

## FIFTH COLUMN SEES COOL MOVE TO POGO!

### Gum Beating Takes Pogo From 'Land Down Under' To Politic Happy Idaho

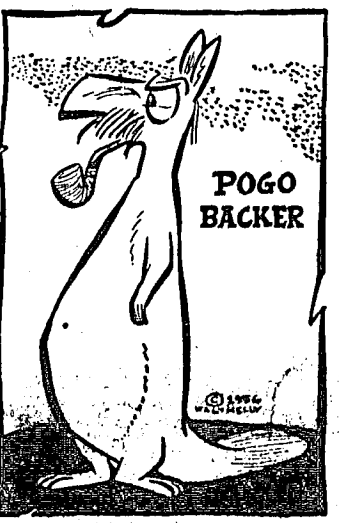
Pogo Possum tonight at an all-campus assembly in the Arboretum will announce the Fifth Column platform and introduce campus candidates for class offices, it was hereby announced this morn by J. Muggs Tubby, his manager.

Pogo's gum beating' and pouch bumping has taken him from the quarters of the world—from the land down under where he led a terrific fight to annex Australia to the U.S.—and will wind up on the Idaho campus this weekend.

The U.S. Presidential hopeful and candidate for Idaho's frosh class presidency, plans extensive campaigning in the heart of a politic happy campus.

Tubby hinted the Possum Politician will attack everything from Nixon's table manners to Adlai's campaign smile tonight and will prove to the campus "he's duh man for frosh prey."

**Fluid Platform**  
At a nominating assembly held last night the Fifth Column jammed Memorial Gym to make nominations and draw up a fluid platform for the coming election. Party chairman Jacques Thornickie,



into a free-for-all when "thugs" from other campus political factions presented a huge floor-width banner which read, "Pogo is not a marsupial, but is in fact a Monotreme."

Fifth Column strong men escorted the sign out but the party representatives wouldn't budge.

**Real Stumper**  
Faculty advisor Gayloff Micksy then reported to the convention that Pogo will stump the country for the campus vote and this brought about an angry exchange on the upper floor of the lower house when a delegate from another party snapped to his feet and declared Pogo was a Monotreme and not a marsupial.

Micksy denied this statement and challenged the intruder to produce evidence that Pogo has never laid an egg. Three Independents hawking partisan pennants were immediately ejected from the convention site.

Some disturbance among the secretive Phi Gam delegation was noticed as the group Bean Brannon's Bugle Bunch performed at a ceremony intended to welcome the Welcoming Committee selected to welcome Pogo to the campus when he gets here in search of votes already conceded by the three majority parties. Thornickie's brief opening statements were followed by keynote Karinka Krausinsky, who gracefully tip-toed to platform and waved gayly to the throng.

