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Semanticist Is Events Speaker

Dr. S. I. Hayakawa, famed American semanticist who has spent the last 30 years of his life teaching people to use their language effectively, will speak here Thursday.

His speech is entitled "The Fully Functioning Personality," and is scheduled for 11 a.m. in the Memorial gymnasium.

Morning classes will be shortened to provide time for his speech. Schedule is as follows: 1st period 8 to 8:30 a.m., 2nd period 8:45 to 9:20, 3rd period 9:30 to 10:45, and 4th period 10:15 to 10:50.

Hayakawa has held few permanent faculty positions since receiving his doctorate from the University of Wisconsin in 1935. Usually, he makes speaking tours during the winter months and teaches special courses at different colleges during the summer.

Hayakawa first became interested in general semantics during the 1930s while he was a professor of English. He found that many

The play, written by Arthur Miller, author of "Death of a Salesman," revolves around the Salem witch hunts of Massachusetts.

"Scripts can be picked up (at the U-Hut) by the middle of the week," Dorgan said.

Grammar Is Torture

One conclusion he has drawn from his studies is that "grammar is an unnecessary form of torture which makes the majority of American adults nervous whenever they pick up a pen." He believes that these are merely incidentals and that the main thing is to be understood and also to understand.

Hayakawa was born in Vancouver, British Columbia in 1906. He received his bachelor's degree at the University of Manitoba in 1937 and his master's a year later at McGill University in Canada. He came to the US in 1929.

At one time he criticized Dr. Mortimer Adler and Dr. Robert M. Hutchins for spending too much time thinking about abstract subjects. He advised them to get their minds out of outer space and study something useful.

Adler Will Speak Here

Adler will speak here March 27. Hutchins spoke here two years ago on modern education.

General semantics is a term that was first used by Alfred Korzybski to define a new field of communications. This study deals with the explicit meaning of words and the reaction of people to different sounds and words.

Hayakawa took up general semantics where Korzybski left off and was instrumental in developing it to where it is now.

Base Of All Evil --- Communications

Just a year ago, the Exec Board revised the ASUI structure and came up with a new setup which was supposedly designed to rid student government of cumbersome out-dated committees and streamline the handling of ASUI duties.

Years of accumulation with no "house cleaning" of committees in which duties were becoming over-lapping and unclear made such a revamping a very acceptable move.

The new structure was aimed at giving student government a working system under which responsibilities would be clear.

In some phases the new system has worked very well under the Executive Board. The group has taken the structure which was handed to it by last year's board and utilized it quite well.

One problem, however, still seems unresolved by the structural change. The Exec Board is still harassed by the problem of communications between its groups.

Last Tuesday in a joint meeting with the Board of Selection and Control, the Exec Board hashed over difficulties between the two groups and in almost every instance, the reason for misunderstandings was cited as poor communications.

This problem is not new in Idaho student government. The submitting of reports and cooperation between groups has long been a bad spot in the ASUI.

Committee chairmen wonder to whom they are responsible, but don't bother to consult the ASUI structure where it is all spelled out for them.

On the other hand, committee members point out that they were never completely informed of their duties when selected.

Whatever the cause of the poor communications it is apparent that the Exec Board is aware of the trouble and is trying to do something about it.

Two weeks ago the group amended the constitution and added an requirement asking student member of student-faculty committees to submit reports of each meeting to the Board.

The Board followed this move with a decision to ask each of the students on these committees to report in person to a board meeting within the next few weeks.

The Board is taking steps to straighten out the communications, we hope some solid recommendations by the present group can be submitted to help next year's Board get its machinery moving a little more smoothly.

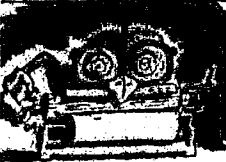
ACCEPTANCE

College Men Doubt Ike Has Lost Reins Of Government

(ACP)—Presidential Aide Sherman Adams recently made a speech at nearly the same time as one made by the President himself. Press reports on the speech pointed out what appeared to be contradictions between what the two men said. Some commentators indicated they felt these contradictions were evidence that the President was no longer in control of the administration.

To obtain the opinion of American college students on this issue, Associated Collegiate Press National Poll of Student Opinion asked the following question in a recent survey:

In a recent address, Presidential Aide Sherman Adams made some remarks which seemed to contradict President Eisenhower's feelings on certain topics. The theory was later advanced that this was an indication the president doesn't really have control of the present administration. Do you think this theory is true, or do you think it is untrue? Why?

