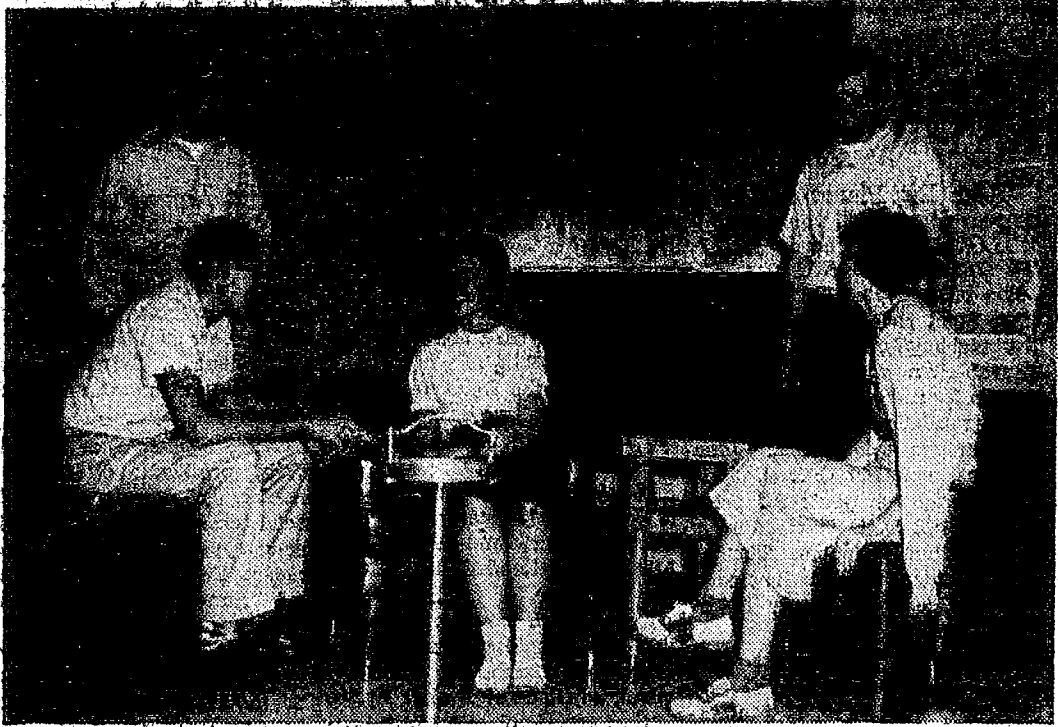








### A New Spot To Relax

### Veep Has Active ASUI Background

ASUI vice-president Fred Burrow brings to the Executive Board a background of active participation in the ASUI administration and campus events. Burrow was elected vice-president at the first meeting of the 1956-57 Exec Board last spring and was elected to the Board from the Student Government party, a cross-campus political group. **Supports New Plan**

### Bookstore Sales Top \$100,000 Mark

The University Book store reports that with registration completed and late registrants dwindling, sales have been progressing at a figure well in excess of \$100,000.

This represents an increase of approximately 8 per cent over the 1955 figures and stands at 35 per cent of their annual business.

Coping with an anticipated increase in University enrollment, which left the supply of books in stock at a scanty level, Chester Kerr, manager of the Book store points out that all books temporarily out of stock have been re-ordered and are arriving daily, and 50 per cent have been placed on the shelves ready for sale.

### \$64,000 Addition Nearly Complete

President D. R. Theophilus Wednesday will dedicate a newly-completed, \$64,000 addition to the Student Union Building.

The structure, part of a long range program of planned extension and remodeling is enclosed on three sides by glass and when finally completed late this week will seat some 180 students.

General Manager Gale Mix announced that recently purchased tables would add to the already installed Hollywood style booths.

The tables will be placed over unused floor area, bringing the addition to capacity.

A portable bar, scheduled to arrive next week, will provide coffee for thirsty Idahoans.

