Telin retires after 25 years at registrar post

After serving under Presidents Hartung, Gibb, Zinser and Bell, Registrar Matt Telin is retiring Dec. 29. "Over 72,000 degrees have been granted from this institution. As registrar, I will have certified over 40,000 of those," Telin said. "I've been around long enough that sons and daughters of former students are now registering."

Telin has seen the University of Idaho reach two major registration milestones. Enrollment has exceeded the 10,000 mark and graduation has topped 2,000 per year.

Telin came here as the assistant registrar in 1968 and became registrar in 1970. At that time, registration was a two-day event that took place in Memorial Gym right before classes began for the semester.

"Students would go around to the department tables and pick up class permits cards for each class," Telin said.

The class permit cards and the student's permit card were IBM punch cards with holes punched out for each number. To formulate class lists, the cards were "game punched" into the computer.

The first one-day arena registration was held in the ASUI Kibbie Dome upon its completion in 1975, Telin said.

The punch cards were replaced with optical scan sheets. Three years later, they used course selection sheets which were then key-punched into the computer.

The next big change was to get registration out of the arena-style process where students had to go around to department tables.

Student user-friendly computer registration began in 1989. Using existing campus computers, the program was up and running in six weeks with no capital investment, Telin said.

UI, University of Iowa and Georgia Tech were the first schools in the country to allow students to go to terminals to register, he said. The schools did not know that the others were doing the same thing at the time.

"We were the first school in the country to have both computer and touch-tone registration," Telin said. "We've had a lot of schools model their registration after us." Telephone registration began in 1991.

The UI system can concurrently handle 90 students registering on computer and 16 registering on the phone, Telin said. Students registering by phone take an average of just over three minutes.

"If I have any claim to fame, it's bringing registration into the electronic age," he said.

Telin has seen a lot of changes, not only in registration, but also in students. He remembers the 1970s as a decade of activism inspired by the Vietnam War and Kent State.

Someone firebombed the Navy building here and burned the National Guard Armory in Lewiston. Hundreds of other students rallied behind the university and serenaded President Hartung at his home.

This was followed by an era of apathy in the 1980s, Telin said. "Students wouldn't react to anything."

"I think they're questioning more, challenging more. They're asking 'Why?' more. It's quite positive.

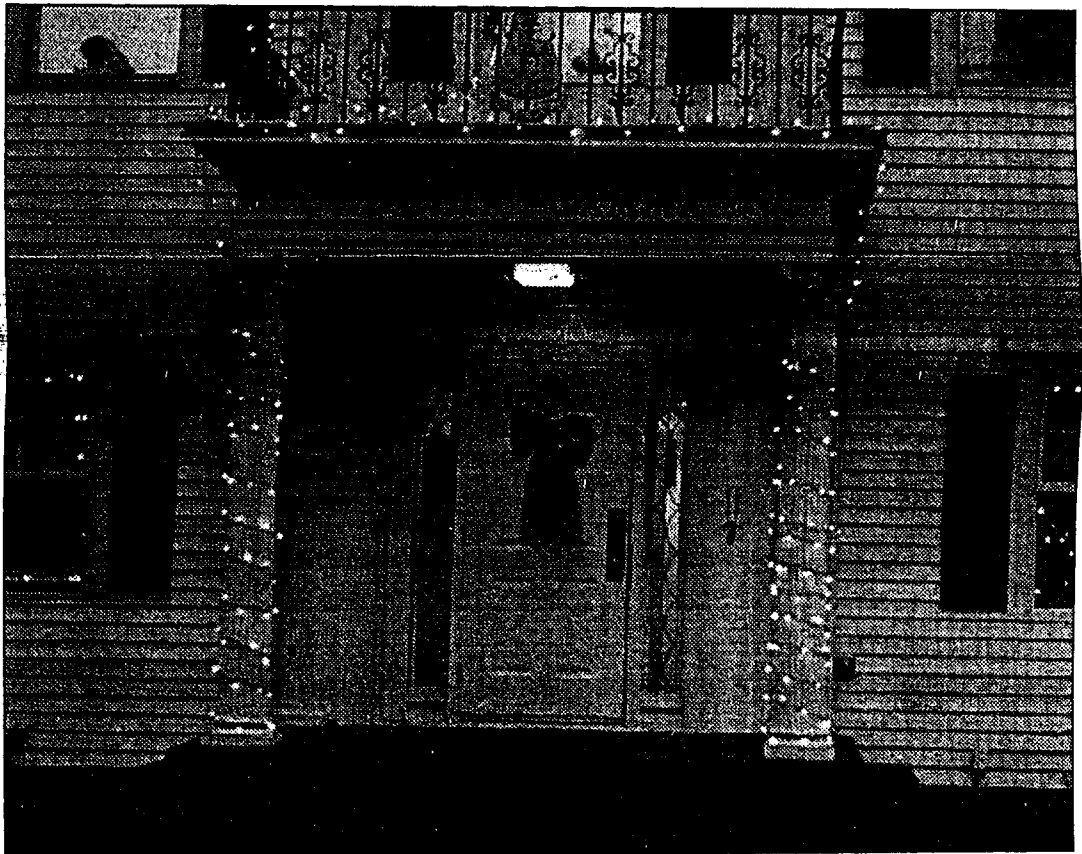
Apathy isn't good for anybody," he said.

"The best part of the university is the students—that's why we're here. Sometimes we lose sight of that. We get caught up in the bureaucratic process," Telin said.

Asked about his plans after December, Telin said, "I'm not looking for work. I'm going to smell the roses."

He plans to tour the Mexican Baja in February with his wife, Karen.

Delta Sigma Phi wins awards at national convention

The men of Delta Sigma Phi fraternity came back from national convention with several awards. Three representatives from the University of Idaho chapter of Delta Sigma Phi went to

Orlando, Florida over Thanksgiving break to attend the 50th Biennial convention of their national fraternity.

John Carpenter, the new president of Delta Sigs, Brett Jones the fraternity's treasurer and John Drake the Delta Sigs vice-president from last year brought back several presti-

gious awards.

Carpenter said, "We're pretty pleased. It's a good indicator of our success in the community's eyes, we were pleased to bring them back."

One award the local Delta Sigs brought back was a third place award from the March of Dimes, the Delta Sigs national philanthropy, for their work in behalf of the March of Dimes.

"It was a pretty prestigious award," said Carpenter.

Carpenter said they won the award because of how much money they have raised over the last two years and for the format they use for raising the money.

They just like the way our philanthropy works and it's also because we've been doing it for so long," he said.

The Delta Sigs have held the Bike to Boise event every spring since the early 1980s. It has raised between \$5,000 to \$10,000 for the March of Dimes.

The Delta Sigs also won an academic award called the Pyramid of

Academic Achievement which is the highest category for national academics.

The convention presents this award to chapters with a GPA three tenths above the men's average on their respective campuses. Out of the 150 Delta Sigma Phi chapters, approximately 10 won this award.

The chapter was also recognized for membership recruitment for last year. The fraternity has 31 new pledges this year and will probably earn an award for this year at the 1997 convention.

The chapter also was recognized twice more at convention for academics over the last two years.

One undergraduate member and one alumni also won awards at the national convention. John Drake won an award for his achievements in IFC and Charles Hudson, the chapter's Alumni Control Board treasurer, won an award from the Grand Council for his long time service to the chapter.

The local chapters advisor, Charles G. Bartell has an award named after him for outstanding

chapter advisor which he presents at each biennial convention.

"It's fun to see Charles Bartell give his award out," said Carpenter.

Carpenter also said, "I think we were eligible for, and had a good shot at winning, the Pyramid of Excellence. More than likely we'll get it at the next convention." The Pyramid of Excellence is the highest award given to chapters from nationals.

"I felt coming from a fraternity centralized in the east coast we represented the west very well. We brought a lot of good ideas with us, I know our presence was felt," Carpenter said about the national convention.

Brett Jones said, "I thought it was a good thing to attend, especially for us. We're a strong chapter and we can provide a lot of help for small chapters that are struggling."

The Delta Sigs are looking forward to next spring and their Bike to Boise philanthropic event which will be held in March or April and will benefit the March of Dimes.

Batt faces protesters, supporters in Burley

BURLEY, Idaho—Gov. Phil Batt found some detractors and some supporters of his nuclear waste deal as he met with Burley residents.

A half-dozen sign-toting protesters were on hand Wednesday at the Burley Inn when the Republican governor addressed local civic leaders.

"If you find it necessary to shoot the messenger, I can't say I'll be happy. But I'll hold my head high because I'm proud of what I've done," Batt said, maintaining he forced the issue of finding a permanent national storage site for radioactive waste.

The governor said he protected Idaho by negotiating what he called a legally binding document that limits spent fuel shipments into the state and creates a scheme for removing most waste from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory during the next 40 years.

One of the protesters, Twin Falls podiatrist Dr. Peter Rickards, has launched a drive to recall Batt. Rickards also is a candidate for the Republican nomination for Idaho's 2nd Congressional District.

Rickards asked Batt why the agreement did not address the issue of plutonium-contaminated waste buried at INEL prior to 1970.

Over 2 million cubic feet of that waste was buried in barrels and boxes at the site, and plutonium particles have been found 240 feet

underground, Rickards said.

Batt said that the buried waste was not part of his negotiations with the Energy Department, covered instead by a 1991 agreement signed by former Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"I'm here to discuss my agreement. It's a separate matter," Batt said, and aside from Rickards comments, there were no other questions from the group of about 60.

Former Gov. John Evans on Wednesday said Batt was in a no-win situation and made the best decision he could with the information he had from federal officials.

But, Evans said, "I just doubt very much they'll be able to fulfill their agreements."

The former governor claimed federal officials were not honest to him when they brought in the remains of the melted reactor core from the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant which went through a partial meltdown. It was during the Evans administration that hundreds of loads of commercial radioactive waste from a Colorado power plant were also dumped at INEL.

