.m. Sunday, June 5, it was announced today by President D. R. Theophilus.

The Christian Herald an interdenominational publication, has the world's largest circulation for a magazine of its kind. Hall is editorial director of Lifetime Living magazine and a member of the executive committee of Magazine Publishers association.

As a writer, he has had his work published in national magazines including the Readers Digest. He is the author of books, "Out of the Depths," "Life of Henry F. Milans," and "Samuel Logan Brengle, Portrait of a Prophet," and co-author of the book, "Protestant Panorama."

A native of Florida, Hall was a newspaperman there, and in Georgia before turning to magazine work. He is the former editor and founder of the Christian Advocate magazine. During World War II, he was a foreign correspondent in the Pacific theatre. He has been a special lecturer in journalism colleges and at summer writers' schools. He holds doctorate degrees from Nebraska Wesleyan University and Tampa University.

Idaho Background For Vandal Head Wins \$10 Prize

Cadet Lt. Col. Robert H. Emmons, of Cincinnati, Ohio, has been named the winner of a new ten dollar bill for designing the award winning shoulder patch for the Idaho Air Force ROTC.

Competition for the shoulder patch entry ended on April 29 with 24 patches being entered. Cadet Emmons is a senior majoring in forestry and commander of the 90th group in the local AFROTC cadet wing. Cadet Col. Edward L. Claiborn made the award to Emmons at the Air Force detachment last Thursday afternoon.

The new emblem which will be worn on the shoulder of AFROTC uniform is a Vandal crest set on the state of Idaho, with a banner reading AFROTC at the bottom. This is mounted on top of a blue background with "Idaho" printed in silver letters and surrounded by a gold border.

The emblem has considerable meaning according to Emmons. The background of the state of Idaho is represented in gold to signify one of the school's colors. The Vandal head, another well known symbol of the school, represents strength, courage, stamina and tenacity. The wings on the helmet of the Vandal head denote the flying status of the Air Force and the AFROTC.

The wings and helmet are in silver to denote the second color of the University of Idaho, and the wings are changed from the typical ones found on regular school emblems to the half-wing worn by senior AFROTC cadets to signify flight training. The banner, in red, is for the purposes of entering the designation AFROTC.

For his work with the Inland Empire section of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, Prof. Norman F. Cosmos Will Get New 'P' House




The show, which is being produced by Rickey Jones in conjunction with a radio class project, will be directed by Joe Corless.

Marine Aviation Is Being Stressed In New Program

The first new program for Marine officers since World War II is called the Aviation Officer Candidate Course and will result in earlier commissions as second lieutenants for men desiring to become Marine pilots. The AOCC will be offered to college graduates. They will attend a 10-week basic indoctrination course at Marine Corps Schools, Quantico. This course will give them basic Marine Corps training, with an emphasis on the infantry aspects. Successful graduates of this 18 month orientation course will receive Marine Corps commissions and be ordered to active duty as student aviators. Requirements for the program include:

1. Age of more than 20 years and less than 27 on July 1 of the year in which commissioned;
2. Highly motivated and adapted for flying, and of a high moral character;
3. Citizens of the United States of America;
4. Graduate of an accredited college;
5. Able to meet the physical requirements for aviation.

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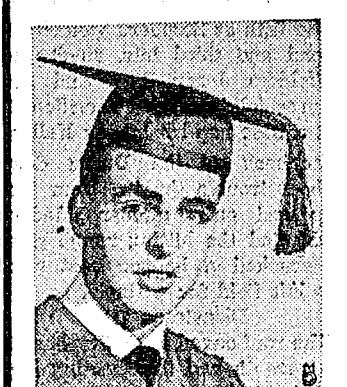
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Spring Engagements Revealed At Dinners
