This contest promotes friendly rivalry between the Greek living groups and also gets out the voters.

Jason would like to interest a few self-propelled independent living group people to take the initiative on that side of the campus, if it has not already been done, and create a similar scheme to get out the voters.

It is sad, but let's face the facts: each party or living group is going to have to offer some inducement to the students before they will get interested enough or even bother to vote.

The Independents are not the only people that are behind in the voting percentages. The other one-third of the student body that lives off-campus has also a negative showing at the polls. What is the reason?

Don't these people consider that it is important for the University of Idaho to have competent student leaders? In a closely knit community such as the University, this writer feels that there is no reason why 90 to 100 per cent returns at the ASUI polls couldn't be an actual fact.

Voters need only to be regularly enrolled and have their ASUI activities card with them to exercise this fundamental right of American democracy, the voice of the people.

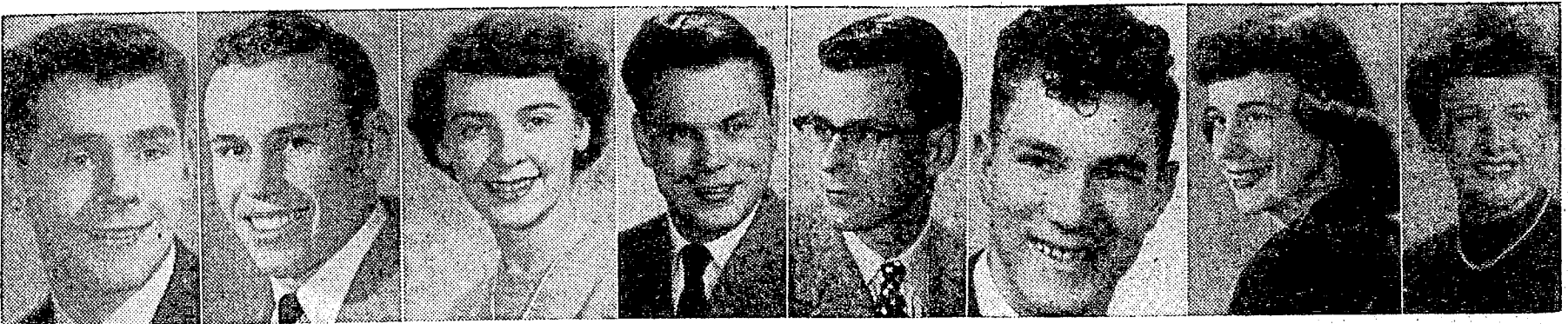

## Ralph Lapp To Appear On Friday

Shortened periods, the opportunity to gain knowledge on atomic energy, and the chance to get out an hour of classes will greet Idaho students this Friday when Dr. Ralph E. Lapp, nuclear physicist and atomic scientist, will appear at the Memorial Gymnasium to discuss a topic entitled "The World of Tomorrow."

Friday morning classes will run for 35 minutes with first period, 8:35-8:50; second, 8:55-9:10; third period, 9:15-9:30; and fourth period, 9:35-9:50. The assembly will begin at 11 a.m.

Dr. Lapp, director of the Nuclear Science Service, has written several books and articles dealing with atomic energy, and following World War II led in the scientific group at both A-bomb tests in Bikini. He also is a consultant and lecturer on atomic theories, and possesses the knack of explaining complicated scientific matters in terms that the average person can readily understand.

After he left government service and established his own scientific consulting service, his nuclear associates were prompted to call him "the one free physicist." The youthful atomic authority remarks about this, "Where I in the AEC or the Defense Department, I could not write or say what I believe must be told about the problems, progress and possibilities of atomic energy—always within the very strict bounds of national security," he hastens to add.

## Lewiston League Praises Theophilus For Firmness

The Lewiston League of Women Voters commended President D. R. Theophilus in an open letter Sunday for his firm stand in support of academic freedom when he declined recently to cancel the speaking engagement of the educator Dr. Robert Hutchins.

The League president, Marion Bender Swartz, stated in the letter, "We recall that in similar circumstances other University presidents in other places have yielded to the kind of pressure brought to bear upon President Theophilus, and we are therefore grateful that there is at the head of our State University a man who values so deeply as to defend them in this way, the freedom of a democratic people."

"It seems to us that it is presumptuous for one group of citizens to set themselves up as judge of what or whom it is wise for another citizen to hear. Furthermore, we believe that democratic values cannot be preserved by undemocratic methods—that communism will not be defeated by our adopting its own detested means. We do not doubt the sincerely patriotic motives of the groups who seek to tell us what it is good for us to hear, but we do protest our right as free American citizens to decide that matter for ourselves."

