## Secret Sessions Threatening?

"THEREFORE, be it resolved that Sigma Delta Chi, assembled in national convention at Los Angeles, California, Nov. 13, 1966, does hereby commend and support the efforts of undergraduate Sigma Delta Chi members to establish and maintain open meeting policies on college campuses."

This was the resolution passed at a national meeting attended by three U-I journalists last week. Sigma Delta Chi, national professional journalism society, has long supported efforts to open the doors of information in all levels of American government.

With this resolution it recognized that a similar problem exists on many American campuses. At the U of I most of the student committees and policy making bodies have made information available to the Argonaut at its request and many have invited newspaper reporters to their meetings. The Argonaut editor-in-chief and associate editor are ex-officio members of Executive Board. This tends to discourage

closing meetings to avoid press coverage.

Where there is a breakdown in communication at the U of I is the Board of Regents. Decisions are announced and the results are printed for students to see, but the reasons behind these decisions are usually not produced without some probing or action from E-Board. The action striking down the Off-Campus Housing Board is an example.

It added that a substantial problem exists on some college campuses, to wit, executive sessions by student bodies which deal with student matters.

This is a comment for E-Board and other policy making bodies at the University to consider and to remember. The Argonaut attempts to inform Idaho students and will continue to strive for this goal. E-Board should remember that it is a representative body of the ASUI, not the ASUI itself. Executive sessions may become too tempting some time.

