





Government evidence lawyer's dream, Weaver's lawyer said

A defense lawyer in the Randy Weaver trial spoke about the trial Thursday in the University of Idaho Law School

Weaver's story began last summer when what was called "a surveillance mission" turned into an 11-day siege in Naples. ending in the deaths of three people and one dog. The deaths resulted from a gunfight between Weaver, who was charged with making and selling illegal weapons, and U.S. federal agents who were watching his cabin.

Questions arose as to which side started the shooting, and it was discovered one of the officers fired the first shot which killed Weaver's dog.

David Nevin, Kevin Harris's defense attorney, discussed his reasons for taking the case. Harris, a friend of the Weaver family, was charged with the shooting death of William F. Degan, a federal agent.

Nevin spoke of his doubts about handling the case. Nevin said Weaver is a "jerk," a "racist" and a "separatist." He has "repugnant beliefs and wants to tell you these beliefs." Yet when Nevin first visited Weaver's North Idaho "shack," he "just had a feeling about it." The deeper he dug into the case, through about 15,000 pages of information, the more his feeling grew. Nevin

"You have a understanding and a feeling about something, then have the courage to act on it." Nevin said.

Nevin learned the "surveillance mission" was known to federal marshals as "Operation Northern Exposure." The operation lasted over 18 months and cost millions of dollars. Two \$130,000 cameras were installed, for example to watch the family. The government had bought the lot next to the Weavers' and was planning on placing a man there, along with five two-men teams hidden in the woods, to befriend and later arrest Weaver.

Beitelspacher defends program cuts

Gubernatorial candidate Ron Beitelspacher was not afraid to say what he thought Thursday night in the monthly membership meeting sponsored by the Paradise Valley Chapter of the Idaho Public Employees Association.

The IPEA, an organization of stateemployed people, is not endorsing his campaign but hopes to bring more candidates to campus before the campaign is over.

According to Harvey Hewitt of Grangeville, Beitelspacher cut off the funding to the outdoor program in 1988. Beitelspacher explained the Outdoor Program equipment was being used for inventory in an Outfitting venture, in other outfitting businesses in Idaho.

In response to Hewitt's accusation, Beitelspacher said Hewitt's comments were 'so much bull—." Beitelspacher explained in small towns like Riggins, people had made the transition from logging to the tourist industry, and those small business owners could not compete with the University of Idaho. "(Student) Fees are used to provide things for students, not to start a business," Beitelspacher said.

Hewitt asked why Beitelspacher had not offset the loss of the outfitter's program with student internships.

Beitelspacher said he had never promised more money to the outdoor program and had told the Outfitters Board they needed to cut back on their funding. "Outfitters have a large overhead, and it isn't fair to use taxpayer's money to start up your own outfitting program," Beitelspacher said.

Beitelspacher also answered a question concerning the amount of money to be spent on prisons, saying the taxpayers should not have to buy "hotel rooms for prisoners." Beitelspacher recommended more highway work crews, with electronic shock collars, but he also expressed concern with people being imprisoned for bouncing checks. "We should find ways to help people in trouble. but once they break the rules, we shouldn't waste our time and resources making their stay in prison comfortable." Beitelspacher said.

Beitelspacher works as a lineman for the power company, and is originally from Grangeville. He was elected to the Idaho State Senate in 1980, and was on several

Residency rules remain same

After the Idah - Attorney General's office sent it back. without inspection because a state officer was not involved, it was resubmitted by Idaho State Senator. Gury Schroeder

In a letter to Schroeder dated Aug. 19. Deputy Attorney General Bradley Hall said the statute as it was amended does not create any irrebuttable presumption (a kind of legal Catch-22). The letter was not ttered as an official opinion, but as guidance.

The new requirements say residency will be recogrized for those people living in Idaho 12 months or nger, it they came for other than the purpose of going t school

Rock and Twiggs drafted the letter because they believed the wording of the statute was unclear, and an irrebuttable presumption did exist.

"How do you prove what your intent was?" said Twigs "We are arguing that the language makes it anconstitutionally hard to get residency.

Twiggs said the language makes it possible for indiaduals in similar circumstances to receive different

Hall, who is also Idaho Board of Education Chief Legal Officer, said tests for residency include submitting proof of tax and registration payments on vehicles. trailers and property, filing of state income taxes, holding a full time job or equivalent, registering to vote and purchasing property

None of the tests are affected by the language of the amendment

"The other tests are still O.K." said Twiggs. He said his intent was to get rid of the language stating, " ...for purposes other than education."

Though the alleged unconstitutionality of the law was not upheld. Rock said at least the Attorney General's office did uphold the right of the student to provide evidence proving residency

The statute was initially considered as far back as 1970, said Hall. Discussion concerning the amendment to the established statute started around 1991 in response to the much stricter regulations concerning residency in surrounding states.

Hall said as the Idaho amendment went through, he thought the state of Oregon was enacting an even stricter law regarding residency

He said normally, legislation passed becomes effective in July. In this case legislators wanted to ensure the people in the process of meeting residency under the old requirements received fair treatment, so they pushed the effective date back to Jan. 15, 1993

Assistant store manager Roger Berardacci said the warehouse was planning a door-to-door walk announcing the opening of the new store closer to its opening.


