# Loyalth Oath To Be Topic Of Open AAUP Meeting

The loyalty oath bill recently signed by Governor Robert Smylie will be the central issue at the American Association of University Professors' meeting Thursday, 8 p.m. in room 6 of the Horne Ec. building.

The meeting will be open to everyone, said Dr. R. A. Postweiler, president of the local AAUP chapter.

A committee will present a resume of the action taken by the AAUP before the bill was passed or signed. They will also answer questions on loyalty oaths.

Committee members are Dean Philip Peterson of the College of Law; Bernard Boring, professor of political science; and William Greever, professor of history.

The loyalty oath bill requires that all state employees sign a loyalty oath by July 1, 1963.

They must sign their support to the state and national constitutions and not belong to any organization trying to overthrow the government.

After the committee makes its presentation there will be an executive session which will be off the record to the press, said Dr. Postweiler.

Attorney General Allan Shepherd recently said that his office will issue a statement this week concerning its attitude toward the loyalty oath bill.

"I am eagerly awaiting what the attorney general has to say," said Dr. Postweiler.

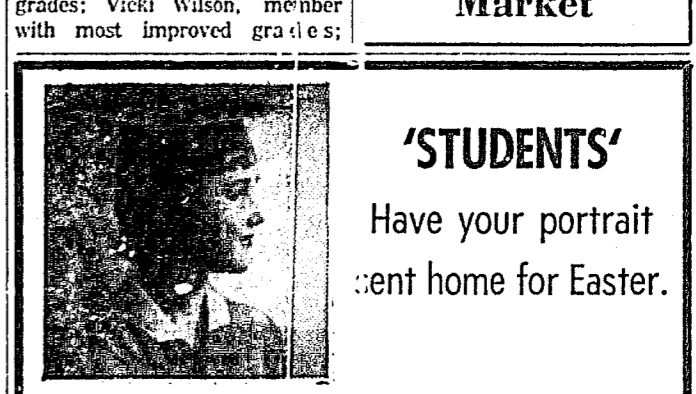

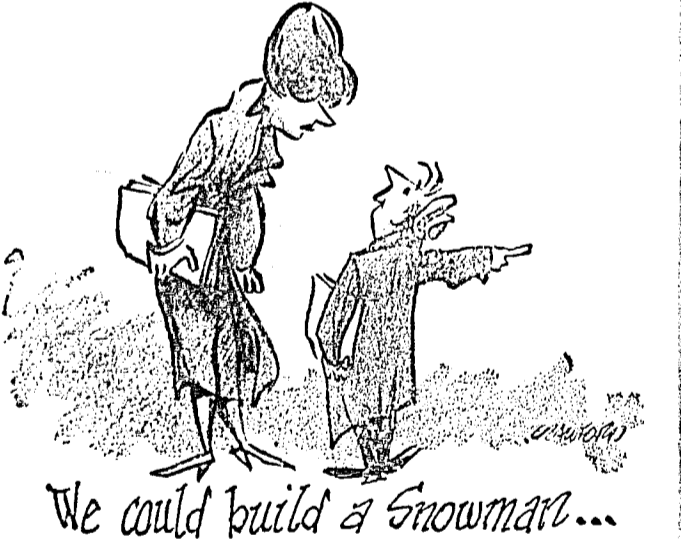
