Ag Consulting Council Plans 1958 Meeting

Status of the College of Agriculture in its three-fold program of teaching, research and extension service is the main topic to be discussed Friday and Saturday at the annual meeting of the Agricultural Consulting Council.

The council of 13 representatives of organizations throughout the state will meet with College of Agriculture heads in the Agricultural Science Building.

President D. R. Theophilus will open the meeting with a report on the status of the University and budget material.

To be discussed are student enrollment, curricula, scholarships, the Agricultural Experiment Station, research projects and present programs and future planning of the extension service.

Principal objective of the consulting council is to help establish a closer working relationship between the agricultural industries of Idaho and the staff and programs of the College of Agriculture.

Other purposes of the council are to advise and counsel concerning major agricultural problems of the state, recommend possible research projects, develop more effective teaching and extension programs, evaluate the needs for expanding facilities and personnel and to implement the services of the College of Agriculture.

Tickets will be on sale at the CUB Information desk.

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

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

Turkey Indebted To US Aid

There are no two opposing ideas about US friendship toward Turkish people; commented a visiting Fulbright professor of history recently.

"Turkey was alone and under Russian pressure after World War II when the US extended her a helping hand," Dr. Ahmet Esmer noted. "Material aid was substantial under the Truman Doctrine but meaning behind the aid was more important because it expressed interest in the destiny of Turkey, and our people haven't forgotten this."

He pointed out friendship and collaboration with the US is the main foundation of Turkish foreign policy and all Turkish political parties are united on the opinion. Dr. Esmer, a former member of the Turkish Grand National Assembly from 1938-48 and chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, said his country has refused Russian foreign aid because of the "strings attached". The strings are not apparent but the people know they are there, he said.

Education Difference

Esmer also mentioned differences in Turkish higher education. Each college in the university has separate faculties and each faculty is run by the professors themselves. Finances come from the government budget. The government's money is the people's money, and the professors are free to use it as they wish.

School policy and courses taught are determined free of any higher authority, Esmer explained. The curricula offered are the same as in the US.

Commenting on Turkish Newspapers, he said freedom of the press is guaranteed by the constitution under regulations of the law. The Turkish press is influenced by European papers more than American, he noted.

Since his nation is bordered by the Soviet Union on the north and the Middle East countries on the south, his people are mainly interested in the country's prospects for war. Turkey has been in all wars except World War II.

Was Columnist

Columnist for Ulus—oldest daily paper in Ankara—Esmer said since the adoption of standard letters and printing equipment in 1928, newspaper reading is much easier for the people. Newspapers, small-

than our own—the largest being six pages—are now widely distributed. The popular sensational newspapers have the largest circulations, he explained.

As a college journalist in his undergraduate days, Esmer observed US and Turkish student papers. He says that Turkish college newspapers are freer to print what they wish than are American student publications. The government strives for good relations with the youth and "much fire" comes from the college paper.

Dr. Esmer humorously added he has seen his cartoon many times in the Ankara University paper and that "most of the time, the pictures were very uncomplimentary."

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Idaho Blanks Utah's Redskins

Squad Gets 1st Win Of Year With Strong Defense Show

Led by a powerful and alert defensive line, the University of Idaho Vandals cashed in for their first win of the 1958 season Saturday at the expense of the University of Utah. The Vandals rambled over the Redskins, 20-0.

The second quarter was the big one for the Vandals and Idaho fullback Ken Hall in particular. Hall bulldozed his way into the Utah end zone twice in the second period and both times capped his touchdown jaunts with perfect conversions to give the Vandals a 14-0 halftime lead.

Idaho's big line came into its own in the first half, holding the Redskins to a net yardage gain of 147 yards.

Grosscup matched Espinoza in completions, but threw the ball 23 times and gained only 122 yards.

The other Idaho quarterback, Gary Farnworth, added six more points to the Vandal score in the third quarter. Farnworth sent Idaho backs June Hanford and Theron Nelsen through the weakening Utah defense as far as the Redskins 17 yard line, then swept right end for the final TD on his own.

Hall's conversion attempt failed, but the Vandals had no need for the extra point.

Defense Better
"We played quite a bit better this game," Vandal head coach Skip Stahley remarked after the clash. "Our line looked better defensively in particular."