Idaho Republican to observe elections

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho—Former Idaho Republican Party chairman Blake Hall is heading to a section of Siberia known for high unemployment, high crime and December low temperatures of 60 degrees below zero.

Rather than an Idaho Democrat's pipe dream, Hall is on a fact-finding mission.

Hall will join two dozen other Americans in Russia this week, to observe that nation's parliamentary elections on Sunday. The American delegation will then make recommendations to the new

Russian republic, to help run elections more smoothly in the future.

"They recognize that it's important, that they're so new at this process of free and open elections," Hall said. "It gives them an independent view of the proceedings."

The elections could be a lot more complicated than a typical American vote.

First of all, Hall expects the turnout for Russia's elections to be extremely high: a carryover from the days when citizens were required to vote in the Communist Soviet Union's one-party elections.

Second, the elections to fill 450 parliament spots are a free-for-all. Forty-three political parties are qualified for the ballot.

"No one knows what they are, kind of like here," said Hall, an Idaho Falls attorney.

Suspect in shooting arrested in New York

NAMPA, Idaho—New York police have arrested a man Nampa authorities believe was involved in the Aug. 6 shooting death of 16-year-old Augustine Hernandez.

New York officers stopped Antonio Flores, 24, on Sunday night and arrested him on an outstanding warrant from Idaho. Nampa Detective Chris Klein said he does not know how soon Flores will be returned.

Klein added he hopes questioning Flores will lead police to the second suspect, Jose Antonio Arevaldo, 22, of Nampa, also known as Arturo Magana.

Police believe Flores and Arevaldo entered the Hernandez home in Nampa late Aug. 6 and opened fire, killing Augustine Hernandez and wounding his brother and a friend.

The shooting was likely the result of a fight that started in Caldwell the night before, police said.

FDA orders casino laser lights shut down in Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS—The laser lights that beckon and dazzle visitors to Las Vegas flashed once too often when they temporarily blinded a Southwest Airlines pilot taking off from the airport.

So the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, fearing a plane crash, has banned the nightly laser light shows put on by the city's world-famous casinos.

The concentrated light beams have been blamed for 51 incidents in the last two years involving flights in and out of three Las Vegas-area airports.

The temporary blinding of Southwest Airlines pilot Shelby LaCroix on Oct. 30 was the most serious incident yet. It forced the co-pilot of the Boeing 737 to take control while LaCroix struggled to regain his sight. At the time, the plane was climbing out of McCarran International Airport.

"Had it hit me and the other pilot simultaneously, I shudder to think what would have happened," LaCroix said.

On Monday, the FDA, which regulates laser beams, sent a letter to a half dozen Las Vegas casinos telling them to shut off their colorful displays until further notice.

Hotels complied immediately while holding out some hope that the laser lights could be used in a modified way.

Husband believes his former male lover murdered his wife

CHICAGO—A man battling his children over his murdered wife's multimillion-dollar estate admitted he had discussions with his former male lover, a part-time German model, about hiring a hitman to kill her.

"Isn't it true you said in front of Helmut Hofer you wished your wife was dead and you would like to hire a hitman?" asked Kimball Anderson, an attorney for Dean Olds' wife's estate.

"Yes, probably," Olds replied.

Olds for the first time in open court on Monday told estate lawyers that he now believes his former lover, Helmut Carsten Hofer, bludgeoned Suzanne Olds to death.

Olds, however, resisted suggestions he was involved. During sworn statements taken Saturday, Olds invoked his constitutional right against self-incrimination when asked if he was responsible for his wife's death.

On Dec. 28, 1993, Suzanne Olds, was found bludgeoned to death at the couple's home in suburban Wilmette. Hofer, 26, was tried and acquitted for the crime. He then returned to Germany.

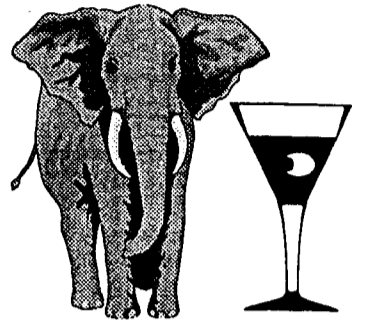
Olds, 66, has never been charged in the killing, and prosecutors refuse to say whether they consider him a suspect. But in civil court, where the standard of proof is lower than in criminal court, attorneys worked to prove Olds had a role in the slaying.

"I knew he was a prime suspect, and the police interrogated him, but I did not ask him if he did it," Olds said.

Elephants raid village in search of liquor



NEW DELHI, India—Attracted by the smell of freshly brewed liquor, five thirsty elephants raided a remote tribal village in northeastern India, smashing huts and crushing one man to death.

The incident occurred Sunday night at Simbulbari, 430 miles north of Calcutta.

The elephants tried to get to the vats of the warm brew, but villagers beat drums and ran after the animals with flaming torches, said Keshav Pradhan, a reporter in Siliguri.

"The elephants got angry and smashed eight wooden shacks," he said. One villager was crushed before the elephants returned to nearby forests.

Elephants frequently raid villages in search of liquor and food. India's 20,000 wild elephants are protected by law and cannot be killed until declared a rogue.

Leaky reactor could be shut down for up to two years

TOKYO—An experimental nuclear reactor that leaked highly corrosive coolant could be shut down for up to two years if its operators find more leaks and have to change its design, officials said Tuesday.

Engineers shut down the \$5.9 billion "Monju" breeder reactor in Tsuruga, 210 miles west of Tokyo, after two to three tons of radioactive liquid sodium leaked Friday night and began to burn.

"We don't think that we can get a go-ahead from local governments any time in the near future," said Ken Maruoka, spokesman of the Power Reactor and Nuclear Fuel Development Corp., the government corporation that owns the troubled reactor.

The Asahi Shimbun newspaper quoted an unidentified official of the corporation who said that if the reactor's operators decide they need to change its design, that could take up to two years.

Local officials in Tsuruga have demanded that the Science and Technology Agency examine that possibility. Protesters at a weekend rally in Tokyo called for the government to scrap the reactor altogether.

It was running at 40 percent capacity when the sodium leaked Friday from a secondary cooling system, far from the core. The government's Nuclear Safety Commission has called the incident "very serious."

Japan, which relies heavily on imported oil, is the only country in the world pursuing the technology to build fast-breeder reactors which produce more plutonium than they consume.

Simmons takes over Provost office during interim period

Dr. George M. Simmons recently took over the office of University of Idaho provost on an interim basis. The provost of the university is the chief academic officer reporting directly to the president.

The provost chairs the Academic Deans' Counsel and is involved with the overall management of the university. Simmons attended UI in 1965 and 1966 acquiring a Bachelors and Masters degree in Chemical Engineering. He also receiving his Ph.D. in Chemical Engineering from Stanford University.

Simmons has been involved in numerous research projects. He has studied the establishment and evaluation of new retention strategies, concentrating on the freshman year experience. The development of prediction strategy for academic success based on student admission standards and several projects dealing with chemical engineering.

Simmons has been no stranger to public service. Recently he has served as chair of the Executive Education Committee for the Association of Western Universities. He has also served on the Advisory Board for the North Idaho Business Technology Center in Moscow, Idaho and been a vice chair and member of the Board of Directors of Arts for Idaho. Simmons also is a member of the Idaho Chapter of Kiwanis International. The UI Circle K, which is a college division of Kiwanis, has greatly appreciated Dr. Simmons help in getting the program off to a good start.

Simmons was also a recipient of the Kellogg National Fellowship Program. He was selected as one of 45 people from a field of approximately 1,000 to participate in a three year program with a focus on leadership and professional development with international input. Topics covered by the fellowship program ranged from conflict resolution, higher education structure and student retention strategies. The Argonaut interviewed Dr. Simmons and this is what he had to say:

Argonaut: What accomplishments do you hope to achieve during your time as Provost?

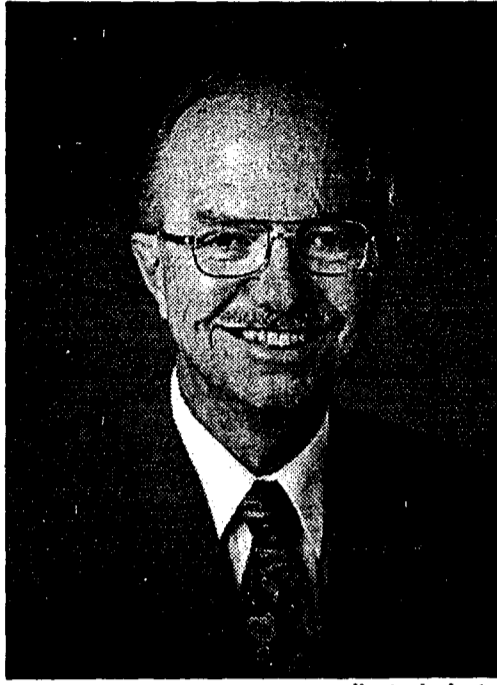
Simmons: Three main things. I want to create a better environment for multi-cultural students. The UI needs to be more attractive to students who come from minority backgrounds. I want to do a better job for them, create programs that would benefit them as well as provide an environment where all of our students can learn from one another.

Secondly, I would like to see more students graduate in a more timely manner. Right now our graduation rate is 50 percent. I would like to see our graduation rate around 65 percent.

Third, the university must continue to expand its services throughout the state, using all methods of delivery. We must participate in the regional and national delivery of academic programs and degrees.

Argonaut: What did you think about the recent state Board of Education's move with respect to Engineering?

Simmons: I didn't agree with the decision, however, we must move

forward and do what's best for out students.

Argonaut: The proposed new University Center in the center of campus and the UI Recreation Center, what is your position on those two new structures?

Simmons: I believe they are both necessary. The University Center is an opportunity for us to develop a central place for the students, faculty and community to come together.

The University Center would pull us together. The proposed recreation center is also very important. Healthy lifestyles and physical well being are extremely important. In

order to be academically prepared, one also needs to be healthy. I am quite confident that both of these facilities will be developed.

