Church Attacks Science Lag

A casual Sen. Frank Church (D-Idaho) Wednesday attacked America's technological development lag as a "shocking thing" during an off-the-cuff 20-minute speech before about 400 University of Idaho students and faculty members.

Church, who followed his formal remarks with a 25-minute question-and-answer session, told the audience which crowded the Student Union Building's middle ballroom, that the United States is in a vulnerable position for Soviet attack as a result of its apparent weakness.

He urged that America "regain the technological leadership of the world," which, he said, the United States has lost or is in the process of losing.

Saw In Paper
Only once did Church mention a controversy over political speakers that preceded him to the University.

"I saw in the paper that there has been some furor over this meeting," he commented.

The youthful Senator appeared before the group as one of three public appearances he made while in Moscow. Earlier Wednesday, Church discussed civil rights legislation with the Idaho chapter of Bene and Bar, law honorary, and turned his attentions to specific Gem State problems at a Latah County Democratic meeting later in the evening.

He left for Lewiston and a conference with Sen. Albert Gore (D, Tenn.), chairman of the Senate public roads subcommittee, Thursday.

An amazingly large crowd flocked into the SUB Wednesday afternoon, in fact probably the largest daytime crowd in the history of the building according to ASUI general manager Gale Mix.

At least 600 students completely filled the Ballroom and were even forced to observe the Holly Week style show from outside through the windows.

But even more gratifying was the crowd that attended the speech by Senator Frank Church at the same time in the Central ballroom.

At least 400 interested students showed up for the speech which the University policy prohibits in buildings owned by the institution.

Jason wonders just what size the crowd at the Church speech would have reached if it had not been directly conflicting with the Holly style show.

We feel that the Central ballroom would have been much too small to even begin to hold the crowd.

The point is that the largest "auditorium" available for a student speech, which was not in the least partisan, was filled and probably would have been overflowing under normal conditions.

We hope the Board of Regents will seriously consider immediate action on the recommendation passed by the Exec Board Tuesday night.

Two Areas Established For Parking

Two areas were established for parking student cars on campus during Christmas vacation today by the University Operations council, Wilson Rogers, plant protection officer, announced.

Rogers said students leaving cars on campus over the vacation must park them along Idaho street west from Willis Sweet hall to the Gym Annex or in the area across Third street and north to the prefab housing area.

The university designates special parking areas for cars left on campus to facilitate removing snow from the sidewalks and streets.

Rogers said cars not parked in the two authorized areas "would be towed to the authorized areas and the student owners charged for the towing costs" if snow falls during the vacation.

The University will not be responsible for any loss or damage to moved vehicles, he added.

Parking lots to be vacated include all lots behind dormitories, SUB and Music Building and all parking spaces along campus streets.

Travel Bulletin Aids Students Finding Rides

A travel bulletin board has been set up in the SUB lobby to aid students in finding rides or passengers for the trip home during the holidays, Gale Mix, ASUI general manager, announced today.

Mix said that students should make their own holiday travel arrangements by posting a card on the board stating their destinations, and traveling accommodations.

Those students needing rides can contact other students whose requirements fill their needs for a ride home, Mix added.

The bulletin board is being set up under the jurisdiction of the travel committee, headed by Bruce McCowan, Beta.

Starting Tuesday, road conditions from all over the West will be posted several times daily.

Weather conditions from all over the country and specific road conditions in an area of approximately 600 square mile radius are being furnished by local and state police to aid students in making their travel plans safer and more efficient.

Up-to-the-minute conditions of mountain passes to the Coast, into Montana, and along the North-South Highway will be available, Mix said, and students are asked to check the travel board before starting home for the holidays.

Male students desiring to remain on campus will be required to move into the guest dormitory at Gault which will accommodate 28 men.

Candlelight Concert Sunday At 8

Idaho students, faculty members and townspeople will hear a full hour of Christmas choral music Sunday, when the 60-voice Vandaleers present the annual Candlelight Concert at 8 p.m. in the Memorial gymnasium.
The hour-long program will be devoted to choral music ranging from the composition of the early church to modern day carols and Christmas hymns.
Guest soloist will be Harry S. Morrison, Jr., of the music faculty who has appeared in many professional music programs Professor

Hall M. Macklin, head of the music department, will be the organist for the concert.

The Vandaleers have quite a history—27 years of it. Back in 1930, 18 students got together a choral group, toured Idaho and became quite popular. The campus realized and appreciated the group's functions and soon the ASUI, seeing an enormous promotional advantage, began supporting its activities.

Ran Two Nights
"Shortly before World War II, the Candlelight Concert became a regular feature," Glen Lockery, di-

rector said. "In those days the concert began at 11 p.m., and ran two nights.

The outbreak of World War II forced the Vandaleers into temporary inexistence. In its place an all-girl singing orchestra was formed and made several tours in the state, visiting high schools and adding "esprit de corps" and morale at military bases.

Candlelight Procession
After the war the Vandaleers were reactivated. Then in the fall of 1947, when Lockery joined the Music Department staff, the Candlelight concert time was changed

to 8 p.m. This also marked the first appearance of the candlelight procession where chorus members entered the auditorium each bearing a lighted candle.

Four years later, in 1951, crowds became so large that the auditorium could no longer handle them, and the concert was moved to Memorial gym.

"Even at that, we were surprised to see the gym solidly packed from floor to balcony," Glen Lockery, said of that first gym performance.

The political recommendation asked the Regents to consider redefining a "non-partisan speech" and asked that the holding of workshops on practical politics and mock conventions be allowed in University buildings.

