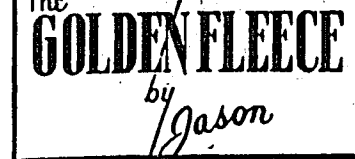


THORNOCK WILL SERVE AS ASUI VEEP

Exec Board Wants Full Representation

Better student government and more student representation in the ASUI is the underlying theme of the new Exec Board members. As a result of interviews held with the new members the following is an account of how the board members feel about their positions and how government should be improved.
ASUI President, Chuck McDevitt—"The program for the coming year is to expand the participation of students in all aspects of student government, to strengthen the relations with the elected student officials and to keep students better informed and encourage wider participation and allowing the students to take a hand in making decisions.
"Through this program it is hoped to obtain complete student backing of the actions of their student government and therefore make the student government sufficiently strong so that it can push through programs that will increase student facilities and generally make the University a better place for students to go to school."
Dewey Newman—"Through co-operation with the other members I would like to investigate and come to some solution for such problems as the Pep Band, Student Recruitment, Students Facilities Fees and their use and student activities in general."
John Gillis—"The two main objectives I will strive for are: (1) A more coordinated and effective student government and (2) a more workable relationship between the students and University officials and alumni. I don't wish to infer that our present student government or our faculty and alumni relations are not good. I believe there is room for improvement and like anything else,

there always will be. Personally, my position on the executive board is of an instigator and coordinator."
George Eidam—"The main things I will try to accomplish are to get many of the committees better organized with their specific purposes explained to them and the power of the committee clearly defined. Also, to bring about an effective compromise between the merchants and the students."
John Thornock—"I would like to emphasize that I am willing and open to student wishes. I think that the group elected and the president are very capable and I will enjoy working with a group that I feel has the best interests of students and the University at heart."
Carol Rojan—"In the coming year, I of course, will pay particular attention to the planks put forth in our platform, and also those proposed by other parties that I feel would benefit the University and its students. I especially would like to see an investigation made of the voting systems, and have a complete report of this made to the students, and then a change made if this is felt necessary. I would like to seek out the possibilities of a new approach to handle the campaign proceedings."
Mike O'Callaghan—"The board should represent the people and should fulfill the needs of the students as these needs are brought before the board."
Karen Lee Krauss—"I'm sure

Cosmopolitan Club will officially present the \$400 refugee scholarship to University President D. R. Theophilus at a ceremony at 4 p.m. in SUB Conference Rooms A and B, following election of officers there at 3 p.m.
Club officers will be installed at the ceremony, and Willis Sweet Hall representatives will present their part of the scholarship, a year's free room, to the University also. The scholarship will be awarded next fall to a refugee student chosen by the club.
Open House will be held at the new International House directly east of the Student Union, following the ceremonies.
The new house, which has four rooms downstairs, has recently been remodeled by the owner, C. R. Stillinger, Moscow. The rooms upstairs will be used by four Cosmopolitan Club members this summer for summer school housing, and will be rented by four other members next year.

The Idaho football schedule for 1956 and 1957 will include home and home games with Fresno State College, Fresno, Calif., it was announced here today by Bob Gibb, athletic director following approval by the athletic board of control.

The 1956 contest will be in Fresno on November 3, while the 1957 contest will be held in Moscow on October 26.

The two teams have met previously, 1946, when Fresno State emerged the winner 13 to 12. Fresno State is coached by Clark Van Galder and has an enrollment of 4,000.

The home-and-home series will bring Idaho's tentative grid schedule for both years within one or two games of completion, Gibb said. An effort is being made in those years for a 10-game schedule.

The WSC win made the final standings between the two schools at 3-3 with one tie.

Campus trackmen will go after living group laurels this weekend in the annual all-intramural track meet beginning at 1 in Neale Stadium. The Fijis racked up the softball crown this past week with a playoff win over Willis Sweet 1 by a 6-2 count.

Over 250 entries have been made in the track meet.

Points given in the preliminary track events will be 5, 3, 2 and 1 for the first four places and 10, 8, 6, 4, 2 and 1 in the finals for the first six finishers.

Each living group enters two men in each event and place four men on the 880-yard relay team. Director Larry Golding said competitors must use tennis shoes, that all spiked footwear would be eliminated.

Golding listed general instructions for all competitors:

1. "When a race is called for, report immediately. If you are not at the start when the heat is ready, you will be scratched.
2. At the end of the race stay on the track so the judges can get your name and house. If you leave the track and cannot be found you will be scratched.
3. There is no time schedule for the preliminaries—therefore be ready in plenty of time.
4. Running events take preference over field events. If you are in a field event and your race is called, tell the official you will be back after you have run.
5. In the 50 yard and 100 yds. the first two men in each heat qualify. In all other events qualification will be on time and distance.
6. Check the board in Room 201, Memorial Gym for list of men qualifying for the track finals.

Field events start: 1:00 p.m. sharp!
Running events start: 1:30 p.m. sharp!

The Vandals have improved greatly during the final few meets and should bring home around 20 points, the coach predicted.

Making the trip are Wilbur Gary, sprinter-broadjump; Lou Gourley, two-mile; Bill Bauscher, 220-broadjump-relay; Jay Buhler, relay; Frank Teverbaugh, relay; Henning Olsen, 440-relay; Gary Dixon, 440-relay; Larry Church, hurdles-broadjump; Buzz Hanson, javelin-high hurdles; Jerry Duffy, pole vault-high jump; Duane Hodgson, javeline and Nick Speropolus, discus.

Gourley and Dixon will be competing in their final Northern Division meet as the co-captains are seniors. Both competed four seasons in track. Glander figures on this pair to get the major Vandal points along with Hanson and Gary. Idaho placed fifth in the division meet last year with 12 points. Gourley took third in the two-mile, Church fourth in the high hurdles and broadjump and Olsen second in the 440.

Huskies Hope For Six Wins

The host Washington Huskies hope to pick up six first place ribbons to Oregon's five in Saturday's Northern Division track and field meet at Seattle, but the talent-laden Ducks from Eugene figure to win their third straight team championship by scoring in each event.

Seven 1954 champions will defend their laurels in the meet, and all but two are expected to finish on top again.
