# Speakers share their 'Entangled Lives'

Lew topics generate more pasSion than race. Ethnic heritage is a source of pride and interest for many Americans.

Exploring this history led both Dr. Ann Neel, a sociologist from Tacoma, and Pam Smith, former communications-director for Jesse ackson, back to "Little Dixie," Missourri. After years of digging hrough marriage licenses and probate records, they discovered Neel's family once owned Smith's.
In their first dual public presenta ion, Neel and Smith shared their story of entangled lives. The women told the hundreds of students, faculty and community members gathered in the Administration Auditorium Wednesday night not only of their personal histories, but also their changing views of race in America.
"So much of U.S. history is a lie
anyway.... When you find out what really went on, it's fascinating," Neel said.

Smith recounted her memories of growing up black in America. A age four, she destroyed the black doll she was given, telling her mother, "I don't want a nigger for Christmas."

Smith told of the racism she faced growing up. In college, she remembered "having ice balls, solid ice balls, fiercely thrown at me." Smith also discussed working for a black newspaper, the Urban League and Jesse Jackson.

Neel told of traveling to California after World War II with a black nanny.
"My mom brought a cot for her to sleep on because the motels would $t$ let her sleep in the beds, Neel said. Neel also spoke of fighting with her father after being for bidden to date a Mexican-American

## Branen addresses student, staff issues

University presidential candi ate Dr. Larry Brane addressed issues of university goals, staff, funds and market ing at a reception Tuesday in the tudent Union Ballroom.
"If you put students first, you will increase their performance overall," he said.

The university needs to come to an agreement on its mission and goals, Branen said, and everyonefaculty, staff and students must have input.
Branen also emphasized UI's role as a residential campus and a landgrant university.
"We value being a residential campus. We do treat students as people," he said. He added mat as a land-grant school, UI has access to teaching, research and extension
programs that employ students, provide equipment and increase critical thinking

One of his goals is to improve and retain staff and faculty.
"What makes a difference in a university and what makes it work is the people," Branen said.

He puts high priority on salary increases and equity.
"Assuring that people who are in charge of this university are recognized and properly rewarded," Branen said.

He pointed out that the cost of living in Moscow is higher than most other places in the state.
Addressing funding, Branen said reallocation is going to be a reality. The predominant source of funds is the state, but money also comes in from grants and student fees, he said.

## Technology park might keep

 business in Moscow-Latah areaAndrew White

he Moscow-Latah County Economic Development Council has proposed a business technology park for expanding businesses. Assuming all contingencies are resolved, the park will be located on the east side of Moscow around the Tidyman's area.

The president of the board of directors Shelly Bennelt said, "The
purpose is to retain businesses in the Moscow-Latah area. Currently many businesses from around the area have left to other areas of the state and in some instances the state altogether"
The proposed park would give ntrepreneurs a place to begin their businesses a a reduced cost, retain present businesses and provide an economic environment for commerce in the Moscow-Latah area in general.

The first phase of the proposed
project has been reached. The Eugene and Joann Thompson family has agreed to sell developed lots at undeveloped value for 16 acres of land in east Moscow.
The second phase of the development will be financed through tax allocation financing under the Urban Renewal Agency. Sewage and water infrastructure will be implemented to serve the needs of the second phase.
"We are trying to work toward a

Election set for disincorporation of Carey
CAREY, Idaho-Carey residents will decide in May if Carey should disband $/$ governing structure that. has been essentially non-existen since anyone can remember.
The Blaine County commissioners accepted a petition from Carey residents requesting the chance to formally vote for disincorporation.
In addition, the commissioners asked Gov. Phil Batt to appoint three people to serve as council members to establish local control.
In a letter to Batt, the commissioners urged appointments to be made soon to enable a city council and mayor to set a budget by June. Falling behind in the budget process would prohibit Carey from functioning in a timely manner during the coming fiscal year.
Monday petition organizers Ronda Hunt and Howard Royal presented the commission with an additional 30 signatures to be added to a 141 -signature petition submitted three weeks ago. At that time, controversy arose over the actual voter population counts for Carey.
With the recent discovery that Carey has been an incorporated "village" since 1919, no one, including the county commission, had an accurate population count. making the 171 -signatures adequate for the simple majority need-
ed on the petition. The election will be set for May 28.

If voters approve disintorporation, residents could then re-establish city boundaries and slart over in the incorporation process If the election fails, the appointed council would make boundary changes.

