

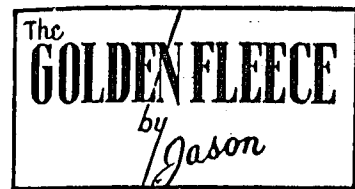
## Men To Select Queen Monday

The ASUI Exec Board Tuesday cleared up what we hope will be the last of a list of students being declared ineligible for extra-curricular activities after they had already applied for and been awarded an office in some ASUI function.

A number of positions filled last spring have been left open this fall when the persons were found to be not quite acceptable by the scholastic standard setup.

When such a situation occurs it is embarrassing for all parties concerned. The person involved, the Executive Board and the group making the appointment are all naturally somewhat upset.

Where the problem can be stopped in this situation is questionable. Every effort is made by the ASUI office and the appointing groups to have the students cleared before they are to be selected, but in most instances this is not always possible.

Therefore, the only clear solution is for students to know, if possible, whether or not they are eligible when they apply. In some instances the students weren't aware of all of the regulations necessary for participation in extra-curricular activities.

## Second Royalty Proposal Passed Following Change

A proposal aimed at more careful distribution of ballots in campus royalty elections was passed by the ASUI Exec Board Tuesday.

Gault Hall's lounge, destroyed by fire exactly one year ago Saturday, will be re-opened for use this weekend.

Material damage has been repaired and new furniture has been moved in. Folding doors to separate the lounge from the dining hall are expected to arrive in about three weeks.

The fire started in the lounge and spread to the fourth floor where it took the lives of three Idaho men.

Four cast members and two crew heads were affected by the University infirmary order. Miss Collette plans to go ahead with scene practices until the flu epidemic lifts.

Howard Dorgan, technical director, said, "We've been working night and day in order to have the sets ready. Now we'll have a chance to take it easy, but crews will continue to put the finishing touches on their work."

Wednesday night, Dorgan and one crew member worked a short time at Memorial gym, but the University thespians will do most of the set work over the weekend.

## Top Sociologist To Lead Off Speaker List

Citizens responsibilities in combating the nation's juvenile delinquency crime wave will be discussed by Idaho's first public

event speaker Tuesday at 11 a.m. in Memorial Gym.

Dr. David Dressler, nationally-known author, sociologist, and educator, will speak on the topic, "Crime is Your Problem."

All students will be excused for the assembly and morning classes will be shortened to 35 minutes each. The 10 minute break between classes will not be changed.

University officials released the Tuesday morning class schedule with first period running from 8 a.m.-8:35; second 8:45-9:20; third 9:30-10:05; and fourth 10:15-10:50.

Dressler is an associate professor of sociology at Long Beach State College and is currently writing the manuscript for a college text book on juvenile delinquency.

He is a prolific writer, being the author of over 100 articles which have appeared in national weekly magazines.

In his speeches and writings he discusses how crime touches every citizen and why it is the obligation and interest of everyone. He also will discuss the psychological factors connected with crime and criminals.

The "flu" bug also took its toll on Idaho Vandal football fortunes Thursday and sent quarterback Howard Willis to the Infirmary for a bout with the disease.

Meanwhile, the Gamma Phi's and Kappas were taking advantage of a delivery service offered by ASUI General Manager Gale Mix. SUB employees were making three deliveries a day to the two houses.

## Jim Golden's Campeyeing What's It Like In Isolation? An Exclusive 'Flu' Report

At week's end, this campus is still in the grip of a horde of tiny, but obnoxious little "flu" bugs. Thursday night two sororities were still quarantined from the outside world. What's it like to be locked up for five days at a stretch. As expected, we made a (telephone) survey and found . . .

AT THE GAMMA PHI HOUSE, the first one hit hard enough to get cut off from mankind: The 50 or so women, who have been sealed off from civilization for five days now, were getting perceptively bored with talking to each other, writing letters and being sick.

And nobody was studying. "We just don't have the energy," one informant said. So to compensate the whole crew was passing time by listening to music supplied by the local radio station and especially to the dozens of request records dedicated to them in their misery.

Bridge and poker games were keeping others occupied and the rest were spending hours on the house's three telephones discussing the situation.

To build up their energy, members were ordering 20 to 30 milk shakes at a time from the SUB, thus taking advantage of a free delivery service started Monday. The milk shake total was running near 90 a day.

"We've got nothing to do but eat," one feminine correspondent reported.

Was anybody trying to take advantage of an illegal "sneak date?"

"Nobody has the energy to climb down the fire escape," according to the G Phis.

And the hashers are afraid of us too.

A sad situation indeed. One parting comment: "Every time they deliver some food to us we all flock to the door to get some air."

And that's the situation at Gamma Phi.

Kappas Isolated AT THE KAPPA HOUSE, now in its third day of isolation, things were much the same, but less desperate generally.

Profiting from the Gamma Phi experience, a host of golden key wearers headed for home before the lid clamped down too tightly, leaving 30 or so to stick it out until at least Sunday.

Those who did get caught were taking the whole thing moderately philosophically in a negative sort of way.

Most of the ailing ones were sealing themselves off from the rest of the crew in scattered rooms. The others were learning bridge or writing letters.

And, again, nobody was studying.

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## Blood Drive To Go Ahead As Planned Say Chairmen

Blood Drive co-chairmen Elaine Heiber and Jim Golden Thursday explained quota procedure and named a theme for the all-campus project, set for Oct. 31-Nov. 1.

Miss Heiber said the Drive committee had set a goal of 850 pints for the three-day campaign. She explained that individual living group quotas had been "substantially" slashed this year to take "pressure off houses with a large number of sick members."

