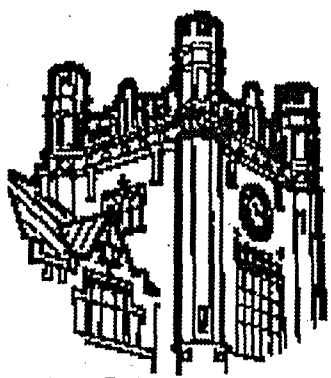

ASUI welcomes new senators, appointees

Last Wednesday the ASUI Senate confirmed all appointees including the three new senators. Senator Brian Kane also discussed the possibility of personalized UI license plates.

Theodore Paradise, John Hoyne, and Annie Averitt all have joined the senate, effective immediately. While they have not yet received their living group assignments all are eager to represent the students.

"I'm excited about it. It's going to be a new perspective on things. I hope to get the living groups repre-

sented and get involved in foreign issues and some work issues around campus," said Senator Theodore Paradise.

Senator John Hoyne, past Activities Board chair said, "I'm happy to be here and ready to do some good things. There is a lot of real positive thinkers here and I'm

ready to roll."

Senator Annie Averitt, the youngest of the three appointees said, "I think it's wonderful, I'm excited to have this opportunity and I'm looking forward to it. I hope to represent everybody fairly."

Veteran senators are happy to again have a full senate.

Assignments of new living groups to freshman senators will take place at next week's senate meeting.

Senator John Tesnohlidek said, "I think Government Operations went through a speedy process and we have gotten very quality people

Summer session important to students

Students who want changes in summer school should contact their department chair immediately.

Washington State University's Social and Economic Research Center surveyed 678 UI students enrolled in the 1995 summer session.

The results indicate summer students want a better selection of courses, a reduction of scheduling conflicts, more upper division courses, and some evening courses for working students.

Over 80 percent of students surveyed wanted courses that fulfill major and minor requirements; 63 percent wanted more core classes offered.

"Students are saying there are some courses they want, and need, but are just not being offered" said Dr. Sidney Eder, director of Summer Programs and Extended Learning at UI. "One hundred fifty-seven students said they couldn't take all the classes they really wanted to take."

Of the 678 surveyed, 155 could not register for needed courses because they were not offered, or their class schedules conflicted with other course times.

Eder said the first thing his staff can do is develop a scheduling format to minimize the overlaps. "The second thing we can do is insist faculty and departments schedule within that framework," he said.

Juniors and seniors comprised 65 percent of the students surveyed.

Only 18 percent were freshmen and sophomores.

"As they are getting closer to the finish line, they are asking themselves 'how do I keep up, catch up, or accelerate?'" Eder said.

Many students work during the summer, and would like to attend school as well. "Working students are saying 'why don't you at least schedule some things in the evening, so we can work and go to school,'" he said.

Over 72 percent of the students surveyed listed "completing school faster" as their primary reason for attending summer school. Enrollment in the UI 1995 summer session increased 24 percent statewide over 1994.

On rare occasion, summer students have experienced the bumpy before the horse: some prerequisite classes have been scheduled after requisite classes.

Eder said while summer sessions can be improved, students gave UI high marks for a good selection of core courses and a flexible summer calendar. Students felt UI offered summer courses which met their needs, and they enjoy the smaller class sizes, he said.

He explained students have more power than they know. "If students want certain classes to be offered in the summer, now is the time to go to their department chair and make their wishes known," he said. "If there is a market need for a class, we can offer it"

Departments are outlining courses for the 1996 summer session now. The deadline for course offerings is Oct. 16.

First Monday 1995 celebrates public interest organizations

While it may not pay as well, public interest lawyers like their work panelists told the First Monday 1995 audience Monday night.

"It's not a sacrifice to be in public interest law. It's a lot of fun. What could be better?" said Neil Franklin, University of Idaho College of Law professor.

First Monday is a celebration of public interest organizations which is held on the traditional opening day of the U.S. Supreme Court session. UI's event included a video of nationally recognized public interest advocates and a panel discussion of local attorneys and law professors.

Public interest lawyers help people who often cannot afford to hire an attorney. They also prepare legal forms, records, and

applications for organizations. Sometimes they volunteer their time to work on cases which interest them, said Elizabeth Brandt, UI law professor.

Carl Mickelsen, a Co-Ad legal advocate, represents people with various disabilities. The majority of his cases deal with clients who have mental illnesses, he said.

"They are powerless. The only thing that empowers them at all is our services. There is gratification in this whole process," Mickelsen said. "Who can we help today? That's been my orientation. My interest in it is helping people."

"If you don't believe in the underdog and if you're not there for the underdog, legal services is not for you," said Randy Robinson of Idaho Legal Aid Services. It is also important to really like people and be able to get along with them, he said.

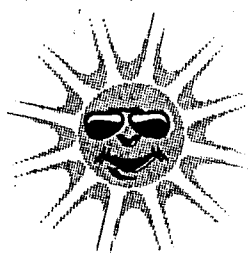
Most public interest lawyers spend a lot of time outside the courtroom, but Public Defender Michael Henegen spends most of his time in court. "We represent the people that don't fit in society," he said.

The way America deals with people who don't fit in society is to put them in jail and prison, Henegen said.

He is there to stand between the state, with all its resources and finances, and the defendant.

"If the system is working properly, you're going to lose most of your cases (as a public defender)," Henegen said. If the system works, police won't be charging innocent people, he said. If it doesn't, public interest lawyers get involved.

"The bottom line is, you got to figure out how to change the system," said law professor Maureen Laflin.

LAPD censors former officer's story

COEUR D'ALENE—Reeling from public scrutiny that has exposed ugly outbreaks of racism and excessive force by its officers, the Los Angeles Police Department has censored a Coeur d'Alene man's story about a deadly stand-off 17 years ago.

Lloyd O'Callaghan Jr., 42, an ex-LAPD cop involved in the shooting death of a black woman in Los Angeles in 1979, believes the department is afraid of his "politically dangerous" book detailing the incident.

The editor of The Thin Blue Line, the official publication of the Los Angeles Police Department's Protective League, said the book, "The Other End of the Gun," is too controversial to advertise in the 16,000-circulation monthly newspaper.

The newspaper last month refused to advertise O'Callaghan's self-published book.

Thin Blue Line editor Lenny Munoz, a 26-year Los Angeles Police Department veteran, said the racial connotations of the O.J. Simpson trial have lowered officers' morale.

O'Callaghan, who moved to Coeur d'Alene about eight years ago, left the Los Angeles Police Department 30 months after the controversial shooting death of Eulia Love.

At a gathering in Coeur d'Alene with 168 former LAPD officers, O'Callaghan said he decided to

distribute his book that reveals the political corruption surrounding the investigation.

Munoz said O'Callaghan chose now to advertise—14 years after his book was published—because of the racial fury surrounding the O.J. murder trial.

O'Callaghan denies he is doing it for the money. He said he did not approach The Thin Blue Line during other racially heated periods.