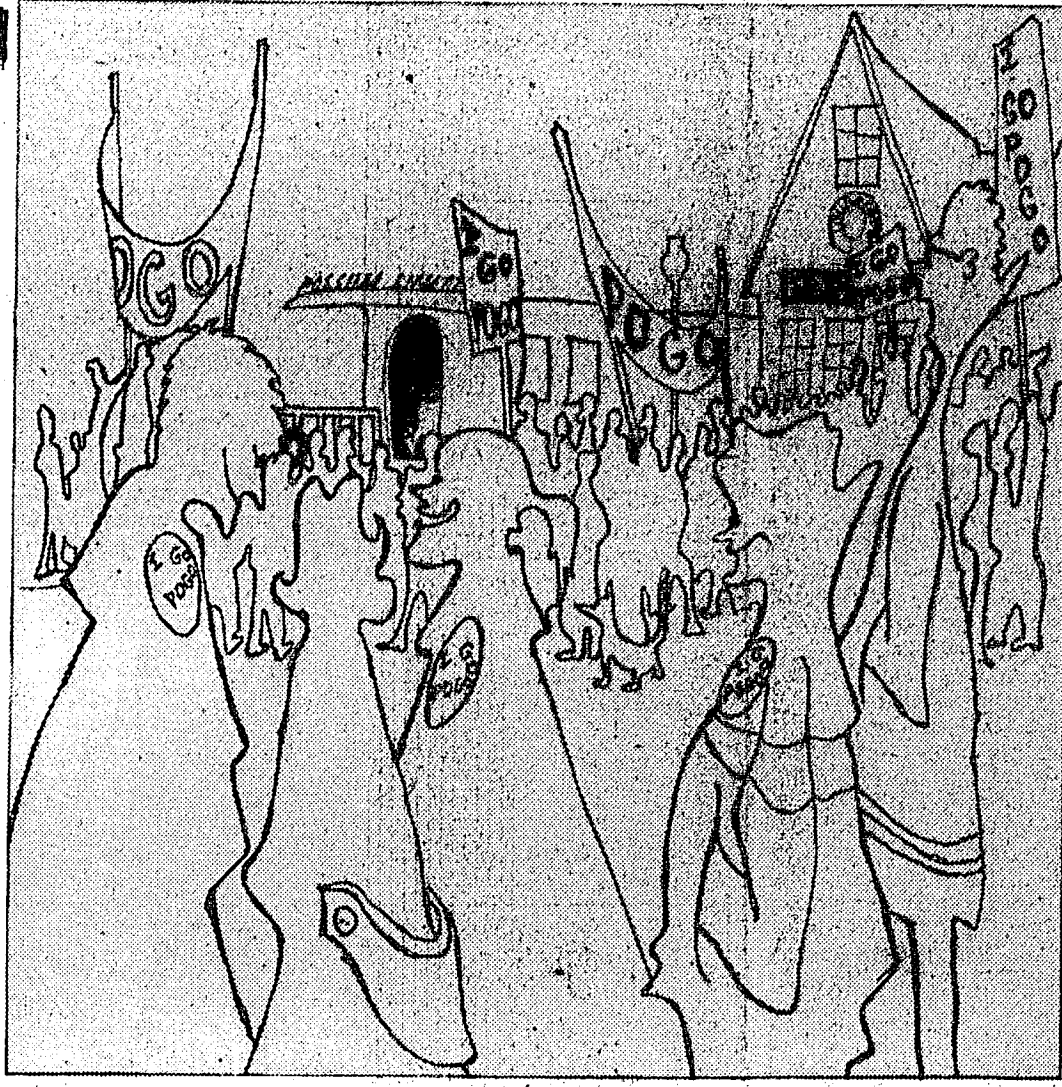

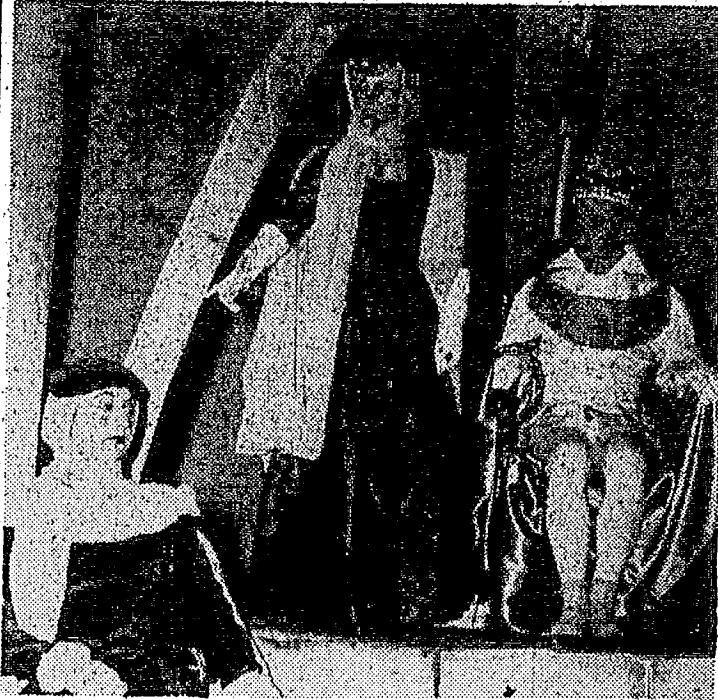
**Rehearsals Month Long**  
"We have been rehearsing since Monday, October 1, in order to shape it into one of the best Idaho productions this year," said Edmund Chavez, technical director. "During that time we worked every night, except weekends, on costumes. All the people of the court will wear color shades of red, yellow, or white, while the people of the sea will wear some shades of blue."

