## Too Fast For Conditions

In the fall and early winter there are a number of factors which influence the driving of motor vehicles and which may increase the chance of accident occurrence.

The first freeze and ice patches on the road is also apt to give the motorist a bad surprise. Most of this is caused by loss of traction. The driver thinks he can cross the road ahead of the oncoming vehicle only to discover that he cannot zoom across, but creeps instead. At the same time the oncoming driver applies his brakes and discovers that he too has less traction than expected. These circumstances are reflected in accident statistics by increases in the number of accidents caused by "Did not have right of way" and "Too fast for conditions."

The amount of skidding can be reduced by replacing smooth tires with tires having ample treads. Other items should be checked on the vehicle at the approach of winter—lights, windshield wipers and defrosters, and mufflers. Having the vehicle in proper operating condition at a crucial moment in cold weather may be the difference between having and avoiding an accident.

It is well for motorists to remember that accidents occur with greater frequency during the holidays, especially Christmas. In cities there are crowds of pedestrians who may not be able to see very clearly because of large packages, inclement weather, or darkness. In the country, road surfaces are subject to changing weather conditions. Trips should be made with generous time allowance, in daylight if possible and only when weather forecasts are favorable.

## Foreign Forum

Dean of the College of Education, J. Frederick Weltzin, Sunday gave a realistic approach regarding differences and similarities between the European and United States systems of education. Dealing with the historical background of systems, especially those of Oxford, England, Germany, Norwegian and Swiss, Weltzin pointed out that the progressive systems of education, as proclaimed by Rousseau and Montaine, were adopted in all systems although various changes of approach did take place among all the important institutions of both continents.

He concluded that Europe and the United States have abolished physical punishment of children by law. In addition, Weltzin showed slides of institutions and places he visited while in Europe.

K. R. Acharya, assistant professor of chemistry, at his talk at the Christian Center-Sunday dealt with the history and philosophy of Hinduism. He concluded that the religion has much to offer the world in this atomic age.

He pointed out that one main difference was that Hinduism does not believe in conversion.

Do the people of Nigeria seek self determination and are they satisfied with the English regime? Winston Onyema: Nigerians are quite optimistic. The British government is working hard toward self determination. The relations between the Nigerians and the aliens are quite cordial yet.

Professor Frank Seaman: Does religion place a greater influence on the average man in India than in the United States in everyday life?

K. R. Acharya: It does not play a greater influence in India than in the United States as we have a secular system of education and religious discrimination is prohibited by law.

## 'Angelo' Depicts Troubles Of Italian-Negro Child

"Angelo," a film on the problems of a young mulatto, will be presented by the ASUI on Thursday, December 15, in the Borah Theatre. Admission for the movie, to take place at 4, 7, and 8:30 p.m., is thirty-five cents.

The story, as written and directed by Francesco De Robertis, is based on the hatred and resentment that Angelo, the illegitimate son of an American Negro and an Italian woman, undergoes. The husband of the woman returns home, after spending five years in jail, to find that his wife had died giving birth to the son of an American GI, and that law requires him to take care of the hated infant, Angelo.

The Italian's loathing of the child and thoughts of murdering him gradually turn into pity as he sees the boy ridiculed and treated as a freak by the neighbors. When the boy's uncle enters the picture to return Angelo to his people, the foster father finds that it is a great sacrifice to let him go.

Angelo is played by a young Italian discovery of the same name, in this well knit, and slightly complicated plot about inter-racial relations.

## EE Grad Develops Reflector Antenna

L. C. Tillotson, a 1938 graduate of the University of Idaho in electrical engineering, has had a major role in the development of a new horn reflector antenna used by the Bell System in their microwave relay links, it was learned here today.

The horn reflector antenna is part of new equipment designed for the constantly growing number of channels required for telephone messages and television signals. This antenna, which can be used for all three radio-relay systems, has already been incorporated into some recent TD-2 installations.

Tillotson joined the Bell System in 1941, working on the design and development of filters and networks in the apparatus development department. In 1946 he was transferred to radio research where he has been primarily concerned with microwave filters and radio relay systems. He is the author of an article, "A Short-Haul Microwave Transmitter," which appeared in the April issue of the Bell Laboratories Record.

## VETS MAIL BAG

Annual income questionnaires soon will be mailed to nearly a million veterans and widows and children of deceased veterans who are receiving disability and death pensions. Veterans Administration announced.

Of this total, approximately 25,000 questionnaires will go to residents of the four Northwest States and Alaska. VA urges all those who receive the questionnaires to fill them out completely and return them immediately to the VA offices which sent them.

Unless properly filled-out questionnaires are returned to VA within 30 days, pension payments, under the law, must be stopped, VA said.

Questionnaires are mailed yearly because pensions are subject to annual income limitations. The current questionnaires request data on 1955 annual income, and anticipated 1956 income.

**Pension Requirements**  
Pensions are payable to certain eligible veterans of World War I, World War II and Korean conflict who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not connected with their service in the armed forces, and to certain widows and children of veterans of these wars who died on nonservice-connected causes. In both cases the annual
