The Rod Burton orchestra will furnish music for the dance, and the style of dress is optional. Decorations will follow the Christmas theme.

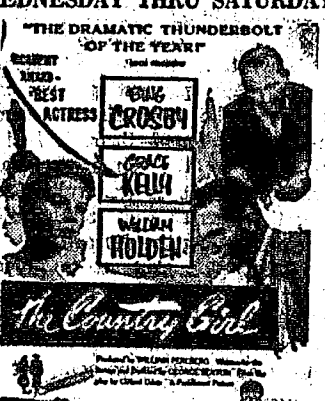

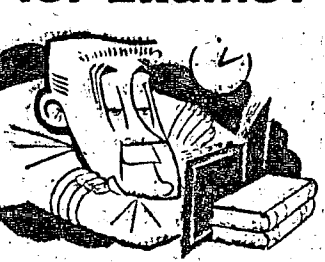

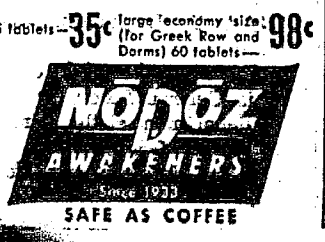

In view of the overwhelming vote and support of the students to change Christmas vacation to an earlier date, I felt obligated to write this letter to speak my mind. I feel that the Administration is not so much opposed to the change as they are afraid of their necks. A few years ago the vacation period was similar to that suggested by the students and after the vacation, parents complained to the Administration that they didn't want their children to travel so soon after New Year's Day.

Over 95 per cent of the Idaho students gave careful consideration to the matter, and voted in favor of the proposed change. The Academic Council seemed to agree on the points of the change, yet they voted UNANIMOUSLY against the student proposals.

There is much talk in this country of democracy, but is it practical? The majority were obviously in favor of the move, but they were voted down by the Academic Council. Was this the way to show the students what is taught? A lesson in democracy can much better be taught by example than by just words. To quote an old saying, "Practice what you preach."

The reasons for the denial were said to be the Vandaleers Concert and travel accommodations for the students to get home. As to the first so-called excuse, it has been said that the Vandaleer leader told the students in the choir that such a change could be made with more practices required. The other reason cannot hold water either. It would be obvious that if the dates were changed, travel companies would quickly change their plans

also. It is doubtful that they would miss the opportunity to make travel accommodations available so as not to miss out on the business. I ask again, what was the real reason for the Academic Council's defeating the proposed change? Who are they afraid of?

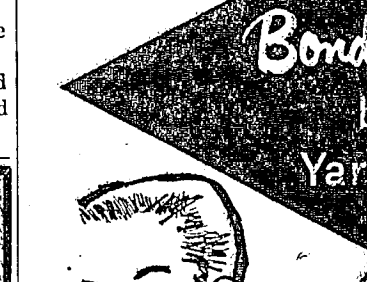

## Exec. Committee Explains Soliciting Control Program

The University Executive Committee today submitted a report on the University's policy for solicitation on the campus. The committee stated a policy to control solicitations and to assure that faculty and staff members are not unduly imposed upon with solicitations.

The committee reports the general policy to prohibit any and all solicitation of individuals or organizations on University property except: (1) Organizations who are granted permission to conduct solicitations for gifts in response to prior written request for each specific drive directed to the Office of President, provided University staff members conduct the solicitation; in no event will outside solicitors be allowed.

(2) The Community Chest, if one is conducted, and Vandal Boosters are given continuing permission, but the solicitation shall be done by regular staff members.

(3) Sale of tickets for shows and entertainments for local lodges, clubs and organizations are not included in the above policy and there is no intent to restrict these sales if done by staff members.

## Two Fellowships Offered To Grads For U. Of Ceylon

The University of Ceylon, Peradeniya, offers two fellowships to American graduate students for the 1955-57 academic year, announced Kenneth Holland, President of the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York City.

Awards cover room, board and tuition. Grantees should have funds to pay their own travel and incidental expenses although their applications will be considered for Fulbright travel and supplementary maintenance grants.

Closing date applications is December 15, 1955.