The tribulation began Jan. 3, 1979, when O'Callaghan, who is white, and his black partner responded to a disturbance in a south-central Los Angeles neighborhood.

Perot could fare well in Idaho

BOISE—With his name recognition, his United We Stand America organization and his billions of dollars, Ross Perot would not have any trouble forming a new political party in Idaho.

The question for many is whether that party would grow into a contender or merely influence the other two parties.

"The type of electoral system we have makes it virtually impossible for a three-party system to be sustained," said Boise State University political science professor Gary Moncrief.

Perot's new party would be a "short term phenomenon"—but could have long-term consequences by influencing the other two parties, Moncrief said.

Thirty percent of Idahoans consider themselves independents, while 48 percent are Republicans and 21 percent are Democrats.

People expected sweeping changes after the 1994 Republican landslide, but "true reform failed to happen," said Platt Thompson, executive director of United We

Stand America Idaho.

Idahoans are frustrated by Congress' failure to pass a balanced budget amendment, term limits, the line-item veto and campaign finance reform, he said.

Theresa Shackelford, a former regional coordinator for United We Stand America, says she is ambivalent about the prospects of launching a new party.

"I think we've had a lot of effectiveness as an outside organization that has been more of a pressure group. I'm not sure that once we become just another party in the system, we'll be as effective," she said.

Third-party movements usually are co-opted by the two established parties, said Jim Hansen, an adjunct faculty member at Boise State.

Mother, boyfriend arrested in death of toddler

COEUR D'ALENE—A woman and her boyfriend were arrested and jailed Friday in the death of the woman's 2-year-old daughter.

Eilene Campanelli, 31, and Federico M. Cortez, 34, were booked for investigation of felony injury to a child, Kootenai County Sheriff's Capt. Ben Wolfinger said. They were being held on \$250,000 bond.

Christina Campanelli died Sunday from severe head trauma, believed to be the result of physical abuse, Wolfinger said.

Sheriff's detectives obtained arrest warrants for the couple Thursday.

Campanelli and Cortez reached an agreement through their attorney, Harvey Richman, to surrender to authorities this morning, Wolfinger said.

Review planned of child sex case

WATERVILLE, Wash.—A prosecutor from another county will review child rape charges against a couple accused of being key figures in a sex ring.

Douglas County Prosecutor Steve Clem said the decision to have a review of the charges against Robert and Connie Roberson is unusual, but does not indicate a potential settlement in the case.

The Robersons are the most prominent of 28 adults charged with sexually abusing children in a loose-knit sex ring in Chelan and Douglas counties.

The review was suggested by Roberson's attorney, Robert Van Sielen, Clem said.

"Of course, it's not binding on anyone. There are no risks to either side," Clem said. "Part of our motivation for having it reviewed is so we can demonstrate to Mr. Van Sielen that there's probable cause to believe there was a crime committed."

Superior Court Judge T.W. "Chip" Small described the review as a possible settlement offer, but Clem said there is no settlement in the works and expected the trial to begin as scheduled Nov. 6.

Clem said the outside review will be conducted by an elected prosecutor from a county in Washington, but wouldn't be any more specific.

Scientists say congress suppressing research

WASHINGTON—Forty-five scientists accused Congress of trying to suppress new government research warning of damage to fisheries, forests and watersheds in the Columbia River Basin.

The biologists, ecologists and other researchers said a Republican-backed proposal in an Interior Department spending bill would censor information on the declining condition of the basin in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

President Clinton earlier promised to veto the overall bill because of concerns about mining reforms. The bill failed on the House floor last week and has been returned to a House-Senate conference committee for further negotiations toward a compromise.

The scientists, in a letter to Clinton organized by the Pacific Rivers Council, said a section of the bill would restrict data in an upcoming report from a team of scientists working as part of the Interior Columbia Basin Ecosystem Management Project.

The bill "deliberately attempts to suppress scientific information about public resources on public lands—important scientific information that was generated at public expense," the scientists wrote in urging Clinton to veto it.

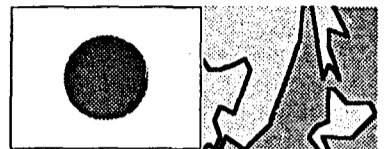
The research includes updated conditions of watersheds, trends of water resources and population status of threatened, endangered and sensitive species, including chinook salmon, bull trout, westslope cutthroat trout, grizzly bears, lynx and wolverines.

"The free flow of ideas and information is critical if scientific knowledge obtained at taxpayer expense is to contribute to sound decision making," they said.

Cult leader confesses to subway attack



TOKYO—The cult guru charged with murder in a nerve gas attack on Tokyo's subways has confessed to that and other killings, reports said Wednesday. His cult said the confession had been forced.

The cult--Aum Shinri Kyo, or Supreme Truth--and some reports also said the confession was not strong enough to be admissible as evidence. Police would not comment.

Cult leader Shoko Asahara has been charged with masterminding the March 20 subway attack that killed 12 and sickened 5,500. Police believe cult members carried out the attack to fulfill Asahara's predictions of doom.

Asahara has previously denied involvement in the gassing.

He is also charged in a nerve gas attack in central Japan last year that killed seven people; with directing the 1989 murder of an anti-cult lawyer and his family; and with involvement in the murder in February of a man who was helping his younger sister try to leave the cult.

Rescue operations continue as hopes for survivors diminish

DINAR, Turkey—Rescue teams used dogs and sophisticated listening equipment as they searched earthquake-wrecked buildings Tuesday, while hopes diminished that there may be more survivors.

The death toll has risen to 84 since Sunday's magnitude-6 quake, with 212 people injured.

German, Swiss and Greek rescue teams worked around the clock at the few sites where people were believed to remain buried.

At one spot, rescue workers pulled out the body of a woman, her three-month-old baby's body firmly hugged in her arms.

The number of missing was unknown but, with few buildings remaining to be searched for bodies, the death toll was not expected to rise beyond 100.

At a site where 11 people--six of them alive--have been pulled since Sunday, rescue operations resumed Tuesday morning after new witnesses emerged saying there were more people in the building when the quake hit the town.

The five-member German team searched the collapsed building for signs of life, using sophisticated equipment that can detect heartbeats or hear breathing from under the rubble.

They found no sign of life. Then a six-member Swiss team, using three specially-trained dogs, searched for bodies. When the dogs barked at the same spot, searchers believed that a body or bodies were there.

Curbs to be painted

Survey addresses drugs, alcohol on campus

Drugs and alcohol and their affect on students' education was the topic of a recent campus alcohol survey.

Almost 50 percent of University of Idaho students surveyed reported alcohol affecting their study habits or class attendance at least once this semester.

The survey was given out to more than 200 students through e-mail and 127 responded. Of the 127 students, 52 lived in residence halls, 36 lived in Greek houses and 37 lived off campus. The sex of respondents was not calculated and the average age was 20.

Students were asked if they consumed alcohol or drugs, how often, how much and if it has ever affected their school performance negatively. They were also asked if they thought alcohol abuse was a problem at UI and to support their answer with a comment.

