Councils Stop Trophy Thefts

Trophy stealing, a familiar early fall custom at Idahe for many years, was abolished last night at a meeting of Inter-fraternity Council and Pan-Hellenic.

The action was the direct result of flagrant violations this year of rules set up by the two Greek councils. The decision was reached by majority vote.

Spokesman Pat Daly, IFC president, said each group discussed the problem separately and the decision was reached at the joint meeting.

A joint Pan-Hell and IFC committee will be established at a meeting next month to set up another activity which could take trophy stealing's place.

The custom started at Idaho to allow freshmen groups from men's and women's living groups to get to "know each other."

The thefts got out of hand this year when one group stole Alpha Chi silverware to return it the next day and several women's houses were painted by prank-

The project, to be located in Park village, is designed to relieve the critical shortage of quarters for married students. It will consist of eight separate, twostory buildings, each with eight one-bedroom apartments, and will be financed by regent's bonds to be paid off from revenue.

Under the Exec Board approval each party, United, Independent and Student Government, will be allotted time for speakers, with no political question and answer session included in the program.


The Board suggested the parties could break up after the assembly and meet with interested stu-
