

SPRING VACATION STARTS AT 5 TONIGHT

Long-Awaited Holiday Brings Nine Day Break

Vandals are priming themselves today for the big push home as the long final hours before spring vacation tick away. Nine days of relaxation from books and classes seemed all too short, anxious students say.

On campus, machinery was already in motion for a virtual halt to activities. Gail Mix, general manager, said the Student Union would close Friday afternoon and reopen Sunday, April 15.

Lee Zimmerman, librarian, said the University library would close Saturday and Sunday, then open again on Monday, April 9 with hours from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The schedule will be similar to Monday's until April 13, when the library will close for Saturday and Sunday and reopen on the following Monday.

Lock Up Belongings

Students were also cautioned to lock rooms and safeguard belongings before leaving for vacation.

For the hundreds of cars carrying Vandals toward home, there will be dangerous, winter-damaged roads to contend with. Latest Idaho road information furnished by the Traffic Safety committee indicated badly broken highways leading to both north and south Idaho with snow slides in some areas. The report:

Grangeville south to New Meadows, broken but passable. U. S. 95 to Weiser fair with rocks on roadway. U. S. 15 south from New Meadows to Boise, frost heaves and snow slides. U. S. 30, Boise to Pocatello, fair. Pocatello to Idaho Falls north to St. Anthony, good.

Exec Board Proposes 5 ASUI Charter Changes

Five amendments to the ASUI constitution will appear on the ballot election day. The Executive Board Tuesday night provided for constitutional revisions concerning election of the vice-president, absentee balloting, election procedures and two other governmental change proposals.

The decision to make changes have been both long-awaited and brought about by increased enrollment pressure. Two-thirds majority of 35 per cent of the student body will be needed for approval. Methods to change the election of the vice-president were established after the Board made three major suggestions and then submitted these to the House Presidents and various living groups.

ASUI Veep Proposals

The change read: "The vice-president shall be the individual candidate for Executive Board who receives the highest number of vice-presidential votes. A special box shall be placed on the ballot adjacent to each Executive Board candidate's name for the purpose of voting for the vice-president."

The other vice-presidential amendment states: "In the event that three or more candidates are running for the ASUI presidency, the one receiving the second highest number of votes in the election shall be the ASUI vice-president and a member of the Executive Board."

Gem Editor Added

The Board also proposed that clause 3 of Article 4, Section 1 concerning membership of the Executive Board be changed to read: "The Editor of the Argonaut, KU-OI Station Manager, President of the Associated Women Students, and a faculty advisor (all without vote) appointed by the President of the University from recommendations submitted by the Executive Board." The clause does not presently provide for the Gem editor as an ex-officio member of the Board.

Absentee Voting

Another amendment proposal reads: Students who will be absent from school and who have academic excuses for said absence shall be allowed to vote in the ASUI General Manager's office one week prior to the date of the annual spring election. Regulations and formalities governing supervision and control of the balloting as outlined in this constitution shall govern the balloting at this time."

The final amendment states under Elections Article that: "Nominations for all ASUI offices shall be made not less than two (2) weeks and not more than five (5) weeks previous to the annual election held in April. The Executive Board shall set the election date five weeks in advance, and the ASUI resident shall give notice in the Argonaut."

These amendment proposals will appear on ballots separate from the ASUI President and Executive Board ballots.

Idaho, WSC Host Audio-Visual Meet

Representatives from 19 Northwest universities and colleges attended the two-day audio-visual conference which was held on the University of Idaho Campus Monday and Tuesday, April 2 and 3. The conference was jointly sponsored by the University and Washington State College.

The first morning was devoted to a visit to Washington State's Audio-Visual center, and the following sessions were held at the Idaho SUB. Discussions included such topics as "Findings of New Research in Audio-Visual," "Campus Production," and "Effectiveness of the College Audio-Visual Program."

In charge for the University of Idaho was Allen Perry, supervisor of the university's Audio-Visual center, and for Washington State was Sheldon Osburn, assistant director of WSC's Audio-Visual center.

In Tuesday night's Executive Board meeting, the whole plan was flushed for this year due to a recommendation from the two co-chairmen of the Recruitment committee. But the Executive Board had little choice in the matter. The project had been destined for the ash can for some time.

One of the problems that plagued the committee from the start was the lack of a convenient date. The idea was a good one, but the committee needed a good time to carry out the good idea. After two different tries, it was decided that a good time wasn't forthcoming.

The first two recommendations which accompanied the co-chairmen's report dealt with this problem. They recommended that the tour be scheduled early second semester possible in mid-February so as to avoid conflicts with the Vandaleers, Concert Band tours, or the Blue Key Talent show.

They further recommended that arrangements be initiated much earlier. These recommendations go to the seat of the trouble that resulted in the cancellation this year. Insufficient time was allowed for the show to get on the road and poor scheduling caused additional conflicts with other touring groups.

Following by this year's mistakes, ASUI Executive Board should set the date for next year's tour this spring, thus avoiding conflicts. If set far enough in advance, sufficient planning and attention can be implemented, thus producing a recruitment tour that the University of Idaho student body can be proud of.

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VETS MAIL BAG

Veterans in rural areas seeking GI home loans who are turned down by local lenders should apply direct to Veterans Administration regional offices rather than to Voluntary Home Mortgage Credit Program (VHMCP) regional committees, VA announced today.