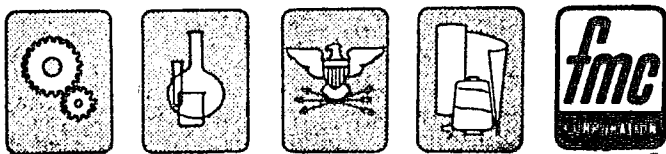

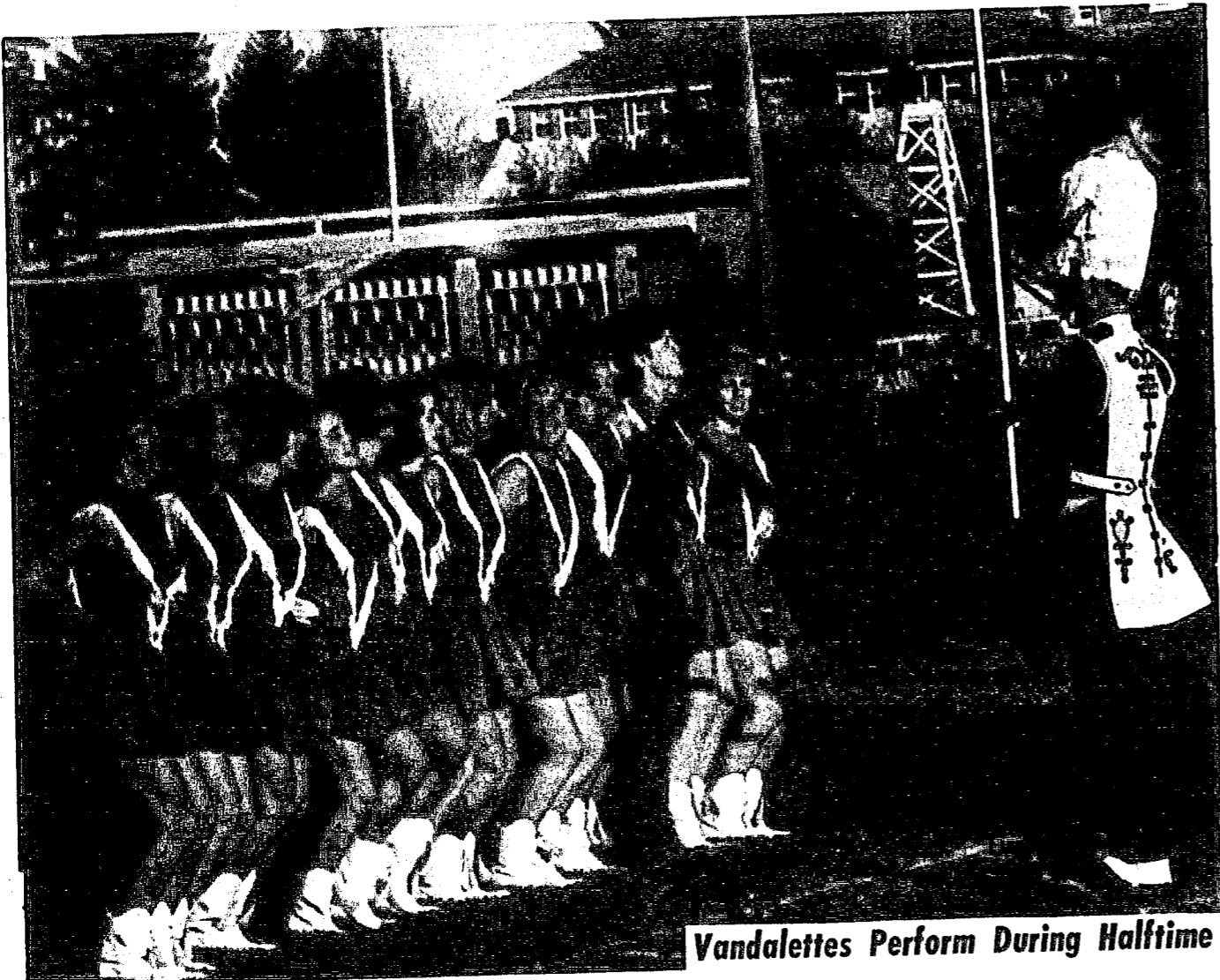

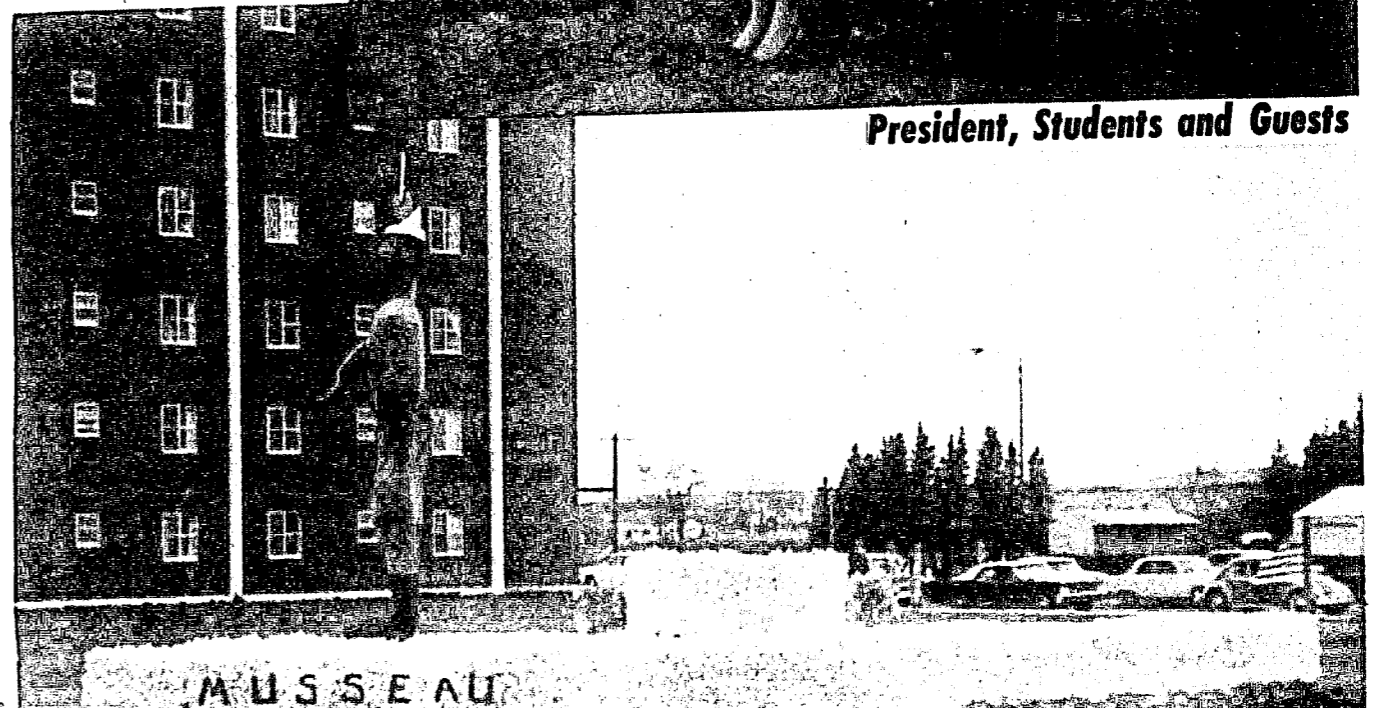

## Columbia Basin Hawks Dump Idaho Yearlings

The Idaho Vandal Babes were overpowered by Columbia Basin Saturday by a score of 34-7. Idaho spotted CBC two touchdowns in the first quarter and were never able to recuperate after that.

Columbia Basin scored first when Idaho's Ken Dotson, punting from his own 10-yard line sliced the ball off the side of his foot and it went out of bounds at the Vandal Babe 19-yard line.

**Brown Scores**  
Columbia Basin's Brown capped the scoring drive on a three yard plunge. Quarterback Ray Brun made the extra point and gave them a quick 7-0 advantage.