"Ondine" was originally a German fairy tale written in 1811 by Friedrich Baron de la Motte Fouge and it was called Undine. Years later it was turned into a play by Jean Giraudoux, an outstanding French playwright during the First and Second World Wars.

**Recent Broadway Show**  
Recently it appeared on Broadway after it was translated from French by Maurice Valency, a Columbia University professor. Audrey Hepburn played Ondine, while Mel Ferrar took the knight's role. It was produced by the Playwrights Company and was directed by Alfred Lunt.

In tonight's production of "Ondine" the knight, Austin Bergin, goes out in search for something for his lady love at court and finds a mermaid, Diane Kall, by a lake. This situation soon results in the ancient love triangle. The

### Marsupial Underdog Hails Campus Today

Pogo Possum, a marsupial new comer to American politics blew into Moscow today amidst a furor of student cries of "I Go Pogo." Pogo will address students at a Political Orientation Assembly tonight at 11 in the Arboretum.

Politicians on this campus see a sudden upset in the forthcoming straw ballot to be conducted national election day Tuesday in the candidate from the Florida marshes.

Pogo waved from the "Possum Limited" and exclaimed to the throng, "My friends, things look dark where I come from, but I am ready to answer your call. I will run on the Fifth Column ticket for frosh class president and will pledge my pouch to throw out this scandalous student administration."

**Cheers**  
Cheers echoed from the Paradise to the Arboretum and sent hundreds toward the campus chanting "We want POGO!!" Hundreds poured from the Arboretum to meet this leader of marsupials the world over.

Pogo announced his candidacy for President this summer and has been beating the brush of the headwaters of Upper Bampopo in Australia since that day. He was called here by the Idaho "Pogo For President" central committee to run for a class office in the hopes he could clean up ASUI politics and its student administration.

The Pogo bandwagon wheeled through the campus early this morning with the Kappa Sig jazz outfit warbling a tune, "Ogo Pogo Mogo."

Marshaling the mile-long lineup of dignitaries was Party Secretary J. J. Chapminski, who in 1952, first proposed Pogo as the logical candidate for the student office.

"I See a Landslide"  
Chapminski said at that time, "I can now foresee a Pogo landslide on this campus. Give us four years and we've got the election cinched." The four years are up Tuesday.

Chapminski in his appearance as parade marshal today rode in a mint green '34 Chevrolet, neatly decorated with party slogans. "If Pogo Doesn't Win, I Will," one read.

Others in the party were J. Muggs Tubby, for five years Idaho Pogo campaign manager, was at Chapminski's side. "I think maybe, just maybe we've got a chance," he opined. "But don't count on anything. As Haze hall goes, so goes the campus." He waved his Pogo-button-covered cap jaocularly as the parade crept along Deakin.

**Other Wheels Turning**  
Noticeably absent were party leaders from the opposition Student Government, Greek and Independent factions. SG manager Robbie Ridninski said he thought the whole stunt was a scheme on the part of the United party. "Pogo is Dale Carlisle in disguise," he said.

At the time, Carlisle was reported to be deep within a Greek huddle mapping further plans to stop the sudden swing to the smiling marsupial. Spokesmen for the Uniteds told an Arg reporter, "This new development has disturbed the party to a great extent. We're going to caucus immediately and come to some decision."

Independents were silent on the whole matter. Party manager J. Wrecker was reported considering suicide, but no concrete details were immediately available.

**A Quick Shot**  
Meanwhile, the Pogo bandwagon moved on, escorted by increasing numbers of Fifth column who were signed up on the spot, took a quick shot, and got in line. Idaho State Police, called out when the mob first appeared, said the situation is "impossible."

One officer looked darkly at the throng of chanting Pogo fans, said "It's impossible," and went back to his comic section.

Low-flying Fifth column jets loosed three truckloads of yellow Pogo buttons high above the crowd. The buttons fluttered down silently, narrowly missing some Greeks.



who were hurrying to a caucus meeting.