"Perhaps it is true," the letter went on, "to say that universities are institutions dedicated to the search for truth. If they are to remain that, all points of view must be freely presented there in classrooms and on the public platform. We have faith enough in our democratic institutions to believe that their merits will be evident when compared with other systems."

"Since we have no idea what it will contain, we do not endorse Dr. Hutchins' speech, but because we believe in free speech, we believe he has a right to express his ideas in a public institution of this State, especially since it is an institution dedicated to the search for truth."

## Legion Aims Guns On Hutchins Again

The American Legion last night here in Moscow apparently loaded their guns for well-known educator Dr. Robert M. Hutchins, State commander Leslie McCarthy of Lewiston met with the members of the Dudley-Loomis Post. The group barred reporters.

Russell Short, post commander, said earlier in the day that a special committee studying the Hutchins issued was to make a full report.

McCarthy said two weeks ago to the Argonaut, that the State Legion was fully behind the stand of two Northern Idaho Legion districts in the desire to cancel the speaking engagement of the chairman of the Fund for the Republic. The state figure said he will make a public statement to the University through the school paper when complete studies of Dr. Hutchins have been made by the posts involved.

According to C. H. Bond, temporary advisor to the new Vandal Veteran's Organization, McCarthy has been asked to meet with the VVO.

## Vote-Or Don't Complain

Election time has rolled around again, and the traditional fanfare of posters, house visitations, etc., are in full swing. This year we have noticed a definite increase in the fever of campus elections. There are more posters, more candidates, and more campaigning in the class elections this year than in any of the past three years. Perhaps this is due to a third party; perhaps it is due to better candidates; maybe the intensified Argonaut political coverage has helped, or it may be due to all of these plus more.

Whatever the reason for the increased interest, we feel it is a boon to the education of the student body. The habits we form in our college years and earlier are the ones we keep throughout life. However, one prerequisite to getting something done is having people capable of doing the job. This is your responsibility. Some of our candidates in this election are real live wires interested in student government. Then some of our candidates seem to be pretty much of dead heads as far as leadership is concerned. It's your job and only yours to see that the right people are elected.

Remember, student government is what you make it. If only a few vote, only a few are going to be interested, and the officers will act accordingly. However, if you really get out and participate, you can force your class officers to give you the best year you have ever had.

## Idaho Helps Its Retarded

Parents of mentally retarded children began to organize in groups about 25 years ago. They found that together they could work for their children's welfare much better than they could alone. By working together they founded cooperative schools for their children so they could be given the attention needed by such children.

During World War II the people of our country came to accept mental retardation as something not to be ashamed of, but rather as something which we could accept and do something about. In October, 1950, representatives of 13 states met in Minneapolis to form the National Association for Retarded Children, a non-profit non-sectarian federation of local and state associations dedicated to promoting the welfare of all mentally retarded persons everywhere.

Today the association is an organization consisting of hundreds of member units which reside in all of the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and Alaska. One of the finest organizational units in the Northwest is in our own Sandpoint, Idaho, where the people through hard work and perseverance have accomplished much to help the retarded child.

Not only has this North Idaho unit given much to the retarded child materially, but it has also contributed much to the better understanding of the child. One means of promoting better understanding of the retarded child is the organization's publication, "Your Child and Mine." The Sandpoint School for the retarded child has many counterparts throughout the state of Idaho in the towns of Moscow, Emmett, the Idaho Falls area, and the Lincoln School at Boise. At this time St. Maries is also organizing a school for the children.

The aims and purposes of the NARC are as follows:

1. To promote the general welfare of mentally retarded children at home, in the community, in institutions, and in private, public and religious schools;
2. To further research on all aspects of the problem of mental retardation; cause and prevention, medical and social treatment, methods of special education;
3. To develop a better understanding of the problems by the general public, and to co-operate with all public, private and religious agencies, international, federal, state and local departments of education, health and institutions;
4. To further the training and education of personnel for work in the field of mental retardation;
5. To encourage the formation of parent's groups; to advise and aid parents in the solution of their problems, and to co-ordinate all local associations working for the welfare of mentally retarded children;
6. To implement existing legislation in behalf of the mentally retarded;
7. To serve as a clearing house of information on these children and to encourage the development of integrated community programs in their behalf;
8. To solicit and receive funds for the accomplishment of the above purposes.

The national association and its member units have done much to help the retarded child in the past few years. The best contribution we as college students can make to this worthy cause is better understanding of the child and the problems he and his parents face in today's world.

