After a second's pause, she added, "But I've always been a little suspicious."

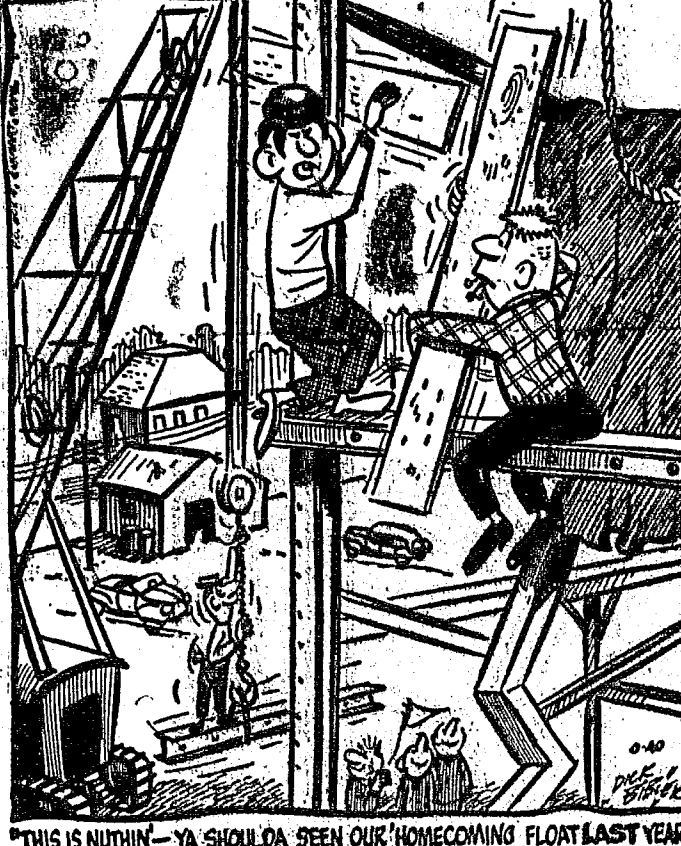
Some not-so-newsy notes of Saturday's function:

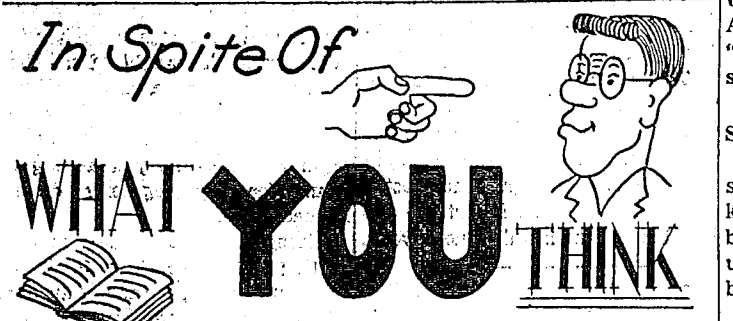

Powell is vice president of the 26-man local chapter.

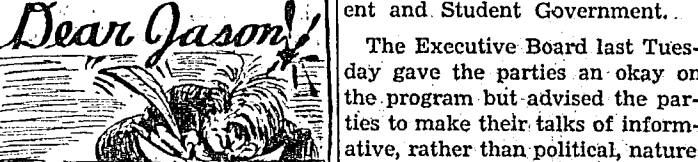
Gem-Arg Choose Photogs For Year

She is attending the University of London's School of Tropical Medicine, in preparation for a career of health education work.

The last year, Miss Winegar held a teaching fellowship in biology at Harvard University and the Thomas Dana scholarship for biological studies at Radcliffe College. She received her master's degree from Harvard in August. She was awarded a scholarship to the University of Oslo summer school in Oslo, Norway in 1953. In the summer of 1954, she attended the U.S. National Student Association's International Student Relations seminar at Harvard University. As a field representative for the World University Service, she spent the year 1954-55 lecturing at universities, colleges and preparatory schools.