The Ceylon fellowships offer Americans an opportunity to study a variety of subjects; sociology; the economics, geography and history of Ceylon; Pall, the language of the early Buddhist Scriptures and Buddhist doctrines, history, art and architecture; Indian philosophy and history; and Indo-Aryan linguistics.

Idaho will be host to the Northwest Junior Varsity Tournament in January for the team's next outing.

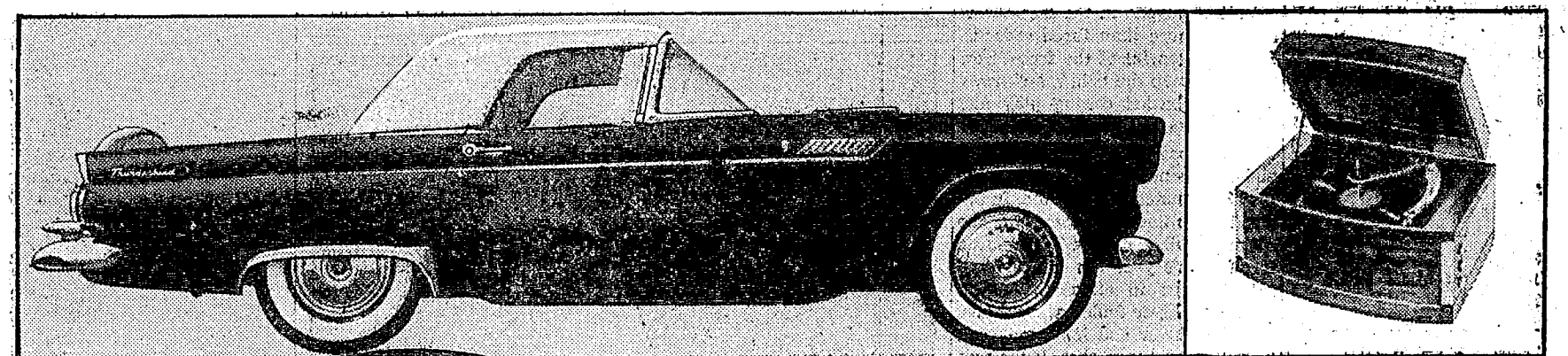

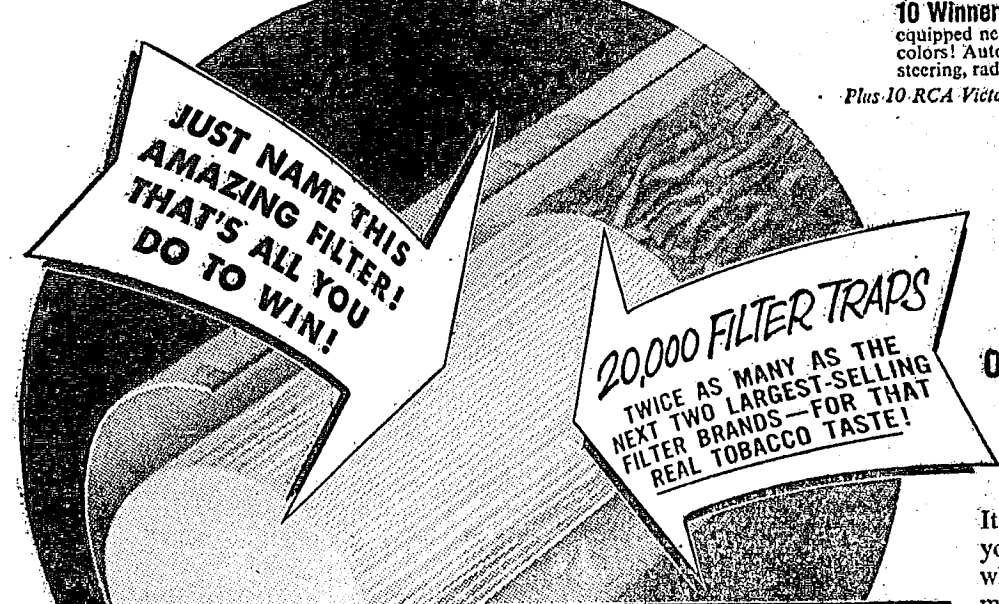