Argonaut: What about the move to the Big West Athletic Conference?

Simmons: It was a tough decision for the UI to make. I believe we made the right call. We will have better competition and a different set of schools. I'm looking forward to it.

Argonaut: Where do you see this university in 10 years?

Simmons: Still a very strong residential campus. Students coming from high school to the university are entering a residential system, whether Greek, off-campus or in the residence halls they are picking up their stakes and coming to study—that requires a big commitment.

I would also see the UI making progress in delivering its programs state wide.

Class attendance and grades correlated

A recent study concluding that a direct relationship exists between student attendance and grades was the focus of a recent UI Roundtable meeting for faculty in the Student Union Building. The survey used information collected from four universities including: UI, WSU, Ohio State University and Perdue and was based on 1993 enrollment statistics of 400 students.

Statistical findings, the basis of the 1993 study by UI Professors,

Stephen Devadoss and John Foltz, point to a number of factors that can lead students to receive poor grades. Among them were the motivation of the student, the skills of the teacher and course work and absenteeism. The upside, said Foltz, is that students that attend all of their classes can expect a gain of 0.6 percent which can translate to a higher grade those for students trying to close the gap between a C+ and a B, or a B+ and an A.

Students missing class, said Devadoss, is especially a problem during special events, such as

Homecoming and near holidays or vacations.

"When students don't come to classes it puts additional demands on the teacher," said Devadoss. "Teachers have to repeat the same questions over and over."

Another problem caused by excessive absences, said Devadoss, is the damage it causes to the overall learning environment.

"Attendance affects the dynamic nature of the classroom and makes students and instructors feel uncomfortable," said Devadoss.

Some other findings of the study

were more surprising than others. One example was relationship between the amount of time students study and the grades that they receive. According to the study, grades do not increase as students study longer. While the numbers of actual hours studied were self-reported and could be biased, said Foltz, there doesn't more studying doesn't necessarily equal better grades. Foltz related his own experience in a chemistry class to the experiences of many students.

Buy your textbooks early to get best prices

The best time to get books from the University Bookstore is right after the first of the year said Larry Martin, assistant manager of books at the University of Idaho Bookstore.

In January, the bookstore expects a larger percentage of used textbooks to be available to students.

Used textbook availability has gone up approximately 16 percent since 1993-1994

school year. In 1993-1994, 25 percent of the total textbooks were used. Forty-one percent of the textbooks sold in the Fall were used.

"The average textbook costs from \$50 to \$75," explained Martin, "But if the textbook is purchased used it could only cost from \$35-\$50."

Engineering and science courses have some of the highest priced books at the bookstore and English and history courses are some of the lowest priced textbooks.

Lower division courses have more used textbooks available because there are more

students enrolled in the courses said Martin. When students sell back their books, the bookstore has a supply of used textbooks to sell students the following semester.

Upper division courses do not have as many used books available because more students are keeping their books for on the job reference.

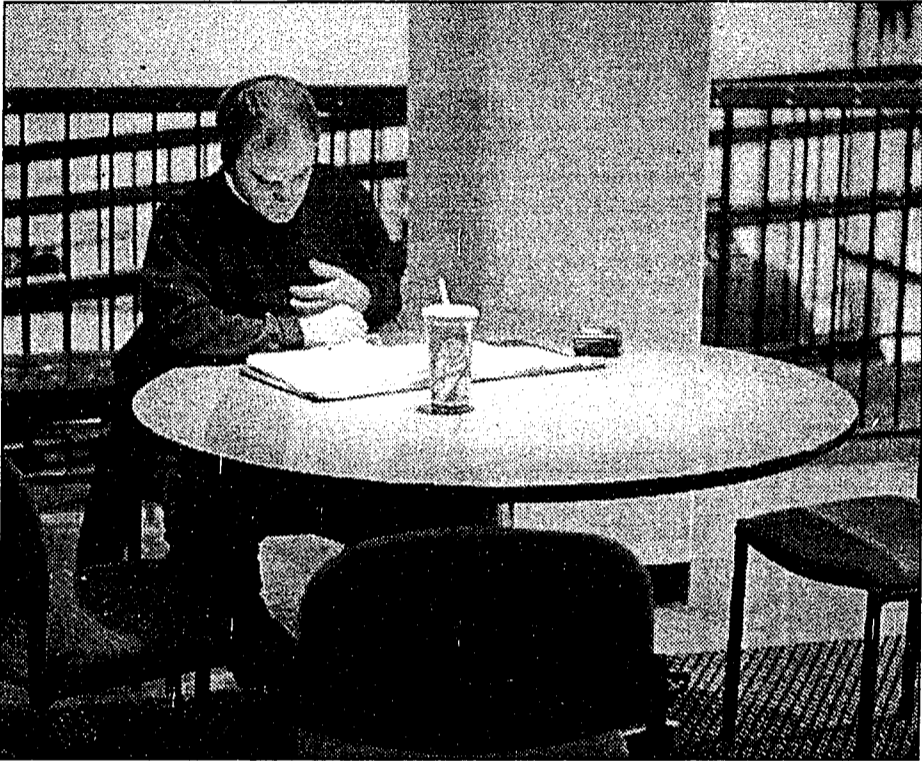
"Used books will be re-purchased at 75 percent of the price the students bought them for," said Martin. "Although some books won't be taken back, Nebraska (the textbook wholesaler) may give students some money

for those books."

Nebraska is the biggest used textbook wholesaler the UI Bookstore buys from. Over 10,000 used books are purchased from Nebraska every year said Carolyn Moore, clerical textbook specialist at the University Bookstore.

The Bookstore is buying back textbooks, Dec.16 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Dec.18 through Dec. 23 from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. To get the best buy back price from the bookstore students need to sell back early.

Kappa Sigma nominated to national historic register

The University of Idaho Kappa Sigma house may be included in a national list of historic buildings, said Pam Peterson, liaison for the Latah County Historic Preservation Commission.

Official notification will be issued next June regarding the inclusion of the Kappa Sigma house in the National Register of Historic Places.

The National Register of Historic Places is part of a 1966 federal act which authorized the National Parks Service to record a list of historic places around the country. In order to gain admission to the list, a site must be over 50 years old and have significance to either the community or a famous individual, Peterson said.

Kappa Sigma holds the first charter granted to an Idaho fraternity from a national organization, which occurred in 1905. The neoclassical house at 918 Blake Street is the oldest standing fraternity house on the UI campus, built in 1916. Kappa Sigma celebrated its 90th anniversary this year.

UI student Michael Sommese first became interested in the listing of Kappa Sigma.

"I worked in summer theater in Michigan, and the theater where I worked had a sign out in front that it was a historical building, and it was only 50 years old. I realized our house would be 80 years old in 1996," he said.

Sommese approached the Latah County Historical Society about the listing of Kappa Sigma and received money to hire Washington State University graduate students Liza Rognas and Erika Kuhlman to write and research the application. The application is now being reviewed by the Idaho Historical Society and notification will not occur for several months. Peterson expects the application to be successful because of the "close association of the fraternity structure with Idaho history."

"It is quite a thing to have your fraternity mentioned in the archives in Washington DC., as contributing to the historic character of our country," Peterson said.

"There's no reward for being on the

After difficult year, U.S. apple growers again in Japan

TOKYO—After getting only a small slice of the Japanese market in their first season, U.S. apple growers are trying again.

But they have a major problem to overcome: Many Japanese consumers don't seem to think Washington state Delicious apples live up to their name.

"They look beautiful but they taste bad," Tokyo grocery store owner Shoji Iwasaki said Tuesday as Washington apples officially went on sale in Japan for their second season.

Last January was the first time American apples went on sale in Japan since Tokyo lifted a decades-old ban on the fruit. Encouraged by heavy media coverage, Japanese flocked to their supermarkets and bought around 7,000 tons of apples in just a month.

But then the U.S. fortunes turned sour. Customers complained that Washington apples didn't have the sweet, juicy taste of their Japanese competitors.

U.S. growers also failed to seize a price advantage, as Japanese growers fought back by selling at a discount less-than-perfect apples that previously would have been turned into apple juice.

The result was a plunge in sales during February and March. By the time the season ended March 31, only 9,000 tons were sold, well below original projections of 12,000-15,000 tons.

This time U.S. apple officials are scaling down expectations by not giving a target figure, and they're tailoring the fruit closer to what Japanese seem to want.

"The Japanese consumer definitely has a sweet tooth," said Brent Evans, Asia marketing director for the Washington Apple Commission.

He said it's easy to make apples sweeter by leaving them on the tree a few weeks longer, and that's what Washington growers have done this year.

Another factor that may have turned Japanese buyers off was the waxing that Washington growers add to give apples a bright red sheen.

To Japanese eyes, Evans said, the waxed U.S. apples may have looked unnaturally shiny, almost like candy. This time, many of the apples being imported aren't waxed.

"It's fair to think of the Red Delicious apples this year as a completely different product from the ones you ate last year," said Jimmy Uehara, a Washington apple official in Tokyo.

But the lingering bad taste is having an impact. Daiei, Japan's biggest supermarket chain, sold 1,400 tons of U.S. apples last season after setting a target of 1,900 tons. This time, said spokeswoman Haruko Toyama, it only plans to sell 490 tons.

"We sold them last year, but we're not going to do so this year," said Seiki Sasaki, the owner of a

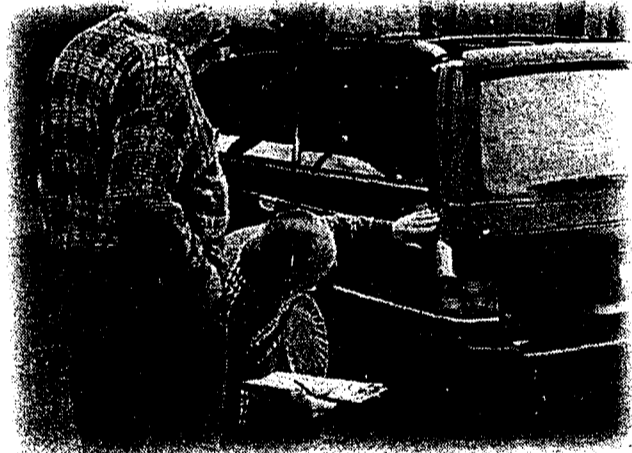

Money tips to help you survive the crunch of school, holidays

Essential News for Women, and the Men Who Care About Them

Ninety percent of American women will sooner or later manage their money solo. In an era when job security, salary hikes, marriage longevity, health care and other benefits are uncertain, it is necessary for women to be financially adept.