When the first buttons hit the ground men and women alike charged forward engulfing the Pi Phi house in the process. So great was the weight of the mob, which was impossible to accurately estimate, that the brick building buckled and crumbled. No one was injured. Within an estimated five minutes and thirty-four seconds the last of the buttons were securely pinned

ned and the vast sea of humanity seethed on.

**Pogo Waved**  
During this entire time Pogo busied himself grinning for photographers and waving to his fans. The possum stood erect in an open car exchanging pleasantries with anyone who happened to catch his eye. "I'm very happy to be here today," he said. He refused to discuss the present student government system, but scheduled a press conference for late this evening. Tubby said he would begin his preliminary attacks at that time and would follow through Saturday with a speech on Moscow's main freeway.

Tubby predicted his candidate would loose what he called "a stinging denunciation" of the present administration in that speech.

Following the parade, Pogo returned to his hotel to write and discuss his Saturday speech with his manager and aids. Nearly 2000 students set up camp outside the hotel on an outside chance of catching another glimpse of him. Late this morning, he had not made any further appearances.

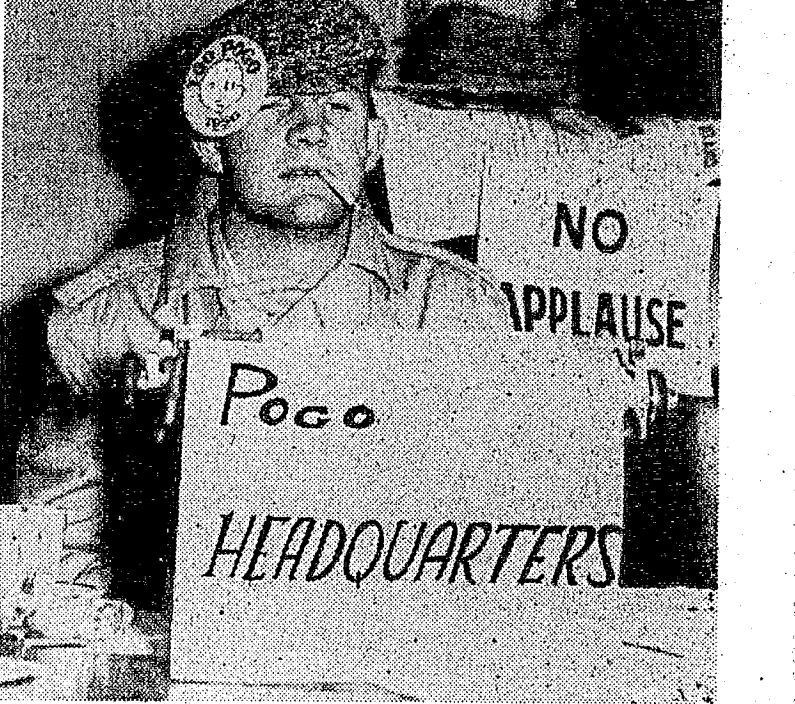
## Tubby Calls POGO 'Real Hound Dog'

Tubby, Idaho campaign manager and press agent heaped into one, said Pogo's program at the Idaho campus will include another investigation of the athletic department, student administration, financial status of the University and efficiency of the Intercollegiate Knights under its present administration.

Kappas and SAE's held their exchange this year at the SAE. The pledges had dinner at the SAE house and the members ate at the Kappa's.

