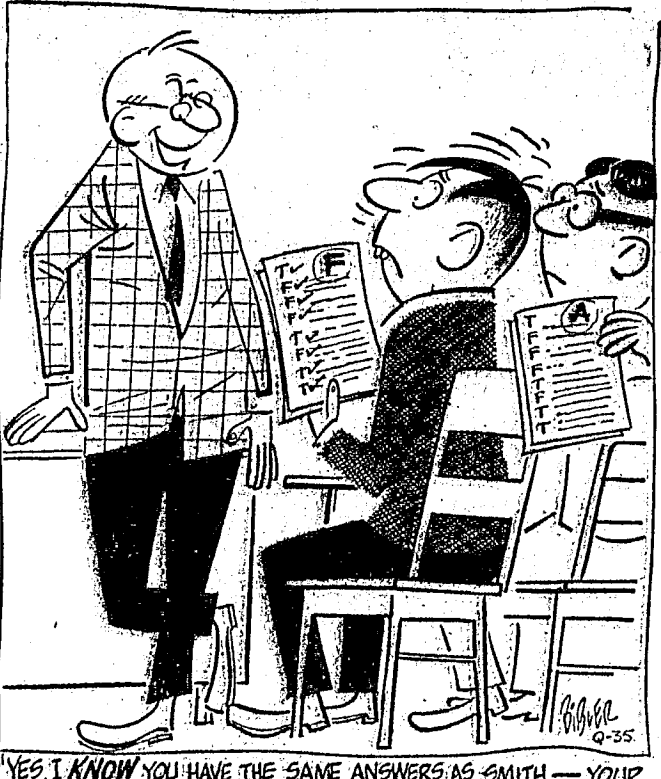

## Student Leaders Consider Recent Meeting Beneficial

Two Idaho student leaders returned from an annual Pacific Students Association meeting in Eugene, Ore., last week with the recommendation that the ASUI send representatives in the future.

ASUI President Dick Kerbs, and retiring president Dave Maxey both said the meeting offered many good ideas and was an excellent training session for student body officers.

The conference for newly elected student body presidents and vice presidents was attended by 140 delegates from 70 schools in the seven western states.

**Idaho Compares**  
Kerbs said he was most impressed with the amount of student interest, voting participation and workability of Idaho's student government setup when comparing it to other schools of similar size and status.

Discussion groups and speaker meetings were held on many aspects of student government, students' role in a university, and leadership responsibility.

Kerbs said the discussion and exchange of ideas in the public relations area was probably most beneficial to him.

"There are many things we could do at Idaho," he said, "to improve our relations with the faculty, community, high schools and other colleges."

**Academics High**  
Maxey said one of the most refreshing things to him at the meetings was the indication that schools were attempting to return to the "academic" emphasis of college and that the students were playing an outstanding role in this change.

"Many schools had students helping arrange university curriculums and have constructive instructor evaluations," Maxey said. "I think Idaho students could do our faculty a great service by conducting a constructive evaluation."

Both delegates said they were able to contribute information to many of the smaller colleges who are having problems which faced Idaho five years ago. Also large school problems were discussed that could probably face Idaho in the near future.

## 'Inside Russia' Talk Set For Matrix Table

A woman newspaper reporter will relate her travel experiences behind the Iron Curtain at the annual Matrix Table banquet here at 6:30 p.m. Friday.

Mrs. Clifford Jackson, Boise, a former newspaper reporter and free-lance writer, will come here under the sponsorship of Theta Sigma Phi, women's journalism honorary. The speech and dinner will be at the New Idaho Hotel.

The Idahoan toured Russia and Poland last summer under a study abroad program sponsored by the national women's journalism organization. While there she was a correspondent for the Dallas (Tex.) Morning News.

The tour was carefully mapped out by the Communist government, but the speaker reports, she had opportunity to deviate from the itinerary. She attributed the ease of travel behind the Iron Curtain to the fact that the Youth Festival was being held at the same time she was there.