The Moscow Tidyman's was opened in 1970. The chain runs through Idaho, Washington and Montana.

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
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Demonstration at WSU aims to free Rik Scarce

committees, but he said he did the most good on the appropriations committee.

There, Beitelspacher said he influenced the amount of money that flowed through programs, and created some good programs.

Beitelspacher said he was running to "make a difference," and he saw other legislators and senators who were there to get reelected. "They aren't there to take care of the people that count," Beitelspacher said.

Beitelspacher said he could "take the heat" on controversial issues.

"I stood up to people like Andrus and Echohawk, and I've attended hearings on abortion. I believe in telling it like it is," Beitelspacher said.

The controversial issues in Idaho have been recent fights between environmentalists and loggers.

Beitelspacher said this is mostly due to changes sweeping through Idaho.

"Everywhere it is changing, and people are concerned about the future," Beitelspacher said.

"Why didn't they just ask him to come down?"

Nevin's trial theme is a quote by George Washington, "Government is not reason; it is force. Like fire it is a dangerous servant and a fearful master."

Nevin said Americans give "too much power to the police. We as a society view police in a different way." Nevin contends the government was wrong to begin the shooting and was doing everything in its power to cover its tracks.

"Government is not reason, it's force... when the chips are down and they have the power to use it they will," Nevin said.

In the end, the prosecution played right into the defense's hands, Nevin said.

"The government's evidence came in so good for us, it was a defense lawyer's dream. We couldn't have made things any better."

Nevin said he never felt better than when he walked down those steps knowing that he had helped free a man who was not actually guilty.

"Most of the time it is logical for your client to be guilty because he is guilty." Nevin said.

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Tougher decisions for Zinser still to come

University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser has named three administrative positions destined for the cost-cutting guillotine and deserves applause for not sending employees into the job-hunting jun-

The Idaho Board of Education ordered the four state-funded institutions to relocate money from administrative areas and into teaching. UI plans to transfer \$2 million over five years, with 80 percent coming from central administration. Zinser responded to an impatient and nearly irate board finance committee by naming the three posi-

tions which totaled \$186,477.

Vice President for University
Relations and Development, currently held by Harry Peterson, will
cut \$107,709 in the trimming effort.
Peterson had already intended to
resign his position in June 1994.

The two other positions named

are for a facilities management administrative secretary and a payroll officer, totaling an additional \$78.768. The payroll officer position is also currently vacant.

There are two ways to look at Zinser's cost-cutting effort. In one view, Zinser did the right thing by saving as many jobs as she could before she will be forced to cut not simply *positions*, but the *people* who do the jobs. And that makes for some extremely difficult decisions.

On the other hand, Zinser may have acted too quickly in her decision making process and may pick up more duties than she can effectively handle when she adds Peterson's workload to her own.

She may have taken the easier road under the board's pressure and may find the remainder of the dis-

tance to \$2 million a steep and rutted path.

Zinser plans to name at least three other positions Thursday and Friday at the board meeting in Boise.

Among those may be the position of UI communications director Terry Maurer, who announced his resignation last week, and the cutting of the vacant position would help keep other jobs intact.

This shift in emphasis to teaching—both by the administrative

cuts and the UI Faculty Council which is currently trying to shift unfair emphasis toward research-geared faculty to faculty who focus on students and teaching—is a strong step toward the true goal of higher education and any attempt to achieve it should be supported, despite the difficulty of the path.


Keep in mind a survey conducted in 1990 by the Centers for Disease Control states nearly three-fourths of all high school students say they have had sex before graduation.

Accord promises first peace in 500 years

alestinian Liberation
Organization leaderYasser Arafat has been
making enemies in the Middle
East for some 30-odd years now,
but it comes as some surprise that
more and more they are
Palestinian and less and less
Israeli.

Surprise, surprise.

The peoples of these two tribes have been killing one another long before the time of the New Testament, which is either a rather long time if you are Christian, or about sometime in the middle of last week if you are an anthropologist.

So it comes with much astonishment on Sunday Shimon Peres, the Israeli foreign minister, and Arafat, leader of the much maligned PLO, came to informal agreements for Palestinian selfrule in Israel.

Ever since Europeans decided

to carve a chunk of prime beach front property smack out of the middle of the Arab world, the people of Palestine have been without a country.

This act, (which made about as much sense as New Zealand telling the United States to convert Rhode Island into a Ugandan homeland, and then having us agree) rested largely on Europe's intention to secure an ally in a normally hostile region.

Of course it had nothing to do with oil, or airstrips where friendly jets could peacefully rest and offer shade to American servicemen who really were there as horticultural specialists.

But anyway, Peres and Arafat agreed in principle to allow Palestinian sovereignty in the city of Jericho and the Gaza Strip Province. Right-wing factions of both Israel and the PLO immediately began lining up in protest.

Then again, what did you expect..

