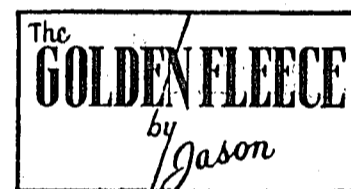

Legion Groups Drop Loyalty Controversy

The University's short-lived controversy with the American Legion has nearly faded out of the picture with the withdrawal of action by one of the interested Legion parties. The North Idaho members of the American Legion came out Monday asking that the University cancel the speech scheduled by Dr. R. M. Hutchins, president of the Fund for the Republic and associate director of the Ford Foundation since 1951.



The biggest Homecoming celebration that students and alumni of the University of Idaho have seen in many a year is booming off to a sparkling start tonight at McLean field with a rally, fireworks, talks by the captains of the football team and an assortment of yells by the students.

Homecoming chairman Kenny Wright and staff, over the weeks, have really cooked up a schedule, as you can see elsewhere on this page. As the alumni will readily see, a few people have been working to make this one the best.

The two resolutions received from district conventions of the American Legion in northern Idaho seem to have fallen by the wayside. President D. R. Theophilus certainly deserves a pat on the back for the fine stand that the administration took on the subject.

It seems to be the opinion of some Idahoans that students of the University of Idaho are still in childhood and that we need a few overseers to call the shots for us. This writer is sure that such is not the case. If the younger generation can't stand on their own two feet now, I'm convinced American wouldn't be what it is today.

The Dudley Loomis post of Moscow has failed to follow the resolution which stated that Hutchins' "public utterances and testimony before congressional investigation committees have indicated that he and his associates are trying to propagandize Americans into believing" certain Communist principles.

The action on the part of the Legion brought instant stands at the University, first from President D. R. Theophilus and later from veterans of the armed services currently enrolled at the University of Idaho.

More than 200 vets at a meeting conducted by ASUI president Chuck McDevitt, also a veteran, issued a press statement today.

Vets Resolve
The statement read: "Be it hereby resolved that we, the veterans of the armed services currently enrolled at the University of Idaho, do resent the attempt of outside agencies to influence the policy making functions of the University of Idaho by coercion and publicity.

"Be it further resolved that we, the veterans of the armed services currently enrolled at the University of Idaho, do support the individuals, who by law have been placed in administrative capacity at the University of Idaho, in their decision to determine themselves, as educators in conjunction with the student body, what shall be fit and proper for students at this institution to hear and to see."

President Theophilus called Dr. Hutchins "an outstanding speaker on education."

The issue was brought up at meetings of the North Idaho Legion posts in Coeur d'Alene and Genesee, but since the issuance, little action has been taken on the part of the Legion groups.

Homecoming Kicked Off With Parade

Homecoming activities on the University of Idaho campus will kick off tonight at 6:30 when all freshmen women will participate in the pajama parade through men's living groups. The girls will wind up the serpentine at 6:50 at the SUB.

Students will meet at the SUB at 6:50 and will go to McLean Field from there. The parade to McLean Field will be led by the band and cheer-leaders.

The program at McLean Field will include yells led by the rally squad, a skit by Kappa Kappa Gamma, a talk by football coach Skip Stahley and a huge fireworks display.

Introduce Vandals
The rally will also include introduction of sophomores and juniors on the football team as groups. Seniors will be introduced individually. Marsh Jones and Ed Hilder, Idaho's co-captains, will each give a short speech.

The rally squad has asked that each living group bring a banner to the rally. This banner should have the football game as its theme and should be present during the rally.

A member of the Delta Gamma sorority, she has been an Idaho cheer leader for the past two years. As Queen, she will reign over the entire weekend of Homecoming activities.

Today the queen and five finalists will travel to Lewiston to appear in the Sesquicentennial parade. The queen will be announced among the group in a small ceremony atop Lewiston Hill. Marilyn Briggs and Donald Konkol are donating their cars to transport the girls to Lewiston. Konkol will donate his car for the queen's float in the Saturday parade and the halftime events.

Accompanying the queen and finalists to Lewiston will be Konkol, Briggs, Kenny Wright, Homecoming Chairman, and Harriette Hanna, Queen's Committee Chairman. Thanks to the Idaho Spurs for their help in distributing the ballots in the men's living groups during the days of election and thanks to the Idaho Club, who is making the Queen's Float with the advice of the Queen's committee. Many thanks are due Jim Lyle, Alumni Sec. for his work to obtain a trailer for the float.

The Queen will reign over the parade and dance. She will be crowned at halftime of the game. A trophy will be presented during the dance. It will remain in the living group where she lives.

Campus Open To 'Old Gang'

Homecoming, 1955, will be celebrated at the University of Idaho this week-end with a full program of events scheduled for the entertainment of returning alumni and other friends of the institution.

While the student body entertains the "old grads," the Vandal football team will play host to College of Pacific at 2 p.m. Saturday in the feature attraction of the weekend. Other colorful events Saturday will include the Homecoming parade beginning at 9:30 a.m., and the annual dance in the Student Union building at 9 p.m.

