CLASS ELECTIONS ARE SET FOR THURSDAY

GOLDEN FLEECE Jason

Two issues ago Jason challenged the University of Idaho student body to prove the Argonaut wrong in its prediction that only half of the student body will vote in the class elections Thursday of this

Today, Jason would like to propose a system by which 80 or 90 per cent of the student voters could prove us wrong.

In the past a better part of the voters have come from the Greek side of the campus.

Because the fraternities and sororities have conducted an informal contest among themselves to promote interest. The living group that has the highest percentage of voters in each election receives an award for participation. This contest promotes friendly rivalry between the Greek living groups and also gets out the

Jason would like to interest a few self-propelled Independent living group people to take the initiative on that side of the campus if it has not already been done and create a similar scheme to get out the voters.

It is sad, but let's face the facts: each party or living group is going to have to offer some inducement to the students before they will get interested enough or even bother to vote.

The Independents are not the only people that are behind in the voting percentages. The other onethird of the student body that lives off-campus has also a negative showing at the polls. What is the

Don't these people consider that it is important for the University of Idaho to have competent student leaders? In a closely knit community such as the University, this writer feels that there is no reason why 90 to 100 per cent returns at the ASUI polls couldn't be an actual fact.

Voters need only to be regularly enrolled and have their ASUI acvities card with them to exercise this fundamental right of American democracy, the voice of the people.

Lapp, nuclear physicist and atomic scientist, will appear at the Memorial Gymnasium to discuss a topic entitled "The World of Tomorrow."

Friday morning classes will run for 35 minutes with first period, 8-8:35; second, 8:45 to 9:20; third period, 9:30 to 10:05; and fourth period, 10:15 to 10:50. The assembly will begin at 11 a.m.

Dr. Lapp, director of the Nuclear Science Service, has written several books and articles dealing with atomic energy, and following World War II led in the scientific group

He also is a consultant and lecturer on atomic theories, and possesses the knack of explaining complicate scientific matters in terms that the average person can readily understand.