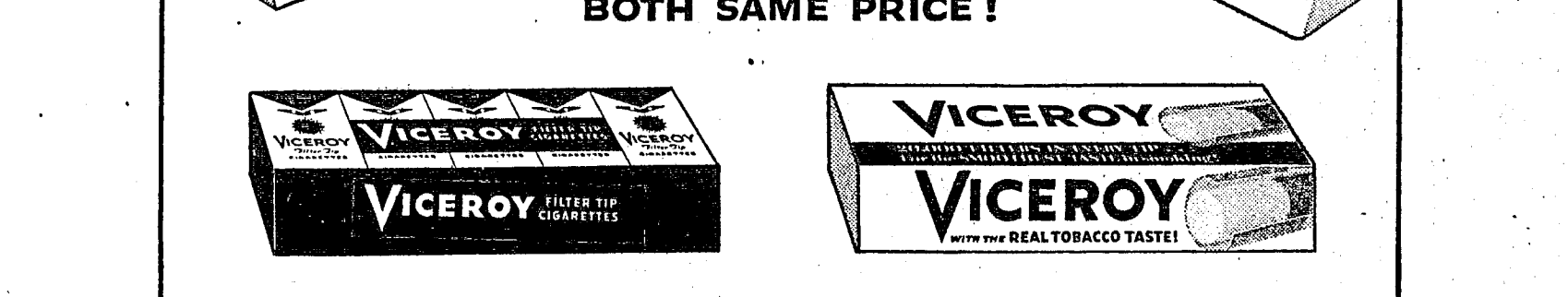
Lewiston Station Stars Military Choir Tues.

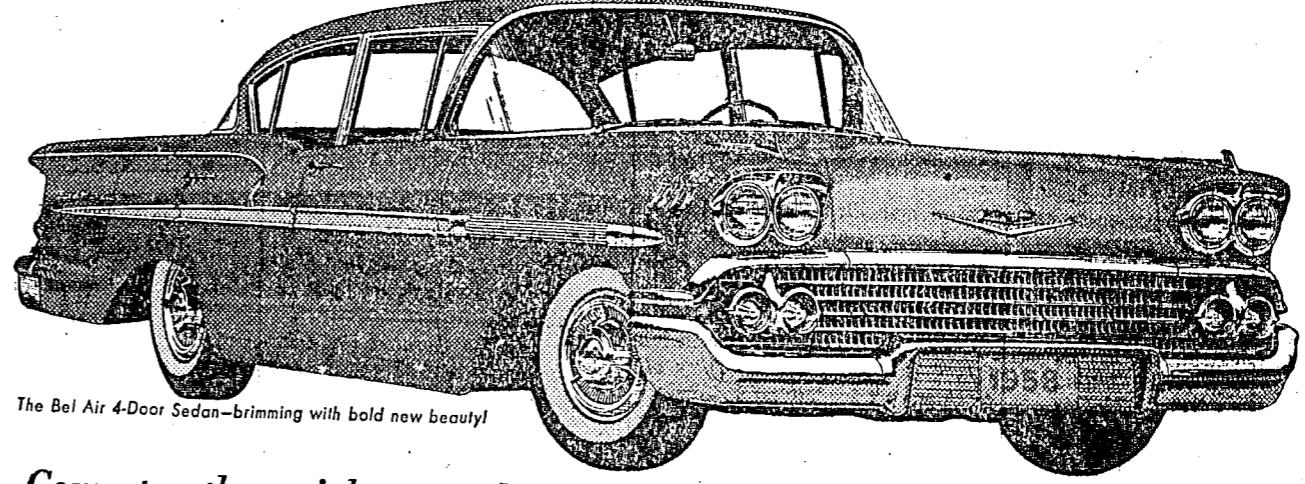

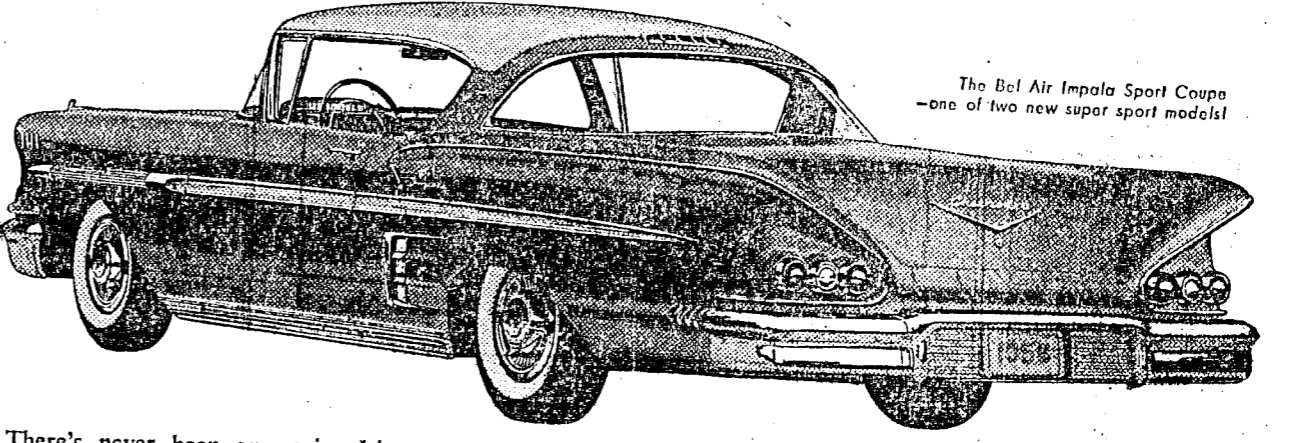