The weekend's activities will actually begin at 3 p.m. Friday with alumni registration at the SUB and Hotel Moscow. Events Friday night will include a pajama parade, fireworks display and pep rally. Vandal Boosters have scheduled a business meeting at the SUB for 11 a.m. Saturday, and

the new Permeal French women's dormitory will be dedicated at 11:30 a.m. All living groups on campus will have "open house" following the game.

The 1955 Homecoming is being held in conjunction with Lewiston's Sesquicentennial Lewis and Clark celebration, also scheduled this weekend. Lewis and Clark's exploration of Idaho — the Birth of Idaho — is the theme of the program. The University band and queen's float will take part in a parade at Lewiston Friday morning.

The queen will be officially crowned by Governor Robert E. Smylie during halftime ceremonies (Continued on Page 2, Col. 8)

65 Entries To Float In Gala Alum Parade

Thirty-one living groups and organizations have put their efforts together to present one of the largest parades ever presented in this area, said Homecoming Chairman Kenny Wright. A total of sixty-five entries have been received from Students, merchants and organizations.

The Homecoming parade will start at 9:30 Saturday morning and will form at 9:15 on A street. All entries must be in position by 9:15 a.m. or they will be disqualified. The parade will go south on Main, west on Eighth, north on Jackson, west on Sixth and south on Deakin.

Each section of the parade is assigned a specific area for forming, and each entry will have a number assigned in each section. Cards will be placed to the rear of the specific section assigned each entry. Guides will be stationed in each section to assist the entries in getting correctly placed. Each entry is to place a poster in plain view on the front with their entry section and number printed on it. As the float approaches the formation area the guides can spot this number and lead the floats into the assigned position. The poster then can be disposed of.

Watch The I.K.'s
IK's will be placed at locations along the parade route to keep the floats correctly spaced and to keep the parade moving. It is requested that floats keep a 70 foot interval between entries.

A judging number will be assigned each living group in the formation area by an IK. Floats will not be judged if the number is not apparent and not in the proper location. The number must be located on the right front corner of the float.

At the conclusion of the parade, floats are to proceed to the vacant lot behind the SAE house. Drivers need not remain with the floats.

Art Misner, parade chairman, reminds living groups to check gas, oil, and air in tires and make sure the motor is in good running order in float vehicles. He also suggests that floats be at the formation area early and living groups should figure out a route in which their floats can be taken to the formation area.

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Darkness Promotes Danger

Hazards become more dangerous when they're not visible. Maintains the Traffic Safety Director Harold Davis. For example, a stalled car on a roadway is dangerous at any time, but at night it's doubly dangerous. An approaching driver can't see it until it comes within the range of his headlights. Then it suddenly looms up out of nowhere, and the driver has a difficult time swerving or stopping his car in time to avoid hitting it.

The same is true of holes in the road, pedestrians walking along the street or roadway, or any object that may lie in the driver's path.

It's obvious that the driver's best weapons against such night traffic hazards are a good pair of headlights, a speed that won't outrace those lights, and a constant attitude of alertness.

Safety Director Harold Davis reminds motorists that although less driving is done in the hours of twilight, darkness and dawn than is done in daylight, the number of people killed in traffic accidents during those hours exceeds the number killed in traffic accidents during daylight hours. This applies to pedestrians as well as to drivers and passengers in cars.

The Traffic Safety Division of the Department of Law Enforcement of the State of Idaho cautions elderly pedestrians especially to use extra vigilance if they venture out into traffic in the dark. Traffic takes a heavy toll of walkers in the 65 or over age bracket, in fact, about two out of five pedestrians killed are from this group.

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Speeding Proves Fatal To Two, Injures Third

John Paterson, 24, Chicago, and Todd Spencer Rathbone, 26, San Mateo, Calif., WSC freshmen, were killed early yesterday morning in a one-car accident near the Pullman city limits. Mrs. Nancy Kincaid, 20, Moscow, was injured.

Traveling at a high rate of speed, the car crossed the center line on a wide sweeping curve, struck the left shoulder of the road and went over the bank, rolled over several times and stopped, wheels up on a railroad track. The curve is posted at 45 miles per hour. The car traveled 540 feet from the center line of the highway, said Officer George Metcalf of the Washington State patrol.

According to Metcalf the car was traveling west towards Pullman on the Moscow-Pullman highway and left the road less than a half mile from the Pullman city limits.

Peterson, apparently the driver, was killed instantly. Rathbone died in a hospital at 1:40 a.m., 15 minutes after the accident.

Mrs. Kincaid, mother of a three-year-old son, has been employed for several months as a waitress at a local restaurant. She suffered a fractured pelvis, cuts and bruises, and is confined to Finch Memorial hospital in Pullman.

