Military Dress Formal At Ball

Regular and ROTC members of the three services will put on their military formal best for the annual Military Ball Saturday night. Dancing to Gary Dossett's music is set to begin at 9 p.m. in the SUB's South and Middle ball-rooms.



The Pacific Coast conference has again wiped its feet on the conference doormat, Idaho.

The conference has scheduled Idaho to play two conference games at home again during the student's Christmas vacation and one during final exam week.

In football Idaho meets Oregon before school opens and this is the only game suitable for Dad's Day.

The officials of this conference make no bones that no concessions are going to be made to Idaho in scheduling activities and have taken a "take it or leave it" attitude. Apparently Idaho is going to take it.

Each team in basketball will make a trip to Memorial gym in an all-conference round robin, a change from last year, which will give fans the opportunity to watch more than half the conference in one season.

To complete this round robin, the conference must open in January, the first weekend. The past season Idaho played two exciting games against UCLA while students were vacationing.

The UCLA scheduling was created at the concession of Idaho since UCLA decided the only time they would play Idaho was on Jan. 6 and 7. Oregon had originally been scheduled that weekend in Eugene but Idaho went out of its way to accommodate UCLA.

But its different this year, says the conference. We're starting anew and we'll rotate each year, the conference moguls say. But both WSC and Idaho are again stuck by "circumstances."

Action should be taken internally here at Idaho to find a way to fight this "take it or leave it" position and establish Idaho as a "member" of the conference, not a doormat.

When the right people decide it's time to be recognized, then the school should attack this problem united, not torn among the many personal interests.

Davenport Wins Honor In AFROTC

Cadet Ernie Davenport has been selected to receive the AFROTC award of the Society of American Military Engineers. The announcement was made jointly by Allen S. Janssen, dean of the college of engineering, and Col. Merrill A. Kempton, professor of air science.

Davenport is one of the 20 junior engineers chosen for the award over the nation, in competition among 109 colleges and universities. This award is given for high scholarship in both engineering and air science curricula and for leadership ability in activities.

He was nominated by Prof. Norman F. Hindle, head of the mechanical engineering department.

Davenport, president of Delta Tau Delta fraternity on campus, is the second student at the university to receive the award which will be presented at the annual AFROTC Spring Review, May 15.

Campus clean-up, the half-day set aside for sprucing up the campus for Mother's Day weekend will get underway at 8:30 tomorrow morning, but a noon lunch on the Ad lawn will not close the project.

An all-campus picnic that has been held in the past was dropped this year because of numerous other picnics scheduled for the day according to Dale Carlisle, Blue Key president.

The clean-up sponsored by Blue Key will be set up in almost the same manner as in former years according to Ernie Davenport, chairman of the project.

Living groups will be assigned definite areas to clean. All refuse will be placed in street gutters where trucks manned by building and grounds employees and Blue Key members will pick it up.

Davenport announced earlier that it would take almost a complete downpour to cancel the clean-up.

A sound truck will travel over campus to get the students out to work, Davenport said.

School Spirit Lack Blamed On New Activity Schedule

One of the chief reasons for the dwindling in Idaho's school spirit was noted in a report to the executive board Tuesday evening concerning the basketball and football schedule for the ensuing school year.

Dad's Day is the same week as registration, while Homecoming is late in October, and the basketball slate includes two home games prior to Christmas vacation, one of which is the day classes are dismissed for the holidays, and two during Christmas. Another of the 13 home games is during final exams. A memorandum was sent to President D. R. Theophilus protesting the scheduling of sports activities.

The new executive board of four Greeks, three Independents, and two Student Government members, will attend the next meeting scheduled for Monday night, and they will assume the duties of student government the following week under the leadership of Dave Maxey, new ASUI president.

Memorandum
 In the memorandum it was stated, "The ASUI Executive Board feels that the students are not given due consideration when athletic schedules are presently being drawn and especially those schedules in which Idaho is participating on the same basis as all other schools in the Pacific Coast Conference. It is the general opinion of the students that as long as the students are compelled to pay \$7.50 a semester as fee to the athletic program they should be entitled to consideration for home schedules in all sports."

