Idaho had its wrists slapped to the tune of one thousand bucks this week by the Pacific Coast Conference. The conference said Idaho was guilty of a recruiting infraction when the school's track coach illegally approached English cinder prospects.

Being the undisputed doormat of the conference, Idaho can be fined and then the conference moguls can think nothing about it. Idaho is in no situation to snap back and must graciously accept this action.

So, Idaho is guilty. But there is so much shady recruiting being conducted all over the campuses throughout the conference, that it is doubtful if this punishment to Idaho only is justified. The big schools can not have a clean recruiting slate, there is too much competition brought upon the schools, that others have also broken the codes.

The \$1,000 fine will hurt Idaho more than any other school. The Vandal athletic program runs on a subsidized basis, is not self supporting. Other schools come close to making gate receipts and alumni handouts carry the load.

The communications and executive boards have named Dean Judd as the successor to this Jason.

We are confident that Judd will continue the staff's intentions of this past year to make the Argonaut a campus newspaper, and not merely a campus bulletin board.

It is hard for some people who would like to have news in the paper to realize that the campus is reading a newspaper, and not the "morning report," and the handling of news is done on this basis.

Judd is a personable guy to work with. We hope you will give him your support. Next year's staff has another big job.

Alley Memorial Fund Nets \$445 In Student Drive

A total of \$445.47, a quarter of the \$2,000 goal set for the Dr. Ralph M. Alley Memorial Scholarship Fund, was collected Wednesday noon in a living group drive.

The house-by-house collection handled by the Intercollegiate Knights and the Spurs officially opened the drive which was set up May 17 by the Executive Board.

The Exec Board committee, composed of Frank Nosek, Chet Prior, Chuck Orem and Mary Jo Mace are in charge of the Alley Memorial Drive and announced the present total does not include donations from a few living groups which have not turned in their donations. The committee also pointed out that numerous groups have indicated they plan to make further donations before the end of the year.

The committee said that any contributions from off-campus students would be accepted at the ASUI office.

The fund, which by present plans will be established as a scholarship for an upperclassman student each year, was set up by the Board as a tribute to the late Dr. Alley.

The drive will continue through the summer with special appeals planned to be made to the Alumni groups in the state through letters and at the Alumni Banquet held during the commencement weekend.

The boards also approved Roger Williams as advertising manager of the paper and Donna Gale as circulation manager. Williams served as assistant ad manager this year and Miss Gale will return for her second year as circulation chief.

Judd is a Phi Tau from Blackfoot and served this semester as house president. He has served on the Arg staff this year as sports editor the first semester and as an associate managing editor the second half of the year.

The new editor was active on the sports staff as a freshman and sophomore and as editorial page director this year.

He was editor of his high school paper at Blackfoot and enrolled at the University the fall of 1954-55. Judd was an Intercollegiate Knight, member of Inter-fraternity Council and Greek Caucus. He is also a member of Sigma Delta Chi, men's professional journalism fraternity, and was tapped for Blue Key.

Judd will be officially "sworn in" Monday night at an Arg banquet when Hughes wills Jason's editor.

Today, coach Clem Parberry's nine travels to Pullman to battle Buck Bailey's crew at 3 p.m. Tomorrow, the two clubs return to MacLean Field to ring down the curtain on the 1957 season at 1:30.

Idaho righthanders Doug Randall and Steve Hincley will attempt to hurl the Vandals into second place in the ND. If Idaho wins both games, it will put the club over .500 in season's standing for the first time since 1928.

Bailey is expected to throw his two top pitchers, Bruce Boldt and

George Van Horne, in an effort to ruin Idaho's brightest season in 29 years.

The Vandals could take over second place in final ND standings if they take a double victory and Oregon State loses two games to Oregon.

Oregon won the Division crown Tuesday, when the Washington Huskies swept a twin bill from OSC at Seattle, automatically eliminating the Beavers from further title contention.

One change should mark the Idaho starting lineup in the WSC clashes.

Delegates also defeated a proposal to limit each school's total number of football games to nine, with five specified as PCC encounters. It was rejected by a 5-4 margin, with school voting in the same manner as on the eligibility question. The move will retain its round-robin schedule which was inaugurated last season.

'Illegal Interviews' Cost Idaho \$1000

Idaho and USC were handed stiff \$1,000 fines Wednesday at the Pacific Coast Conference meeting at Spokane.

PCC directors reportedly invoked the fine against Idaho because track coach Joe Glander held "illegal interviews" with prospective students. USC was penalized because a "basketball coach" made unspecified comments to unspecified officials during and after a game last winter.

The other high point of Wednesday's conference action was the 5-4 rejection by league teams of a petition to restore a half-season's eligibility to penalized 1957 USC and UCLA senior and junior footballers.

Idaho, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford and Washington voted to defeat the measure, while Washington, California, UCLA, and USC favored it.

Vandals Host Golf Title Play Saturday