Currently, women live longer, save less, and invest more conservatively than their male counterparts. Women save about half the amount men save and prefer the safe but low paying investments, such as certificates of deposit. For many women, careers are interrupted by child rearing, thus pension benefits and earnings are reduced. Though more women are becoming financially savvy, women generally do not earn as much as their male counterparts and many are in lower paying jobs.

Where to begin? Work hard to earn money, spend less than you earn, save regularly (even a dollar is better than nothing), become knowledgeable about investing (read Money, Smart Money, Working Woman; talk to those who invest, join an investment club, look for classes on money management such as spring's FCS 346

Personal and Family Finance and Management).

It is important that women today become financially adept. And may the men who care about women—dad, brother, son, spouse, boyfriend, teacher, neighbor—encourage and assist them.

Pay Yourself First

Financial advisors consistently encourage Americans to pay themselves first by regularly putting money aside to save or invest.

Why? Savings is important for a variety of situations such as emergency expenses, annual expenses such as income taxes, Christmas/birthday gifts and for relocating after college. Could you come up with \$3,000 in a few days—without using a credit card or borrowing? A Wall Street Journal/NBC News poll indicated 71 percent of 18 to 24 year olds and 51 percent of 35 to 49 year olds could not. Ann Diamond, author of *Fear of Finance*, counsels, "You have to treat saving...as part of your basic monthly expenses."

Locally, First Federal Bank of Idaho offers a 2-year Add-On certificate of deposit, currently paying 6 percent simple interest (6.14 annual percentage yield). For \$100 you can purchase this CD. Any amount can be deposited at any time. Any withdrawal will be charged 3 months interest but only on the amount withdrawn. Compared to a savings account

earning 3.25 percent simple interest, the Add-On CD will benefit you if you keep the funds in it 7 months or longer. If you don't have \$100 available, a savings account can be opened at Global Federal Credit Union or Latah Federal Credit Union for a very small amount. Inquire about their membership criteria. A suggestion is begin a savings account, sacrifice non-essentials, deposit that "sacrificial" money into your saving account. When the account reaches \$125 arrange for a \$100 Add-On CD. Keep adding your "sacrificial" money to your CD.

Treat savings as one of your regular monthly expenses. You'll be glad you paid yourself first!

Debit Cards are not credit cards

Though they look alike, don't confuse debit cards with credit cards. A debit card is issued by your financial institution. A debit card debits or withdraws the amount of purchase from your checking or savings account immediately. You may already use a debit card at automated teller machines, but you can arrange to use them at grocers and most businesses that take credit cards.

In contrast, credit cards delay your payment. They are available from retail businesses (such as K-Mart and Chevron) and financial institutions. The vast majority of

the 25,000 financial institutions that issue credit cards are affiliated with Visa International or the Interbank Card Association, which issues MasterCard. Though you may bank at a local financial institution, you may choose to apply for a credit card from an out of state financial institution. For a list of banks offering credit cards with low finance charges, send \$1, check or money order, to BankCard Holders of America, 560 Herndon Parkway, Suite 120, Herndon, VA 22070. Request "Low Interest Rate List." The March, 1995, issue of *Money* available at the UI Library, lists several banks with low interest credit cards.

age prime rate in 1980 was 15.26 percent. In 1992 it was 6.25 percent.

Inserted in a recent issue of the Argonaut was an application for a Discover credit card. A section of the application was titled Important INFORMATION, variable rate information. It stated: "Your Annual Percentage Rate (APR) may vary. The rate is determined for each billing period by the highest Prime Rate reported in The Wall Street Journal on the last business day of the previous month plus a fixed amount of percentage points as follows: Initial year and Best Rate—Prime Rate plus 8.9 percentage points..."

A variable interest rate on your credit card will mean an APR which can change monthly. If you carry credit card debt from month to month, rising prime rates will mean increasing interest costs to you. If you carry a balance from month to month you may want to shop for a fixed APR rate. A recent Visa credit card application from First USA Bank featured a fixed APR of 5.9 percent until March 1, 1996, at which time a 13.99 percent fixed APR would be effective. Prime rate: It can make a difference!

Prime Rate: It can make a difference on your credit card bill!

Prime rate is a type of interest rate frequently associated with credit card information. It is the rate that banks charge large corporations. It tends to be an industry wide rate with most banks quoting the same prime rate at any given time. Second, the prime rate is variable or fluctuates. The annual aver-

national register, just a sense of pride and the realization that they're one of six buildings on campus that are national register buildings. That's a prestigious list to be included with."

"It's real nice," Sommes said about the nomination. "We all have a good feeling for our house and we've won national awards for the appearance of it, but it's nice to be recognized by the state." Sommes

hopes to get a plaque to commemorate the listing.

Several other buildings on the UI campus have been listed to the register, Peterson explained. These include Ridenbaugh Hall, registered in 1977; Memorial Gymnasium and the Administration Building, registered in 1978; the UI Gymnasium and Armory, listed in 1983 and the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity House, listed in 1993.

"Either they just seem to get it or they don't...I would sometimes just sit there and stare at the page," said Foltz.

During the discussion Foltz and Devadoss encouraged instructors to follow a number of suggestions that were not covered by the study, drawing quips from some of faculty members. When Foltz suggested that instructors "employ humor and levity" in the classroom, one instructor asked if humor was one of the subjects covered by the analysis, which it was not.

"We are not suggesting that instructors become stand-up comics," said Devadoss "we just think humor can be beneficial," said Devadoss.

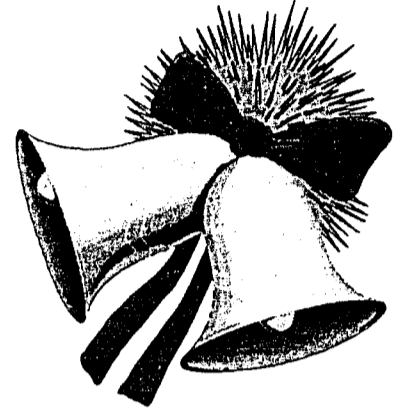
fruit store in Tokyo's Shinjuku district. "Of the people who bought (U.S. apples) last year, not a single one came back to buy again."

Washington officials also still find it difficult to compete on price. Daiei is selling a 7.7-ounce apple for 78 yen (about 77 cents) but it's possible to buy a much larger Japanese apple in a bag of four or six for around 100 yen (or just under \$1) apiece.

"We're kind of at the mercy of importers," said Evans. "We'd love to get the product here as cheaply as possible."

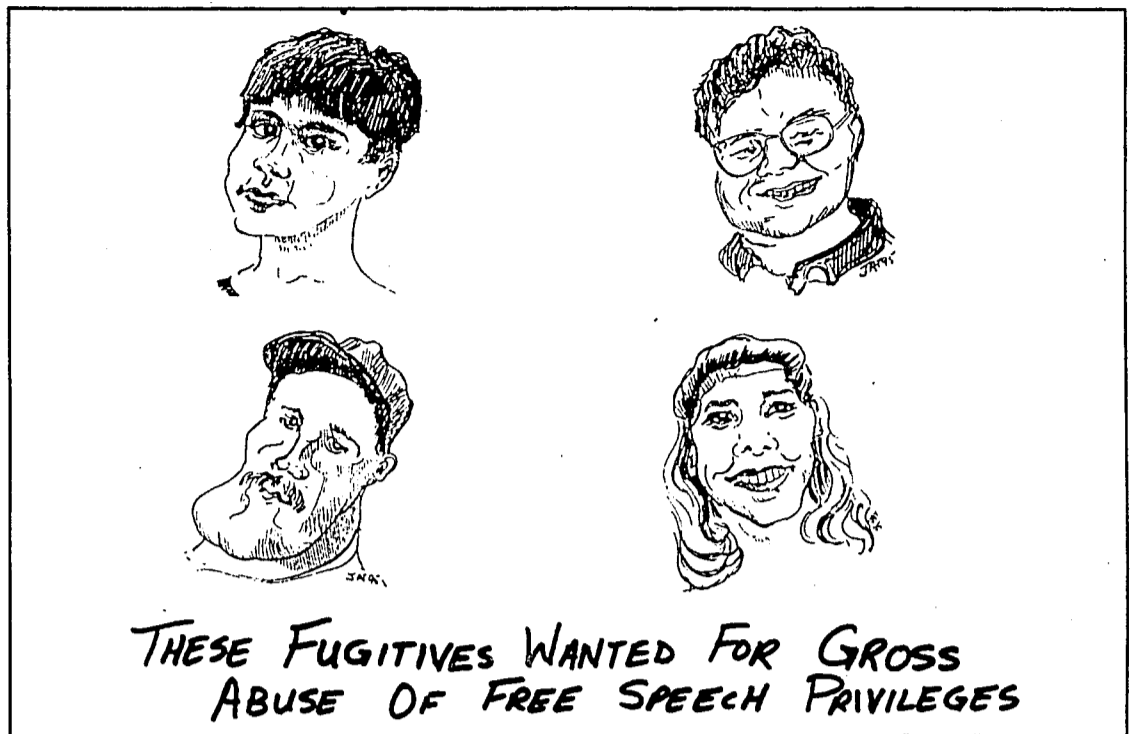

Help end the slaughter

Each day 10,000 human babies are born in the United States, and each day over 70,000 puppies and kittens are born: as long as the birth rates of companion animals (cats and dogs) are of such staggering proportions, there will never be enough homes for all of them.