Men's living groups, she said, would be asked to donate blood representing about 44 per cent of their total membership. Women will be asked to supply donors from about 38 per cent of their groups.

"We wanted to put less pressure on the women especially," Miss Heiber said, "because they are bearing the brunt of this 'flu' outbreak."

Golden told a meeting of Blood Drive house representatives Tuesday that his committee had "made no plans" to cancel the Drive because of the influenza situation.

"The total so far is negligible compared with the total campus population," he said. "We see no reason to consider postponing the campaign."

Golden further pointed out that donating blood would not hurt students' resistance to any illness.

"I have been assured by physicians in Boise that the loss of a pint of blood could not hurt any student who is not suffering from some ailment already," he said.

"The committee, Miss Heiber, and I intend to abide by that medical judgment."

He added that any student who had recently suffered from influenza would be automatically disqualified from donating blood.

Earlier this week, Vandal fortunes took a turn for the better when Larry Norby ran near his pre-season peak in practice drills. Norby has been hobbled by a leg injury suffered early this season.

Bob Dehlinger, also hampered

by a leg injury, will make the Stockton trip, but probably won't be near top form. Paul Wagar, the third Idaho back suffering from a lame leg, was not yet sufficiently recovered to make the jaunt.

**Prestel Gone**

The other name conspicuously absent from the 35-man traveling roster, was that of Jim Prestel. The massive tackle is at Indianapolis, Indiana at the bedside of his ill mother and has not played in the past two games.

"We should be in another really rugged affair at Stockton," coach Stahley avered yesterday. "COP is always tough and is another in the line of undefeated ball clubs

Idaho has met this season."

To date, the Vandals have met three teams, who were undefeated when Idaho played them, including Oregon, Arizona State, and Oregon State. The latter two have yet to lose.

The Vandal starting team should remain the same, with the possible exception of Willis. Larry Aldrich and Wade Patterson should be at ends, with Tony Anderson and Pete Johnson at tackles, Jerry Smythe and Jerry Kramer at the guard slots and Wayne Walker at center.

Gary Kenworthy may take over at quarterback, with Jim Norton or Dehlinger at flankerback, Larry Norby at right half, and Ken Hall at fullback.

# Hall Tops PCC In Punting For 3rd Week

Ken Hall, Idaho's quick-kick artist, retained his rank as top punter in the PCC, with an average of 48.3 yards a try, a full 2.6 yards better than his closest competitor, Jim Conroy of Southern California. Hall is also 7th in yards gained rushing, where he has a 4.2 yard average.

Oregon State dominated the rushing department, having three players in the top five in total yards gained on the ground. Nub Beamer leads the conference with 345 yards, followed by Jim Shanley of Oregon with 344 yards, and Joe Francis, also of Oregon State with 283 yards. The other Beaver, Earnel Durden, is fifth with 242 yards.

**Willis Drops**

In scoring, as a result of last weeks shut-out by Oregon State, Vandal quarterback Howard Willis dropped into a tie for the lead. Jack Fanning of WSC climbed into the tie with Willis, following WSC's win over Stanford last Saturday. Both Willis and Fanning have scored 5 touchdowns.

Willis also lost his second place position in passing and total offense, as he dropped to third in both departments. Willis is headed by Bob Newman of WSC and Jack Douglas of Stanford in the passing statistics, and trails Newman and Joe Francis of Oregon State in total offense.

Larry Aldrich, Idaho senior end, remained in the number two spot in pass receptions, as Don Ellingsen of WSC pulled in seven aerials Saturday against Stanford, while Aldrich was held to 3 catches against Oregon State.

Last Friday, the same four men took the top spots in a meet against the Cougars. Hatten finished first in that run with Adams and Wyatt following.

Yoder finished behind Reed in yesterday's meet to lead the WSC squad. Frasier and Zeeben took sixth and seventh.

Milt Riggers, of Idaho was eighth and Dick Boyce ninth. Dick Durham, Mike Lund, and Terry Lynch also finished for the Vandals.

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# Fleet Back And Top Passer Featured In Tiger Attack

Jack Larscheid, a 151-pound speedster, and Tom Flores, who is threatening to wipe Eddie LeBaron's College of Pacific passing records off the book, will lead the Tigers against the Idaho Vandals at Stockton tomorrow night.

Larscheid and Flores are typical of the class of players which have made COP one of the most feared independents in the nation.

Flores, a senior, completed 73 of 127 passes last season for a .575 average and 1119 yards. He will again be throwing to his favorite targets, left end Farrell Funston and right end Bob Denton.

Funston picked off 27 passes for 563 yards and five touchdowns last year and figures to be even better in his senior year. Denton was second with 17 receptions for 301 yards and four touchdowns.

Larscheid, who stands only 5'6", has been called by the COP coaching staff "one of the finest ball players in the country." He has led the Tigers in yardage gained throughout this season.

The COP line should be the biggest that the Vandals have faced this season. Denton, at 229 pounds and Funston, at 217 pounds, are two of the largest college ends around anywhere.

**Line Big**

John Williams, 206, and Bill Streigel, 222, at tackle, Ken Castles, 218, and Bob Startwell, 208, at guards, and Roland Rutter, 212, at center should complete the starting line.

Charlie Chatfield, a 185-pound senior, will be at the flankerback post, with rugged 193-pounder, Tom Green, at fullback. Green is rated the top blocker and linebacker on the squad, and also kicks extra points.

The Tigers are coached by Jack "Moose" Myers, a former Phila-

delphia Eagles' blocking back. Myers said earlier this year that the main team problem would be line depth and inexperience. But the pleasant surprise provided by Larscheid has more than made up for that.