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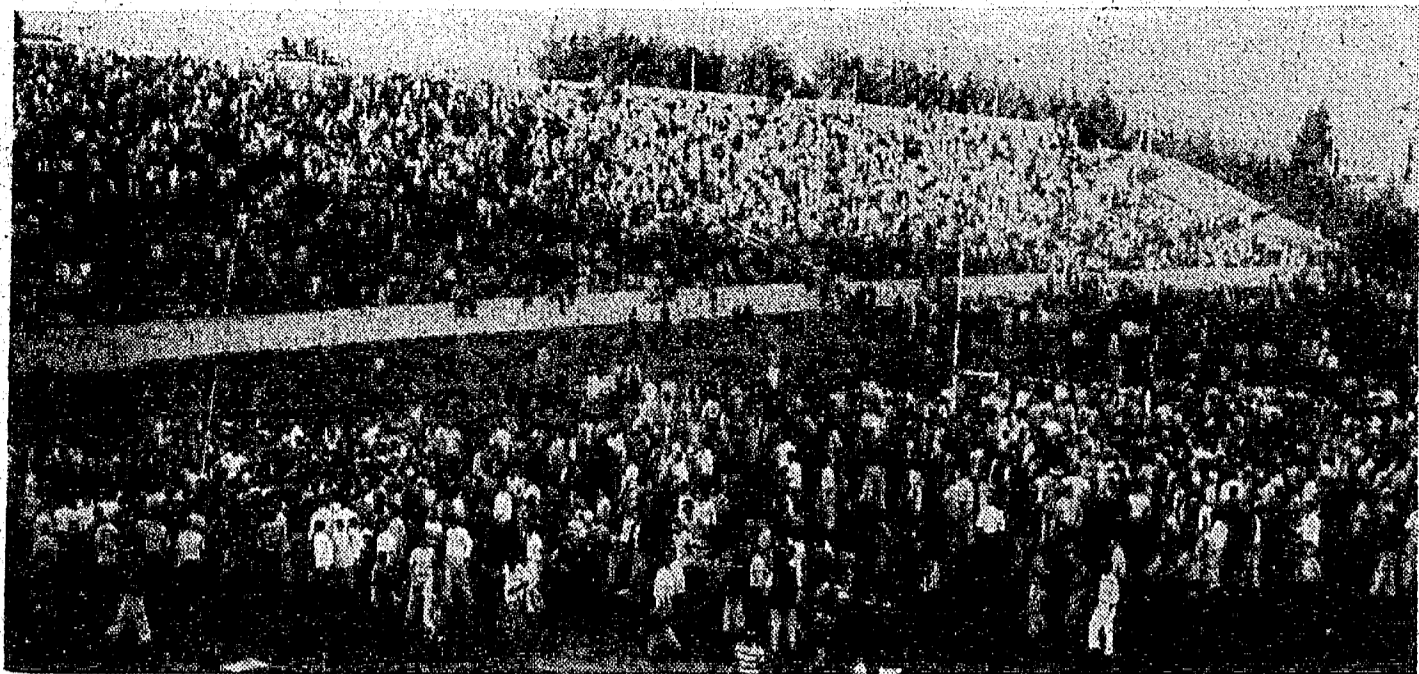

Wild Battle Of Goal Posts



School spirit raged and blood flew freely as Idaho fought to defend its goalposts against the WSC invaders in lively action following the scheduled Battle of the Palouse.

Cougars Win 57th Battle Of Palouse

An injury riddled Idaho team, that was long on fight but short on depth, fell to the Washington State Cougars Saturday '33 to 19 in the 57th edition of the Battle of the Palouse.

The strong Washington State squad showed no concern that the Vandals had a squad of only 32 men, as they used a well-blended running and passing attack to roll to five touchdowns in the course of the afternoon.

The Vandals never stopped fighting in the contest, as they came within one foot of tying or going ahead of WSC in the opening minutes of the second half. Then after losing starting quarterback Howard Willis, they came back in the fourth quarter to score twice more.

In scoring 19 points in the game, the Vandals rolled up their highest total against the Cougars since 1924 when they beat their neighbors 19 to 3.

The Cougars opened their scoring for the day when Quarterback Bob Newman threw a six yard jump pass to Dick Windham,

after a pass from first string quarterback Bunny Aldrich had picked up 26 yards.

The Cougars moved to their second touchdown in the next period when Don Ellingson grabbed a pass from Newman and ran 35 yards to the end zone. Halfback Ron Hare missed the conversion, after having made his first period try.

Guard Jerry Kramer set up the first Idaho score by recovering a Cougar fumble on the Cougar 32. Ken Hall picked up 3 yards going off tackle, and Gary Johnson got to the eight on a keeper play before he ran out of bounds. Larry Norby then went over after two tries, and Kramer kicked the extra point.