In February, 1994, the Washington State Senate passed a resolution calling for a voluntary, one year moratorium on the "casual indiscriminate or unplanned breeding of cats and dogs," in our state. This resolution, supported by us, the Companion Animal Aid and Placement Society (CAAPS), was introduced by Senator Sylvia Skratek.

The reported number of dogs and cats put to death in U.S. shelters in one year exceeds 30 million. Of course, this number needs to be viewed as a minimum because many shelters did not respond to the survey on which this report is based.

Many puppies, kittens, dogs and cats die outside the shelters (Cat Fancy, Apr. 1993). Homeless companion animals roam urban and

rural areas. They die of disease, starvation, in traffic accidents, are prey to other animals or are killed by humans. This mass killing of innocent companion animals, most of which were young and healthy, must be stopped. Pet overpopulation can be avoided.

Firstly, people, including very young children, must be made aware of the enormity of this tragedy, which is preventable. Pets must be neutered. They should not be allowed to breed even once. Neutering will solve the enormous overpopulation. It also lowers the odds of breast cancer, prostate problems and decreases roaming and attendant accidents.

I would like to appeal to the national consciousness of all breeders with the plea to stop breeding for at least one year.

Shelters are overcrowded with the victims of a society where everything and everybody is disposable. One of these companion animals could be your best friend. Until there are no more healthy pets put to death in our shelters, adopt one of our companion animals.

CAAPS is continuously assisting in these efforts. We find homes for wonderful companion animals, small and large, young and old, healthy and recovering from injuries.



Help the non-game animals

I am representing the University of Idaho Wildlife Society student chapter as the project leader for the Teaming with Wildlife initiative. This initiative would add a user fee to outdoor goods such as tents, sleeping bags, hiking boots and outdoor camera equipment. This money would then be distributed to the states based upon a land area and population formula.

Currently non-game funding is raised through specialized license plates, check-offs on tax return forms and individual donations. Although this generates some money, it is not substantial and unpredictable. Programs cannot be maintained because of the fluctuation in incoming money.

The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Enhancement Act is modeled after two previous acts: the Pittman-Robertson for game animals and the Dingle-Johnson for game fish. Game species receive money from a tax on firearms, hunting gear and fishing gear.

The fee would benefit all people who purchase outdoor products through educational projects, habitat research and improvement, recreational facilities and a preservation of non-game animals enjoyed in non-consumptive uses.

Support by consumers is imperative to success. Writing letters to outdoor industries is highly important as well as contacting congressional representatives.

But this isn't the point I'm trying to make. For those of you who believe in Christ, I urge you to step outside of the Christmas norms our

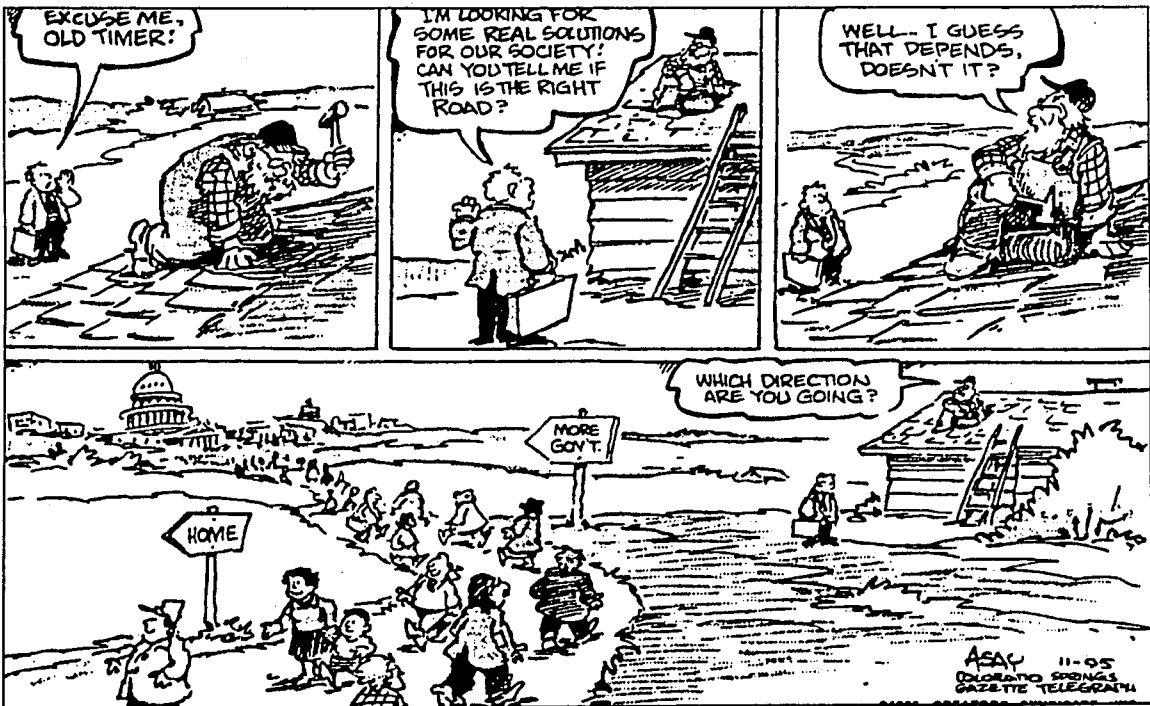
society seems to have set up.

Oleson receives Idaho Writer-in-Residence Award

After assaulting the reading community for over 25 years with a multitude of short stories, poetry, essays, novels and other work, Director of Creative Writing Lance Oleson has received Idaho's highest literary award, the Idaho Writer-in-Residence.

The award goes back to 1923 when governor C.C. Moore appointed the first Poet Laureate for life in Idaho. That person was Irene Welch Grissom. She lived until 1946. Then Sudie Stuart Hagger came in and was laureate until 1982 and then the governor decided to appoint a five member panel of Idahoans and three western poets. They recommended that there should be a selection of a writer-in-residence to serve a two year term.

An author has to submit an application including history, publishing record and other pertinent information and a tape of them reading.

"The way somebody gets the award is there is a panel and the writers in Idaho submit work and the panel reads the work anonymously and makes a decision," Oleson said.

Oleson submitted pieces from his soon-to-be-released novel *Burnt* and short fiction.

The panel is made up of published authors.

Oleson was born in New Jersey and raised in Venezuela for a few years, then returned to New Jersey where he spent the rest of his childhood. The genre that Oleson plays within the most is cyberpunk, a break-off from the science-fiction world. Yet he also frequents many other genres and has not strictly adhered to the world of sci-fi.

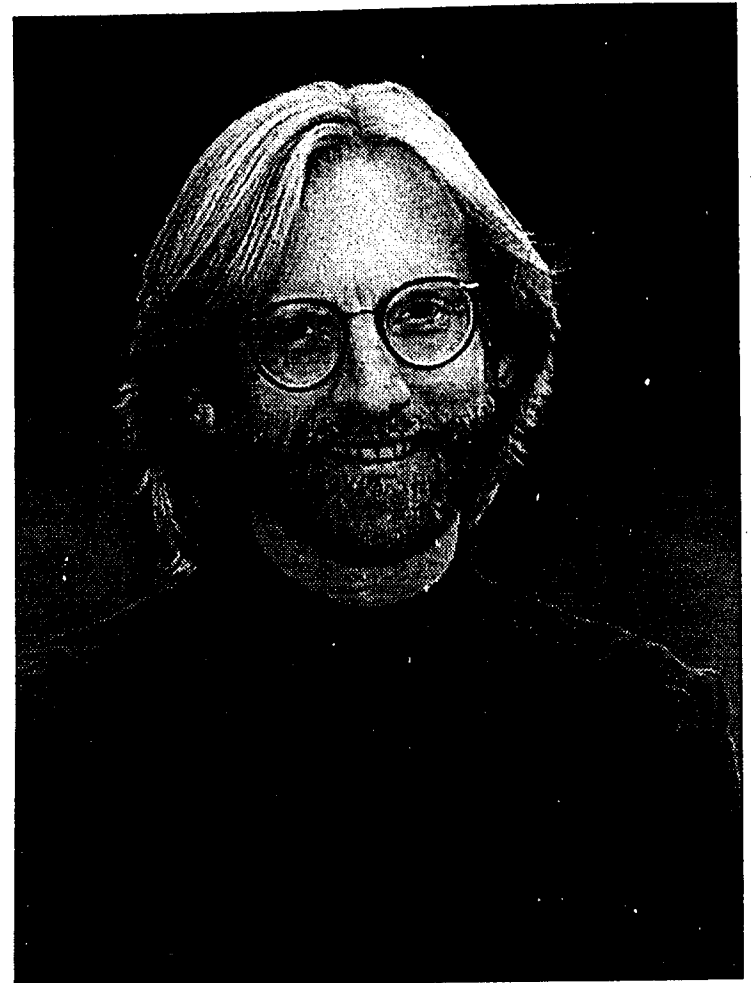
The Idaho Commission on the Arts awards the Writer-in-Residence. It entails numerous readings done by Oleson around the state and a \$10,000 dollar grant. Oleson officially takes over as the Writer-in-Residence on Jan. 1, 1996.

The Writer-in-Residence will be

awarded Dec. 21 in a proclamation made by Governor Phil Batt. The ceremony will be held in the Governor's office in Boise.

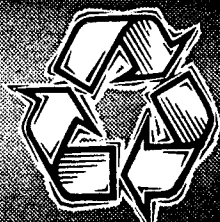
"There is currently an exciting, fresh interest in literature in Idaho which is unprecedented in our state's history. This literature represents the rich diversity of our state in choice of subject, approaches, landscape and division. I believe that arts should be the heart of the culture and these are really tough times for them and I'm delighted to have been selected to be part of this moment," Oleson said.

