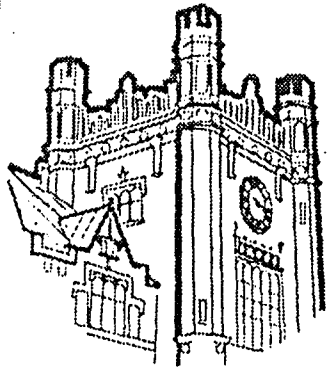

Students split over controversial photos

A student's recital posters that were torn down early this week by administrators who claim they were improperly posted and offensive now has music students divided over issues of decency and academic freedom.

Wednesday the announcements, which contain graphic photos, were reposted and by 10 a.m. Thursday several were found crumpled in a nearby trash can but University of Idaho School of Music officials said, although the posters may have depicted explicit content, most were removed because they violated university building code.

The announcements use images of death, nudity and religion to promote music composition major Ryan Gibler's senior recital this Sunday.

Senior music major Scott Winks said some of the posters were pornographic and unsuitable for the music building where his family might see them.

"If he wrote a piece about the pictures, it might make sense," Winks said. "But I think that's ridiculous if he's just trying to get attention—what's his point?"

Some students had contended the School of Music was engaging in cen-

sorship when, in response to complaints from staff, faculty and students, the original posters were removed Monday and Tuesday.

Steve Hanna, assistant to director of academic programming, who oversees what is posted in the music building hallways said he had the janitor remove several posters because of university policy prohibiting the taping of bulletins to painted walls.

"There were some people that were offended by the posters," Hanna said. "But it's not that we took them all down because they were inappropriate."

Photocopies of a nude Vietnamese girl running from a bomb attack, a dead boy and his crushed wagon after a car accident, and a gunshot riot victim are the subjects of Gibler's most controversial posters.

Hanna said the posters may have gone unnoticed if people would not have brought the content to his attention. Several posters which were posted on appropriate bulletin boards and glass were also removed but Associate Professor of Music Robert Dickow said "We (staff and faculty) don't know who took those ones down, it could be a mistake by the staff or students took them down."

Gibler, who assembled 18 different

Another pedestrian hit in crosswalk near Student Union

Only one week after a professor was hit by a car in a crosswalk another pedestrian became a victim Wednesday night.

Brian Doshier, an 18-year-old freshman at the University of Idaho was walking home Wednesday from a late class when he began crossing Deakin Avenue. at the corner of Deakin and Idaho Avenue.

A blue truck traveling northbound on Deakin Avenue continued through the crosswalk as Doshier was crossing. At the last

minute, the truck swerved to miss Doshier, spilling his load of pipes from the back of the truck which smacked Doshier's ankles and feet.

"I had to hop, skip and jump to get out of the way," said Doshier who, aside from a few bruises on his ankles, was not injured.

Doshier said, "He saw me, there was no way he couldn't have."

People are blaming close calls and accidents on that corner to the lighting.

"Drivers aren't very aware, especially when it comes to crosswalks. It only takes drivers a couple seconds of their time to stop and let a pedestrian by, but they're all in a hurry to get where they're going," said Doshier.

The accident on Wednesday night and the accident last week aren't isolated events. On Nov. 29 Luke Omodt was exiting an alley at 10:30 a.m. and while standing on the sidewalk at the end of the alley was hit by a university vehicle also going through the alley.

Instead of stopping to inquire if Omodt was OK, the driver drove off. Both Omodt and the driver filed police reports, but the driver's report conflicts with Omodt's.

There was a witness at the scene, but Omodt failed to get his name. Omodt asks if the witness could call him at 885-3558 to clear up any discrepancy.

UI expert defends his critical assesment

TWIN FALLS, Idaho—The scientist most critical of operations at the state's food-safety laboratory is defending his negative assessment against claims he is biased against the Twin Falls facility.

Supporters of the Quality Assurance Laboratory suggested Gregory Moller's evaluation differed so dramatically in tone from evaluations of experts from the Montana and Oregon agriculture departments because the Analytical Sciences Laboratory Moller runs at the University of Idaho has some of the same capabilities.

While Laszlo Torma in Montana and Nels Pedersen in Oregon raised questions about procedural documentation and worker training, Moller cited instances of analytical reports that were not supported by actual testing and possibly illegal disposal of chemicals and solvents.

He maintained his review was harsher because he had access to information Torma and Pedersen did not—information that at one point he had to prevail on Gov. Phil Batt to obtain for him from Agriculture Director John Hatch. That was a situation Batt labeled as intolerable earlier this week as uncertainty mounted over Hatch's future in the administration.

Moller, Torma and Pederson were asked to conduct the review by Hatch after Batt said he was not satisfied with the director's origi-

nal proposal to conduct an internal review of problems at the laboratory.

The laboratory has been at the center of political controversy ever since its backers reneged on their promise that they would never seek taxpayer subsidies to run it. They originally said if the state put up the \$2 million to build it, the operational budget would be financed by user fees from testing. But those fees have never reached the level promised and taxpayer subsidies, now running about \$150,000 a year, have been provided since before the lab opened for business nearly three years ago.

Trial over freshman's injuries moved from Boise to Moscow

MOSCOW—The trial over Rejena Coghlan's injuries on the University of Idaho's Greek Row has been moved from Boise to Moscow, 4th District Court documents say.

On Aug. 19, 1993, the Spokane freshman fell from a third-floor sorority fire escape after a night of drinking, causing paralysis.

In August, the 20-year-old Coghlan and four relatives filed suit against the school, the state Board of Education, 10 unnamed Idaho residents, three fraternities and one sorority.

The fraternities were accused of supplying alcohol to the underaged freshman.

The change of venue was granted over the objections of Coghlan's attorneys, but no date or time has been set or the presiding judge announced.

The court essentially said the evidence and the witnesses are located in Moscow and it would be more

convenient to have the trial there, said J. Scott Miller, the Spokane attorney representing Beta Theta Pi fraternity.

A number of motions are still pending, including one by Miller requesting the case against Beta Theta Pi be dismissed because he claims the local chapter was not properly named in the case.

Another incorporation drive launched in Spokane suburbs

SPOKANE—Some residents in the suburbs east of Spokane want to form a new city, just seven months after a similar effort failed.

The proposed city of Lilac Valley would encompass suburbs east of Spokane, roughly to the Idaho border. It would be home to about 75,000 people.

The drive is the fourth such attempt since 1990, but supporters are undaunted by past incorporation defeats, a leader said Monday.

Lilac Valley would have a council-manager government similar to Spokane's. Previous incorporation plans called for a strong mayor form of government.

Mertens said his group must do a better job of convincing residents of the benefits of incorporation. He hopes for a special election next summer. To qualify for the ballot, Lilac City supporters must gather signatures of about 3,500 registered voters.

Two other campaigns are aimed at forming smaller cities in the Spokane Valley. Both the proposed cities of Opportunity and Evergreen are inside the proposed borders of Lilac Valley.

AIDS ad with pope won't see light

NEW YORK—A poster to raise money for AIDS research that begins "IF THE POPE HAD AIDS..." will not be released, its creator, the shoe designer Kenneth Cole, said Wednesday.

"We felt it was a distraction from our overall message," said Cole, who created the pope poster and several others like it, mentioning "the president," "the speaker of the House," "your mom" and "your kid."

The posters were designed for the American Foundation for AIDS Research, or AmFAR, on whose board Cole serves.

"IF THE POPE HAD AIDS, HE'D NEED MORE THAN JUST YOUR PRAYERS," declares one. Words in the first clause are in larger type than words in the second.

Another poster says, "IF THE PRESIDENT HAD AIDS, HE'D NEED MORE THAN YOUR VOTE." None of the posters bear photographs.

Joseph Zwilling, spokesman for New York Cardinal John O'Connor, termed the poster "distasteful" and objected to any insinuation the church had not done enough to support AIDS care and research.

Cole said he intended no such implication. "Many people feel this pope and this president have done a lot about AIDS," he said. "But our point is that there's so much more to do, and that no one, not even the president or the pope, is beyond AIDS."

The scheduled release of the pope poster in 17 U.S. cities has been canceled, he said.

Judge sets trial date in Rabin assassination

TEL AVIV, Israel—Yitzhak Rabin's assassin nodded and smiled today as a prosecutor read aloud the murder charges the gunman faces stemming from his confession that he shot the prime minister to stop Middle East peace.