Results show nearly 35 percent reported binge or excessive drinking in the last two weeks and almost 4 percent reported drinking daily. Approximately 11 percent reported using marijuana in the past year.

The survey also reported 83 percent of the students thought drinking was a problem at the UI and most commonly attributed it to peer pressure, availability and advertising. Others reported alcohol abuse not being a campus problem but a broad social problem.

Senior music major Aidan Donohue, 21, said people have misconceptions of what a problem is.

"The problem is the word problem," said Donohue. "What is the definition of a problem?"

"Life goes on and kids are still graduating," he added. "I think drinking is only a problem for those who make it a problem for themselves."

On the national level, the U.S. Department of Education reported in the 1993 Core and Alcohol Drug Survey that alcohol is associated with missed classes and poor performance on tests and projects. The number of drinks consumed per week is also related to lower GPAs.

Of 56,000 college students, those who had D and F GPAs had an average of 11 drinks per week, while those who earned mostly As had three or less the survey reported.

According to a 1992 issue of College Bulletin, college students spend about \$4.2 billion annually to purchase 430 million gallons of alcoholic beverages, including over 4 billion cans of beer.

Because the availability of cheap alcohol has been reported to cause drinking problems, some U.S. campuses have restricted or banned student newspaper advertisements promoting reduced price drinks or happy hours for students.

The Argonaut has no restrictions on alcohol advertisements except what is stated in the State of Idaho Alcohol Beverage Code said Argonaut Advertising Manager Travis Quast. The code states advertisement can mention beer and wine but not hard liquor drinks such as Margarita's.

Quast said alcohol advertise-

Study proves attendance influences class performance

Two campus professors released a study last week which shows going to class will increase your grade point average.

Steven Devadoss and John Foltz, both assistant professors of agricultural economics at the University of Idaho started the project with two goals in mind.

"We wanted to help students understand that they should go to class," said Foltz. "And show faculty what they can do to create a better environment to learn in."

The research reported "today's undergraduate students seem to place greater emphasis on non-academic activities like jobs, sports or other activities rather

than on academics--resulting in higher class absences."

The study, partially funded by UI's Office of Teaching Enhancement, evaluated classes at UI, Washington State University, Purdue and Ohio State University which had enrollments of 11,500, 17,000, 35,000 and 50,000, respectively in 1993.

Data was collected during the spring semester of 1994 from 12 classes and instructors, and about 400 students in the field of Agricultural Economics.

Results indicated, a student who goes to all of their classes will receive a high B average while attending 75 percent of classes will merit a C grade. By going to class half the time, a stu-

dent will receive a D average and by attending only 25 percent of the time a person is likely to fail the course.

Devadoss and Foltz also noted that motivated, often older students, and those with better prior grades went to class more regularly. Students who support their own education, rather than rely on parents, also go to class more often.

Class periods held on Monday, Wednesday and Friday between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. have higher class participation. The study stated students may prefer a shorter lecture three times a week over a longer lecture twice a week.



Task force works to educate community about HIV/AIDS

The University of Idaho HIV Task Force took preliminary steps to protect and educate the community on the HIV/AIDS problem in their Sept. 28 meeting. This was their first meeting of the 1995-96 academic year.

The meeting was called to establish a preliminary schedule for HIV outreach and education activities through the academic year. The meeting was also called to establish goals for policy review and update regarding HIV on the UI campus.

"The HIV Task Force was created to meet two goals," said Susan K. Gelletly, medical doctor and coordinator of the HIV Task Force. "The first is to educate and reach out to the community regarding AIDS and the second is to review the campus HIV policy to insure that individuals infected with the virus are treated fairly."

Meetings of the HIV Task Force are open to anyone and are attended by students recruited from areas such as student government, the Greek system, residence halls and more. University staff also attend and are recruited from areas of Student Health Services, Counseling Center, International Programs, Women's Center and others. The HIV Task Force also works with individuals active in

the Palouse AIDS Network.

"The problem with HIV on campus is not the number of people who have contracted the virus, but risk behaviors," explained Gelletly. "It is only a matter of time before the number of people infected increases."

"The HIV Task Force plans to attend the Oct. 9 Student Health Fair to answer questions about HIV and to make pamphlets and condoms available to the public. The Task Force also hopes to feature videos on HIV throughout the day and to someday make films available to be checked out for public use.

The HIV Task Force has been working on and off for seven years. The Task Force started even before condoms were made available to students on the UI campus. Although condoms were highly controversial at the time, the newly established HIV Task Force made them available to students. Condoms can now be obtained for 5 cents each.

The next HIV Task Force meeting will be on Oct. 12 at 7:15 a.m. in the Ee-Da-Ho room of the Student Union. A Peer Education Training Session will also be held on Oct. 17 in the Ee-Da-Ho room to brief people who want to be active with the exhibit table during the Student Health Fair.

"There is never enough education on HIV," said Gelletly, "The Task Force is only one factor."

who are serious about the job. There is a lot of things that we need to discuss and we have new blood and new ideas and I'm very confident that we will get it accomplished."

A host of other ASUI student appointments were confirmed. Eben Sutton, appointed to the University Judicial Board said, "Judicial Board will keep me out of trouble, all that excitement, it's an active committee."

Senator Kane raised the issue of personalized UI license plates. Senator Kane believes the license plate idea is a realistic one for the University and has the support of several other senators. "What we would have to do in order to get it enacted is first run it through the Board of Regents and then we would have to run it through the legislature down in Boise."

If the license plate idea is successful, all Idaho schools would have the opportunity to participate in the personalized license plate program. Washington State has a similar option available as well as most states.

Christa Manis, ASUI senator said, "The license plates would have the logo of the institution for those who attended UI or BSU." Senator David Hisel said, "I'm all for it, I think we should do it and in fact it would show school spirit and it tells people the ASUI is doing something worthwhile."

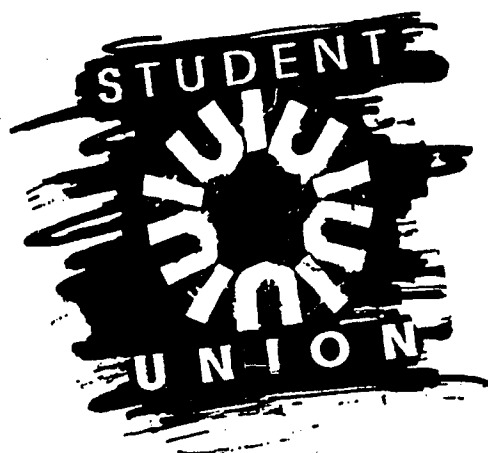

Local 4-H clubs begin new year with national celebration

The 4-H club began a new year this month. Oct. 2-6 is National 4-H Week, which marks the new year and a time for the 18 Latah county 4-H clubs to re-group and recruit for the 1995-96 year.

During this week, the 5.6 million 4-H Club members from across the nation, including the 22,000 members in Idaho, start preparing for next fall and a new year with 4-H. Jan Jacobs of the Latah county 4-

H program wanted to stress that 4-H is more than just an agricultural club. National 4-H week is a time for club members to advocate that. In fact the message 4-H is trying to get across right now is "4-H...More than you ever imagined."