Oleson is the author of such books as, *Live from Earth* (1991), *My Date with Franz* (1993) and *Tonguing the Zeitgeist* (1994). *Tonguing the Zeitgeist* was a finalist for the Phillip K. Dick award, science-fiction's highest accolade for best science-fiction book. He is also the author of the first literary study of William Gibson, the god-father of cyberpunk, author of *Neuromancer*, *Count Zero* and others.

Cougs squeak out victory at foul line

When you play a basketball game, the outcome is determined on the hardwood or the contest wouldn't be played, or at least this is what's supposed to happen.

When the Vandals took the court Tuesday evening, they were supposed to match their skills against Palouse rival Washington State's, but they forgot to factor in the referees in an NCAA women's basketball 72-71 nonconference loss.

After trailing by as many as 14 during the first half, Idaho put forth another exhibition on rallying, cutting the score to 42-36 at the half. The start of the second half was a direct replica of the first, as Idaho came out shooting poorly and once again finding itself down by double figures at 10. Enter Michelle Greenwood. The Spokane, Wash. native scored six of Idaho's first 11 second half points, including four in a row to cut the Cougar lead to six at 53-47.

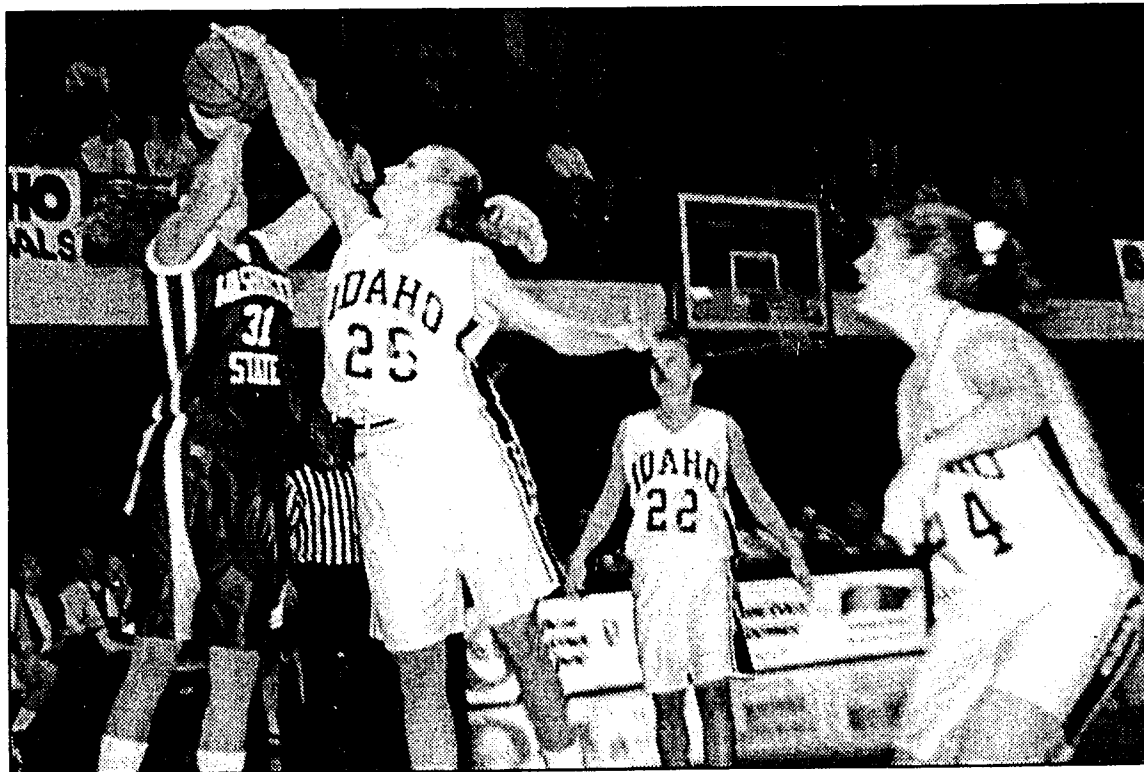
Idaho was down between six and eight points for the majority of the second half, before turning up the defensive pressure to force the Cougars into costly turnovers. Idaho cut the Wazzu lead to three at 71-68 with a 1:12 left in the game. Jade Hyett went to the line for the Cougs with 47 seconds left, but missed the free throw, unfortunately for Idaho the Cougars Jenni Ruff

pulled down the rebound to reset the shot clock for the Cougs. With 26.6 seconds remaining and Washington State University still in control of the ball, Cougar coach Harold Rhodes called a timeout. This timeout allowed Idaho to put together a play for its next possession and that is exactly what it did.

On the inbound pass, Wazzu's Ruff took the ball to the hoop with eight seconds remaining on the shot clock, but missed a layin. Idaho rebounded the ball and moved up the floor quickly to run the play, they were able to set up on the W.S.U. timeout. With what appeared to be a double screen just below the arc, Idaho rubbed Ari Skorpiik free for a 21 footer that hit nothing but the bottom of the net with 6.2 seconds left in the contest.

When Wazzu inbounded, Hyett looked as if she carried the ball, but it was left uncalled. As she penetrated toward the bucket, Greenwood seemed to have great position on defense, but was whistled for a foul with one tenth of a second left on the clock. Hyett went to the line and missed the front end of the two shot foul, but meshed the second to set the final score at 72-71.

Idaho was once again led in scoring by Mindy Rice with 28, followed by Greenwood and Skorpiik with 12 and 11 points respectively. Although Idaho shot a season best 92 percent from the line, it was unable to reach the charity stripe

during the crucial second half.

WSU was led by the play of Ruff. The 5-10 senior from Mossyrock, Wash. tallied 20 points and 11 rebounds while playing brilliantly with four fouls. Kristin Erickson compiled 19 points, while Julie Wight finished out the double figure scoring for the Cougs with 11.

Idaho returns to action Saturday

afternoon when it takes on the Portland Pilots at 3 p.m. in Memorial Gym.

Vandals look for upset in Border Battle

Idaho basketball fans will make a run for the border, but it won't have anything to do with a Taco Bell ad.

Basketball on the Palouse will get a shot in the arm Saturday night when the Idaho Vandals (3-2) make the eight-mile trek to Pullman to face the Washington State Cougars (4-1) in the annual Border Battle at Friel Court. Tipoff is set for 7 p.m.

The Vandals will try to become the first non-PAC-10 foe to hand the Cougars a loss in Pullman since 1989, a span of 26 nonleague games. Incidentally, Idaho was the last out-of-conference opponent to accomplish the feat, picking up a 56-52 triumph on ESPN six years ago. The Vandals also upset the Cougs 87-77 last year in the Kibbie Dome.

"I think it will help them (WSU) psychologically. There's a certain revenge motive," Idaho coach Joe Cravens said. "I think they not only would like to avenge the loss, but they'd like to beat us as bad as they can."

The Cougars roughed up another Big Sky foe earlier this week, dropping the Montana Grizzlies 98-87 Wednesday. Washington State,

which led the nation in field goal percentage last season, shot the ball well against the Griz, connecting on 32-of-58 shots, including 11-16 from three-point land.

"We'd like to get a hand up when they're shooting. We have to keep them from shooting the way they did against Montana," Cravens said. "They create a lot of problems; they're a very talented team."

There is no lack of firepower for the Cougs. Washington State returns its top six scorers from last season's NIT quarterfinal club.

NBA scouts are taking a long look at 6-foot 9-inch Mark Hendrickson. The forward is averaging 17.5 points a game and 10.5 rebounds per contest. Until Wednesday's matchup with Montana, Hendrickson had posted double figures in scoring in 17 straight games. The Mount Vernon, Wash. native led the PAC-10 in field goal percentage last winter and was a first team all-league pick.

Junior guard Isaac Fontaine leads the Cougars in scoring, averaging 19.3 points a game. Another junior, point-guard Donminic Ellison is chipping in 13 points a game. Senior guard Shamon Antrum was the PAC-10's newcomer of the year last sea-