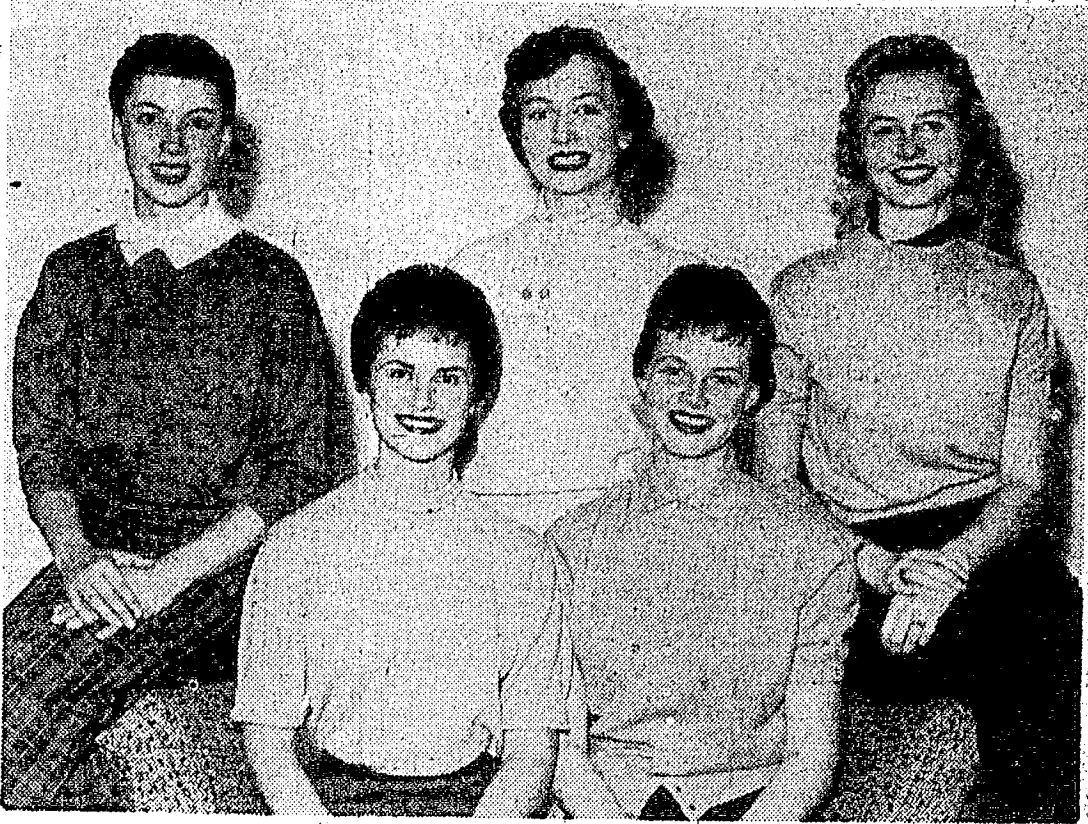
The Gamma Phi and Phi Delt dinner and dance exchange was enhanced by the music of Jim Mercer and his band.

# Tuesday To Decide New Class Officers

Idaho students go to the polls Tuesday to elect class officers and also to mark their choices on a straw ballot of the national presidential election and the senatorial and representative races in Idaho.

Polls, which open at 8:45 a.m., and close at 4:15 p.m., will be located in three central places on the campus:

1. Student Union Building—lobby.
2. Engineering Building—first floor hall.
3. Administration Building—first floor hall.

Students will vote for president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer of their respective classes as set down by the registrar and must present their ASUI cards in order to receive their ballots.

The straw ballot, which is being sponsored by members of Sigma Delta Chi, men's journalism honorary on campus, will include the presidential race between President Eisenhower, Republican, and Adlai Stevenson, Democrat, and the Idaho senatorial contest between Republican Herman Welker and Frank Church, Democrat.

Also included will be the contest for first and second district U.S. representatives from Idaho. Competing in the first district race are Gracie Pfost, Democrat, and Louise Shaddock, Republican. The second district battle pits Democrat John Reynolds against the Republican choice Hamer Budge.

Campus politicians reached the climax in their campaigns this week with continued living group visits, at which the various candidates introduced themselves, stated their qualifications and their party's platforms, if any. These living group visits are made during lunch and dinner.

**United Party Finishes**  
United Party candidates wound up their campaign last night, due to shortened visits and a revamped visiting schedule, according to Dale Carlisle, Greek Caucus president.

The Independent Party will be the final group to complete their

campaign finishing their living group visits in men's halls Monday evening.

Student Government Party will end their campaign in Gault Hall Monday noon.

Class election ballots will be counted Tuesday night by the election committee of Jim Hargis, chairman, Cherie Bacon and John Bradbury, assisted by a fifteen member election board, chosen by examinations given by the executive board.