Outside the county 4-H members have opportunities on the state level. The Know Your Government Conference for junior high students is held in Boise in February every year and a Teen Conference held in June providing classes for older students as well.

The projects range from the traditional baking, sewing, and raising livestock, to projects in photography, computers and business. Jacobs commented if a young person has an idea for a project they may pursue it as long as they follow the educational guidelines.

These guidelines for a project entail a student giving a demonstration on the project, describing what they learned, writing a review of the project detailing what they would or would not do in future projects, and if they achieved their

goals or not.

Jacobs said, "The educational goals are to teach kids life skills, planning and goal setting." Jacobs continued to say the projects put kids into a position of responsibility, 4-H leaders advocate a learn-by-doing method of teaching.

Jacobs is in charge of a program that goes out into local schools and teaches social skills as well as conflict resolution. 4-H members and Jacobs will be out later this month in the local schools talking to students.

"It's one more way we that we try to reach out to the kids and the community," said Jacobs.

Right now, national 4-H Week exhibits are on display in Moscow

and on the UI campus, including one at Washington Water Power as well as one at the Idding Agricultural Science Building on campus. Volunteers from 4-H have been at schools all this week handing out flyers advertising opportunities for 4-H members.

The Collegiate 4-H Club has begun planning activities to help the collegiate 4-Hers to enhance the professional and personal development of its members. Later this month the Collegiate 4-H members will have a display at UI Ag Days.

Anyone is eligible to volunteer to assist the 4-H program in their local community. The 4-H program of Idaho is always looking for more members and volunteers.

ments are not the reason people go out and drink.

"People need to be responsible consumers," said Quast. "Ads make people drink no more than anything else."

Other findings of the survey show 67 percent of the non-drinking students would prefer an alcohol-free campus environment and almost 82 percent would like it drug-free.

Although drinking is prohibited at most campus areas, the Student Policies and Information handbook states alcohol can be consumed by people of legal age in private areas of residence halls, graduate housing, family housing and the home of the university president.

Professors who have won teaching awards or use classroom examples also attract a high percentage of students to attend their class said Foltz.

"Many teachers read right from the textbook," Foltz said. "But typically students need more help and can use real examples."

Devadoss and Foltz suggest students' avoid early morning or late afternoon classes, particularly for core requirements. Since excess employment can hurt performance, they suggest students find work related to their studies or seek financial aid instead.

A final suggestion by the pair is for professors to avoid following the textbook too closely and strive to provide insight and "real world examples." A class project they say will help improve understanding and performance.

The research article has been submitted to the American Journal of Agricultural Economics and will also be discussed in an upcoming seminar by the Office of Teaching Enhancement.

LeClaire announces bid for city council

Former political aide and current chairman of the Latah County Republican Central Committee Tom LeClaire declared his candidacy for Moscow City Council last Tuesday.

LeClaire is a graduate of the University of Idaho and former clerk of the Idaho House of Representatives, as well as serving for four years on former Idaho Senator Steve Symm's staff.

LeClaire currently sits on the city of Moscow Building Code Advisory Committee and chairs the Moscow Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Committee.

"I have a strong interest in politics and I have become a leader within the Chamber of Commerce," LeClaire said. "I think the Chamber's views need to be expressed on the city council."

LeClaire is supportive of local growth. "Growth is important for Moscow, especially for the UI to compete for funds. The city council must allow growth."

To support this philosophy, LeClaire advocates more commercially zoned areas. "We need to develop these zones north and east of town, where the growth is occurring. These areas must fit so that people don't have to drive all over town for goods and services. This will reduce our traffic congestion."

LeClaire also wants the city council to be united in support of a south-end couplet of Highway 95, "which is currently not a priority. I also support widening State Highway 8 from Line Street to the Washington State line," LeClaire said.

During a speech to the Moscow Central Lions Club Tuesday, LeClaire said the city's contractor

licensing ordinance was "out of control. This ordinance has forced many landlords and small business owners to become licensed building contractors."

"The intent of the law is to require those who do significant construction work to hold liability insurance. However, to require \$300,000 worth of liability insurance for landlords, businessmen, and homeowners working on their own property is silly."

LeClaire also advocates cutting the salary portion of the city budget. "I am for cutting salaries, except for the police department. Moscow will always lose employees to bigger cities, but the police department shouldn't have such a high turnover rate. To reduce police turnover, LeClaire suggests returning merit pay. "I don't think we should go in with a meat ax, but most salaries should be cut."

The benefits of affirmative action

These days, we hear a lot about the negative effects affirmative action has had. Indeed, I myself have written a few columns deriding the possibly stigmatizing effects the federal law has upon minorities and women by lending them the unnecessary and undesired image of needing the assistance of the law to help them achieve equality in our society.

The other complaint has been that the law has prevented qualified white males from obtaining jobs in order to satisfy racial and gender quotas demanded by affirmative action, and quite often the complaint is that the minority or woman hired is somehow less qualified than the white male denied the job.

While one may certainly surmise that affirmative action has had these effects, one may also surmise that the quota system has also had another, quite opposite effect. It could be argued that the very presence of the law tells minorities and women that their government is trying to do its best to make sure they can at least compete on the same playing field as white males. For another, putting minorities and women into positions of leadership—even if they are, as the argument often goes, unqualified—at the very least provides role models for younger people of similar gender and ethnicity to look up to.

These arguments—both for and against—cannot be easily discounted. One may also be tempted to think that much of the backlash against affirmative action (just read the news to find allegations of its abuse) has much to do with white males feeling threatened by the potential loss of economic and political power which they have unarguably and historically held in disproportionate numbers.

There is no doubt the issue is highly complicated and not easily resolved. However, there may be an answer: equalizing access to education. By this, I do not mean we should begin imposing quotas upon universities (from which most of our economic and political leaders emerge), but rather that we should begin overhauling our public education system. After all, it is the very thing which the vast majority of Americans share in common and the place where inequality quite often rears its head for the first time in a person's life.

To start with, we should equalize the manner in which schools are funded. Many states have laws which require schools be funded by property tax revenue. This quite often results in a system in which one school may receive as much as several thousand dollars less per student per year than other schools in the same state. These property tax/school funding laws tend to hit inner-city schools the hardest where property values tend to be significantly lower. Schools in suburbs and especially in rural areas are much better off fiscally, and, perhaps unsurprisingly, this is where minorities are least likely to reside—quite often because when they do move into these areas, they are treated with suspicion in the least and hostility at the most by their neighbors.

But as things stand now, and when viewed in comparison with the 1992 election, the only thing a third party would do in 1996 is to steal votes from conservative Republican candidates, making the Democrats the winners and America the loser. That is something neither the Republicans nor the potential third-party voters want.

Do we want to be seen as the state where anything goes?