The building was begun in June under a contract to Johnson, Busbom and Raub of Spokane, who are also currently building the new library. It was completed Sept. 23.

Cedar paneling was installed around three sides with flamingo red leather used in booths. A wide fireplace built of specially-ordered

Arizona sandstone dominates the southern end of the floor. Matchstick curtains cover the large picture windows.

A lighted color photo of Idaho landscape supplied by Ross Hall studio of Sandpoint has been placed immediately opposite entrance doors. New air circulating equipment was built into the structure and is connected to the entire Student Union.

The floor was finished for dancing and will be used for various student functions during the year.

### Greeks Write Constitution

### Student Insurance Set For Another Semester

Students of the University of Idaho are covered by a \$3,000 accident insurance policy with the United Pacific Insurance Company of Tacoma, Washington, Kenneth A. Dick, Bursar, announced today.

This policy covers all regular full-time students, undergraduate and graduates taking more than six credits per semester beginning 10 days prior to the first day of official registration for any semester; providing the student has arrived in Moscow. The coverage ends five days after the last day of final examinations for all students for each semester.

For a student who is an accident victim to be eligible for the benefits under this policy he must file a report within 30 days of the mishap. "The University of Idaho will not enter into any claim," Dick said. "It is a relationship between the student and the insurance company."

In connection with any accident if a student suffers the loss of life, \$1000 will be paid to the next of

University of Chicago with the purpose in mind of getting a first hand look at how the organization works and what good it does us as Idaho students. I will devote this article to the Physical Structure of NSA and how it works and others in the series will discuss my personal observations of the congress, a few facts on our regional group, how NSA benefits Idaho, and some issues upon which discussion centered at the congress.

The national student association is the only representative group of students here in the United States. A decade ago the association started as a counter-move to a student group in the communist countries which was rapidly taking many European schools. From its small start the organization has spread to over 300 colleges in the United States.

**Well Attended**  
The convention which I attended had over 1000 students present, 500 of which were voting delegates. The rest were filling many capacities, the most prevalent of which were alternates and observers.

Forty-eight foreign countries were registered, about half of which represented foreign student unions (organizations of students from one country), and the other half representatives of foreign colleges.

Many United States student groups were also present as observers with: Newman Club, National AWS, different state student groups, and Mortar Board are some examples. The organization is unique in that it is made up completely of students, all of the officers are elected from the delegates at the congress and officers serve a one year term. The National president (offices of the group are in Philadelphia) has under him four vice-presidents, each in charge of a different commission and these commissions are the major fields of NSA.

**Student Reports**  
The Student Government Commission prepares information on many student government functions and recently sent out a model student government research Bulletin costing \$30,000 to prepare. It also has a question answering ser-

vice for government problems which are submitted. At the national congress it serves as a workshop for student leaders and the members of this commission and the sub-commissions under it discuss student government and help each other with their respective problems. Incidentally, discussion group leaders are student controlled just as all other responsible positions at the congress are.

The International Affairs Commission works very closely with foreign student groups, sets up summer travel tours for students, sponsors foreign and American exchange programs, runs a six week summer school at Harvard on international programs and relations, and tries to keep informed on foreign student groups in addition to publishing a large amount of literature and seeing it is distributed.

At the national congress the international affairs sub-commissions and commission introduced American students to foreign student problems and sent out congratulations to foreign student groups who have been doing good jobs against odds. Several different types of student exchange programs were launched.

The education Affairs commission has as its goals better student-faculty relations, an active student part in the educational community, and good relations of the college itself with the town in which it is located. Other activities include sponsoring of Academic Freedom Week in all colleges, dealings with issues which affect colleges publicity-wise (it was active in the Autherine Lucy case and in other segregation issues) and it also was a big push in putting the bill through Congress which allows a student special income tax privileges.