Members of the election board include: Dale Johnson, chairman, Lin Meek, Kay Lipp, Beverly Newberry, Cora Krakaw, Jim McPherson, Claudette Kern, Barbara Joseph, Bill Hart, Roger Slet, Virginia Ward, Glen Stokes, Bruce Balderson, Bob Ridener, and Bob Hill.

Hargis said he expects the ballots to be counted by approximately 8 p.m.

# Today's Independent Party Grew From 1946 Decision

"In March of 1946, a vote was taken by the Associated Caucus to change the name of the organization to Independent Caucus," Jay Eacker, Independent party chairman told the paper yesterday in correlating the party's purposes and history.

Eacker continued "A unanimous vote was cast to change the name as we know it today and to establish once again the Independent Council whose functions are to direct the social activities of the independent students."

"Thus, the Independent Caucus has been in operation for the past 10 years with the traditional purpose of representing the independent students on campus by providing a political organ for the selection of qualified students to run for the various political positions on the campus of the University of Idaho.

"With the subsequent abolishment of Independent Council in March 1948, this basic objective developed into a traditional phase in two directions. First, due to popular demand, the sphere of Caucus activity was expanded to include more and more activities and these aims were incorporated into the preamble of the Caucus Constitution.

"It reads: It shall be the purpose of the representatives chosen to the Independent Caucus to serve the independent living groups, unify their relationships, improve their activities, and participate in and contribute to the political, and social activities of the University of Idaho. The duly elected representatives of the Independent Caucus, in order to promote this purpose, hereby establish this constitution.

"Second, due largely to the exchange of ideas which similar organizations through the National Independent Student Association, more consideration has been given to outstanding students not represented on Independent Caucus. This evolved into the policy of backing the students considered best qualified from the entire student body.

"We are a flexible body, able to change with the times, and since the adoption of the constitution, the phrase in the preamble, 'of the independent students,' has come in for much criticism. This criticism was initiated largely by the regional organization of NISA, and also by several organizations on campus. However, the organization is basically concerned with Independent Students, because of the fact that they constitute a large body on this campus and their interests must be made known to the entire student body. We feel that transgression into

# SG Was Formed To End Poor Political Situation

"The Student Government party grew out of a meeting of over 250 students about a year and a half ago because these students were dissatisfied with the political situation at Idaho," party co-chairman Bob Ridener told the Argonaut yesterday.

"They felt," Ridener continued with the hopes of informing student of the cross-campus party, "that candidates for office should not be selected according to where they lived by one faction of the campus, but by an assembly representative of the entire campus."

"They also felt that the students who lived off campus should have a chance to participate in campus activities, both political and social, not afforded them by either of the existing political parties. As a result students living off campus were encouraged to attend and participate in Student Government Party assemblies and the Town Men's Association was organized to give them a chance to mix socially," Ridener added.

**Feature Open Assembly**  
In the Student Government Party all students who care to take part, regardless of where they live, draw up their platform in open assembly, he said. They then choose candidates who promise to support the party platform and to represent all the students at Idaho, not just a particular part of them. These platforms are not merely idle promises or words designed to gain votes during the election, but they are pledges of what the candidates will seek to accomplish if elected.

"Since the beginning of the Student Government Party some have said that it would not last and that its popularity was due to its leaders, but the leaders have come and gone and the party has grown steadily in representation with each election. This growth has been due to the development of young leaders each year and assures the Student Government Party of continued life and progress.

**Represents All Groups**  
Ridener pointed out that new students are sometimes skeptical of becoming supporters of the Student Government Party for fear that there is some stigma attached to leaving the party representative of their particular living group. However, no such stigma exists, for in Student Government Party assemblies every living group on campus has been represented.

"The history of the Student Government Party has been one of progress," Ridener stated. It

# Week Long Effort Nets 827 Blood Jugs

Eight hundred and twenty-seven pints of blood were donated in the sixth annual Blood Drive on the "bloody" Idaho Campus. Co-chairmen Marie Van Orman and Bill Deal, who worked for over a month shaping the campaign, said the campus fell short of the 1,050 goal by 227 pints. Last year the campus was only 100 pints short of its quota.