# VANDALS SURPRISE BEAVERS, SPLIT PAIR

## Johnson Stifles OSC On Six Hits; Wins Friday Opener, But Leaders Come Back

Idaho's hot and cold Vandals surprised league-leading Oregon State with a 4-2 victory Friday, then went down before the two-hit pitching of Beaver Gary Moore, 13-1, in the second game of their two game series Saturday.  
The split left Idaho with a 3-9 conference record with four games left to play.  
The Vandals will face Oregon in games tomorrow and Thursday when they host the visiting University of Oregon Ducks on MacLean field.  
In a doubleheader at Eugene, April 25 and 26, the Ducks swept both games, winning the first in a 15-4 rout, and overwhelming the

visiting Vandals 8-2 in the second game.  
Bases empty home runs by Knute Westergren in the second inning and Wayne Rigg in the eighth, coupled with 6-hit pitching by hurler Val Johnson paced the Vandals to their Friday win over the Beavers.  
Westergren was the big gun for Idaho in the victory, collecting two runs on three hits in four times at bat. Oregon State pitcher Ray Lunde walked Westergren in his other appearance at the plate.  
Wayne Rigg's 340-foot homerun ball put the game on ice for the Vandals, after a 2-2 tie at the bottom of the eighth.  
Rigg's blast cleared the fence approximately 20 feet to the left of Westergren's long hit to left field.

## Pirates Tromp Vandals, 86-45

Whitworth completely overpowered the visiting University of Idaho track team Saturday, taking a 86-45 win at Whitworth Stadium near Spokane.  
The Whitworth weight men provided the spark, sweeping the discus, shot put, and javelin events for a total of 27 points. Another sweep in the low hurdles added an additional nine points, and left the host Whitworth team completely out of range of the Idaho thin-clads.  
Idaho did come up with a sweep in the two-mile run where distance ace Pete Reed led teammates Frank Wyatt and Ron Adams to a 10:24 seconds mark. The closest Whitworth runner was a full 300 yards behind Adams.  
Adams-Wyatt Win  
Adams and Wyatt went one-two in the mile run to complete their scoring spree for the day. Adams reached the finish first with a solid 4:26.5 time.  
Dave Durham notched his best quarter mile time of his career, flying around the track in a blazing 49.8, but was nipped at the tape by Whitworth's Darrell Russell, with a 49.7 time.  
Durham came back to grab top honors in the 220, however, racing to a 22.4 victory in his first 220 win of the season.  
Dick Boyce and Mill Riggers showed their heels to the Whitworth half-mile competition, with Boyce leading Riggers home in a fast 1:58.5 time.  
Charlie Kahl of Idaho and Dick Moultrie of Whitworth shared the top spot in the pole vault, each clearing 13 feet, and each missing the next height in their next three tries.  
Kahl later easily cleared 13'6" in an after-meet practice vault, according to track coach Joe Glander. "He just barely knocked off the bar at 14 feet. He should be able to clear that height yet this season."

## Neutral Corner Failure To Win More Baseball Games Is Linked To Aid System

"Why doesn't Idaho win more baseball games?" this corner was asked after the Vandals had just been defeated by Oregon State Saturday.  
It doesn't take much digging to figure out that the reason is the same one that plagues all Idaho athletic teams, lack of manpower, or to be more specific, lack of the "horses."  
That lack stems directly from another "time-honored" fact at the University, Idaho never (at least under the current setup) can hope to compete with larger schools in minor sports. And baseball is considered a minor sport here.  
Spark of Hope  
The progress of the Vandal basketball and football squads has provided a spark of inspiration in recent seasons.  
Much of this has been because of able coaching. More specifically, however, it has been linked to better material provided by scholarships.  
The big reason then, that Idaho baseball teams (and track, tennis, and golf teams) are not consistent winners, is the lack of scholarships available to coaches in those sports.  
Back in the days when the Boston Braves were the class of the National League and were pennant winners, 1948 to be exact, a famous baseball saying came into vogue.  
A rookie shortstop, Alvin Dark, provided most of the hitting and fielding, and the pitching staff, thin at best, was led by Warren Spahn and Johnny Sain.  
The pitching situation got so bad late in the year that Brave's manager Billy Southworth coined the famous phrase.  
It went something like "Spahn, then Sain, then pray for rain."  
Idaho coach Wayne Anderson has much the same problem.  
Done Well  
Righthander Val Johnson has performed nobly for the Vandals, but past him the pitching, except