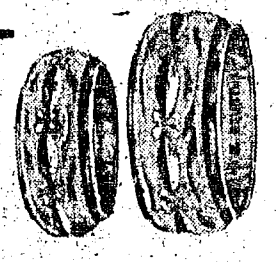


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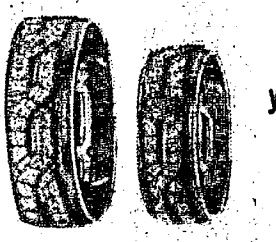

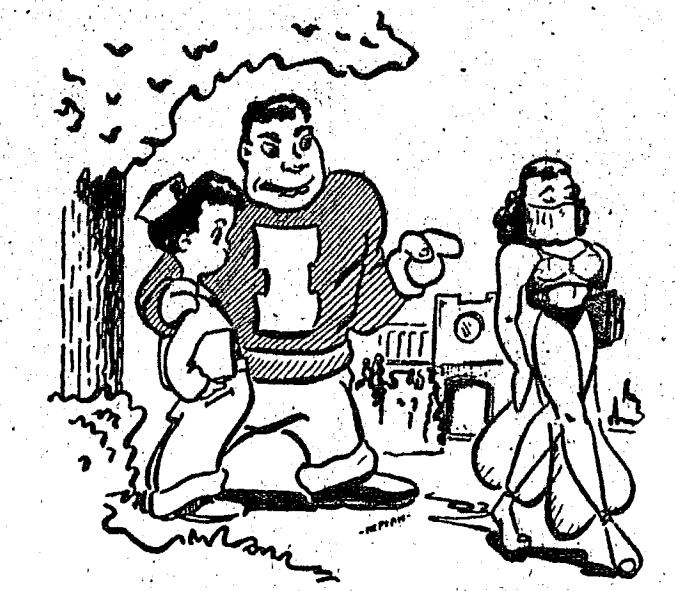

Dedication Of French Is Saturday

The first of two dormitory dedications will be held at the University of Idaho Saturday, with the dedication of Permeal French house at 11:30 a.m.

Regent Marguerite Campbell, New Meadows, will give the dedicatory address, and Margaret Draper, student president of the dormitory, will give the response. Dr. D. R. Theophilus, President of the University, will preside at the ceremonies.

The dormitory, which was opened this fall to house 60 women students, is named after the former dean of women who died in Seattle a year ago, Miss French, who re-

tired in 1936, seldom missed a football homecoming celebration at the University for many years thereafter, and the dormitory named in her honor is being significantly dedicated on the day of the homecoming game with the College of Pacific.

The following Saturday, October 15, Gault and Upham dormitories, which house a total of 277

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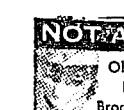
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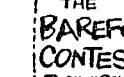

On The Arm



It's nothing new—but you have got to have attendance and financial support to run a college football team. Small and large colleges are today finding it more and more difficult to get the football fans to come out to their park and witness an afternoon of competitive football.

Here at Idaho we are in the midst of a building program and should Idaho football fans blame anyone for the poor showing as far as scores go, then let's hire a magician instead of a coach—horses instead of college players.

Live television in this area has hurt Idaho and WSC at the gate. Such football powers as Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Southern California and others have been built up by television industries to the point that the average TV viewer has been captivated into following these teams through the modern means of the home screen and have forgotten about teams they have followed loyally in the past.

The attendance at last year's WSC-Idaho game exemplifies this point. For years, Idaho and WSC have been traditional rivals and fans from Spokane, Lewiston, Moscow, Pullman and surrounding cities have flocked from here and there to witness this annual classic of the Palouse.

With live television in these people's homes few now take the time or trouble to attend games in this area. A Spokaneite who hasn't missed a game in fifty years said this weekend that he didn't want to miss the game of the week on TV or drive all the way to Pullman to see the game.

Schools such as Idaho and WSC, which are located in towns which can not totally support their athletics, are being hurt all over the nation as a result.

And as we have discussed when you don't have the paid admission you can't support a vast program such as is being built at Idaho and carried out at WSC. Attendance at both schools is down from past years and the decrease is evenly tapering off each season.

Can't Ban TV

It is a cinch that you can't televise all of the area games or ban football from the television screen but something must be done to prevent television in general from ruining football gates in such cases as Idaho and WSC.

The University of Idaho this year again obtained the finest prep football players in the state and has a fine coaching staff. This, as you know, has been expensive, for modern football as it is played today is tremendously expensive.

Prizes for the winners in each event will be, belt buckles, first; boots, second; shirts, third; and levis, fourth.

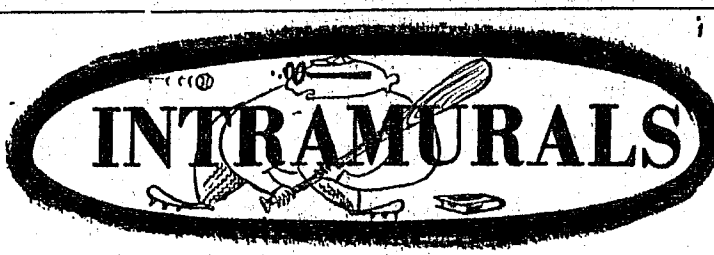