"Yigal Amir is accused of the gravest crime, murder, and the victim was the prime minister," prosecutor Pnina Guy said. She said the prosecution planned to present as evidence Amir's confession, ballistics tests and the reconstruction of the Nov. 4 assassination after a Tel Aviv peace rally.

Amir's defense attorney, Mordechai Offri, said he hasn't decided how his client would plead on the first day of the trial. Offri said he would not seek a political line of defense.

"I see this as a criminal trial, a murder trial that has no political implications," Offri said after the hearing in Tel Aviv District Court.

Amir, a fervently religious Jew, told police and a Tel Aviv magistrate that he killed Rabin to prevent the implementation of the Israel-PLO peace agreements.

The 25-year-old law student, wearing a gray sweatshirt and a black skullcap, sat on a courtroom bench today as Guy read the charges. Police prevented him from talking to reporters outside.

Amir is also represented by attorney Jonathan Goldberg, who immigrated seven years ago from Houston, and lives in the West Bank settlement of Emanuel.

When asked why Amir smiled while the charges were being read, Goldberg, who has defended Jewish militants in the past, said: "That's a reflection of his good nature."

Even if Amir pleads guilty, there will be a trial before three judges, according to defense attorneys.

If convicted, Amir's mandatory sentence is life in prison. The death penalty in Israel is reserved for Nazi war criminals and offenders who harm state security, such as spies.

According to the indictment submitted Tuesday, Amir decided sometime after the first Israel-PLO accord, signed in 1993, to kill Rabin. The charge sheet said he recruited his brother Hagai, 27, and a friend, Dror Adani to help him.

Justice Minister David Libai said today that Yigal Amir acted alone when he pulled the trigger Nov. 4 and that his two alleged accomplices didn't know he would carry out the attack that day.

"In the murder they could directly accuse only Yigal Amir, because he acted alone," Libai told Israel radio.

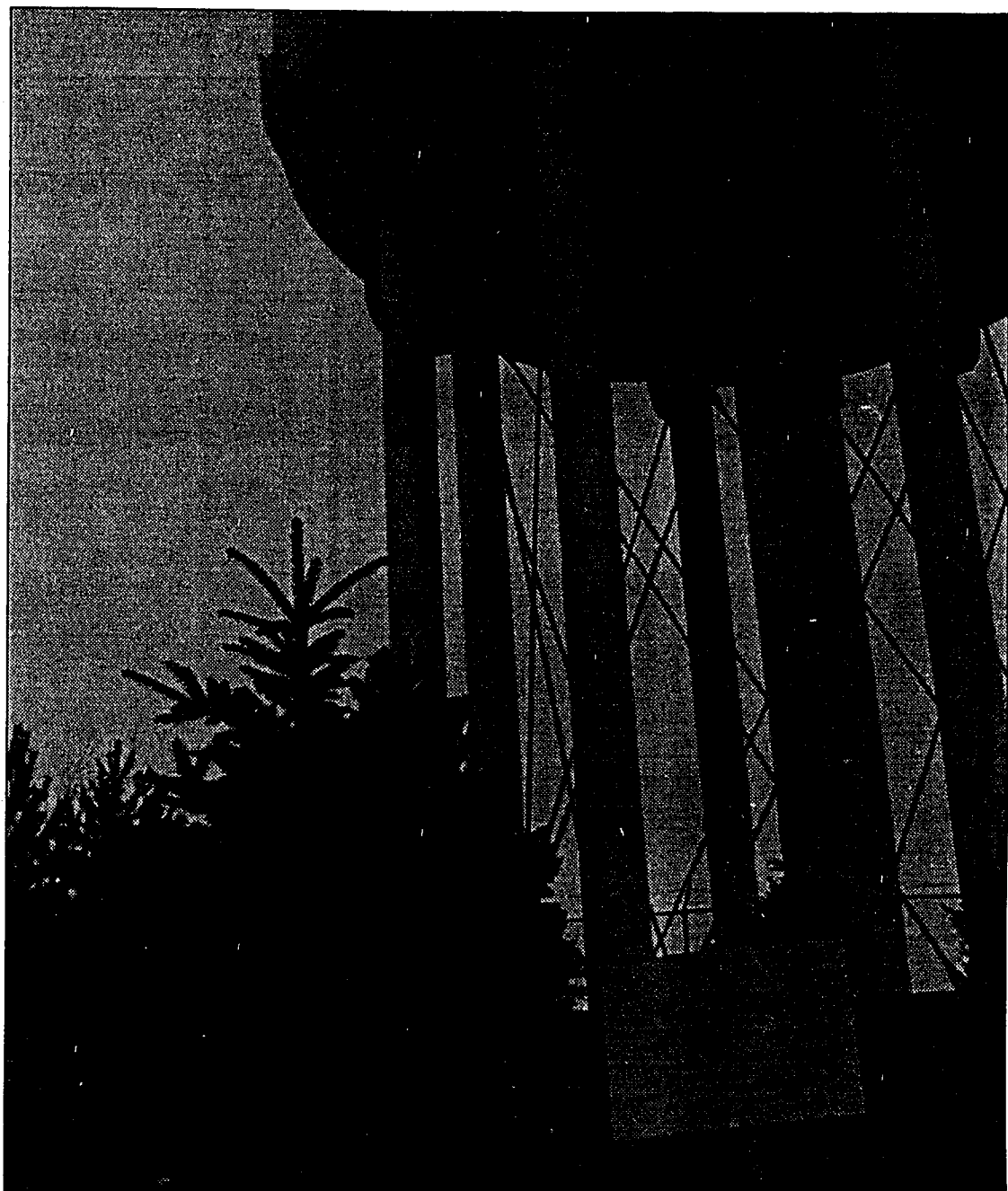

Smelly trees deter Christmas thieves

Abandon all thoughts of decorating your living room with a Christmas tree from campus. The scent will make for a very un-merry Christmas season.

To prevent evergreens from being stolen for use as Christmas trees, the University of Idaho and Washington State University have again sprayed campus trees with potent skunk scent and fox urine this year. While the scent may be difficult to detect in the cold outdoor temperatures, the smell becomes unbearable when warmed indoors.

"We've treated about 200 Christmas-tree sized evergreens," said David Rauk, Facilities Management grounds manager.

The scent is purchased in concentrated form and mixed with water, Rauk said. It's still pretty strong. "A little bit goes a long way," he said. For UI, it seems to be working.

"Since we started the program in 1990, we've only lost two trees," Rauk said. One of those was stolen last year from the president's residence. Prior to the tree-spraying program, UI lost four to five trees each Christmas season, he said.

WSU seems to be having less luck with their spraying program.

"We've never gone through an entire year without losing some trees," said James Antoine, WSU physical plant assistant director.

"We had a problem last year," Antoine said. They lost three trees, including one planted in 1990 as part of their Centennial observance. Still, tree-theft has declined with the spraying program, he said.

"It has been reduced by our effort to get the word out," he said. WSU and UI began their programs at about the same time.

Besides getting a raunchy-smelling tree, thieves face prosecution.

"They would be charged with theft. The replacement value can be

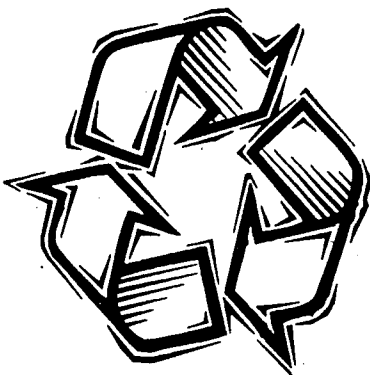

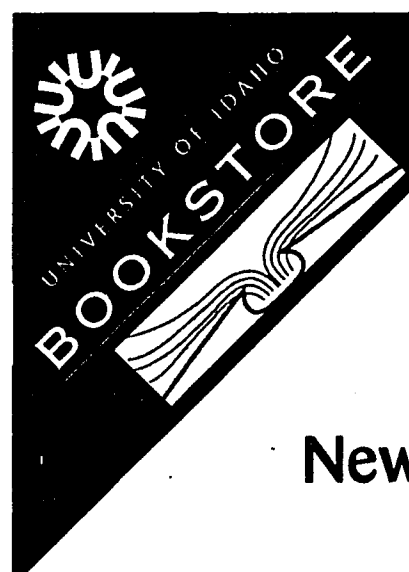

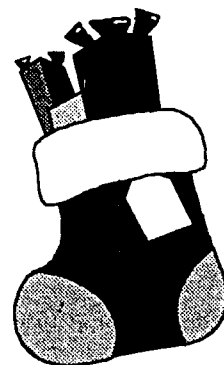

National test for teachers not required

Students hoping to enter the College of Education have one less road block to worry about this year. In June the Idaho state Board of Education in Idaho decided to eliminate the National Teachers Exam as a criteria for future teachers.