Have you noticed the substantial amount of media attention Idaho has received lately? I wish I could say this is a good thing, but unfortunately the recent coverage has not been in Idaho's favor. Beginning with the Ruby Ridge catastrophe, the nation has been treated to horror stories about backwood, inbred, gun-toting, animal-abusing, neo-Nazi characters who supposedly populate our state.

The relocation of Mark Fuhrman (you know, O.J. trial) to Sandpoint has not helped matters much either. This unfortunate man who has been called a "genocidal racist" and been compared to Adolf Hitler, has moved to a state which already has the notoriety of being a stronghold of the Aryan Nation.

The media, aware of this and putting it to good use, have trans-

formed the quiet, artsy little tourist town of Sandpoint into a neo-Nazi Disneyland practically overnight. The result of this propaganda has already affected Sandpoint by causing a significant drop in tourism, the town's main source of income.

Idaho's reputation has become so bad that I've even become weary about telling people where I live. At the slightest mention of Idaho, I notice people scrunch up their eyes and scrutinize me as if the hair on my head had suddenly been reduced to a fine stubble and a huge swastika had appeared on

my forehead. Idaho has become synonymous with racist.

It is not hard to see why public opinion is so negative. Idaho has become a state better known for its lawless, anti-government mentality than for its potatoes. To begin with, Idaho's laws, when compared with other states, are less restrictive on its residents. I was surprisingly informed of this last winter in Coeur d'Alene as I waited to renew my driver's license. While patiently sitting in the lobby, I overheard a man, who was accompanied by his wife and son, ask his wife why she wasn't disciplining Junior, who was at the moment misbehaving. She answered that she felt uncomfortable disciplining him in public. The man, placing his hand firmly on the large bowie knife attached to his wide leather belt, promptly replied, "This is Idaho. You can

do whatever the hell you want in Idaho!"

This is the message echoed and heard by many around the nation. People move here precisely because they believe anything is tolerated by this state. This is the main reason why many right-wing anti-government militia groups can also be found scurrying in the underbrush within Idaho's borders. These groups make their own laws because there are none to govern or restrict them.

For example, in Lava Hot Springs, Idaho, a disgusting and inhumane compound called the Ligertown Game Farm operated for years without any sort of permit, supervision, or investigation by state authorities. Not until the lions escaped and were consequently shot was public attention brought to the farm and to the sordid conditions in which the ani-

mals were kept. The owners, which I will kindly describe as the embodiment of ignorant white trash, originally moved from California because there were too many regulations for them to legally run their farm. I can just hear them now, "Gosh darn it, Dottie. We'll just go to Idaho. We can do anything we want in Idaho."

Idaho needs to wake up and pay attention to what is happening within its boundaries. It can no longer turn a blind eye to the activities of individuals who give it and its residents a bad name. A tragedy, like the Oklahoma bombing, should not occur before state authorities have to react and take action.

Idaho is an exquisite state that should be known for its lakes and mountains—not as the home for baldheaded racists.

As I have often said before, throwing money at a problem does not mean it will go away. We also need to begin educating public school teachers about the unfair and, to be fair, probably unconscious manner in which they educate our children. A recent study showed teachers are more likely to call upon white male students to answer questions than they are upon minority male students.

Likewise, minority male students are more likely to be acknowledged in the classroom than are white female students. And minority female students quite often find themselves at the bottom rung of the educational ladder.

If discrimination begins this early in life, if our young students are receiving the message that what white males have to say is more important than that which minorities and

women have to say, we must ask ourselves how this early form of discrimination plays out in the actions and expectations of the students who are initiated in it at so young an age when they grow up. Who is more likely to have a higher sense of self-worth?

If we are to achieve Martin Luther King's dream of one day creating an equal playing field for all people in America regardless of

race or gender, we must begin with education and proceed from there. Applying Band-Aids such as affirmative action to the wounds of discrimination after they have been inflicted is a negligent and ultimately, in itself, a discriminatory solution which, if it does any good at all, ends up negating that good which it has done.

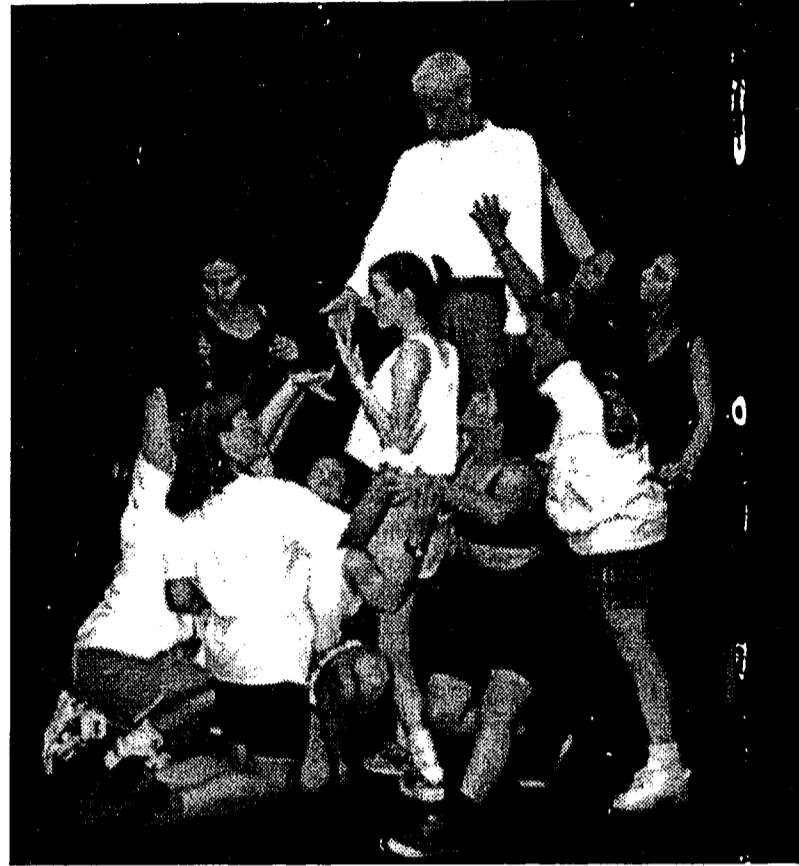

Who the hell are you?

Ghazanfar speaks of the realities of Islam

Shelves of books and papers decorate the walls of S.M. (Ghazi) Ghazanfar's office representing years of scholarly research and analysis. Just as amazing is the number of misconceptions he can point out concerning Islam.

Ghazanfar, professor and head of the Department of Economics, mainly questions the glaring gap in the cultural spectrum that largely ignores Islamic contributions.

"Why do we go from Aristotle to St. Thomas Aquinas?" asks Ghazanfar. He adds that much of our link to the Middle East now is oil, but historically it was ideas.

Ghazanfar has been part of the institution for some time. He received his degree in economics

in Pullman, attended Brown University and has even taught in the Middle East. He has seen the University of Idaho grow and evolve through 3 or 4 presidents since he has been teaching at the institution since 1968. What Ghazanfar hasn't seen change is the stereotypes and historical biases towards Islam.