Another miscue plagued the Vandal Babes in the first quarter. One of Steve Garmon's passes was intercepted inside his own 20-yard line and was run back inside the 10-yard line.

Columbia Basin drove down near the goal where Brown plunged over again, this time from the one-yard line. Brun again made the extra point.

**Plunge By Garmon**  
The Vandal Babes scored in the third quarter on a one-yard run by Steve Garmon, which was setup by a 45-yard pass play from Garmon to Bob Jones.

The Vandal Babes finished the season with a 2-2 mark which was described by head coach, Al Daniels, "as a mediocre season." The entire squad saw action at one time or another during the season and their should be a substantial amount of varsity prospects for next year.

## Thunder Ray Sets New Grid Marks

The University of Idaho Vandals shoot for a break-even season this Saturday afternoon as they host the Bobcats from Montana State University.

The defending Big Sky champs from Bozeman have found it tough going this year and the outcome of their season has been almost as frustrating for Coach Jim Sweeney as has the '65 campaign been for Idaho's Steve Musseau.

**All Eyes**  
Again this Saturday all eyes will be on the Vandal's Ray McDonald as he continues to make a shambles of the Idaho record book. The only marks that do not belong to the Caldwell junior are the all-time point scoring title, and the one game touchdown and point marks. All other games, season and career records for carrying the football and gaining yards on the ground are in his name.

It is doubtful that McDonald will crack the 1,000 yard rushing mark this season since he needs 162 yards against a team that doesn't give up ground readily.

**Punting Record**  
Joe Rodriguez can capture a new one-season punting mark if he keeps booting the ball at the pace he has going now. He has a 42.9 average which is ahead of Mickey Rice's mark last season. Darrell Danielson has already set a season record for field goals, tied one for a single game and equalled the career mark. He is a sophomore from Centralia, Wash.

It would be all records Saturday, however, as the Vandals try to salvage a share of the Big Sky title and finished with a 5-5 record.

## Vandals Ramble To 15-7 Homecoming Win

Steve Musseau's Vandals, after being bogged down offensively for three quarters, exploded for two touchdowns in a come-from-behind victory over a determined Idaho State squad.

Idaho State made their first and only score of the day in the second quarter when ISU's John McCarthy intercepted a Vandal aerial at the Idaho 21-yard line.

**3-Yard Pass**  
The final three-yards of the Bengal scoring drive was covered on a three-yard-pass from quarterback Don Neves to half-back Bud Hare. Neves booted the extra point and Idaho State had a 7-0 lead over the seemingly doomed Vandals at halftime.

Idaho looked impressive statistically-wise the first half, but the scoreboard showed a different story. The Vandals moved the ball real well but were not able to push the ball across the goal-line.

In the third quarter it was pretty much of a seesaw battle with neither team being able to capitalize on each other's mistakes, but the fourth quarter proved to be the decisive factor.

**Idaho Finally Scores**  
Late in the fourth quarter Idaho started a drive from their own 48-yard line which eventually developed into a Vandal touchdown. They drove down to the ISU three-yard line where two plays later, big Ray McDonald using brute strength crashed over for the score from the two-yard line.

Rodriguez theorizing that this might be the only Idaho score for the day decided to go for two points in the point-after-attempt. He calmly rolled out to his right and ran the ball over which gave the Vandals the lead, 8-7.

**Quick Score**  
Just before the game came to an end, Rodriguez on a roll-out to his left ran the quarterback keeper and pitched to McDonald after seemingly being tackled. McDonald raced in the end zone in a play that covered 66 yards and wrapped up a victory for the Vandals.

This touchdown gave McDonald two additional records; most touchdowns scored in a single season by a Vandal-11 and most touchdowns in a career — 16.

This week Idaho takes on Montana State from Bozeman. The Vandals will have to win this one if they are to be assured a share of the Big Sky Conference football crown.

## Bobcats Next On Idaho Grid Slate

Idaho football coach Steve Musseau and his charges began setting the stage for the grand finale of their 1965 grid season today.

All eyes turned toward the possibility of an "even-Steven" season. The Vandal clash with the Montana State University Bobcats, Saturday in Neale Stadium.

Today Musseau and his squad looked at films of the MSU-Fresno State game.

The Idaho mentor describes the Bobcat squad as, "a losing but good team." He explained that they, too, had been plagued by injuries at key positions.

"The Bobcats' strategy is basically aerial," Musseau noted. "They passed 43 times against South Dakota with pretty fair results. This indicates that they have a good offense. However, their defense isn't nearly as good."

The Vandal boss said that his squad would have to move the ball well on the ground if they expected to win.

"It's pretty evident that we have problems when we go to the air," he noted. "And since they have only a mediocre defense, this is probably the best plan."

In team scoring, Idaho was first with 50, followed by ISU-56, Montana-63, Weber State-74, Montana State-84 and Gonzaga with 110.