Some students report the exam takes almost five hours to complete and costs students about \$75 to take. Twenty-five dollars of that money goes for registration and \$25 for each of the two parts of the test. An extra \$25 was tacked onto the fees of any late application.

Before June of this year the

exam was required for all students at public universities in Idaho trying to get into the College of Education.

The state Board of Education determined the test were testing potential teachers for the wrong things, as well as being somewhat discriminatory.

Ronda Edmonston of the state Board of Education said, "A lot of teachers and legislatures were saying the National Teachers Exam was measuring ability to teach and it's not."

Edmonston said the test should have been looking for the teachers ability to teach, their academic background and their knowledge of

subjects they wish to teach. The exam geared more towards measuring academic knowledge and was not as conclusive on the teachers ability to teach.

Jeanne Christiansen said one criticism of the NTE is, "The NTE became a single barrier from some people getting their teaching credentials."

Christiansen also said there is significant data showing that the NTE discriminates against some minorities and non-native English speaking students.

In the future, teachers will have another form of evaluation to pass before being granted their credentials. In light of the elimination of

the NTE, Christiansen says the state Board still has an expectation of colleges to ensure future teachers in the program can meet basic skills.

The state Board of Education sent this issue to the Professional Standards Commission which will make a recommendation how the state should measure competency in candidates and send it to the State Board of Education.

From the Professional Standards Commissions recommendation, the state Board of Education will implement a new method for measuring the ability of future teachers. This method of measurement is due as early as April of '96.

WSU researchers detect breast cancer in 3-D

The war on breast cancer rages on. The toll: over 46,000 women in the United States will succumb to the disease in 1995.

New battles will be fought. The American Cancer Society estimates 182,000 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed in the U.S. this year alone.

Early detection is one of the most effective weapons in the war against breast cancer. A new detection technique has sent Washington State University researcher Charles

Manry to the front lines.

Manry and his colleagues are developing a new imaging technique completely different than mammogram imaging systems currently in use.

"The idea is to get a picture (of the breast) from all directions," he said. "It is like an x-ray/catscan that produces a cross-sectional image of the breast. Instead of getting a two-dimensional view, we might be able to get three-dimensional."

To obtain a multi-directional view of a breast, Manry said the subject would place their breast inside a tank of water while lying face-down on an examination table.

A ring of transducers surrounding the tank would send ultrasound waves through the breast.

"We would use one transducer in the ring to send out a pulse of energy," Manry said. "This energy would go into the breast, reflect off and produce echoes, then go to the other transducers to record and store information."

Manry said the process would be repeated for each transducer in the ring. "You are trying to figure out what is inside (the breast)," he said. "You need as much information you can get."

Mammograms are most widely used when looking inside a breast for cancer. To obtain an image







Vaginal infections common on UI campus

While the University of Idaho's female students are knowledgeable about the health benefits of good nutrition and exercise, few know about the serious health risks associated with the most common vaginal infection among the UI population.

Bacterial Vaginosis (BV) is an infection which results from an overgrowth of certain bacteria in the vagina.

"Recent studies show that women with BV may be at higher risk for major complications such as pelvic inflammatory disease (PID), which could lead to infertility," said Dr. James McGregor, gynecologist and authority on BV. "PID often requires hospitalization."

Donald Chin, medical doctor at UI Student Health Services explained BV is a prominent problem on the UI campus.

"Health Center doctors each treat approximately two to three BV sufferers each day," said Chin. "The women infected usually haven't heard of the infection and didn't know what to look for."

A recent Gallup Survey found that most women know about yeast infections, the

second most common vaginal infection which is generally considered harmless, but only 34 percent had heard about BV.

"I have never heard the words bacterial vaginosis in my life," said Jamie Retacco, a 21-year-old senior at UI. "If I had known something so dangerous was out there I would have been looking for signs of it."

McGregor advised women with any of the warning signs of BV (a thin milk-like discharge, a foul or fishy odor or vaginal itching) see a doctor for diagnosis and treatment. McGregor also pointed out symptoms can vary at times.

BV can be treated easily and effectively with prescription drugs but no amount of douching, washing or over-the-counter medications will relieve the symptoms.

While BV is more common in sexually active women, the condition is not considered to be a sexually transmitted disease. BV has been reported in young girls and women who have never experienced sex.

To help in the effort of educating college-age women the National Vaginitis Association is offering a free brochure on vaginal infections. Those interested should call the National Vaginitis Association at 1-800-382-7404.

PCEI wetlands project nears construction stage

A project to construct wetlands on UI land bordering Paradise Creek is nearing construction, said Adam Thornbrough, water quality program coordinator for the Palouse-Clearwater Environmental Institute. The project will assess the effectiveness of wetlands for treating different types of pollution.

"Basically what we're going to do is demonstrate two different wetland treatment technologies," Thornbrough said.

Free water surface flow wetlands are shallow ponds, with water depth ranging from four to 20 inches, and a total area of about four acres. "These areas provide good bird habitat, and we'll be putting in rushes, reeds and other types of wetland vegetation in that open-water wetland area," Thornbrough said.

Subsurface flow wetlands are essentially holes with gravel or sand, in which vegetation is planted. The water is then pumped through those layers.

"The gravel provides a lot of surface area for the bacteria to live on and break down the (pollutants) that we need to break down," Thornbrough said. This wetland will be approximately one-half acre in size.

"These systems will reduce nutrient loading into Paradise Creek by uptaking those nutrients into the vegetation itself," Thornbrough said. The wetlands should also lower the biochemical oxygen demand, by improving water quality and allowing more oxygen for organisms downstream of the site. Vegetation will be planted using locally manufactured "BogMats," which are thick, woven mats that are planted with seeds and laid down over the wetlands site.

Effluent from the Moscow Wastewater Treatment Plant will be used as the base for the project. In addition runoff from UI livestock areas, the aquaculture lab and the Wal-Mart parking lot could also be treated.

Only 5 percent of the total effluent will be treated, as the project is still in the experimental stage and treating more water would mean increasing the size of the wetlands, Thornbrough explained.

"Wetland treatment has never been tested in the Northwest," Thornbrough said. "The main reason for this project is research purposes, to see what happens with freezing and thawing."

The project is funded by a \$117,900 grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

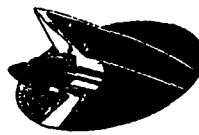

posters for his recital, said he wasn't surprised the posters came down but was upset to see other posters put in the same place and remain on the walls. He added that some of his posters, which did not have graphic photos, were removed although they were properly posted.

"Everyone tapes their posters to the walls," Gibler said. "It's just mine got caught because I struck a nerve."

School of Music Director Richard Hahn said he did not see the posters and wasn't sure if they were censored or not, but added the department does not have a public announcement approval process. Steve Hanna said Gibler never told the department about the posters and never complained when they were removed.

Gibler said the photos were not pornographic and were found at the UI library and local churches. He said his intentions were to

make catchy announcements to get people to come to his recital by shocking them and just to see the overall reaction of the department.

"There's a heavy cloud of judgment over that department and people are imposing their conservative ways on everyone," Gibler said. "Someone needed to open things up and say something."

He added that his multi-media recital of original pieces involved some harsh language, it doesn't correlate to the pictures on the posters.

Music building administrators said students often try to grab each others attention with the posters and do not expect any policy change regarding censorship to come out of this incident. The posters were the first recital announcements to generate such controversy, music officials said.

Gibler said he may spend an extra \$1.40 for copies everyday and put his posters on exhibit at the music building until people get tired of taking them down.

using a mammogram, the breast is placed between two plates of glass, or plastic. The breast is then squeezed to a uniform thickness and x-rayed.

However, images produced through mammography are only effective on older women. "An x-ray works on density changes, Manry said. "Therefore, a mammogram does not work very well for young women, as they tend to have dense breasts."

