Three main speakers will present addresses on different aspects of the over-all theme, "Society, Science, Security," in the Memorial Gym Wednesday and Thursday.

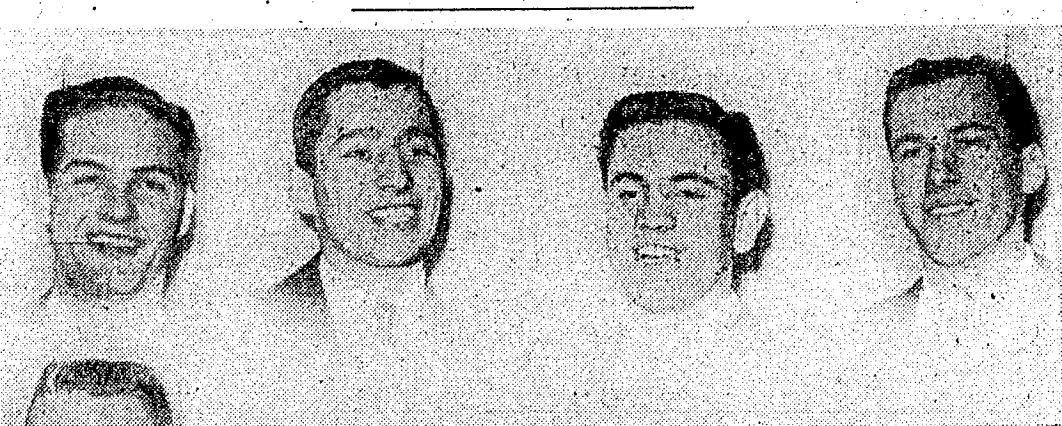

Dance, Beard Contest End Week Frosh Pull Sophs, Car Into Creek



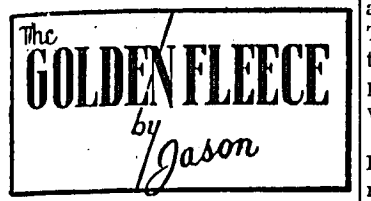
Candidates for Frosh Royalty

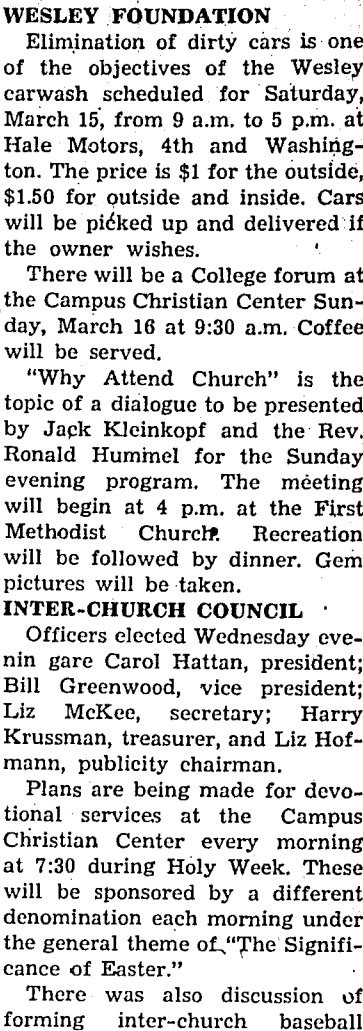

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Martin Faces Parking, Social Rule Coding Problems Early In Term

It took Lowell Martin, Willis Sweet, exactly five minutes last October to find out that the glory of being elected to a student body office requires a lot of time and work.

The defeated Independent candidate for ASUI President last spring entered in the middle of a meeting of the ASUI Exec Board after he had been elected to fill a vacancy in the Board's membership. He was immediately appointed to two important policy-forming committees.

Martin, a senior economics major, was appointed chairman of a four-member student traffic-parking committee to investigate and study the school's parking problem and to submit a report to the University President recommending a solution.

To pile on more work, he was appointed as one of the ASUI representatives to the Student-Faculty committee, which is considered the leading University committee controlling campus social activities.

Report Tuesday
Next Tuesday night the final parking committee report recommending a parking fee for both students and faculty car owners will be submitted to the Exec Board for approval before it goes to the University Administration.

A parking fee, used by many colleges in the U.S. which allows parking cars on campus, is being recommended out of what the committee considers a necessity for an adequate solution at Idaho.