"I am Westerner, with Islamic heritage," says Ghazanfar, who is originally from Pakistan. Still, he isn't looking at the issues from an ethnic or subjective perspective but instead from an objective academic standpoint.

"Why is it that Islam, which has made so many contributions to European enlightenment, so systematically, so stubbornly, not only misunderstood but ignored?" he questions, adding that one renowned Harvard Scholar calls this neglect as "worse than a lie."

Because the idea of Islam is to admire all creations for complexity. Many roots of thought have been uncovered and contributed by Islam such as mechanics, mathematics, astronomy, medicine, and

philosophy. Much of our own language including these basic roots is inherited from Arabic. Words such as algebra, astronomy, astrology, chemistry, calendar, pharmacy, and even university are words borrowed from Arabic and later translated to Latin. So what rationality is there for ignoring these enormous contributions?

Ghazanfar explains that historically the Islamic world was viewed as a threat to Christian Europe in early centuries. Meanwhile many medieval European scholars were either directly or indirectly influenced by the Islamic world ideals and innovations whose motive was to reconcile faith with reason. Such scholars as Dante Aligheri, Blaise Pascal, Adelard of Bath and Aquinas were influenced by Islamic thought.

"Keep in mind that this was a time in history when religion was dominant. Every action, every breath you took was viewed in terms of your salvation," reminds Ghazanfar. But even today, Islam is misunderstood in tremendous

ways and the acknowledgment for these contributions hardly exists in mainstream circles. "Ignorance just perpetuates it," says Ghazanfar.

"We get accustomed to seeing certain people in certain ways," he says. Movies such as Arabian Knights, Aladdin, and the media portray Islamic culture with many errors. Ghazanfar refers to an article that asks Hollywood producers who they were going make antagonists in their movies after the Soviet relations healed and the Cold War was over. "We still have the Arabs," they replied.

Furthermore not all Arabs are Muslim and not all Muslims are Arabs. In fact Ghazanfar says that only around 15 percent of the Islamic world is Arab. The role of women and other issues are frequently misperceived. "There is an enormous amount of learned ignorance," says Ghazanfar.

Ghazanfar has authored several articles on the roots of economic knowledge that have flourished into today's advances that can be traced back to Islam.

Senior running back Lavoni Kidd will take over the starting duties for the Vandals this Saturday in Bozeman. Kidd proved himself against Sonoma State, rushing for 138 yards and two touchdowns.

"He (Thomas) is our best back and we'll have to make some adjustments. But we still have to be able to run the ball," Tormey said. "At the same point in time we have to give Lavoni and Marcelle (Williams) a share of the work."

Secondary awaits Gunn's comeback

Cornerback Arnold Gunn will return to the starting lineup for the Vandals this Saturday. Gunn's return means that Antoine Chambers will challenge Tommy James at the strong safety spot.

Chambers, a junior, took over starting duties for Gunn when he injured his shoulder against Oregon State in the Vandal's season opener.

Tormey mentioned that the starting strong safety position is open to competition.

"Antoine (Chambers) is real suited to play the strong safety position," Tormey said.

Vandal fans can hope that

Gunn's return to the secondary will mean better pass coverage against the long ball and although Montana State is largely a rushing football team, Tormey says that the secondary must play tighter coverage.

"I felt like our secondary guys played too tight. We just can't give up the long touchdown passes," Tormey said. "So far they've (MSU) been running the ball more than they pass but they may look at the ISU game and start passing."

Vandal quarterbacks face nightmare at MSU

Excluding the Sonoma State game, the duo team of Vandal quarterbacks Brian Brennan and Eric Hisaw have been anything but consistent. Last Saturday Tormey threw out the switcharoo quarterback system and let Brennan start and play the entire game. His statistics on the season—30 completions out of 68 attempts for a meager 381 yards with one interception. Brennan's counterpart, Hisaw, is even worse. His statistics—14 completions out of 30 attempts for 175 yards and two interceptions.

Surprisingly enough, the scariest thing about heading into Bozeman isn't the statistics of the two Vandal quarterbacks—it's the fact that the Bobcats have intercepted

two passes in their last six outings. The Bobcats secondary is led by junior Omar Turner, with four interceptions and 88 total yards after the interceptions.

Tormey's worries aren't quashed considering the well-versed offensive line of the Vandals rendered six sacks and ultimately gave Brennan little time to throw the football.

"We didn't pick up the blitz as well as we needed to," Tormey said.

This Saturday the offensive line will have to control a defensive line that has combined for 10 sacks on the season and a loss of 102 yards.

If past records hold true, Vandals will punish the Bobcats

Idaho should be fairly confident heading into Bozeman this Saturday. Consider the fact that UI has won eight out of the last 10 contests against MSU and in that span, the Bobcats are 1-4 against Idaho at home.

The Vandals haven't lost back-to-back games since 1991 and haven't lost consecutive conference games since 1986. Also, the last time Idaho lost to Idaho State the Vandals responded with six consecutive wins and a conference title.

Tormey said his team underestimated the Bengals and hopefully

the same mistake won't be made about the Bobcats in Bozeman.

"You look for reasons. You know and I think a big part of it was—don't sell ISU short," Tormey said. "They're a very good football team and we sold them short."