As women age, their breasts tend to become more fatty. Fat has a lower density than tumors. "A tumor will stand out with an x-ray mammogram on an older woman," Manry said. "With younger women, it won't be visual."

The National Alliance of Breast Cancer Organizations suggest women have breast examinations at least once every two years until age 50.

Manry said tumors need to be caught when they are small. "If the tumor is five millimeters

or smaller, they can knock it out with chemotherapy and radiation therapy," he said.

Although the new imaging apparatus is not built, Manry said tumors as small as one millimeter can be detected on the device. He said the device can be effective in detecting tumors in women as young as 16. "This would be useful for women who have a history of breast cancer in their family," he said.

However, since a parallel supercomputer is needed to calculate all of the equations involved in the new imaging process, it may be years before a small, cost-effective device is built for use in the field.

The war rages on. Manry said one of every 200 college-age women has breast cancer. "Self-examination is the only screening you have at this age," he said. "If you go in for an examination, have a professional do it. Women can find lumps at one and a half centimeters. A clinician can find lumps at one centimeter."

very expensive," said Captain Dale Mickelsen, campus division commander of the Moscow Police Department.

If the tree and its replacement value is over \$350, they will be charged with a felony, he said. "All they're getting is a chance to go to jail and a tree that smells really bad," Mickelsen said.

Grounds crews finished spraying the trees this week and put up warning signs near groups of trees, Rauk said. "If you see someone hauling an evergreen across campus at night, please let the authorities know. Call the police. Help us out," he said.

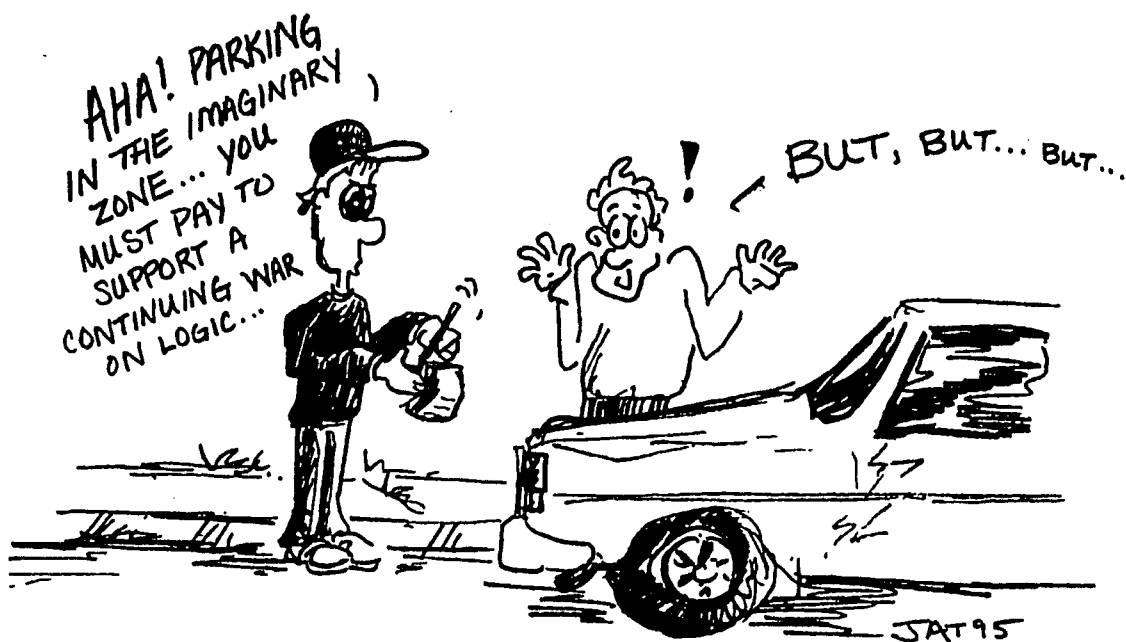

I would posit that any standards we do set will have to be ambiguous and not very helpful at all, and any lawyer worth his weight in legal code would be able to find a way around it.

It seems as if we are stuck with a dilemma: either we accept the current situation or we write a guideline which may potentially end up closing the courts to people with a valid claim.

I have another suggestion which I will relate through an anecdotal personal experience.

I once had a friend who was

involved in a minor fender bender. There were no serious injuries either to her or to the Jeep she was driving.

Yet, on pretense, this friend filed suit against the driver of the other vehicle claiming she had suffered a serious case of whiplash as a result of the accident. This little story ends with my friend accepting an out-of-court settlement from the insurance company for several thousand dollars. It was a reward based on a lie.

This happened nearly 10 years ago, but what I should have done at the time was to tell this friend of mine that what she was doing was unacceptable and if she pursued the suit any further she would lose my friendship and I would be compelled to inform the insurance company of her deceit.

This would have been an extremely hard thing to do. I'm not one who is prone to running around

tattling on others (in the playground I grew up on, this could result in some serious bodily injury). I prefer to let people learn lessons on their own. But here's the problem: frivolous lawsuits end up costing everyone money.

If you believe that McDonald's just simply ate (if you'll pardon the pun) the several million dollars it paid out to some woman because their "coffee was too hot," you are sadly mistaken.

The costs are passed on to you, the consumer. That extra nickel or dime you're paying this year for a Quarter Pounder may be a partial result of the lawsuit. One ladder manufacturing company has to pay several hundred dollars in liability insurance for each ladder it manufactures. Think about that next time you go out to buy a ladder. And think about that if one of your friends decides to sue a company on some frivolous charge.

Public deserves to have more input into future of education

On Oct. 17, 1995, the Idaho State Board of Education held a public hearing in Lewiston, Idaho. This public hearing consisted of three individual sessions: curriculum, technology and Goals 2000. The curriculum session brings one word to mind—aimless.

Soon, the task of writing new curriculum guidelines for Idaho public schools will begin. The formation of a new baseline curriculum for Idaho's schools affects educators, future educators, parents, children and taxpayers.

One bizarre aspect of this public hearing was the absence of public representation. Why this lack of public interest in the future of Idaho's youth? Allow me to "beg the question." Did you know about these hearings? If you were aware of these proceedings, were you informed far enough in advance to fit it into your schedule? You will likely answer "No" to both of these questions since few individuals were privy to this information.

I would like to focus on the curriculum component of these hearings. Six public hearings were held at different locations around Idaho. The purpose of these public hearings remains difficult to ascertain, even after I personally attended the

meeting in Lewiston.

Tom Farley, director of curriculum, spoke on behalf of Dr. Anne Fox, state superintendent of Idaho Public Schools and the State Board of Education, during the curriculum sessions. The purpose of these hearings, as indicated by Farley, was to acquire public opinion and answer public questions concerning curriculum in Idaho's schools.

Farley said the proceedings were being recorded and at the conclusion of all hearings a compilation of these tapes would be made. One look at the recording device, an archaic tape recorder placed near the corner of the room, clarified the minimal importance assigned to these transcriptions. If the content of these hearings interested the Board of Education a better recording system would have been used.

As for answering the public's questions, Farley either bordered on incompetence or chose not to cooperate—I suspect the latter. I spent nearly two hours of my

afternoon at this hearing, during which time I heard not a single question answered directly.

Farley fielded many questions but did not offer even one forthright response; his answers in no way furthered public knowledge. Most individuals in attendance were University of Idaho students, toward whom Farley directed a conspicuous attitude of condescendence. Our tax dollars will fund these changes in curriculum and I believe the public deserves to know precisely how these changes will affect Idaho's educational system.

The removal or "sunsetting" of Idaho's current public school curriculum will occur in May 1996. Idaho's curriculum guides recently underwent revision (our tax dollars paid for this). Why establish new curriculum guides already (yes, our tax dollars will pay for this as well)?


The State Board of Education has not even attempted to determine the effectiveness of the recently revised curriculum guides and yet taxpayers will soon fund another revision. Dr. Fox, elected on a platform of "back to basics" in education, presumably intends this ideal to be the basis of our state's new baseline curriculum.

By "back to basics," Dr. Fox refers to the three "R's": reading, writing and arithmetic. Can Idaho's children receive an adequate education based on the three "R's"? What about physical education, health, wellness, art and music? Obesity, cancer, unwanted pregnancy, drug

use and sexually transmitted diseases are a few among the list of problems plaguing our society. Our children must have the ability to identify the risk factors associated with disease and the importance of disease prevention

Accident not surprising

Although Tuesday night's accident in front of the Student Union is disturbing, it is not surprising. I work on campus and drive home at five every night right past the Student Union. Every night I worry about hitting a pedestrian—not because I'm driving fast, but because I can't see people starting to cross in the crosswalk.