A team of six nurses and several doctors from the Boise Bloodmobile Center lent professional ex-

perience and supervised the medical segment of the drive. Spurs and IKS were present constantly at the drive headquarters in the SUB ballrooms, which reeked with familiar hospital antiseptic odor. Entertainment was going on throughout the Student Union. Roving comedians, musical acts and live piano music helped to calm nerves.

**Two Houses Over Quota**  
Sigma Chi and SAE's went over their 24 and 32 pint quotas, respectively, and tied with an average of approximately 40 pints. Others making their 100 pct. quota were Delta Chi, Delta Sig, Lambda Chi, Farmhouse and L.D.S. Lambda Chi was the first to fill a quota.

A large sign at the SUB's main entrance kept students up-to-date on total donations and individual gauges in the lobby informed living groups as to their relative positions with other houses. Each living group was assigned a quota they were to meet. This quota system replaced the earlier "one hundred per cent" set up in which entire houses had to give blood if their numbers were qualified.

Miss Van Orman said the new idea gives each living group a quota of eligible donors which must be met before any awards are made.

**Dance Opener**  
A kick-off dance opened the program last Monday night, with Allyn Dingel as master of ceremonies. Kappa Sig's band furnished the music for a large crowd. In the men's division of posters Willis Sweet took first while SAE took honorable mention. Tri-Delt was first for the women and Alpha Chi won honorable mention.

During the drive none of the women's living groups filled their assigned quota. The Tri-Delts came the closest with 90 pct. of their members giving blood.

George Tanner, Red Cross representative, said donors can send their blood to any place they wish, provided they informed officials at the time of contribution. He added that blood is free from any Red Cross bank and that should a student ever need blood, he can contact the bank here and have proper credit established in whatever district he is in at the time.

Tanner said the donations this year would be sent to the Boise regional blood center, to Red Cross banks and to army hospitals throughout the nation.

## Gibb Tells Blue Key Men Leaders Have Obligations

Bob Gibb, Idaho athletic director, emphasized to 30 campus leaders Wednesday night that the men of Blue Key must "learn early in a life of service, that with every privilege you enjoy, it carries with it an obligation."

The athletic director spoke after an initiation banquet and called on some 15 year experience in service as a member of International Rotary clubs to emphasize the meaning and responsibility of service to fellow men.

"Without now serving this state, country and the world, we're going to go backward," Gibb stressed in explaining the necessity for dedicated service. "Once in a while you will get tired of serving, but that is the time we must reach for our goal and with us pull others on our coat tails."

**Four-Way Test Plan**  
He advised the men to give their proposed actions the "four-way test." Before you act, he continued, "Is it the truth; is it fair; will it build good will and better friendship and will it be beneficial to all concerned?"

# Sifting Info, Interviews Continue In Arson Hunt

Earle C. Koehler, Idaho Commissioner of Law Enforcement, returned to Moscow Wednesday morning to continue sifting information to find the cause of the death of three Idaho students in the fire October 19.

Koehler has been attending a safety meeting in Utah the past week leaving search for Organization of an auxiliary police force, by Dudley Loomis Post of the American Legion and sanctioned by the Idaho department of the Legion, is now being started, according to Warren Devereaux, local commander.

Devereaux said the organization of the force was spurred by the present investigation and security measures underway at the University following the fire in Gault Hall.

Plans for the auxiliary police were announced prior to the fire, but the incident increased the possibility of needed assistance in policing the campus spurred the matter along, Devereaux said.

Latah County Prosecuting Attorney Lloyd G. Martinson, whose office is the center of the investigation, said "we are now faced with the job of checking and double checking all the leads and information which have been gathered by investigators and provided by the public. Our job appears to be a big one and we are grateful for the full cooperation we have received and will continue to receive."

Meanwhile, Whitman county, Washington, Prosecutor D. L. McMannis reached at Pullman, said the investigation of a young man being held at Colfax on suspicion of arson is being continued. While authorities have as yet been unable to connect the man with the four suspected arson cases at the University, they are planning to continue the study.