Results indicate that the college men interviewed tend to disagree with the statement rather strongly, while a slightly larger proportion of coeds interviewed, on the other hand, feel the statement is true. However, more women than men were undecided on the issue. Complete results of answers to the question are as follows:

	Men	Wom.	TU.
Think the statement is true	35%	36%	35%
Think the statement is untrue	47%	32%	41%
Undecided	18%	32%	24%

Although the men and women interviewed were split on their feelings toward the statement, almost equal proportions of both of them agreed with the theory that the president really does not have control of his administration. A substantially higher proportion of men than women, however, feel the statement is untrue.

'Not Under His Thumb'
A variety of comments was offered by the students interviewed to support their answers. A junior from Wayne State University (Detroit, Mich.) feels the statement is untrue, and that the apparent contradiction "merely indicated that his administration was not under his thumb."

A Lake Forest College (Lake Forest, Ill.) freshman agrees with the Wayne State junior, but because "Adams might not have

The participation trophy was awarded to the Pi Phis, and the tournament cup went to the Tri-Delts.

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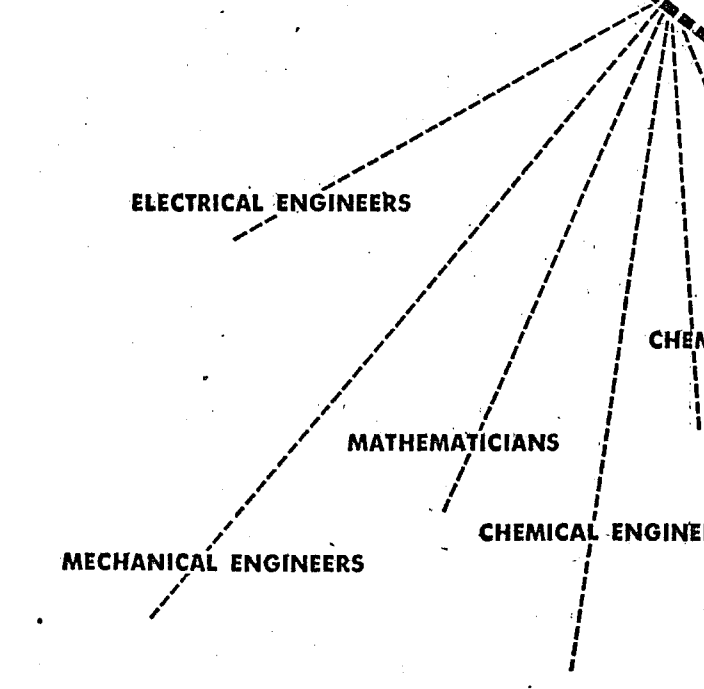
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CAGERS STAGGER LEADING BEARS, 82-72

Suprise Win Gives Squad Road Split; Keeps Alive PCC Third Place Chance

Idaho's Vandals surprised the California Bears 82-71 at Berkeley Saturday night to gain a split of a two game California road trip and retain hopes of a tie for third in the PCC race.

The Vandals were upset 72-62 at Palo Alto by the Stanford Indians Friday night in the first of the two game set in the Golden State.

It was a distinct team effort against the Bears which gave Idaho one of the biggest upsets of the season in the PCC. All five starters for the Vandals scored in double figures.

Forward Jim Branom and guard Gary Simmons were co-high point men at 19 points each. Forward John Liveious and guard Whaylon Coleman had 16 apiece and center Gary McEwen dropped in 10 markers.

The win gave Idaho a 1958 PCC season victory over every other team in the conference, with the exception of the Oregon State Beavers. The Vandals have downed Washington State twice, and the rest of their PCC opponents once each.

It was Liveious who steered the Idaho course on the way to victory over Cal with six second half buckets.

Looked Bad

Early in the game, it looked as though the Bears had it all sewed up when, with center Don McIntosh, hitting well, Cal blazed to a 10-1 lead.

Some very effective sharpshooting by Simmons and Branom, however, helped Idaho to overtake the Bears and take out a 38-33 margin at halftime.

The Bears clawed back to tie at 51-41 early in the second half but from then on it was all Idaho with Branom, Simmons and Liveious leading the way.

Cal, which shot 39 percent from the field during the tilt, cooled considerably near the game's conclusion, hitting only five field goals in the last ten minutes.

Idaho couldn't miss from the field or free throw line, averaging 52 per cent from the former and hitting 22 of 27 attempts from the latter.