The headlights of oncoming vehicles cause a glare which obliterates people on the sidewalk, and it's not

until the car has passed and my eyes adjust that I can see clearly again.

One night, a man walked behind a passing truck—out of my sight and in front of me—and the only reason I didn't hit him was because I saw him about five feet in front of the doorway before he started walking towards the crosswalk.

The lighting from inside the Student Union provided enough light to see him while he was close to the building, but the glare of the headlights and the fact that he was walking behind the vehicle could have caused a severe accident like Tuesday's.

Two things can be changed to help prevent future accidents. One, the University of Idaho can install more lights or brighter lights to illuminate the two crosswalks between the Student Union and the UI Bookstore. The second option is that pedestrians take into considera-

tion that drivers cannot stop immediately. Pedestrians on campus are very trusting that a car will stop. This is fine if the car has enough space and time, but when a pedestrian starts across the street without even looking, it's frustrating for the driver.

A pedestrian, especially at night and when the roads are slick, should wait to cross until they see that the driver has seen them and is slowing down. Most drivers will stop, but if they don't, at least the pedestrian hasn't been the victim of an accident because they exercised caution.

Students must be taught basic information about the body and its response to exercise. We, the public, can not allow such vital aspects of education to be ignored.

If the public secured a forthright explanation of the future of curriculum alterations, then we could inform the State Board of

Decisions are being made without public input, decisions which affect educators, students, parents and taxpayers. A revered phrase comes to mind: "...by the people, of the people, and for the people." The public deserves and must have a voice in the decisions of Dr. Ann Fox and the State Board of Education.



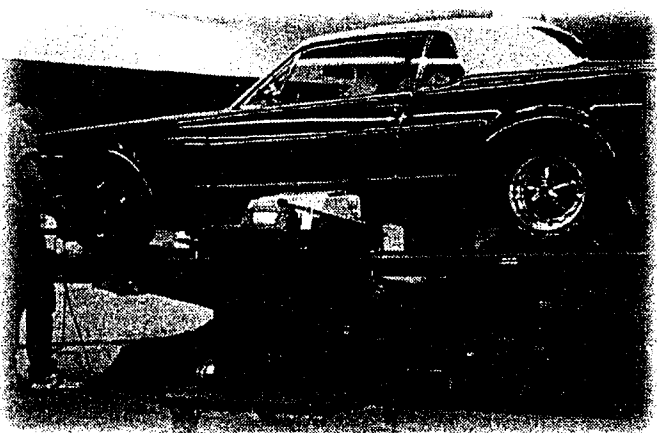

Jaffe explores non-linear narratives

December is the cruelest month, which is why the English Department did what they did. In from San Diego State University they brought Harold Jaffe to—not read—but perform at the UI courtroom.

Jaffe assaulted the crowd with searing stories of gender bending, sexual outlaws, female and male serial murderers, techno-freaks, rogue cops and punk anarchists Wednesday night.

The method of operation: a multi-voiced reading—Jaffe with Lance and Andi Olsen.

Weapons of choice: stories from his most current book *Straight Razor*, including, "Latex Glove," "Necro," "Stalker" and two new stories recently written.

To sample, and give a taste of Jaffe from "Stalker": "Go out, shit on my mind, looking for marks, not much out there, come back, still edgy, jack in.

Wash my face. Heat coffee.

Scanning names and #'s on the monitor.

Pick up the phone, punch a #: voicemail. Punch another: voicemail. Punch another: voicemail."

Non-linear narratives as well as non-structured formats hint at a plotted map to the city of new ideas and a veering off the beaten path of close-mindedness.

"I'm trying to destabilize the reader. What I'm doing is deady serious," Jaffe said about his

political subversiveness of the taboos of today's America and the restructuring of the way a person thinks.

To quote the summarization on the back of *Straight Razor*: "Time: 20 minutes into the future."

Jaffe sets the short stories in the future because it allows him to have more maneuverability with what he can do. It also dabs a bit of science fiction into the mixture to create stories that deal with current topics of society.

"Virtually every writer and artist has to draw on what's out there. And the culture has changed. When I started writing in the early mid-70s the culture had a lot of problems. It was different than now. It wasn't really a electronic culture, we were sort of limping toward the millennium, or rolling toward the millennium. It was still a late industrial kind of culture. And there were some psychological remnants from the 60s which was a very often optimistic time and the culture we're living in now is very different in every way."

Currently Jaffe is Professor of Creative Writing and Literature at San Diego State University. He has published numerous books, among them *Straight Razor* (1995), *Eros Anti-Eros* (1990) and *Madonna and Other Spectacles* (1988). And an array of his short fiction has appeared in magazines and fiction collections.

Relieving holiday stress

The holidays present a time of stress whether you celebrate Christmas or not, since just feeling the stress of everybody around you can create strain says Phyllis Van Horn.

"Relieving Holiday Stress with Quiet Exercise and Other Relaxation Techniques" was the theme of the final International Women's Association meeting for the semester last Saturday. Van Horn introduced ways to reduce stress, including a demonstration of Tai-Ji.

Van Horn explained people choose how they react to stress. Since some people actually thrive on stress it may be something that they don't want to get rid of themselves.

"Wanting to be de-stressed is the first step in becoming that way," says Van Horn. "Stress is not an external factor pushed on us, it is an internal one in which we feel."

One of the easiest and most relaxing ways to take a break from stress is a practice that Van Horn calls Image Tripping. Using only music and the mind, a person can escape to anywhere they want. Music used at 60 beats per minute is ideal for this practice since anything more can actually create stress.

While lis-

tening to the music one sets images in the mind using absolutely no words, taking themselves to a pleasant seashore or a peaceful woods setting.

"You can be there as long as you want to," says Van Horn. "Just make the scene come alive in your mind." Van Horn also demonstrated an 18 form version of Tai-Ji Qi Gong, a 350-year-old Chinese practice originally introduced as a martial art but has been known to have many health benefits.

Van Horn, a professor of English as a Second Language at the University of Idaho, started learning Tai-Ji while in China and found that it reduced the discomfort of back problems she had.

Unlike aerobics or weight training, Tai-Ji focuses on slow graceful movements that don't have technical names, but rather titles that produce visual images such as scooping the sea and parting the clouds.

"The Chinese always have poetic names for things, even their exercises," jested Van Horn. More important than balanced legs and fluent arms however, is the breathing of Tai-Ji which is thought to be the element from which the benefits of a stronger lymphatic and immune system come from.

Van Horn demonstrated the 18 form Tai-Ji and then taught the group a few exercises concentrating on deep breathing and posturing which alone can reduce stress and strains on the body.

The meeting included members of a group from El Salvador working in the Forestry Department to take their knowledge back home to improve their country. IWA meetings are held monthly and are open to any women in the community.

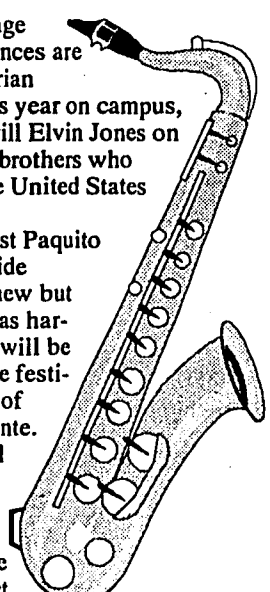

Vandals send Huskies packing

The Washington Huskies hoped to give the Idaho Vandals a dose of the Dawg Days of Winter. Too bad for the UW crew the Vandals did their best imitation of a veterinarian treating a sick canine.

Idaho (3-1) outhustled the PAC-10's Huskies time and again down the stretch to turn in a 64-61 upset in front of 3,543 Kibbie Dome fans in NCAA nonconference basketball action Wednesday night.

Jason Jackman nailed an off-balance layup underneath the basket with 1:13 left in the game to give Idaho a 62-61 lead. It would prove to be the gamewinner.

"I just tried to go right at them," Jackman said. "I tried a couple jump shots before and coach didn't like it. He told me to face up and go to the hoop."