## Education, corrections clash in cash struggle

BOISE-Thelegislative inclina tion to pump more and more cash into education has once again run headlong into Idaho's rising criminal population.
The Senate grudgingly settled for 4.1 percent increase in general tax support for the three universities and Lewis-Clark State College ties and Lewis-Clark State College
on Monday while budget writers on Monday while budget writers
quickly conceded nearly 15 percent quickly conceded nearly 15 percent
more general tax money for the more general tax money for the
fledgling Department of Juvenile fledgling Department of Juvenile Corrections.
The Senate also sent to the House the new budget for the Fish and Game Department after only mino debate over the propriety of siphoning $\$ 50,000$ in big game depredation money into coyote control in eastern Idaho.
And the House forwarded to the Senate the $\$ 33.5$ million budget for veterans services and some other Health and Welfare Department operations.
The Joint Finance-Appropria tions Committee also endorsed the $\$ 1.3$ million general tax appropriation to Public Television, but not before several lawmakers called for the ouster of General Manager Jerold Garber. Garber came under fire for announcing program cutbacks due to reductions in both state and federal support and for
what budget writer Rex Fumess, a Rigby Republican senator, claimed was excessive travel.
Public Television supporters convinced a majority to avoid micromanaging the program and expressing their frustrations and complaints through the state Board of Education, which oversees the agency.

## Base college major decisions on bucks

WASHINGTON-If you're a student picking your major based on future earnings, there's a new Census Bureau study that might Cens
help.
Bi.

Big bucks? Head for medical or law school.

Don't care? Maybe home ec is your cup of tea.
People with a degree beyond high school had average monthly earnings of $\$ 2,339$. This was substantially higher than those with either a high school diploma only ( $\$ 1,080$ ) or who attended college but did no take a degree ( $\$ 1,303$ ). For persons who did not complete high school the mean monthly earnings were just \$508.
The study found top mean earnings of $\$ 5,049-\mathrm{a}$-month for people with degrees in medicine and dentistry. Lawyers were second a \$4,353 monthly.
Home economics was at the bottom of the scale among college majors checked, monthly incomes of $\$ 1,165$.

Besides medicine, law and home economics, average monthly earnings for other majors listed in the study were:
Economics, \$3,330; engineering \$3,117; agriculture and forestry; \$2,973; mathematics and statistics $\$ 2,583$; business management $\$ 2,426$; physical and earth sciences \$2,357; English and journalism \$2,331; psychology, $\$ 2,236$; police and law enforcement, \$2,178.
Also biology, \$2,118; social science, $\$ 1,970$; religion and theology, $\$ 1,963$; nursing, pharmacy and health technology, $\$ 1,889$; education, $\$ 1,884$; liberal arts and humanities, $\$ 1,733$; and vocational and technical studies, $\$ 1,713$.

As the hearing got under way today in El Centro, Calif., Lopez was briefed on procedures; testimony was not expected until this afternoon. A decision on whether Lopez will face trial is not expected for two to three weeks follow ing the hearing, according to Lt Col. Jerry Broeckert.
If convicted, Lopez could face

## New program makes foreign exchange inexpensive

The American Institute for Foreign Study is offering a new program that makes foreign exchange more affordable.
Students can now work off some of the cos of foreign exchange while attending school in Europe. Students will live with a host family and provide child care for a maximum of 30 hours a week. In return for the child care, the student receives room and board, $\$ 75$ a week and time off for vacations.
"Young Americans have always been interested in studying abroad," says William Gertz senior vice president for AIFS. "But the cos
has been prohibitive for many families. This program makes the European cultural experience affordable to many more students by combining work with study-a long established American educational tradition."

The cost for one five-month semester ranges from $\$ 1,995$ to $\$ 2,495$; for a full year the cost is $\$ 2,495$ to $\$ 3,495$; and the cost is $\$ 995$ for a summer semester.
The cost covers air fare, help in obtaining a visa, tuition and fees, training in child care, a three day orientation, medical insurance, access to an on-campus AIFS counselor and prescreening for a host family. Students may take

The 1996 spring semester at Washington State University saw an increase of 213 students from hast year. This year?s total of 16,034 compared with 15,821 of spring of 1995 comes as no surprise to Gus Kravas yice provost for student affairs Since 1991 , high school sraduation and consequent enroll ment in higher education in Washington tas been steadily increasing This trend of the "b asy boon eha bens. ed by the fact that senior chases, fins are suller than ed by he fach ncoming freshmen classes.
Krayas said, "We expect enrollment to continue to rise hrough 2012?
Support from the state legislature is necessary as WSU Kravas

disastrous, he said. A brief session of question and answer and open discussion ended the seminar.