"We were opposed to our alternative solution eliminating cars on campus," Martin said. "Poor transportation services to Moscow, the difficulty in enforcement and the idea of discriminating against students and faculty members lead to this decision."

Fund Sources
The money raised from the parking fee plus funds from other suggested sources as parking fines, a fund collected each semester for building a field house and student facilities fees could be used to construct more parking lots in congested parking areas on campus.

"Development of a lot behind the SAE house and on the Idaho Club property, are projects we will recommend that are being considered soon," he commented.

"These lots are on opposite sides of the campus and take care of the problem on the whole campus for the present anticipated increase in car numbers on campus. Also these lots would furnish parking for between-class parking which should be located within a five-minute walk to the class room."

Temporary-Permanent
Martin said the Idaho club area would be available for a period of six years after next fall. In six years the University may have other plans for this area and by that time may have purchased a lot adjacent to the heating plant to enlarge the present lot there.

The committee during the past six months has talked to city officials, faculty members, other university committees concerned with parking, administration and students to find information for the recommendations.

"We have made only suggestions for policies in our report and not the real details for setting up the parking areas," Martin said.
"We have not recommended the much-talked about Dead-storage parking areas because we feel that they will not do as much good as spot parking and that money can be best spent for every day parking use.
As a member of the Student-

Faculty committee Martin has been working with a codification and clarification of all Administration social regulations concerning the students.
"The results of the committee

will be published to tell each student what to do in exercising their freedom in carrying on campus social functions."

While working on this committee Martin has realized the importance of what he calls, "playing ball" with the faculty and administration to get things done.

"I feel students are going to have to recognize the apparent paradox that we have in student government," he said. It amounts to working with the Administration so the student body will receive greater independence."

Favors Retreat
The ASUI Exec Board recently began working on plans for a student faculty retreat for next fall.
"I think this idea is very good and will do a great deal to establish an atmosphere for working together to solve common problems," he said.
"When separate groups get together to get to know each other

learn how they think, and find out where the group is going, there is a lot of harmony and continuity of program that can be achieved."

Take Responsibility
Martin's main comment from experience in running for student body and class officers (he was Sophomore vice-president and Junior class president), is that students should recognize their responsibility of preparing themselves for the office before the election.
"If students would devote more time preparing themselves for office," he said, "student government would not be plagued with so much inexperience and lack of knowledge after each election."

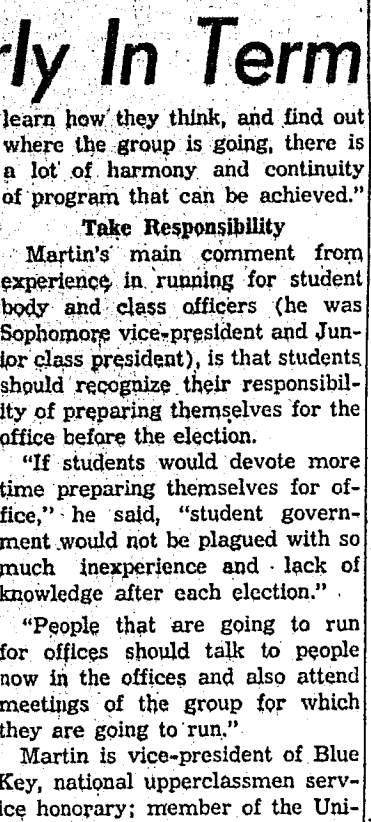
"People that are going to run for offices should talk to people now in the offices and also attend meetings of the group for which they are going to run."

Martin is vice-president of Blue Key, national upperclassmen service honorary; member of the University debate team; Silver Lance, Idaho service honorary; and last year's president of Wesley Foundation. Last summer he took part in a Labor-Management relations seminar in Detroit, Mich., where he worked in an industrial plant during the day and took part in relations discussions in the evenings.

Dick Day, off campus, and John Bradbury, Fiji, took the affirmative for the Democrats. John West and Don Modie, Betas, took the negative for the GOP with Gordon Chesler, Phi Delta, as an alternate. Mrs. Nancy Mendoza acted as moderator.
Bradbury said the GOP "inherited an expanding economy," but their "let drift" policy had not succeeded.
Modie said, "We shall ignore failures of the Democrats" during New Deal and Fair Deal eras.