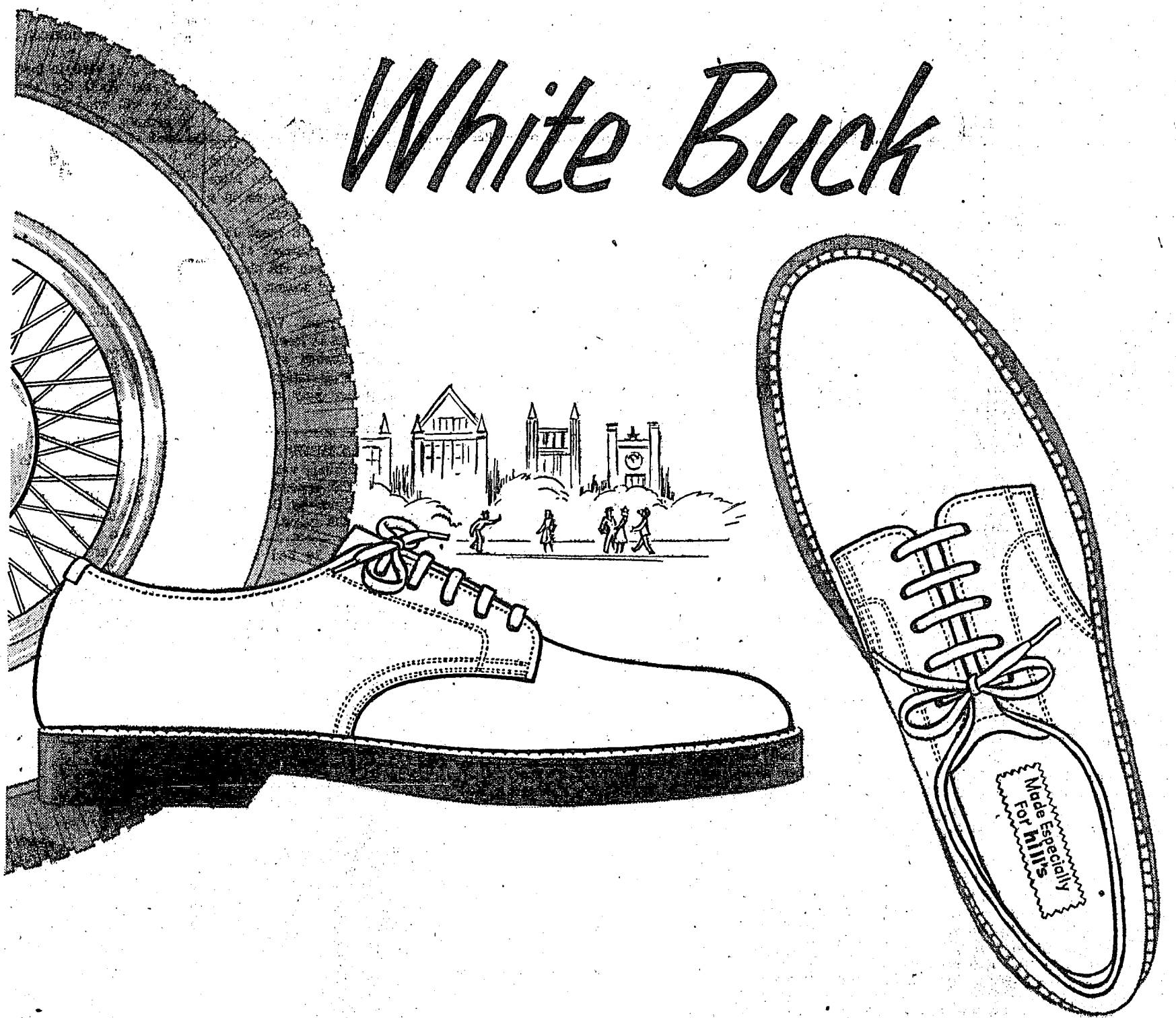