With 25 seconds left, Idaho point-guard Reggie Rose drove the lane and was converged on by three Huskies. The officials called a jump ball, giving the ball back to Washington on the alternating possession arrow. Washington's Bryant Boston tried to get the ball into the paint to teammate Mark Sanford, but had his entry pass tipped by UI forward Nate Gardner. Rose came up with the loose ball and was fouled seconds later by the Huskies.

Rose responded by burying a pair of free throws to give the Vandals a 64-61 advantage with 10 seconds left on the clock.

On the next possession



Washington (2-1) once again went to the athletic 6-foot 8-inch Sanford, but the Dallas, Texas native's three-point attempt from the corner was blocked by Gardner at the buzzer.

"I felt contact. I felt like their was a foul on the shot, but the refs didn't think so," a sullen Sanford said after the loss.

Sanford canned a three-pointer at the 4:38 mark of the second half, putting the Huskies up 57-54, but Idaho scored 11 of the contest's last 15 points and held the Seattle school scoreless in final 2:29 of the game.

"We kept them out of rhythm. We went to a trapping defense and that threw them off," Idaho coach Joe Cravens said. "I know they weren't crazy about coming over here to play, but then again we weren't happy about going over there last year either."

After Sanford's trey, Idaho's

layins, came from within 15 feet of the hoop. After a feeble first-half shooting effort, in which the Vandals shot only 38 percent from the field, Idaho converted on 56 percent of its shots after the intermission.

"We seem to be a little better in the second half than we do in the first," Cravens said. "That's of concern because obviously we want to play well in both halves."

Harrison propelled the Vandals at both ends of the court, pumping in a game-high 20 points and pulling down 13 rebounds. Jackman and Shawn Dirden each chipped in 13 points for Idaho in the winning effort.

The Huskies were led by Sanford and Boston, who both finished with 17 points.

The Vandals continue non-league play Saturday when they head to Cedar City, Utah to face the Southern Utah Thunderbirds (1-3).

The independent Thunderbirds knocked off Cal-State Stanislaus in their opener, but have dropped their last three games, falling to Northern Iowa, Arizona State and Gonzaga. Idaho got by Southern Utah 86-72 last winter in Moscow.

Southern Utah gets most of its offense from two players. Junior guard Jon Gaines, 6-4, is the club's leading scorer, contributing 19.5 points a game. The other catalyst is 6-1 senior guard Daryl Christopher. The Las Vegas, Nev. native is scoring 16.3 points a game.

Morris enjoys Idaho beat, still keeps perspective

A sports broadcast plays out like a drama, unfolding before you, nothing scripted, just a ride you go on.

That's the way Tom Morris, 41, the sports director and account executive for KRPL/AM and Z-Fun 106 and the voice of Vandal basketball sees things. But for Morris, the games only act as part of the ride.

Raised in Columbus, Ind. 40 miles south of Indianapolis, Morris began dreaming about being a sportscaster at an early age, recalling his play-by-play of the Indiana high school basketball championship in front of his TV at just 8 years old. Morris looks at his career saying, "It's like getting paid for a hobby; I've always enjoyed sports."

From that point, Morris came to Moscow and now works as the sports director of Z-Fun and has been the Vandal Basketball voice for 11 years, filling the position left vacant by Bob Curtis, "Mr. Vandal" in July of 1985.

Morris recalls the road that led him to Vandal country, beginning with his graduation in 1976 from Depauw college, a Division III school. After graduating, Morris went on to work for several small stations, first in Middlesboro, Ky., then Hastings, Neb., where Morris covered NAIA college sports.

From Nebraska, Tom moved on to Danville, Ill., where he broadcast for the University of Illinois Fighting Illini in a unique situation. Morris recalls that the university never had a radio station and that the games were covered by 10 area stations, who eventually linked into a network.

Morris moved to the Big Sky in

1983 when an opening at the University of Montana presented itself. This move led him to Idaho in 1985. Morris broadcast a football game in the ASUI-Kibbie Dome where the Vandals slaughtered the Grizzlies and remembered the Moscow school. When a new station manager made wholesale changes in Montana in 1985, Morris found himself looking for work.

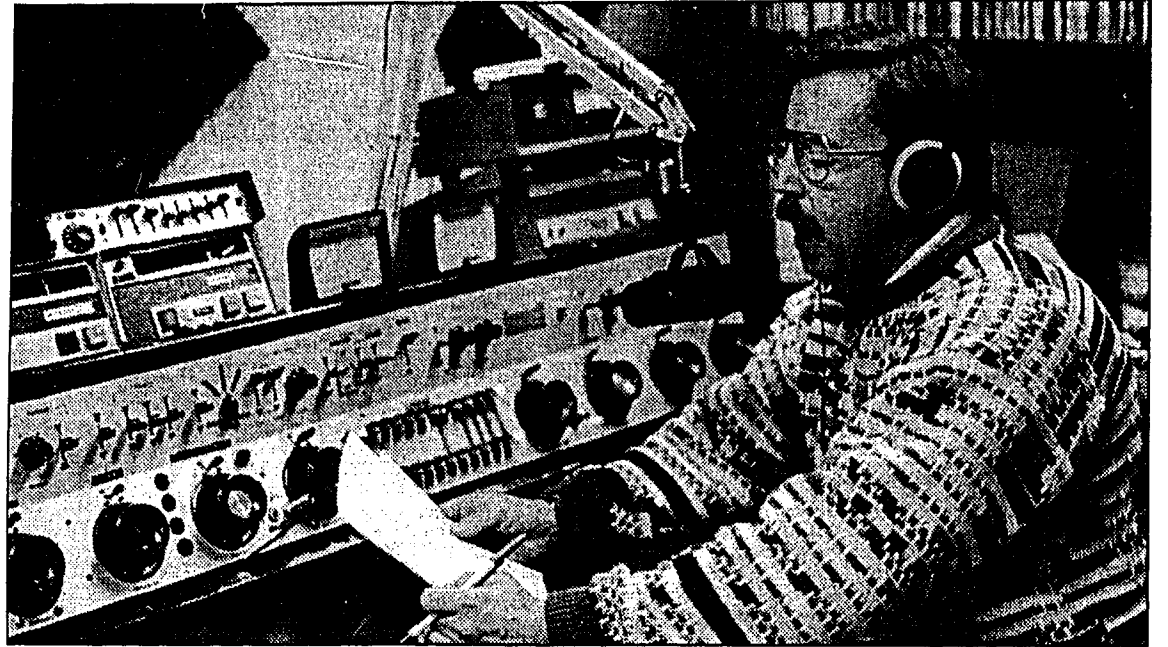
Bob Curtis, the Vandals' football and basketball sportscaster resigned his duties with basketball to focus on his family life more at the same time as Morris found himself free of commitments. This led Morris to Moscow where Dennis Deccio, Z-Fun station manager, hired him as the full-time sports director and the voice of Vandal basketball.

Since July 1, 1985, Morris has been the voice of Vandal basketball, and has branched out into other areas in his field. Morris teams up with Curtis every Saturday in the fall to provide the color commentary for Vandal football, he provides voice-overs for season wrap-up video's for Vandal sports, MC's Vandal banquets and he does the news reports for Z-Fun and KRPL in the mornings.

"I try to give the university some of my talents besides play by play," Morris said.

Morris, an 11-year veteran of Vandal sports, looks back at some of the memorable moments, recalling the Big Sky Championship basketball game of 1990 in Boise he broadcast when the Vandals downed Eastern Washington 65-62 on a three-point buzzer beater by Ricardo Boyd.

"I remember looking at the ball, then the clock, then it went in, It Counts, It Counts, the Vandals are into the NCAA Tournament,"

Morris remembered.

Despite his long history in the broadcast field and being a public figure, Morris has set his priorities in order, saying sports coverage is "a part of my life, not my life."