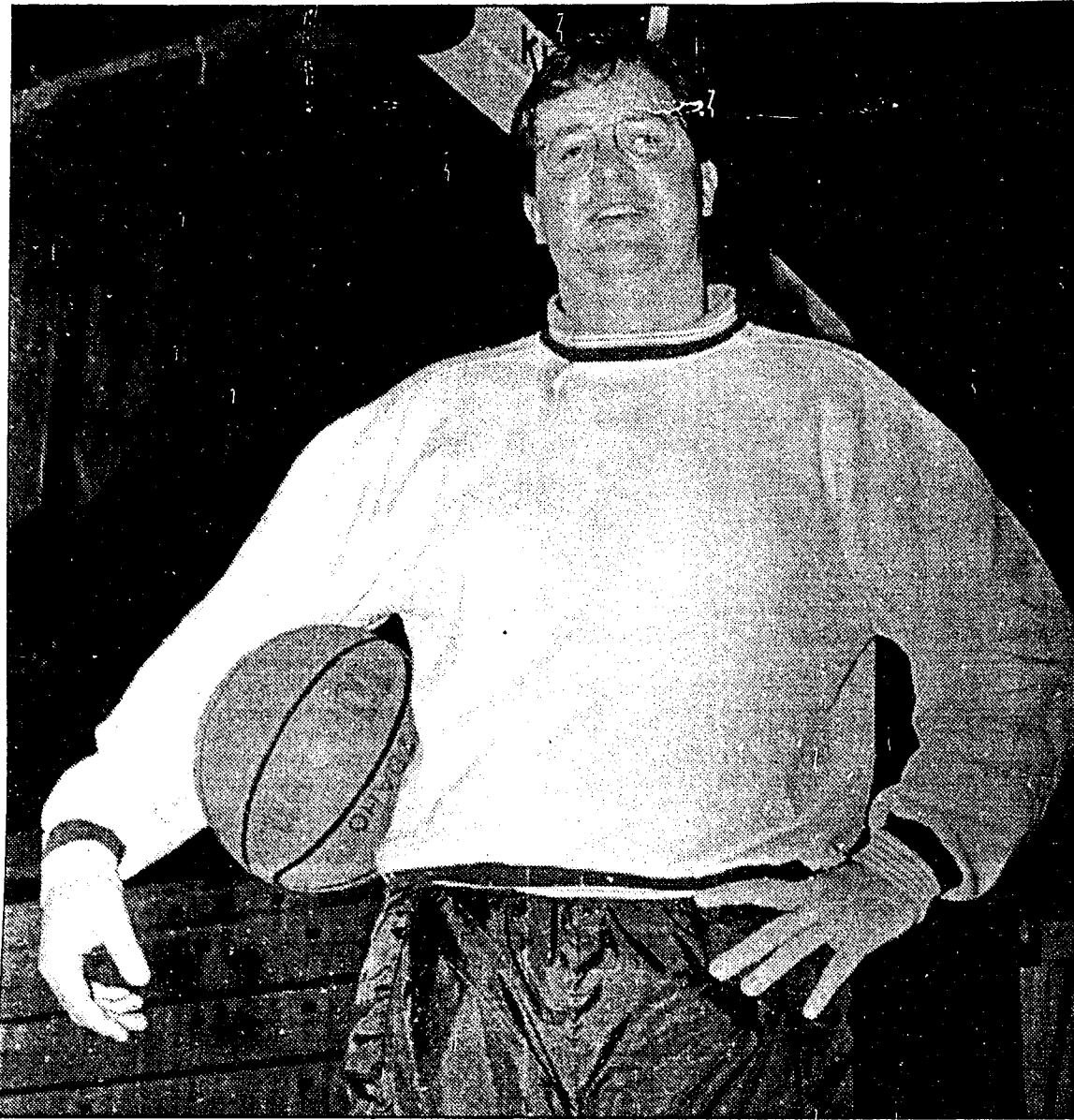

'Quasi-coach' does it all for Idaho hoops

Often times, during a successful basketball season the head coach or a key player will get all of the credit for a winning season, leaving little room for words of congrats to the little guys in the athletic department—little guys like Jason Ficca.

Ficca, a Moscow native, currently holds several different job titles within the University of Idaho basketball program.

"I don't know what the technical job title is for what I do," Ficca said with half a smile. "I don't know if there is one."

Actually, among other things, Ficca's position has been labeled several different ways—including graduate assistant coach, student coach, team manager and administrative assistant.

"The way the rules go nowadays, they don't have any more graduate assistants," Ficca said. "If they had one, I'd be it. I'm basically a quasi-coach, which is a pretty applicable term for what I do."

What Ficca does could be viewed as extraordinary.

Besides being almost an assistant

coach—as far as being down on the floor with the players—Ficca initiates film exchanges and watches films to scout other teams playing. He also manages to do a great deal of work in his tiny office in the athletic department at the Kibbie Dome, where he makes phone calls to other colleges and completes certain administrative duties.

"He (UI coach Joe Cravens) gives me a lot of responsibility," Ficca said. "If I mess up, it's probably not going to cost him his job, but anything I do is directed at winning, which results in him keeping his job."

Four years ago, when Ficca started out, he didn't have the responsibilities and respect that he has now.

"I'm glad I don't have to sweep anymore. Basically, my job has been to do whatever they told me," Ficca said. "Now I've got people under me, where if they tell me to sweep the floor I can tell them to sweep the floor."

Although Ficca isn't going anywhere fast, he's doing something he loves—being involved with college basketball. Even when the Moscow native was playing for his high

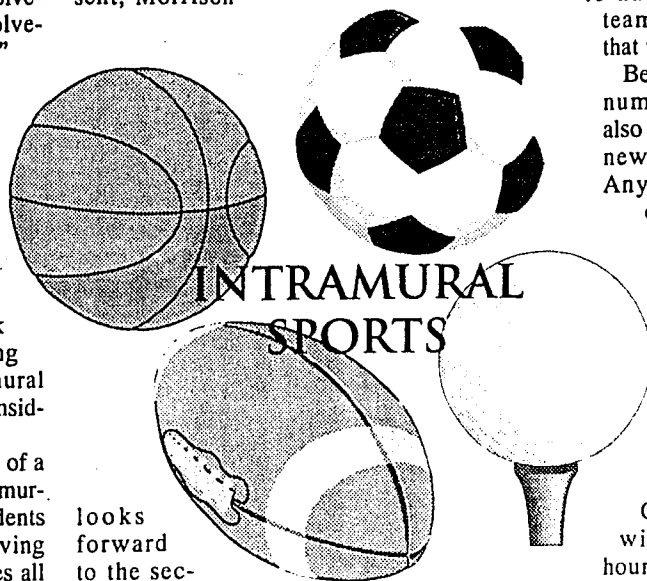
Other dates to remember for this

school basketball team, he always felt that he should have been coaching.

"I think we need to play overall at a very high competitive level. For us, I think it has to be a combination of six to eight guys playing big."

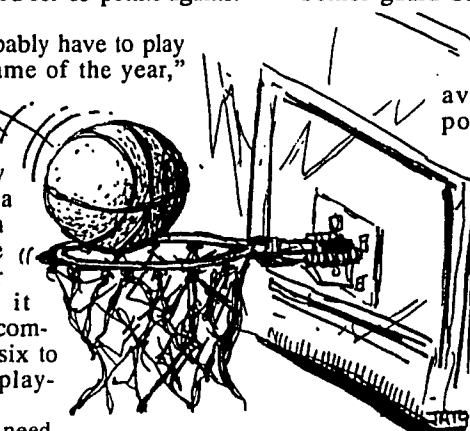
Idaho will need a big performance from power forward Harry Harrison. The 6-foot 7-inch Brunswick, Georgia native missed the Vandals first two games, but has been solid since returning. Harrison has contributed

13.5 points and 12 boards to the UI cause in his four games.

Senior guard Shawn Dirden is the Vandals' leading scorer. Dirden is averaging 16 points a game.

Junior college transfers Reggie Rose and Jason Jackman have been key ingredients in Idaho's scheme so far this season. Rose, a

6-foot point-guard is averaging 13.2 points a game while the 6-9 Jackman is adding 11.8 points to the offensive effort.

Canada kicks it NBA style

VANCOUVER, British Columbia—In Toronto, the fans are learning not to holler and yell when their team is shooting free throws. In Vancouver, they are being ever so patient with a team that's lost an expansion record 18 in a row.

There's no blue line and no goalie. Most of the players still have their front teeth. But Canadians seem to love this new game.

"I've played hockey all my life, and I love hockey," said 27-year-old Andy Cave, who sat a few rows from the court at Sunday night's first all-Canada NBA game. "But I'd much rather go to a Grizzlies game over a Canucks game. The crowds are into it more. There are more things going on."

Even that losing streak, capped by the Grizzlies' 93-81 loss to Toronto Sunday, hasn't doused the enthusiasm in Vancouver, at least not yet.

"Right now, it's great just to have a team," Cave said.

The NBA did mountains of research before deciding to bring Toronto and Vancouver into the extremely successful world of professional basketball. Still, everyone involved is surprised at how quickly Canadians have taken to the game.

"They're excited about it, especially the kids," Toronto forward Willie Anderson said. "They are

really excited about basketball coming to Canada. I thought it would be a big adjustment and take some time for it to hit because of Canada being dominated by hockey.

"I thought it would take at least a couple of years before basketball would really catch on. But it's caught on quick."

Toronto's Raptors, playing in the cavernous SkyDome, are third in the NBA in attendance at just over 21,500 per game. The crowds have been big, even when going head-to-head with the NHL's Maple Leafs.

"I think we played three nights head to head and we've drawn 18,000, 21,000 and 21,000," Raptors owner John Bitove said.

Coach Brendan Malone said even the SkyDome staff has been won over by the new game in town.

"The people who work at the arena who are hockey fans are surprised at how quick and how fast-paced the game is," Malone said.

In Vancouver, a much smaller market than Toronto, the Grizzlies are 11th in the NBA in attendance at 17,298 and are drawing as well as the NHL's Canucks. Both the basketball and hockey teams have the same owner and both play in the new General Motors Place arena, affectionately known by the locals as The Garage.

The fans are still learning the

nuances of the game.

On opening night, the Grizzlies distributed a booklet titled "The Bear Facts A to Z Basketball Primer." Malone has held two clinics for the local media, showing tapes to explain such NBA subtleties as the illegal defense call.

The Raptors have been highly competitive at home, and the Toronto fans, known in other sports for their lack of enthusiasm, have been loudly supportive.

They also seem to have learned, finally, that they shouldn't yell and wave their arms when their own team is shooting free throws.

"After the whole bench jumped up and said, 'Hey, be quiet,' they figured it out after awhile," Raptors forward Tracy Murray said.

Jackson and Toronto general manager Isiah Thomas know the novelty eventually will wear off and the teams will be expected to win.

"The honeymoon won't end for a couple of years," Bitove said. "But it's like any other sport. If you don't progress from year to year, you're going to run into problems, so we know what we have to do."

Super Bowl Theme Park set

TEMPE—For some fans, the NFL Experience might be the closest they get to the Super Bowl in January.

So for the first time in its 5-year history, the pro football interactive theme park will be open seven days over a two-week period, NFL officials announced Tuesday as some younger fans gave it a test run.

The NFL Experience will cover 20 acres along the Rio Salado Parkway adjacent to Sun Devil Stadium, site of the Jan. 28 Super Bowl.

Children and adults can test their skills on more than 60 interactive games and activities, attend clinics and card shows, and view numerous exhibits.

Tony Bailey, 11, tried out a chute and harness which simulates making a run for the goal line and being halted by defenders. "It sort hurts," he said as it stopped him short. "You don't expect it when it jerks you back."

It took Alicia Stroble, 11, six tries as she dodged through inflatable "defenders" while

attempting to snag a pass shot her way by machine. "Finally," she shouted as she cut to the right and snagged the aerial.

Ryan Freeman, who tried on an NFL uniform, pads and all, was dubious. "It's pretty big," the 76-pound 11-year-old said.