Idaho's Branom nearly had an altercation with a fan when the fan jumped out onto the court near the finish of the game and apparently cursed the big Vandal forward. Teammates pulled him away, however, before either struck a blow.

The incident occurred immediately after Branom had fouled out of the contest.

Robinson Out

Cal's Earl Robinson, the Bears' star guard, missed the first nine minutes of play. He was reportedly getting an injured ankle re-taped in the dressing room.

Robinson led Cal to a 56-50 win over UCLA Friday night with 20 points. He got eight against the Vandals.

Stanford blistered the nets for 51.9 per cent Friday to dump Idaho, which hit well enough to win many ball games, 39.8 per cent.

The accurate John Arrillaga, Stanford guard, provided what proved to be the winning margin in the first half by dropping in 11 points. Arrillaga continued his hot pace early in the second half hitting three quick long shots.

'Jumping' John Liveious and guard Simmons kept Idaho in the ball game throughout but their two man effort was not enough.

Liveious topped all game scorers with 24 points. Simmons had 17. Arrillaga led the Indians with 20 counters.

Stanford was on top 41-34 at the half but only after the score had

been knotted nine times. An Indian reserve unit opened up the margin of difference in that half after the Stanford first unit had been unable to pull away.

Doug Warren and Jerry Stahler paced the Indian second five in the first half drive.

Idaho's Gary Simmons dropped off somewhat pointwise in the two tilts but still leads the PCC in scoring with a 21.9 average. His closest competitors, Dave Gambee of OSC and Doug Smart of Washington are both around the 20-point mark.

"Little Idaho, a PCC orphan for so long, needs only to ask—it can have the biggest possible favor from Oregon State, excepting possibly the foundation of Gill Coliseum itself."

The above was written by George Pasero, sports editor of the Oregon Journal, Portland, for that paper Sunday.

It was written after Idaho had just knocked off the mighty California Bears, PCC leaders, to keep alive Oregon State's slim conference title hopes.

We always have objected to the term "little" as a descriptive adjective describing Idaho athletic teams and seriously doubt whether OSC would give the Vandals anything (least of all a win this Saturday night). We did agree with Pasero when he called Idaho's win over Cal "a startling upset."

Victory Startling

In this column Friday we called the California Bears the best team in the PCC. As usual someone was listening to prove us wrong, in this case, the Idaho Vandal basketball team.

What made the Idaho victory all the more startling was the fact that only the night before the Vandals had been solidly beaten by Stanford, which is a PCC also-ran at best.

A curious aspect of the two games concerned shooting percentages.

Friday Stanford shot 52 per cent from the field and California 39. Both nights it was just a case of the hotter team walking off with the victory.

Teams Too Hot

We asked Idaho Coach Harlan Hodges if the Vandals did not shoot over their heads against California. He replied that certainly they did but added that many of Idaho's losses this season had been to teams who were just as hot from the floor.

"Stanford Coach Howie Dallmar told me after the game that his boys had played their best game of the season against us Friday night," Hodges said. "Our squad certainly deserved the win over Cal after that tremendous shooting performance."

Hodges praised the entire team for the Saturday night showing and singled out big Jim Branom for special praise.

"Branom undoubtedly played his finest game for us against the Bears. He did everything you could expect of a big man," Hodges said.

Gets Most Criticism

Probably no other player on the Vandal squad this season has received as much adverse criticism as Branom. Much of this has been undeserved.

Any player who stands 6-7 is certain to become an object for the fan's eye and as such when something goes wrong on the court Branom is the first to receive the blasts from those same fans.

Anyone who has watched Bran-

om in his college career or even in high school realizes the improvement he has made, especially this year.

A firm believer in giving credit where it is due, we salute Branom, who has made good this year with almost no one on his bandwagon.

Tennis Courts To Be Opened For Free Play

University tennis courts will be open to free play for the rest of the 1958 school year, the Idaho physical education department announced yesterday.

The main court, back of Memorial Gymnasium, can be used for free play anytime when not in use by University PE classes or the Vandal varsity tennis team, a department spokesman said yesterday. The varsity netmen practice from 3 to 6 p.m. during the week.

Lights have been installed over the court back of Memorial Gymnasium and may be turned on by persons who wish to play at night.

Tennis courts back of French House also have been opened and are available for student use.

The University Recreation committee has recommended that the courts back of Ridenbaugh Hall be re-surfaced and re-activated for play.

The Committee is making a survey among students and coaches to determine how much Idaho tennis courts are used by University students and faculty.