Morris places his spiritual beliefs and his family at the top of his list. Married for eight years, Morris enjoys spending time with his wife Judy, daughter April, 7, and son A.J., 3, when he is not hard at work. He even incorporates his family into his work, bringing his kids to Vandal basketball games and his wife on one football and basketball road trip each year. Interesting enough, Morris and his wife Judy

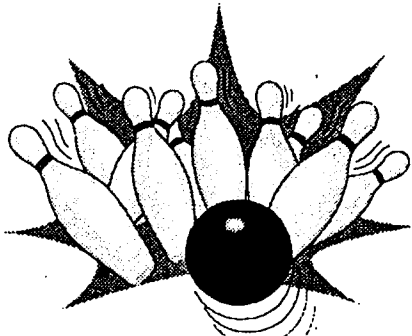

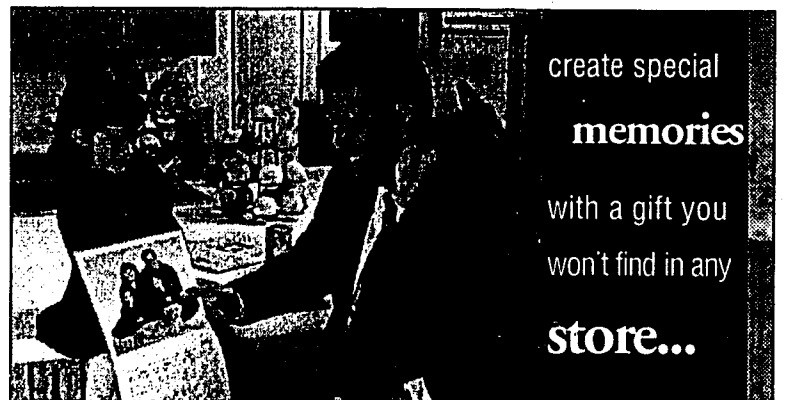

California schools hit Palouse for tourney

There have been several positives that have already surfaced for the Idaho women's basketball team this season, but possibly none will be as big as what could happen tonight.

Idaho will host an annual December tournament after a one-year hiatus, as San Jose State meets Sacramento State at 5 p.m. before the Vandals face-off against Cal-State Northridge at 7 p.m. to open the First Annual Best Western Invitational in Memorial Gym.

The Vandals enter tonight's contest at 1-2, but are much improved over last season in all major categories. The UI club is averaging 72.3 points per game while shooting a torrid 48.3 percent from the field. Last season Idaho was in the Big Sky cellar averaging just 60.1 points per game and shooting only 37.6 percent. Perhaps the biggest improvement from a year ago would be the three-point shooting. The Vandals are hitting an average of seven triples a game while connecting on over 40 percent of their attempts.

Ari Skorpiak is leading a well-balanced attack on the offensive end, averaging 15.3 points per game. Skorpiak has had defenders wearing fire-proof suits so far this season, as she is shooting 55 percent from the floor and 53 percent from beyond the three-point arc.

Mindy Rice is averaging a...ho-hum double-double. The Grandview, Idaho native is scoring 15 points a game to go along with her team high 11.3 boards a game. Rice is reaping the benefits of playing only one sport this season, after being named a volleyball all-American a year ago and missing most of the pre-season.

"It really helped to be there for the whole pre-season, it allowed me to work on some fundamentals that I wasn't able to work on last year," Rice said.

Along with Rice, another Idaho native is having a great year as well for the Vandals. Kelli Johnson, a sophomore from here in Moscow, is averaging 14.3 points per game, while leading the team in assists at nearly five a game. Johnson is also leading the team with 11 three-pointers, while hitting 46 percent of her attempts from beyond the arc.

Idaho faces the Matadors of Cal-State Northridge (1-4) to open its quest for the tourney title. The Matadors are a balanced scoring team, but none of their starters are averaging in double figures. Pam Karbowski leads the Northridge offensive attack averaging 8.7 points per game, while teammate Maureen Batiste is not far behind at 8.3. Carrie Domire, Tanea Nelson, and Tammie Mills round out the Matador starting line-up averaging seven, six and five points apiece respectively.

In the tourney opener, Sacramento State, which enters the tourney on a three-game winning streak, will put its 3-3 record on the line against the 0-2 record of San Jose State.

Sacramento State is led in scoring by Sarah Stapp who is averaging 16.7 points per game while shooting 45 percent from trey land. The Hornets have another double figure scorer in Mary Ann Bowman, who is averaging 14.7 points per game and grabbing six rebounds as well. The Hornets enter this contest making 39 more free throws than their opponents, so teams can expect a driving slashing ball club when they take the court against Sacramento State.

San Jose opened the season with two straight losses, to Fresno State (74-66) and Santa Clara (77-42). Despite the play of freshman standout Kylie Page, the Spartans are struggling on the offensive side of the ball. Page is averaging a solid 18.5 points per game to lead the team. The Elwood, Australia native has shown the caliber of play "Down under" is comparative to the states and she will be one to watch for opposing defenses this weekend. The Spartans are shooting only 31 percent from the field and averaging just 54 points per game.

The winners of tonight's games will meet in the tournament championship Saturday night at 7 p.m., while the losers will meet at 5:00 p.m.

The job does take its toll on Morris and his family though, as he finds himself on the road about 60 percent of the time between Sept. and March. But having an understanding wife helps. Judy Morris also enjoys being involved in Vandal athletics according to Tom, noting she graduated from Idaho in 1976 and has been a Vandal Booster for 15 years.

Morris' devotion to his life outside of Vandal sports actually has gone full circle, drawing his outside life back into Vandal sports. He established an informal chapel group for the football team at Jon L. Smith's request a few years ago. Morris sees the opportunity as valuable, stressing players need to "keep the game, and everything, in perspective, making them a better person." He believes that these kind of outside activities can help the players keep their perspective.

Morris also has been active in Vandal Boosters with his wife and the radio station. He also puts several of the former UI coaches on the top of his list of friends, visiting with many of them when his travels with the current team provide an opportunity.

For Morris, being a part of the Vandal broadcast team and the public realm creates some opportunity in his life that he relishes.

"I enjoy the feedback from people, a guy called up and thanked me for giving the junior varsity scores, so I must be doing something right," Morris said. "When I close the book on a broadcast, I want people to say, yeah, he did a pretty good read."

Madrigal Feast offers sumptuous dining

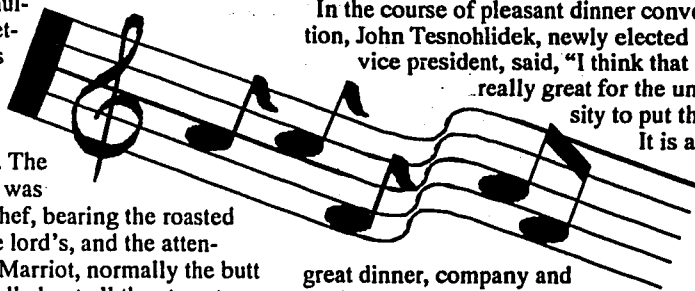

With his newfound trophy and a feeling of pride the young man brought the boar back to school where the wild boar's head was saved for a feast. Even today the boar's head remains a traditional symbol of man's triumph over evil.

The night was a success and I am looking forward to the next Madrigal Feast. The only complaints I heard all evening were when it ended. Dessert was Plum Pudding, a dessert resembling fruit cake, and one of the guests, Louise Denison, made the comment that, "Friends don't give friends fruitcake," adding that otherwise "it's delightful, I'm having a wonderful time." Upon stealing and sampling the pudding from a neighbors plate this jester sneered and decided that plum pudding was not what jesters like best.

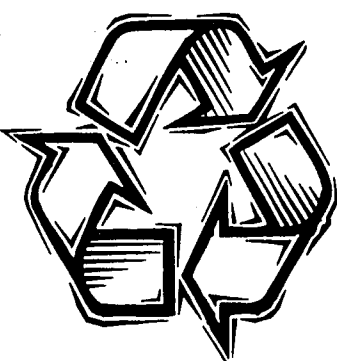

Caryl Churchill's 'Top Girls' top notch

"Cogito ergo sum," was the declaration Descartes made over 300 years ago. Better known as "I think, therefore I am," his proclamation did not really include the thoughts of a woman.

Caryl Churchill addresses the struggle of women achieving equality in a male dominated world in her contemporary postmodern playwright, *Top Girls* which opened at the Hartung Theatre Tuesday.

Directed by Charles Ney, *Top Girls* is a heated look at the battles women face and the price they pay for success by becoming more or less imperfect men.

Act One opens with Marlene, played by Kelly Quinnett, an independent and charming woman who has just been made managing director of a London employment agency. Marlene celebrates her promotion with notable women from history and legend. Each of the characters portray the strife of being a woman and offer insights with everything from acceptance to angst about the subjugation in their lives.

