## Let Them Sleep

Presumably the final words of both campaigning presidential candidate will in effect be: "Vote as you please—but vote." This slogan will echo and re-echo in all

media of communication, and civic-minded groups will have already launched a vast crusade to arouse the non-voter from his political lethargy.

If these energetic persons were not overly concerned with statistics and percentages, they would discern it as selfdefeating and downright discourteous to wake these slumberers and herd them to the polls by social pressure.

Perennial non-voters may be char-acterized in general terms. Investigation has shown them to be generally egocentric, having limited horizons and seldom thinking in universal terms. They think politically when the issue involves THEIR pocketbook, otherwise politics is a matter for the neighbors.

Forty-five per cent of the non-voters queried in one survey replied that indifference had kept them from the polls. Doubtlessly this percentage would be increased if the interviewed had been less willing to offer socially acceptable explainations.

Asked eleven political questions, such as "Who ran for President in 1956," nonvoters scored a deplorable average of three, where as voters of similar education and background answered seven questions correctly.


The usual 60 per cent American turn out for a presidential election is embarrassing. Their lack of insight prohibits them from seeing the would-be-non-voter as a danger to the democratic process rather than a asset on the percentage charts. Casting his sacred ballot in acquiescence to social pressure, the indifferent, uninformed would-be-non-voter makes a dreadful, but seemingly patriotic, gesture, similar to the Russian citizen's symbolic act. But voting in America is not symbolic, but rather a functional act.

The superficial ballot is tallied with those of deep concern. The vote of the diligent citizen is cancelled by the apathetic one. The man who has pondered the issues becomes the equal of the political ignoramus. To insist everyone get out and vote is a disparagement of democracy, is self-defeating. When the time and energy spent blandly

forcing people to vote for a slogan — ALL GOOD CITIZENS VOTE — has been channelled into educating them politically, it will be noted as a strengthening of Am-

erican democracy. Indiscriminately insisting, "V o t e! Vote!", is like shouting early Sunday morning, "Church! Church!", in the silent upstairs of a living group. Be courteous and let them sleep.—D.H.