Preliminary plans for organization of the Legion's Auxiliary unit came following a request several weeks ago from Koehler that the Idaho Legion could provide valuable services by providing volunteers who would be ready in case of emergency.

No tyro in the political arena, Smith has served Illinois as state senator from the University of Chicago district and has been a Congressman-at-large from Illinois.

The founder of the famed University of Chicago Radio Round Table and CBS's book program, "Invitation to Learning," he has appeared on many educational programs such as Town Hall, Information Please, Quiz Kids, Wake Up America and People's Platform.

**Stillman Gov.**  
During World War II, Smith became military governor of Sicily and Italy for the Allied armies in charge of Italian education.

Smith's educational background made him a natural for the job of special democratizer for Intellectual German prisoners of war which in turn led to special education missions to Japan, Germany and Austria for the State and War departments.

Long editor of the philosophy magazine Ethics and an editor of State Government, he has authored 20 books on government and the philosophical aspects of it including Lincoln: Living Legend, Democratic Way of Life, Philosophers in Hades, Atomic Power and Moral Faith, and most recently, Live Without Fear.

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# Polio Vaccination Offer Available To Volunteers

A voluntary polio vaccination program for Idaho students will be started on the campus soon, Dr. Ralph Alley, university physician, announced today.

"All students who wish, may take the shots," Dr. Alley said.

The Salk vaccine, Dr. Alley said, would be given in a series of three vaccinations. The program will be started as soon as possible to complete the series before classes adjourn in the spring. Starting date for the program has not been announced.

Charles Decker, director of student affairs, said that the program is aimed at providing protection for individuals receiving the vaccine and for the campus as a whole, since each person vaccinated results in one less potential spreader of the disease.

Those who wish the shots should go to the infirmary and sign up for the vaccine. The list will give physicians the approximate amount of vaccine to order for the program.

**Need Parents Waiver**  
Although they may sign up for the program, students under 21 years of age will be required to show a waiver of responsibility statement signed by their parents before they receive the vaccine.

The vaccinations will be made available on a cost basis, about a dollar for each of the three shots of the series. The large amount of vaccine will be specially purchased for the student program.

Several other Northwest colleges and universities, including the University of Oregon, Dr. Alley said, have similar vaccination programs under way.

Tryouts for Helldivers will be held Monday at 7:30 p.m. at Memorial Gym pool for any interested men, and any women of sophomore standing.

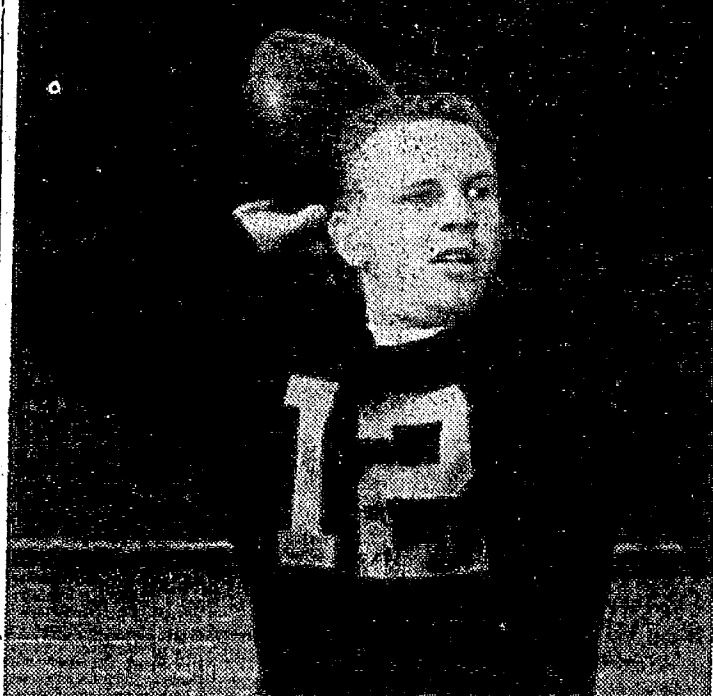