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## Congress cutting funds for family planning

I bring to your attention today a matter of utmost urgency. The U.S. Congress must resolve before March 15 the appropriations fo several major programs and agencies. This also provides them with the opportunity to correct grievous mistakes in previous efforts to pre mistakes in previous efforts to preing a devious and deceitful crip pling of intemational family planpling programs.
Uing programs.
U.S. international population assistance has been dealt a devastating blow by a conserva
majority in the House of
majority in the House of
Representatives with support from Representatives with support from
the Christian Coalition and other the Christian Coalition and other
right-wing, anti-choice groups. The right-wing, anti-choice groups. The
Senate had repeatedly refused to concur in House approval of legis concur in House approval of legislation aimed at withdrawing all funding of overseas family planning efforts. But in a compromise worked out by a conference committee, 1996 international population spending will be slashed by 35 percent of the amount appropriated for 1995-a total decrease of nearly $\$ 200$ million. The U.S. contribution to the United Nations Population Fund will drop from $\$ 35$ million in fiscal year 1995 to $\$ 22$ million in 1996-a reduction of $\$ 13$ million. The most damaging element of the measure is that the U.S. government will be unable to spend any of the overseas family planning appropriation until July 1-nine months after the start of the fiscal yearunless Congress enacts a foreign

aid authorization bill. Congress has not approved such a measure since 1985.

If authorization legislation has not been passed by July 1, international population funds will be disributed in monthly installments no exceeding 6.7 percent of the appropriation per month. This translates o an 85 percent cut in fiscal year 1996 funding. These restrictions that apply to no other international assistance program make it virtualy impossible for individual service providers that rely on U.S. government funds to plan their programs. The so called "Mexico City" policy prohibiting international family planning aid to organizations that planning aid to organizations that when U.S funds are not involvedhas been excluded from the legisltion. The House of Representatives tion. The House of Representatives "Mexico Cought to interject the "Mexico City" language in the foreign assistance appropriations bill Although groups supporting the actions are known for their opposiIion to abortion, the Congressional measure is estimated to lead to an additional 200,000 illegal and unsafe abortions according to Nils Daulaire, U.S. Agency for

International Development depaty administrator for policy and child health policy adviser. Dualaire estimated that as many as 5,000 more women will die as a result of unsafe abortions and mistimed pregnancies over the next year and there will be 500,000 additional births. In addition to placing greater stress on already strained child survival proalreads strained the Congressional grams, he says, restrictions will increase administrative costs four to five timescosting taxpayers $\$ 750,000$ to $\$ 1$ million more than if the funds were to be channeled in a conventional manner.
The 35 percent cut in funding for overseas family planning programs is grossly at odds with present real ities, in which nearly 100 million people are added to the earth's pop ulation each year, with nearly 90 percent of that growth occurring in the developing world. It would be incorrect, however, to characterize this as a partisan dispute, for mang responsible House and Senate Republicans have expressed their outrage at the recent reductions in overseas population assistance. For instance, Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., pointed out that his "calamitous formulation" is "antithetical to the pro-life positon" since it will inevitably result in more unplanned pregnancies, more abortions and more maternal deaths. We strongly support the Senator's conclusion that "all the

anti-abortion speech this Chamber can tolerate will not reduce the number of pregnancies as swiftly or as surely as our support for voluntary family planning. There simply are only two ways to prevent abortion, through abstinence or family planning."
While foreign aid may seem like an issue that in no way concerns your campus, the rippling effect it will have is sure to be witnessed by each and every student across the country. International family plan ning encompasses a wide range of issues, including the environment, empowerment of women, reproduc tive health, nutrition and sustainable development. Congress, who has mistakenly treated this as an abortion issue, has chosen the wrong forum for this kind of debate. No matter what side of the abortion issue a person is on, we should all support family planning funding which undeniably reduces funding which undeniably redu the number of abortions. Rest
assured that these attacks are not assured that these attacks are not confined to the international arena; they are bound to creep across the domestic frontier and hit us where it hurts: at home
The funding cuts will be immediately mirrored in the health and well being of the 50 million women whose access to maternal care and other reproductive health services is in jeopardy. Sustaining current investments is far less costly than future consequences of inaction. Stokes departure comes at a time when the club is rebuilding and the addition of Leslie Hilbert as head coach attempts to solidify the team for future seasons. Hilbert said she stepped in to help the team with organization and to run practices.
"I would hate to see what they had done so far fall apart when Melissa left," Hibert said. Hilbert gives another reason for the team not noticing the change. She says she and Stokes held the same ideas about coaching, practicing the fundamentals and getting the most out of the athletes.
Steele also believes that Hilbert is more familiar with the players then Stokes.
Melissa's main priority was coaching the girls team," he said.
Hilbert's time playing recreationally with
several of the men on the club team makes her more in tune with the team according to Steele