This suggestion is made, VA said, in order to speed up direct VA loan processing and to set up a priority system for veterans who are unable to secure VA-guaranteed GI loans from private lenders through VHMCP.

Previously, veterans seeking GI loans were being referred direct to VHMCP regional committees so that these committees might be able to assist in securing private GI mortgage financing for World War II and Korean conflict period veterans living in remote areas and small communities.

Veterans applying to VA will be sent a VHMCP home loan application. VA then will put their names on a register so that a follow-up may be made and a priority established for the individual veteran. Should the VHMCP committees be unable to provide regular GI financing for homes from private lenders, the veterans then can apply to VA for a direct government loan.

Loans secured from private lenders through the facilities of VHMCP regional committees will be guaranteed loans bearing the same interest rate as VA direct loans—4 1/2 percent per annum.

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Cindermen Open Dual Competition At UW

Vandal tracksters will be looking for their first dual meet win from the Washington Huskies when they journey to Seattle tomorrow to open PCC dual meet track and field competition.

The Huskies have won 10 of the 11 dual meets from Idaho, while the eleventh, way back in '63, ended in a 61-61 tie.

Coach Joe Glander stated today that there will be three additions to the previously announced 18 man traveling team for this trip. The three men named and their events are Larry Church, high and low hurdles, Bill Bauscher, 100 yard dash and either the 220 or the mile relay, and Gary Collier, 220 and the 440.

Vandal hopes are pinned on the expected performances of Wilbur Gary, Warren Johanson, and Paul Hanson to keep Idaho in the meet. Gary was high point man for the Idaho squad in the recent WSC indoor invitational, placing high in the sprints, broad jump and high jump. Johanson was a Northern Division winner in the mile run in 1959 before leaving to serve with the armed forces, and Hanson has showed well in the javelin event, having thrown the spear over 200 feet this spring.

Glander Predicts

According to Glander, "Possibilities for first and second places in this meet seem to be very good for several of the boys. Hanson should place high with the javelin, Henning Olson and Walt Denny in the 440, Johanson will undoubtedly show well in the mile and the half-mile events, and Gary and Bauscher are expected to place in the broad-jump. If we have good luck in Seattle and the Huskies perform as expected, the U of W should win by about 85 to 50."

Rounding out the Idaho traveling squad are: Jay Buhler, sprints and mile relay; Dick Shern, sprints and broad jump; Larry Aldrich, quarter mile and mile relay; Doug Seely, half mile and mile; Milton Riggers, half mile and two mile; Gary Simmons, hurdles and high jump; Jerry Duffy and Ron Edwards, pole vault; Andy Anderson and Jerry Kramer, discuss and shot put and Stan Neely, discuss.

The lack of sunny weather which has afflicted Vandalville so far this spring will undoubtedly be a deterrent to the Idaho squad in this, the first Northern Division meet. The Vandals have but limited outdoor practice so far this year.

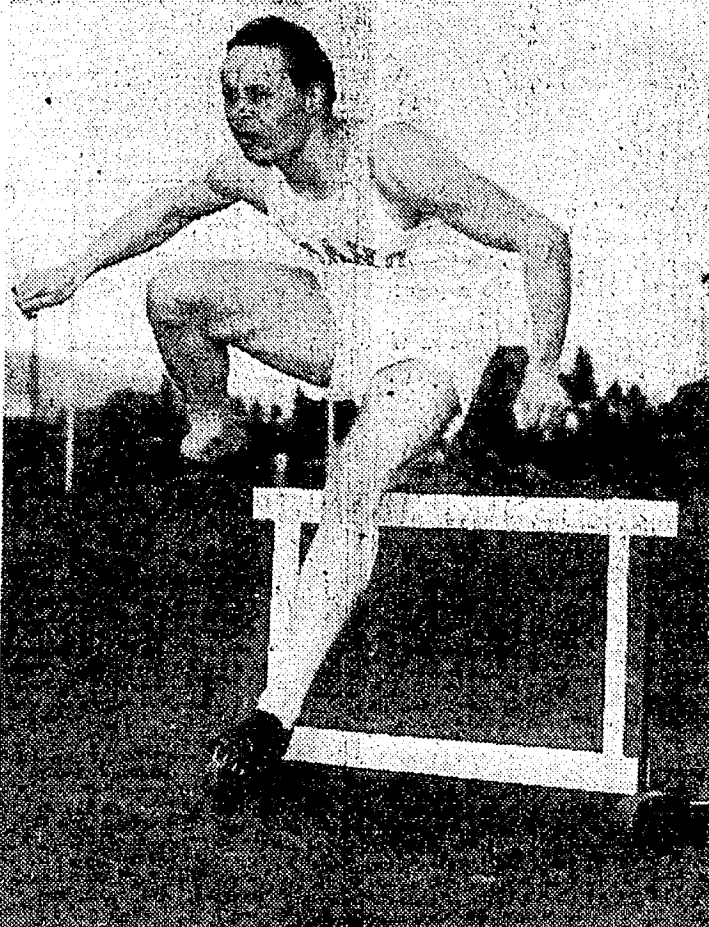

Other Huskies to watch in the forthcoming meet will be Jim Hilton in the pole vault, Dean Singer, high hurdles, and Dean Derby, who with his unofficial 10 seconds flat in the 100 yard dash, is considered to be a Northern Division contender this year.

The Vandals will travel to Seattle by auto, leaving Moscow at 8 o'clock this morning, and will return immediately after the meet which begins at 1:30 Saturday afternoon.