Up to 50,000 people per day are expected to pass through the NFL Experience, which will run from Jan. 19-21 and Jan. 25-28.

"Since its inception in 1991, more than one million visitors have attended," said Don Garber, vice president of business development-special events for NFL Properties. "It'll enable all area residents to be part of the excitement of the Super Bowl, whether they have a ticket to the game or not."

The Super Bowl has been sold out for months.

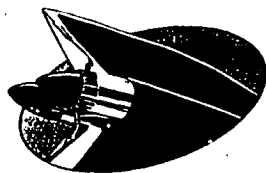

Stuntman's daredevil show transcends past

Stuntman's euphonious parallel lead guitar sound may be reminiscent of its former incarnation, Treepeople, but don't expect these Boise natives to dwell on the past.

Singers/song-writers/guitarists Scott Schmaljohn and John Polle have breathed fresh air into the charred ashes they left behind as Treepeople and have since reinvented themselves with immensely tight and straight forward rock songs with the help of bassist Sean Lennon and drummer Mike Rundell.

Stuntman played at Washington State University's Butch's Den last Friday along with Seattle's Flake and The Gimmick from Pullman.

For Lennon and Polle the show was sort of a homecoming. The

two had previously been paired together in Thin Section while attending WSU. Schmaljohn and his former bandmates in Treepeople had also been frequent visitors to the Palouse. Polle also shared guitar duties with Schmaljohn on the final Treepeople album.

Stuntman's tight energetic live show recently landed them an appearance at South by Southwest, a musical showcase of up and coming bands held every year in Austin, Texas.

South by Southwest provided the band an opportunity to show off their talent to somewhat larger audiences than they have been accustomed to. Stuntman also caught the eye of several record label executives and before long they were entertaining offers for eight album contracts from Alias records.

your whole life," Schmaljohn said. Eventually Stuntman hooked up with New York's Link records and penned a deal for one album.

"We were looking for an indie label, Link originally wanted four albums but we decided on one," Schmaljohn said.

With that deal signed Stuntman also released a trio of independent singles for several smaller labels. "The Right Channel" was the first, mixing the duo talents of Polle and Schmaljohn's furious finger work with thundering rhythms from behind. Robert Marshall Long and Slaves soon followed while the full length self-titled album from Link won't be available until January 16.

Schmaljohn said upon the release of the debut album the band plans to embark on a West Coast tour.

If Stuntman's live show is any indication of what the album is good things can be expected. Maybe then they can finally shed the constant reference to their former incarnation.

"Treepeople was always a good thing, but it's good to let things rest," Schmaljohn said, "Good things are happening with Stuntman too."

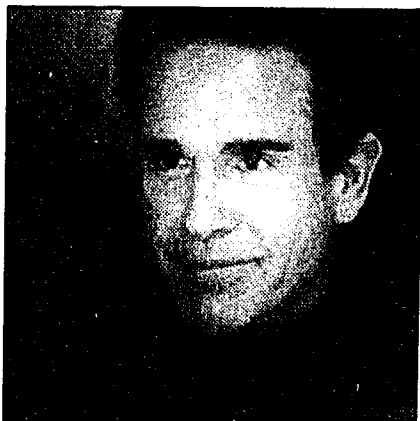

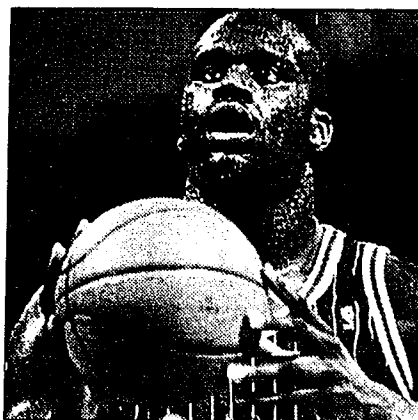

LC's Brew Review: Another beer smorgasbord

It's been a few weeks since the last brew review, but I was on special assignment in the Himalayas with my wife, Morgan Fairchild. Yeah, that's the ticket.

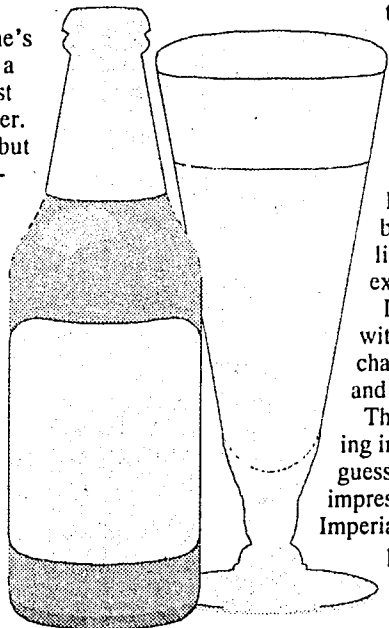
In that time, I sampled many a beer, some of which I'll share with you today. The first was Coeur d' Alene's T. W. Fisher Cherry Porter. It was a little light bodied compared to most porters, but was a very pleasant beer. The cherry flavor was very subtle but the black patent malt was not overpowering despite its typical malt-heavy porter aroma. The aftertaste was dry and lasted only a few moments on the palate. The Cherry Porter is by far the best T. W. Fisher brew I've tried.

Thomas Hardy's Ale is touted as one of the finest ales in Britain. It is bottled with its natural yeast and will mature in the bottle long after bottling. I am not a big fan of this style of ale. It is heavy, malty and syrupy sweet with a fruity and yeasty bouquet. It has a very nice deep reddish-brown color and full body, but is a little too heavy and sweet for my tastes. Granted, this was a 1995 bottling and may have needed a few more months to condition in the bottle, after which the sherry-like qualities develop more fully.

The Steenbrugge Dubbel Bruin Abby Ale I tried next was much more palatable for me than the Thomas Hardy. This Belgian brew was malty, but with a bite. It had a nice sweetness to it and a sharp aroma that was hard to place. The dark amber color complimented the medium

body of the beer.

I have to admit I was afraid to try Holland's La Trappe Quadrupel Ale. A quadruple-brewed beer made me a little leery, but I decided to try it anyway, much to my delight. The La Trappe was a dark gold color with caramel overtones in the aroma. It had a lightly malty character with a port-like aftertaste that lingers in the back of the throat. You don't have to fear this beer.



Finally, I got to try the Samuel Smith's Imperial Stout, and I was a little disappointed. Sam Smith's Oatmeal Stout and Taddy Porter both impressed me, but the Imperial Stout was a little weaker than I had been expecting.

It is an exceptional stout, with a thick, bitter and malty character, full, opaque body and black color.

The aftertaste is bitter, lingering in the mouth and throat. I guess I was expecting a more impressively heavy beer from the Imperial Stout. Despite my disappointment, I still enjoyed this beer from England's old Tadcaster Brewery. Enjoy your vacation and

remember, if you are drinking this holiday season, arrange for a designated driver or another way to get where you are going next.

There's a lot of beer in the world to sample, and it's awful hard to do with at least six feet of soil between you and the nearest bar. It's not just your future you take into your hands when you drink and drive.

Some kids, however, take mischief to a different degree.

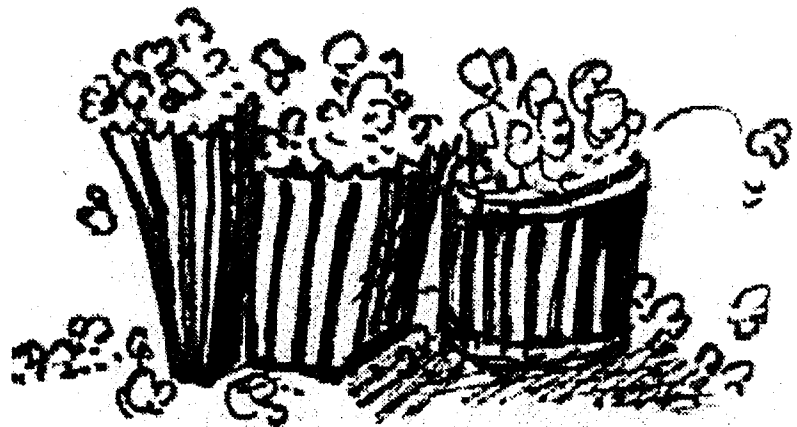

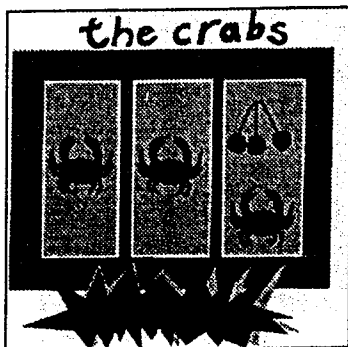


The Crabs Jackpot

Tickets are available at Ticket Express in Moscow or Corner Drug in Pullman.

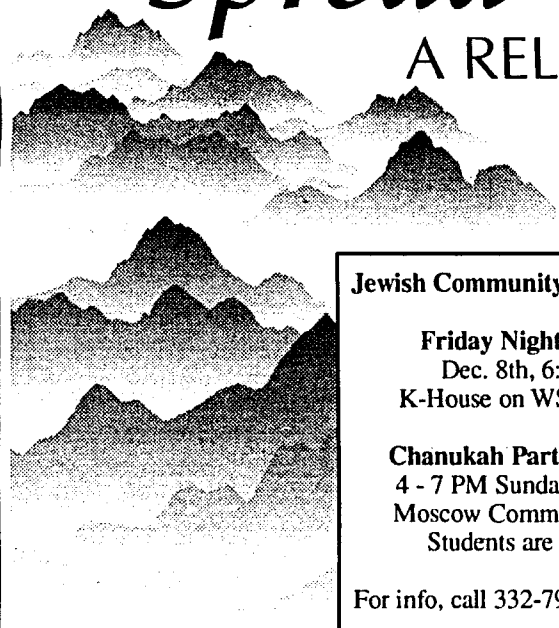