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Cowboys have more money to spend, so do other NFL clubs

NEW YORK-For the time being, the cap-restriced Dallas Cowboys and San Francisco 49ers have $\$ 2$ million more to spend to try to keep their teams at the top. But so do their fellow American National Football League clubs in the era of free agency.
The money comes from a court decision handed down Monday in Minneapolis by U.S. District Court Judge David Doty, who has retained ultimate jurisdiction of the league's labor matters since presiding over the 1992 antimonopoly suit that led to the NFL's labor agreement.
Doty's ruling raises next season's cap - the maximum each team can spend to pay all 45 players on its roster - from $\$ 38.773$ million to $\$ 40.753$ million. The lower figure, up from dirs 37.1
million last year, was set by indemillion last year, was set by independent auditors for the league and the NFL Players Association, but appealed by the union to Doty.
Now the league is appealing suggesting that Doty adhered to suggesting thas labor adneract not the spirit.
Under the contract, the projected cap for each year is determined by cap for each year is deleimined by And that's what Doty found, holdAnd that's what Doty found, howding cap should be $\$ 2$ million more than the auditors set.
more man the league argues that last season's growth was artificial because of the addition of the two Panthers and Jacksonville Jaguars. Greg Aiello, the NFL's director of communications, suggested that the $\$ 2$ million jump now is likely to mean that cap remains flat for the next year or two.
And while Doty's decision may also put in jeopardy the contract extension beyond 1999, approved by the owners in Chicago three weeks ago and already ratified by the players, not every team is against the increase.
Two are those bitter rivals, the
Cowboys and 49ers. Cowboys and 49ers.
What they have in common is that their dominant position in the league has been slowly eroding because they can't afford to pay their many talented players. Dallas has lost 21 players since it began a run of three Super Bowl titles in four seasons, including three defensive starters so far this year.
But they may not be helped,
either. either.
The 49ers, for example, want to, sign the New York Giants' Rodney Hampton, the running back they need to replace Ricky Watters, who defected to Philadelphia a year ago. But the Giants have made Hampton a

## Cleveland council ponders future of NFL in city

CLEVELAND-Persuading the NFL to return football to Cleveland mayor Michael R easy part. Now, persuade the City Council.
White on Monday presented a
skeptical council with a package of four ordinances that would authorize public financing for a new stadium and give him the authority to finalize the deal with the NFL.
The council has until March 8 to approve the package so NFL team owners can consider it at a March 11 meeting. NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue will meet with council members next Monday, White said.
"These people (NFL owners) are not playing. They want to do a deal on March 11 , or they will not do a deal," the mayor said.
White and NFL owners reached a tentative agreement earlier this month to give Cleveland a team by 1999 to replace the franchise Art
Modell is moving to Baltimore.

The NFL agreed to pay $\$ 28$ million president Jay Westbrook. to $\$ 48$ million toward construction of a new stadium and to have Modell pay up to $\$ 11.5$

The deal has been fine-tuned over the past two weeks to ened over the past two weeks to ease
some concerns raised by council members, but NFL negotiators rejected a number of their propos als, White said.
For instance, the NFL would not give Cleveland discretion to choose the owner of the new franchise and it insisted on keeping the possibility of using personal seat licenses to recover its contribution to stadium construction costs. The most expensive seat licenses would cost $\$ 2,000$.
The council had also asked for a year to review possible sites for a stadium, but the NFL and White both objected because it would "in all probability preclude completion of the new stadium in 1999," White said in a letter to council


White wants the new stadium built on the site of existing Cleveland Stadium.
Among the provisions of the deal presented to council:

- The NFL will deliver an exist ing or expansion team to Cleveland for the first full season after completion of a new stadium anticipated to be 1999, but possibly a year later. The team is guaranteed to play in a division with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh.
- The nickname "Browns," the team's brown and orange colors and its history will remain in Cleveland.
- If an expansion franchise is awarded to Cleveland the NFL will seek local ownership candidates.