Montana State's offense is sputtering

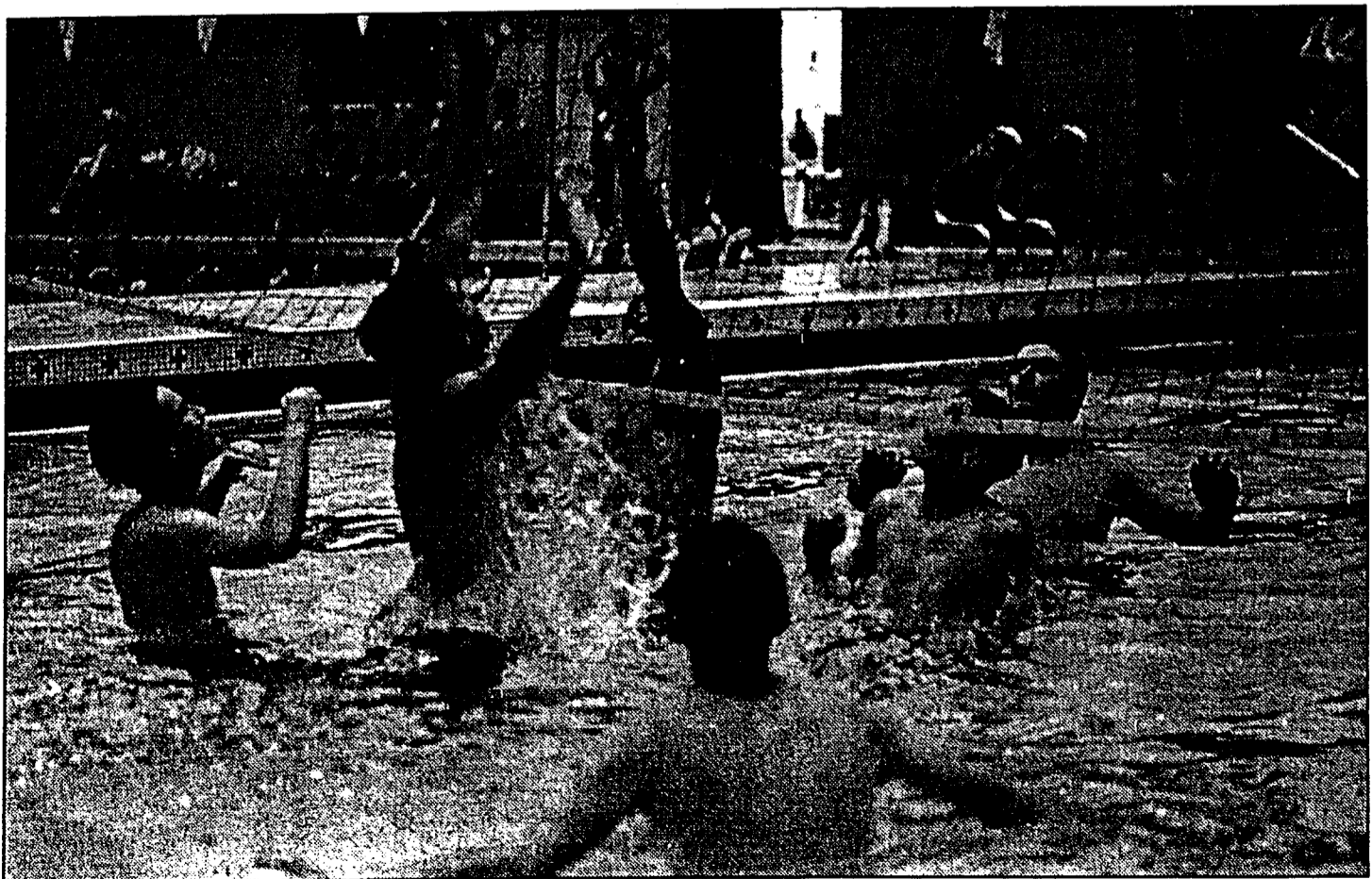
The Bobcats' three-game winning streak ended last week against Northern Arizona as they suffered a 37-0 thumping.

MSU's usually consistent runningback, Matt Engelking, averaged more than 137 yards per game but was held to just seven yards on eight carries before leaving last weekend's game with a concussion.

The Bobcats turned the ball over six times against NAU, the most turnovers seen by MSU coach Cliff Hysell since joining the MSU coaching staff. This same struggling offense will have to face a Vandal defense that is ranked 20th in the nation in total defense and 22nd in rushing defense.

"A number of guys on defense played well for us against ISU. Defensively in the first quarter we didn't play with poise," Tormey said. "In the second half our defensive guys adjusted and played with more poise."

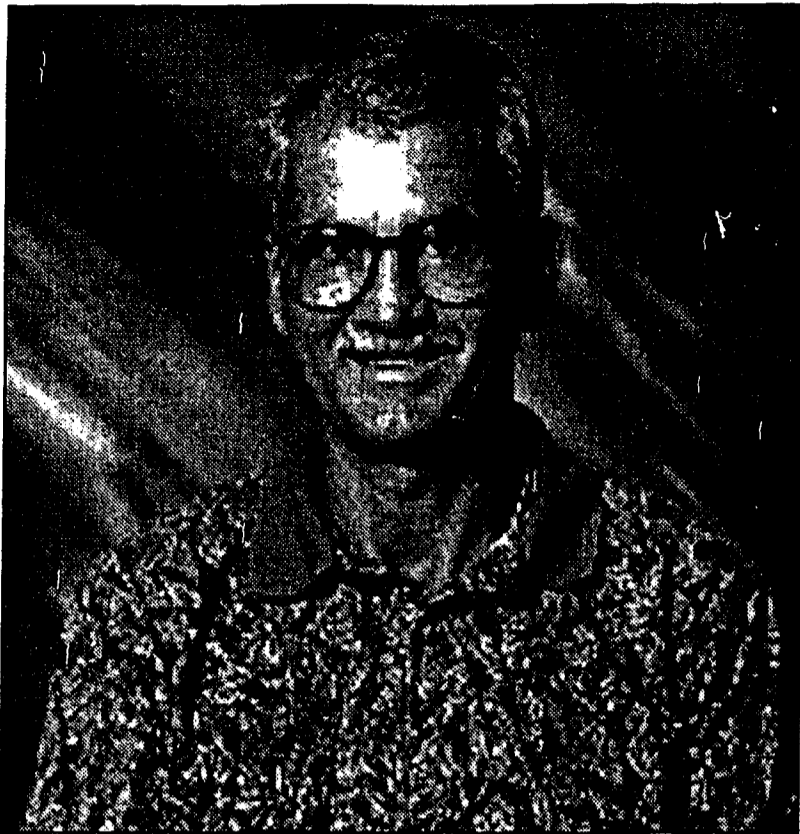

Keller pushes tracksters in right direction

After 20 years of field research the University of Idaho men's track and field and cross country coach feels he has developed the answer to the problems of the world.

Well maybe not, but Mike Keller, 55, does feel that people could take a lesson from his team about growing up and being responsible. They could also learn a lot from Keller about what college athletics really means.

Keller came to Moscow in January of 1974 to work as men's track and field coach and a physical education instructor. Previously, he had spent 10 years working in education and coaching everything from elementary school up to community colleges, track to wrestling.

Beginning his career at Idaho, Keller worked both on the track and in the classroom as coach and an instructor of first aid and bowling. He reflects on that time now as beneficial because he stayed involved on campus, but finds that he has more time for recruiting and

his athletes.

Athletes now act as Keller's major concern as he works to build a strong team in the Big Sky. "There are very few jobs you can make an impact on a kid's life," Keller said.

Keller believes he teaches kids punctuality, the ability to adjust and to be a team member. He hopes that his former athletes' lives are better now than when they came to Idaho.

Coach Keller recalls that his program offers kids a chance to improve themselves when other opportunities do not exist. He remembers one athlete from Arizona whose parents never finished high school. Keller recruited him and now that athlete holds a masters degree and works for the cultural diversity department of the Phoenix School District.

Most people remember one athlete who benefited from Keller's coaching methods, Dan O'Brien. O'Brien came to Idaho 11 years ago to compete for Keller, who moved the young star into the decathlon where he excelled. Keller notes that Dan never trained any different from the rest of the team, that he just possessed a higher level of talent than the rest of the pool.

The benefits acquired by training with Keller does not stop with U.S. students, as Keller focuses his efforts on recruiting foreign students. Keller says foreign students face greater challenges because "foreign students need to take the SAT and the TOEFL, an english language exam. They need a 525, half the American students on this campus probably wouldn't score that high."

Keller needs these students

though as he fights recruiting deficits, saying that he cannot compete against the UCLAs and LSUs when recruiting American athletes. They can pay for students to travel to their campus for visits and we have to make them pay, Keller said.

"When I go to Trinidad, I am the only coach there."