This year's basketball schedule was one of the worst in the history of that sport at Idaho, the memorandum said. Four of the seven home conference games were played during holiday vacations. During Christmas the Vandals played with UCLA here and during Washington's birthday Oregon State was on the Idaho campus two nights. A similar schedule awaits fans in 1957-58.

Several non-conference games in basketball are on the schedule during Christmas, but the executive board said in the memorandum that such a move was necessary since some games must be played during this period. However, they are asking for equal consideration with the other nine schools in the conference.

Local Frat Makes Chapter Application
 Idaho's local chapter of Farm House fraternity will probably be installed this fall, officers said Monday.

A spokesman for the group said they were presently applying for a national charter and would "pro-nect week. The local now has 20 members.

The group, colonized on the Idaho campus last year, pledges only students majoring in agriculture and related fields.

The fraternity will not participate in general IFC rush in September because it does not pledge men until after they have completed one semester at the University.

Northwest Debate Draws Idaho Team
 Idaho debaters left Thursday for Missoula, Mont. to compete in a tournament at the University of Montana.

Groups from all over the Northwest will be in competition Saturday. Subject for debate will be the United States' foreign aid policy.

Representing Idaho are Dick Sorenson, Reed Bowen, Bob Hill, and Richard Hughes. Dr. A. E. Whitehead, advisor, accompanied them.

Students Must Show Interest

ASUI President Dave Maxey and the newly elected executive board will take office after Monday night. The accomplishments of this group in gaining benefits, protecting the rights and governing the students of the University of Idaho will depend as much upon the students as it does upon the persons placed in office.

The student government, with its power limited by the administration, can only be as powerful as the administrators will permit or as strong as the student support it has behind it.

In almost every instance, the ten persons in the key seats in this year's student government met with the same unconcerned student attitude time and time again.

When the Executive Board took up the cleaning issue, the reason for failure probably wasn't as much the fact that nothing could be done on the issue; but more that the majority of the students lost interest in getting

anything done. This attitude seems typical in any issue handled by the board. After thoroughly discussing the benefits of NSA on the Idaho campus this year's Board decided to accept it, but a great number of students still have no idea of what the organization is or what its functions are.

And so down the line, activities, problems, political orientation assemblies, etc.—the students have failed to support their elected leaders by lack of interest.

Maxey, the student's choice for president, emphasized often during his campaign that if he was elected he wanted the student body to let him know what it wanted.

"If I am elected I want to hear from you," he said. "If I don't hear from you, you will be hearing from me."

Close to 2,000 students displayed enough interest to elect the officers now the next step is to show interest in what they do.

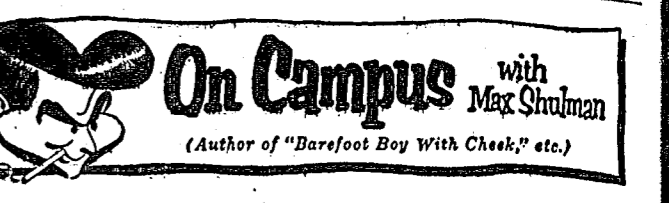
She objects to overemphasis of realism in entertainment. "Life is not always in the back streets of slums."

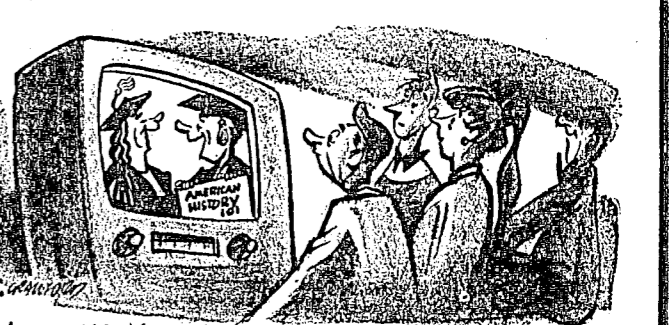


VIDEOT'S DELIGHT

The Vandals stopped Oregon State 6-4 Wednesday as pitcher Steve Hinckley picked up his third straight division victory to become the league's winningest pitcher. His big bat again helped the Idaho plate attack.

The Vandals get the weekend off, then face Washington State Monday afternoon at 3 p.m. on McLean field, has faced and lost to the best pitcher Oregon and Washington have thrown this season, is scheduled for pitching duty Monday.
