The proposal provides that the MUN trips be put into the same category as other extracurricular activities, with IRC training the delegates. This would mean ASUI funds would be used for the trip.

The IRC memo to the interim committee states that WSC is trying to sponsor MUN next year; if this becomes a reality, they will want help from Idaho. Idaho might pe a co-sponsor or represent an important nation, but in any case the experience gained by attending the session is invaluable.

Last year's session, held at Oregon State College, was the first U of I delegates attended. Idaho represented Iceland. This year the function will be held at Stanford University. The trip will be made during spring vacation, causing students to miss only one day of classes. It is proposed that 15 delegates attend this year - 13 students and 2 faculty members. An IRC official said today that the trip would cost about \$30 per person.