For Idaho's track and field coach the benefit of getting these athletes serves a purpose for the team and university, but Keller places the individuals' development higher than team victories. Actually, this principle serves as the focus for Idaho's track team and Keller's self-evaluation. We do not notice wins and losses Keller notes, saying the improvement of athletes shows whether he has done a good job. Keller does add one exception to that attitude, the Big Sky championship, which Keller's men won in May.

Outside interests also have benefited the university and Keller's team. Keller's tie with Washington State University through Cougar Coach Rick Sloan, who acts as co-coach for Dan O'Brien, enables the Vandals to compete against the best universities in the PAC-10. Also, the O'Brien connection brought a Nike contract for Keller and \$14,000 to \$15,000 to the university for new uniforms and equipment for the Idaho team. Lastly, the outside efforts of Keller have improved his talents, in his own opinion, creating the best coach possible for the Vandals.

The future of Vandal track and field and cross-country looks strong, but Keller refuses to make predictions. Goals though are post that high."

"We need four good scores turned in at one time in order to really have a chance to compete for the title," said Rasmussen.

Davina Hogaboam, Elizabeth Carter, Brenda Hall, Marc Bernhardt, and Kellee Vosberg will be the women competing for the women's title.

The tournament will be held at Riverside Country Club and will run Sunday through Tuesday.

Moscow Farmers' market thrives with tradition

Roy and Faye Huckaby have been staples at the Moscow Farmers' Market for the past three years.

While the Rosalia, Wash. natives attest that the market in Moscow is the closest one of any size, these specialists in the sale of herbal plants are quick to point out that it is also in one of the friendliest communities.

"It's a real pleasure dealing with a lot of the people who come through here," Roy Huckaby said. "They're really interested in what we do."

Indeed, it is in part this sense of community that brings the farmers, artists and craftsmen to their spaces in the market every Saturday morning.

"We love being around people," said Jean Stockwell, who, along with her friend, Jeanette Cox, has been selling flowers, fruits and vegetables at the market for five years. "We see a number of friends and become friends with a lot of people," she continued.

The Farmers' Market, which is held in the parking lot behind

test new specialized fruit trees for her business, Sweet Bough Nursery. It also helps her increase business.

"Through the farmers' market, we can build a main base," Judd said. "Then we can keep on adding new customers."

Judging from the enormous

crowds in attendance every Saturday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., it is quite apparent how the marketplace has stayed so successful over the 18 year span of its existence.

"This year has been excellent," said Mary Blyth, director of the Moscow Arts Commission, which sponsors the Farmers' Market. "It's the biggest and best season we've had."

Many of the vendors at the market hold the same view. For Judd, every year has been better than the previous one.

An added feature to the market is the presence of local musicians who play, rain or shine. Last Saturday saw the Washington/Idaho Symphony perform under a light drizzle, while tomorrow's act will be folk musician Dan Maher. The final day of this year's market

is Oct. 28.

Still, what keeps the Moscow Farmers' Market alive is what Blyth calls "a tremendous community spirit," not to mention old-fashioned value.

"We thrive on reasonable prices and honesty," said Marvin Durfey, a fruit and vegetable farmer from Prosser, Wash. Durfey, who has one of the most profitable stands at the market, explained that his success is due to "quality" and "not overpricing."

The market also features crafts and jewelry. "The criteria for the Farmers' Market is 'hand-made, home-grown,'" Blyth stated.

This motto has held up for the last 18 years. If the market continues to flourish as it has been, there's no telling when or if it will ever end.

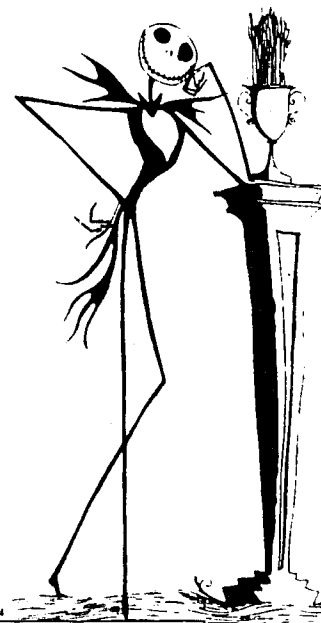

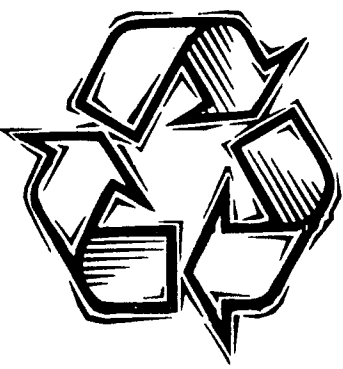

"Some of his true monologues are in there," said Muneta. She also said that the fictitious voice of Ziegfeld Follies founder Flo Ziegfeld interrupts Rogers periodically to set his story straight.

Rogers, a popular political philosopher and humorist who was born of Cherokee and Choctaw Indian heritage, was idolized by the American public until his death in 1935.

"I'm already a Will Rogers fan,

but I think it will be great to learn more about him," said Muneta.

The show has won six Tony awards, including best musical and best score. The music of the show is by Cy Coleman, the lyrics by Betty Comden and the choreography is by Tommy Tune.

The musical score ranges from burlesque, vaudeville and blues to country, folk and jazz. In addition to musical numbers and monologues, the production includes rope tricks, dog acts and 90's political satire.

The Troika Organization, which sponsors musical theatre throughout North America and Europe, is sponsoring the performance. Local business sponsors are Presnell Gage CPA's and First Interstate Bank.

Tickets are on sale at the Beasley Coliseum, The Depot in Pullman, UI Ticket Express in Moscow, Albertson's in Lewiston and all G&B Select-A-Seat outlets. Prices are \$25 for the first seven rows, \$20 and \$16 for adults, \$16 and \$10 for students and \$12 and \$8 for children under 12.



It would ruin the movie to give out who plays the killer. Though in the end the audience will begin to dread what is happening on the screen. More than likely the viewers have figured out exactly what is happening, but say a prayer against what that ominous thing may be.

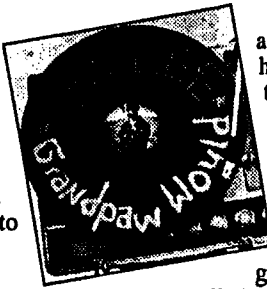
Seven does not end like anyone would expect. Its theme is followed through completely to the end.

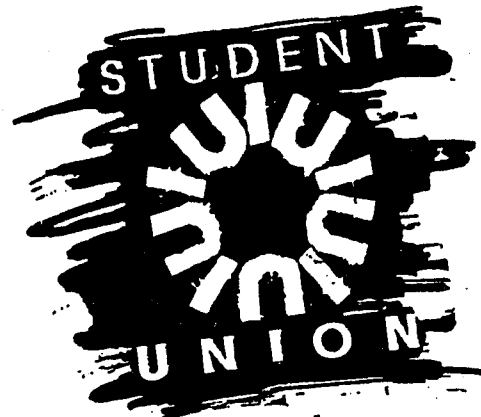
