

The Pacific Coast Conference is still in existence following its week-long meeting that came to a close last Friday; but how long the conference will continue to exist and whether or not the group as it now stands will be an assistance to athletics at Idaho both seem to be rather pressing questions.

Two incidents following the Conference meeting, along with situations which arose during it, indicate that the PCC may be on its last legs.

Votes by different factions in the two University of California schools earlier this week point out that some parts of the California institutions want out of the group.

They Want Out

University of California student representatives voted to break from the conference on Tuesday, and the faculty of UCLA indicated that it was in favor of Los Angeles taking the same action.

In earlier action during the actual conference meeting, the round robin football scheduling was dropped in favor of a schedule with only five games required with PCC schools to make a conference member eligible for the Rose Bowl.

. This along with the relaxing of the ban on ineligible players to only one half a season should have eased the

tension and the tempers of the "big" schools in the conference which feel they have been wronged by the "small Northern schools" and Stanford.

This, however, does not seem to be the case. Instead these large schools show no indication of changing their attitude toward Idaho and are now even able to eliminate Washington State from Rese Bowl competition.

Money! The almighty dollar appears to be the true root of the entire conflict. Aid to athlete conflicts, of course, have finances as their basis and certainly the main reason all of the California schools refuse to schedule Idaho and hesitate when they are asked to put WSC or one of the Oregon teams on the slate can be summed up in one word — MONEY.

The big schools see no reason for scheduling a game with one of their weak Northern neighbors whan games with intersectional powers can put much more money in their athletic coffers by drawing capacity crowds.

So stands the situation. Idaho officials will have difficulty in getting Washington added to their schedule. let alone

adding a fifth team from California. Idaho will be rather a lost sheep with no place to go if the PCC does fold, but could this be much worse than its position in the current mess?