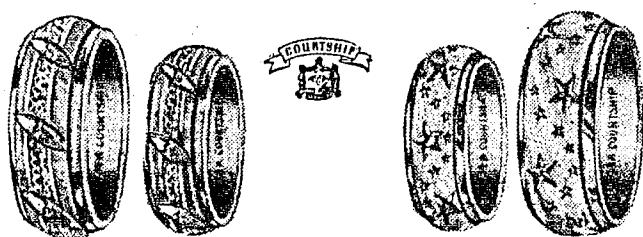

# WANDALS SCORE TWICE; BUT LOSE SEVENTH

## Coach Praises Team In Loss; Play BYU At Provo Friday

Although they did their first scoring in four games the winless Idaho Vandals dropped a 33 to 14 decision to Oregon State Saturday afternoon at Eugene.

The Vandals held the edge in most statistical departments and trailed by only seven points, 21 to 14, early in the final quarter, but two quick OSC TD's in the last period put the game out of the Vandals' reach.

Idaho hit the road again this weekend, their third straight game away from home, travelling to Provo, Utah to meet BYU Cougars Friday afternoon.

The Vandals will not scrimmage this week due to lack of manpower and the fact that they must leave Thursday morning for Provo.

Commenting on his team's loss to OSC, coach Skip Stahley praised his squad for their spirit and fight and said that they played a good ball game but lacked speed. "They just ran away from us on that 80 yard punt return," said the Skipper. "Our passing was all right and rushing offense improved, the boys all did a fine job."

The only Idaho injury resulting from the game was a dislocated elbow suffered by reserve end Dick Newby, putting him out for the season.

**Opened Scoring**  
Oregon State opened the scoring in the first three minutes of the ball game when fleet back Dick Mason picked up a 44 yard punt by Nick Uglesich on the OSC 20 and ran it back 80 yards for a touchdown. Ted Searle, who started the game at quarterback for the Beavers in place of the injured regular Siegrist, booted the extra point giving the hosts a seven point advantage.

However, Idaho fought back gamely and quickly evened up the score again. Halfback Ray Bittner recovered a Beaver fumble on the OSC 32 and after having one score called back because of a penalty, Ron Braden, junior halfback, sliced through tackle from two yards out for the Vandal TD. Sophomore Jerry Kramer added the tying extra point.

OSC took the lead again just before the end of the quarter with Mason scoring his second TD on an eight yard sweep around end. Fullback Bob Sutton set up the score with a run to the Idaho 20. Sutton was sprung loose on a direct pass from Searle and rambled 70 yards before being brought down from behind by fleet-footed Wilbur Gary.

**Blocked Punt**  
The Beavers scored their third TD in the second period when junior guard Ron Daniels broke

Overwhelming long runs and passes were major contributors to the Vandal Babe's 40 to 14 defeat suffered at the hands of the Washington Husky Pups Saturday afternoon in Seattle.

The Pups wasted no time in letting the Vandal Frosh know what was in store for them, with quarterback Lee Grosscup, Santa Monica, Calif., hitting Luther Carr for 20 yards. Washington was penalized 15 yards but Grosscup quickly hit with a 30 yards toss to Don Millich, who went the rest of the 78 to score.

Idaho picked up its touchdowns in the first and last periods on two short plunges. For the first count, halfback T. J. Owens went through the center of the line for two and in the last period halfback John Missetich plunged one yard for the TD.

Washington scored once in the first period on the pass to Millich from Grosscup, twice each in the second and third quarters, and once again in the fourth period. The longest run of the game came when Washington's Luther (Hit and Run) Carr, speedy back from Tacoma, hit right tackle in the third period for 94 yards.

It was a very good day for passing in Seattle, although the field was a little soft, but the Vandal Babes showed little or no pass defense, with Washington hitting 12 of their 15 attempted passes, two of these for scores.

The Vandal Babes lacked the spark which had carried them to an easy victory over Montana Frosh the week before but coach Clem Parberry named several outstanding individuals.

**Coach Praises**  
Backs John Missetich, who scored one TD and Len Jacobowitz came in for praise from the coach as well as end Alf Bourque. Bourque recovered a pair of fumbles and snagged onto several passes thrown by quarterback Bill Davidson.

The Vandal Frosh make their only home appearance of the season at Neal Stadium Friday afternoon when they entertain the WSC Couabes. The Couabes lost their opening contest to Washington 7 to 0 and last week were edged again by Oregon Ducklings 14 to 7.

## Chrisman 1 New Touch FB Champs

Powerful Chrisman Hall I downed a stubborn Phi Gamma Delta squad Friday to become the sixth straight independent team to hold the campus football crown.

The hard-fighting Fijis held Chrisman to a 2 to 2 tie, but the independent squad won the game on penetrations.