On offense Stahley was still not satisfied with the Vandals' performance. "We should be better offensively," he noted.

Morale, always important to a football team, is particularly good, according to Stahley. "I'm very pleased with the esprit de corps and the boys' willingness to work," the head men- tor said.

Grosscup Checked
Highly-touted Lee Grosscup, All-American passer for the Redskins, had to take a back seat to Idaho quarterback Joe Espinoza. Espinoza completed 12 of 19 pas-

ses for a net yardage gain of 147 yards.

Stout Idaho Defense Proves Too Tough For Top Passer

For the second year in a row the Idaho Vandals have literally taken Lee Grosscup & Co. to the cleaners. Grosscup's passing prowess seems to disappear when faced by the Idaho defense, much to the despair of the Redskins.

The Vandal quarterback, Joe Espinoza, proved to be the class in the passing department of the game, showing Grosscup up by completing 12 of 19 aerial attempts for 147 yards. Grosscup tried the air route 23 times and succeeded on 12 of his attempts for a gain of 122 yards.

Conclusion? Espinoza, completely un-rated as a passer, may be a better man with the pigskin than Grosscup, an All-American choice last season all other things being equal.

But of course, all other things weren't equal. The Idaho line and pass defense has to be given a great share of the credit in holding Grosscup down.

Rather than make the normal digs directed toward Washington State after Saturday's rout, we'll just say that it seems pretty evident the "Rose tint" prevalent on the Cougar campus just two weeks ago must have faded considerably.

We think it could fade a little more after the Cougars travel to Moscow Saturday.

Oregon's Ducks almost "quacked" the win column against Oklahoma over the weekend. The tilt pretty well proved the Oregon crew to be a tough outfit in any class, and made the Vandals' first game loss to the Ducks look a great deal better.

No one likes to lose, but there is the fact it's nicer to lose to a good team rather than a poor outfit. From this corner the Oregon eleven looks like a really tough squad.

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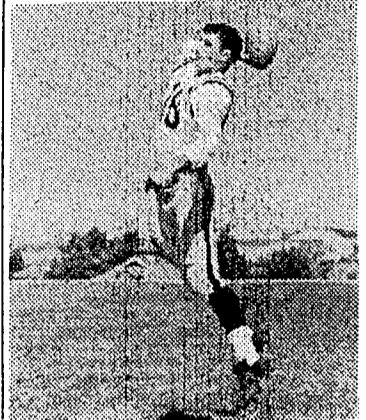

Large Contingent Of Freshman Grid Hopefuls Start Practice

An estimated 63 freshman grid hopefuls were on hand to greet frosh football coach Wayne Anderson yesterday as the junior Vandals opened their practice sessions.

The group, described by Anderson as being "pretty big numerically," included Ron Karlberg, All-American high school pick from Lewiston, as well as a flock of all-state and all-conference gridders. "We should have some big linemen," Anderson stated, "most of the line averages around 200 pounds with a few in the 230-pound class."

In the backfield Anderson hopes to have more speed than last year. The backfield averages close to 175 in poundage with a few 195-pounders in the initial turnout.

Home state prospects showed up in numbers, with an estimated 25 former high school players hailing from within the state.

Two new coaches, Gary Kenworthy and Jerry Smythe will assist Anderson. Kenworthy, who alternated with Howie Willis at the quarterback spot last year, will coach the frosh backfield, and Smythe, one of the top guards on the 1957 Vandal grid machine, will coach the line.

The Vandal Babes' offense will remain basically the same as last year, according to Anderson. The spread T formation employed by the Babes is the same offense the varsity uses.

Harriers Face WSC Cougars On Thursday

Idaho's only defending champion team, the cross-country harriers, open their season Thursday against the WSC cross-country group at 4:30 in Pullman.

The Cougars were the only squad to slip past the Vandals last season, registering a narrow win over Idaho at the Inland Empire meet when Frank Wyatt and Ron Adams were disqualified on a missed turn. Wyatt, Dick Boyce, Wendell Maize and Pete Reed finished far ahead of the pack in the two-mile time trials held Friday to determine the squad for the meet.

Wyatt, Idaho's top miler in track competition last spring, narrowly edged Boyce, ace Vandal half-miler. Wyatt toured the course with a 11 minutes, 17 seconds clocking with Boyce just two seconds behind him in 11:19.