The Vandals opened the third quarter with a rush when Willis recovered a WSC fumble on the second play of the period. On four running plays and a pass from Willis to Aldrich Idaho moved down to the Washington State 17. Willis took the ball to the seven on the next play, but was injured

and saw no more action in the game. Johnson took over as signal caller and moved to the four. Bill Baxter made two yards going off tackle, but fumbled on the next play and Washington State recovered.

The Cougars took the ball on their own one yard line and marched 99 yards in 16 plays with fullback Jim Frankson going over from the one for the third Washington State touchdown. Aldrich made the conversion.

The Vandals took the WSC kickoff, but were forced to punt after a number of penalties pushed them back. The Cougars moved to the Vandal one and fumbled. Quarterback Gary Kenworthy was caught on the 19 after receiving a bad pass from center while trying to get a pass away, and the Cougars took over. One play later Frankson went over from the four for the fourth Cougar score and Aldrich converted.

The Vandals picked up their final touchdowns in the fourth quarter. Johnson went over from the Washington State one yard line, climaxing a drive from the Idaho 33 in which he either carried or passed in 10 of 11 plays. The final score was set up when Larry Aldrich intercepted a pass from Newman and Johnson banged over nine plays later.

After running out the clock on the ground, the Cougars scored their final touchdown with only three seconds to play. Aldrich threw to Windham, who moved past the Vandal defenders to the goal line.

Vandals Nip WSC Runners In 1st Meet

Vandal cross country runners jumped off to a fast start in season's competition by scoring a convincing 31-24 victory over the Cougar cindermen from Washington State.

Idaho's six English squad members showed well in the meet, five grabbing spots in the top ten rankings. Raymond Hatton paced the entire field, covering the 2 1/2 mile course in 11 minutes and 45 seconds. He was followed closely by fellow countryman, Frank Wyatt.

The Cougars nabbed the next three positions, with John Zeeman, Max Rader, and D. Rader finishing in that order.

Great Britainers Ron Adams, Dick Boyce, and Peter Reed completed Idaho's first ten contingent, taking spots six, seven and eight.

The Vandal distance men journey to Pullman Thursday to clash with WSC over a 3 mile course, and return to meet the same opposition at Moscow, October 18.

Biggest event on the cross country calendar is slated for October 27. The Vandals will display their talents at the Canadian Championship in Vancouver, B. C., and will be out to better the second place they garnered last year.

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Idahonians Successful In Defense Of Goal Posts

Minutes before the final gun sounded the end of the 57th annual football Battle of the Palouse students from both schools began gathering on the sidelines for the battle of the goalposts.

For some 45 minutes staunch Vandal supporters staved off repeated WSC attacks on both the east and west goalposts. Finally, at an opportune moment when the majority of the battlers were at the east end, Moscow and Latah county police broke up the fray with tear-gas bombs.

Fuelings on both sides rose during the game with WSC's copping of an anti-Cougar sign from in front of the Vandal cheering section and then burning it on the cinder track before their own section.

Joe Threatened

Near the end of the half-time activities, Joe the Vandal was pursued and nearly caught by a WSC student before the Cougar was stopped in his tracks by ex-Idaho footballer, Eivind Resa.

During the final quarter "mega-phone-swipers" brought as many cheers from the crowd as did the play on the field.

Several hundred battlers from

both schools participated in the after game activities with only a small percentage actually engaging in the numerous fist-fights which took place.

Several Vandals were boosted up to the top of the goalposts where they led repeated "fiftens for Idaho." WSC supporters made several futile attempts at clambering up the posts, with one student having his pants completely pulled off him, in his assault on the heights.

Police ventured forth with the tear-gas despite a shower of oaths, dirt and bottles thrown at them by the battlers.

The gas sent the fighters scurrying for shelter, many with burning and team streaked eyes. But not before WSC succeeded in tugging down a portion of the west goal posts. However, Idaho students quickly restored the post to its proper stature, just as the wind-blown gas reached the west end, completely clearing the stadium turf.

After the raid on May 16, the men of the organized living groups around the campus contributed approximately \$3.50 per man to a philanthropic fund to pay for restitution of damages.

Individual claims from the girls averaged about \$20. Many were as small as \$1, but at least one totaled over \$100. Nor has the restitution committee finished the job of paying. It has now begun evaluating the property damage claims of the various houses invaded during the riot.
