In the past two meetings, the Board has gone on record opposing various suggested means of accomplishing this sampling. Jason emphasizes that the Board on the whole has opposed the means, but that does not mean that the student's elected representatives are chanting "down with student opinion."

As a matter of fact, it has been quite the contrary. The Board unanimously approved the suggestion that a system of sampling student opinion be instigated. Jason feels that they have a sincere desire to reach you students.