Isabella Bird (Sarah Hanson) entertains Marlene with quips of her past trying to rationalize her worth in society as a woman by immersing herself in countless commitments. Lady Nijo (Wanarat Jayaphorn) comes complete in her traditional Japanese kimono offering her perspectives on maternity and the pain of losing babies in her life, simply because she could not produce a male for her notable husband. Dull Gret (Bevin Flynn) grunts only a few words during the luncheon until she finally tells her explosive story of struggle. Pope Joan (Holly Allen Marsh) speaks of her obsession with learning and her belief that it is necessary to be man-like to become anything successful. Patient Griselda (Gabrielle Korten) arrives last telling her

story daintily justifying her support for her husband and backing of the treatment in her life with acceptance.

The women continue to relate their pasts as the violinist (Cate Olsen) continues to play and the Waitress (Anne Jensen) keeps up with the requests for wine and brandy. The dialogue gets more intense and honest as the drinking continues as the women express their anger living dispersed among the males. Marlene, who does "t seem to relate to the repression, becomes overwhelmed with it all and hides under the table.

Act Two comes back to the present as we see Marlene in her work environment. Other female colleagues talk about their affairs and climbing to the top giving a look at women who have achieved success by taking on the traits of self-made men.

The cast takes on second roles as Marlene's colleagues, friends and family following the story of Angie, a young girl trying to find her identity. Angie idolizes her "Auntie" Marlene and longs to be the "strong, aggressive and perfect" working woman that Marlene is. As the story evolves, we learn that Marlene has had to pay a price for her success. Provocative script and great acting leaves every woman strongly relating to the play.

Top Girls is not only insightful but very funny and entertaining. The audience can be assured to learn more about themselves and their viewpoints on gender after watching.

Performances continue this evening and Saturday Dec. 9 at 8pm and Sunday Dec. 10 at 2 pm. Photo exhibit opens at Prichard

"Content and Discontent in Today's Photography," a new, traveling photo exhibit, makes its debut at the Prichard Gallery today. The opening reception is from 5 to 8 p.m. and the exhibit will remain at the gallery until Jan. 27.

The exhibit features several artists whose progressive work has helped shape the way we perceive photography. The work examines the fine line between what people expect with photography (content) and what people may or may not expect in photography (discontent).

Wally Mason of the Prichard Gallery, said that the underlying theme behind the exhibit is what a photograph really is. "They question all of the things that a photograph really does," he said.

Among the artists featured in the exhibit are Andres Serrano, Adam Fuss, Penelope Umbrico and John Divola. Their work has received favorable attention for its progres-

sive style, but also has been deemed by some as controversial. Most of the images are a departure from typical photographs in regards to their subject matter, abstract nature and even size. Some pieces in the exhibit range from 48 inches by 98 inches to 16 inches by 14 and one-half inches.

"You would never think of some of the pieces are photos because of their size," Mason said. "A lot of them look like paintings, which is part of the idea of discontent."

The exhibit was brought to Moscow and the Prichard Gallery by Andy Grundberg. Grundberg is director of Friends of Photography/Ansel Adams Center, and is a former photography critic for the New York Times.

"It's a traveling exhibit, and this is its first venue," Mason said. "From here, it will go to Lowe Art Museum at the University of Miami."

Hours for the Prichard Gallery are Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., and Saturday 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

This band is a little different from the sounds that Built to Spill are making. This is pure punk rock! Listening to this E.P. put a smile on my face.

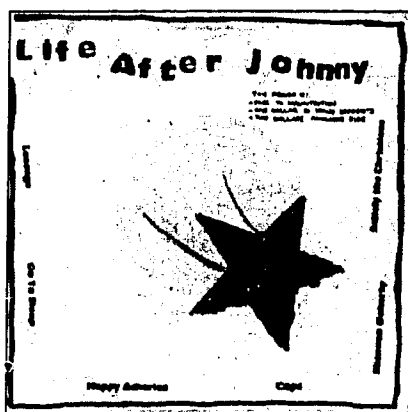
Johnny's sound reminds me of the Vindictives. Annoying screechy vocals over hyper guitar anthems makes you jump up and

The American President

It seems as if the bulk of the decent movies currently out in theaters fall into three categories. You have the action flicks (*Nick of Time*, *Money Train*), the mobster films (*Get Shorty*, *Casino*) and the youth-oriented comedies (*Ace Ventura: When Nature Calls*, *Toy Story*).

Somewhere outside of this present cinematic potluck lies *The American President*, a romantic comedy/drama that looks at what would happen if a widowed president took a dip in the shallow end of the dating pool.

Michael Douglas plays President Andrew Shepherd, a widower since his election almost four years earlier. Annette Bening is the object of the presidential desire as environmental lobbyist Sydney Wade.

While the magic between Douglas and Bening is definitely believable, the real value of this chemistry comes in partnership with the setting in which it takes

place. Watching Wade evolve from clumsy school-girl nervosa to first date jitters to kissing in the "dish room," all against the otherwise impenetrable White House's inner chambers, combine to create a fairy tale story reminiscent of Cinderella.

However, director Rob Reiner fails in almost all attempts to create fresh and interesting subplots or smaller conflicts, opting instead to rely solely on his idea of a president who's hot-to-trot as his be-all and end-all to carry the film.

If anything, *The American President* serves as a platform for liberal screenwriters and producers to extol their ideals and virtues in an unchallenged arena.

Still, this film fulfills what is probably its principle goal: to tell a fictional love story that is romantic in almost every aspect. *The American President* is not ground-breaking material, but it's definitely a good date movie.

Collette productions focus on spirit

Subtle intermingling of spiritual thought characterized two one act Collette Theatre productions; *The Apple Tree* and *Finding the Sun*.

Both were pleasant diversions from a hectic time of the year. *The Apple Tree* was the better of the two plays yet, *Finding the Sun* was also enjoyable.

Both plays took a stab at explaining fundamental issues that affect us all as people. A running theme of loneliness binds the two pieces together. One used a parody of the Biblical account of creation to show that earthly pleasures of love and sin are potentially worth more than the promise found in the Garden of Eden.

The other, through a twisted look at an anything but typical day at the beach, dealt with love, loneliness and the things people will do to find, or avoid, them.

Interpersonal relationships that appeared to be weak and fragile were shown to have great strength and love

within them in *The Apple Tree*. The subtle humor that Mark Twain is known for was not lost in the translation. Adam (David Rosenberg), tried in vain to avoid falling in love with Eve (Mary Finkelnburg), who continually chased Adam to avoid loneliness.

Through the serpent's intervention, Eve loses the Garden of Eden for the pair. In the remainder of the play, an adaptation of a Twain short story, Adam and Eve grow to love each other and decide the real Eden is in their love which has flowered and grown into something beautiful over the years.

The play *Finding the Sun*, written by Edward Albee, takes a more cosmopolitan approach in dealing with people and their problems. The eight players all find themselves at the beach on a summer day. Six of the eight characters know each other and all have, to varying degrees, dysfunctional relationships. Although I enjoyed the play, I recognize it was not for everyone.

Some of the issues broached would have offended some conservative viewers.

Stuntman headlines at WSU

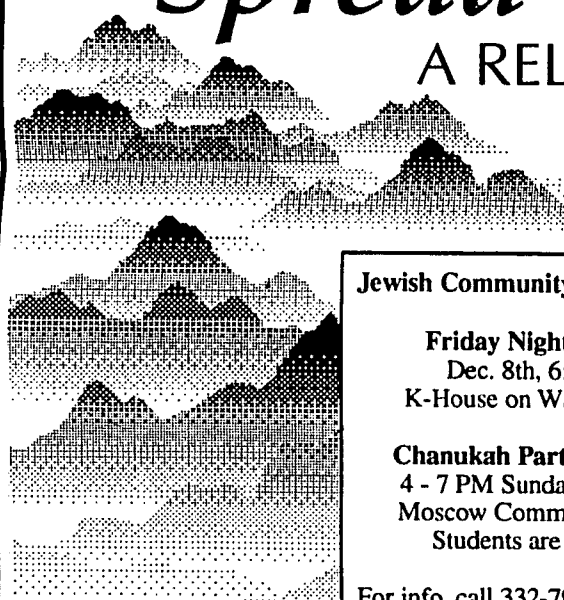
Resident Idaho rock-gods Stuntman will headline tonight at Washington State University's Butches' Den.