The conversion to independence will be an easy one for Palestine for several reasons. First of all, they already have a flag - a beautiful appendage with cobalt blue highlights. Secondly, they have lots of military experience, which will come in handy in their chosen venue.

This summer, while I was in attendance at an International Friendship Association banquet, a man stood up to give a presentation on his country.

People from India and China and Costa Rica and all over the world sat and listened to this man wax eloquent about a land he felt more attachment to than wood or stone. It was a feeling greater than the enjoyment we shared over baklava and tempera vegetables, which were excellent, by the way. This man stood as no man I had ever seen and said, "I am from Palestine."

The irony seemed to be lost in the cracks of our many languages, but I have never forgotten what he said. I still see him around campus, and although I never shared my feelings with him, his bravado inspired me.

If he reads this, I would like to extend my heartfelt congratulation to him and his compatriots. The process of the current negotiations will indeed be a long one and in no way is an end to the fighting, but it is a step towards humanity.

But do not believe for a minute that if these agreements fail, Palestine will cease to be a nation in the hearts and souls of the people of a tribe with more history than the dirt you and I trample every day.

Because without borders and constitutions, without a seat in the United Nations, or without a McDonalds or a Walmart, one man in Idaho speaks for all his people when he says, "I am from Palestine." That, my folks, means forever.

This attitude is also very present right here at UI. Students usually place cops just above shower scum on the totem pole of life forms. 
Cops are restrained by the Constituion. Police must follow stringent restaints when arresting the bad guys. Too stringent if you ask me, but that's another column.


far I have seen only one person try it on the Clearwater.

While I can't vouch for the drift fly's fall effectiveness (yet), I fished the South Fork of the Clearwater the last weekend of the spring season and hooked two dark steelhead on flies. We were fishing flys on 6 inch droppers above eggs. The fish hit the fly over the corky set up both times.

If you try this set-up, don't tip the fly with bait until Oct. 15. The water above Memorial Bridge is closed to bait fishing until that time. Until then, consider fishing below Memorial Bridge at the Snake/Clearwater confluence or Mill hole. Fishermen backtrolling lighted plugs at night have been catching chrome bright A runs.

Since dove hunting has been lousy, the elk aren't bugling yet, and grouse hunting is still in question, it looks like I'll see you on the lower Clearwater.

Vandal Volleyball kicks season off at the Cougar Challenge

The University of Idaho Volleyball team got mixed reviews over the Labor Day weekend in their season opening at the Washington State University Cougar Challenge volleyball tournament.

The Vandals lost a 5 game heartbreaker in their tournament opener Friday afternoon to the Western Athletic Conference member Wyoming Cowgirls 16-14, 5-15, 16-14, 12-15, and 15-8.

Friday night featured the border battle between PAC-10 foe Washington State and Idaho, which saw the Cougars drop the Vandals 16-14, 15-12, and 15-11.

Saturday The Vandals found their winning form and ripped the Iowa State Cyclones of the Big-8 7-15, 15-5, 15-4, and 15-3.

The Wyoming match was like a roller coaster as both clubs traded momentum throughout the match. After losing game one the Vandals stormed back to drill the Cowgirls 15-5 in the second clash. Idaho looked to be taking control of the match leading 14-8 in the third game, but the Cowgirls tossed a shutout the rest of the way en-route to 16-14 win.

The Vandals did not fold fighting back to tie the match at 2 games apiece with a 15-12 triumph in game four, before falling in the

Idaho hit just .061 and .091 in the crucial third and fifth games. Wyoming held a .244 to .207 hitting edge overall and pounded down 16 blocks to Idaho's 7.

Nancy Wicks led the Vandals with 15 kills in 25 attempts for a .480 hitting clip. Jessica Puckett also added 15 kills for the Vandals.

Against Washington State the Vandals jumped out to 14-10 advantage in game one, but again the well went dry for Idaho as the Cougs reeled off the game's final six points and claimed the victory.

The Cougars fell behind in games two and three as well, but their combination of 5-foot 11-inch middle blocker Carrie Gilley, who

hammered out 18 kills and a .519 hitting percentage in the match, and 6-5 outside hitter Becky Howlett, who hammered 16 kills, was too much for the Vandals.

Mindy Rice was the star for Idaho Friday night with 17 kills.

Any logical human being would refuse the opportunity to run five kilometers, hop on a bicycle and trek 30 kilometers, then run another five.

Nevertheless, insane individuals like Jean Grammar, or perhaps remarkably gifted ones, enjoy and excel at this grueling competition called a duathlon.

Who, in their right or even wrong minds would attempt such an event?

Grammar justifies. "It's something you do for yourself."

Many would consider the event a two sport event. Consequently, the name biathalon comes to mind. But, the biathalon is an olympic event that involves cross country skiing and rifle marksmanship.

Grammar, 41. has claimed the Hammer and Cycle Duathalon victory during the previous two schedulings of the event. The Hammer and Cycle was not run in 1992. The third annual race is scheduled in Moscow on September 19.

Additionally, Grammar has also taken first at the annual duathalon in Post Falls. These tournaments attract some of the best multi-sport talent of the northwest.