The new stadium will be openair with natural grass and about 72,000 seats.
The council's approval is no sure thing, said Rick Werner, executive
assistant to the mayor. At least 11 of council's 21 members must approve it.
"I hope we'll be in excess of 11 votes. I don't think we're there yel, , Werner said

Briefly, over the past two years Skinny Puppy, which is made up of N. Ogre-lead singer, cEvin Key-guitarist, drummer, and programmer, and D.R. Goenel-keyboardist programmer, and D.R. Goenel-keyboardist has suffered setbacks such as death, record company conflicts, bad weather and inter-
nal disagreements. The consequences of nal disagreements. The consequences of
these setbacks have manifested themselves in the form of "cut-n-paste" songs on an album that has taken longer than usual to produce.
I agree that the "cut-n-paste" method is a component that helps define Skinny Puppy music, but The Process lacks a certain continuity which might've been avoided continuity which might ve been
with a shorter production time.
with a shorter production time. more than sets the stage for random and incoherent parts to follow. "Jahya" begins with a series of intermittent electronic/synthesizer blurbs and then pieces them together to form a segment that I almost got used to...repeat broken electronic/syngot used to...repeat broker blurbs, again.
The listener may feel let down after listening to many of the tracks. Many of the songs give the impression that they are building up to something and then fail to reach a peak that the listener may be
expecting. The first track on the album is one of many that exhibit the lack of continuity, among other things.
Other Skinny Puppy traits that do not appeal to me include their unimpressive ability to talk instead of sing their lyrics. While this trait has remained a fairly consistent characteristic of Skinny Puppy's sistent characteristic of Skinny Puppy's
music, it can still be viewed as a characteristic that keeps the band off the radio and istic that keeps the band
off mainstream charts.

The Process does contain songs with potential. The more melodic songs," "Cult" and "Amnesia," have singing lyrics and more continuity. The continuity aspect of "Amnesia" is displayed in the form of a piano or synthesizer line that is prevalent during the entire song. The traditional Skinny Puppy fan may not like melodic attempt in The Process. On the other hand, as a critic and not a fan of Skinny. Puppy's work, I welcomed Skinny Puppy's semi-melody-rich songs with open arms. While Skinny Puppy's music is oftentimes compared to NIN and Ministry, their raw, electronic and random nature will most likely not appeal to the more mainstream industrial fan. I think the mainstream industrial fan is looking for more flow, more grooving bass lines and less talking. If that is the case, The Process may be painful.

## Bodies, Rest and Motion opens next week

Berating the listener with a combination of noise, samples, guitars and harsh drums Skinny Puppy presents their final album, The Process. It is with this album that Skinny Puppy's final chapter comes to fruition after two years of turmoil.
Madness. Disaster. Fire. Flood. Heroin. Each word and syllable alludes to the essence of Skinny Puppy's The Process and the trials the members had to go through in order to finish it. On the day Skinny Puppy moved into Shangri-la, a historic old residential recording studio near Malibu, California, they were forced to evacuate as the Malibu fires of '93 threatened their studin. Soon after the fire, during winter, they again were challenged by mother nature with the Malibu floods.
In the beginning of recording of The Process there were three, Ogre, cEvin Key and Dwayne Goettel. After two years only one member remained, cEvin Key.

The North American industrial band formed in 1983 and ever since have been troubled. During the two years it took to record The Process the world witnessed the acrimonious resignation of singer Nivek Ogre and the death of synthesist Dwayne Goettel from a heroin overdose. The fall of

Skinny Puppy began in October of 1993. On June 12 Ogre made the decision to leave the band in pursuit of a new project called W.E.L.T. Two months later, on August 23, Dwayne Goettel died of a heroin overdose in the bathroom of his parent's home in Edmonton, Canada. A week and a half later after Goettel's death, Key handed in the completed Skinny Puppy album to American Records who had already invested half a million dollars into the project.
The music of the album reflects the fall Skinny Puppy experienced. Their opening song, "Jahya," starts off with erratic bleeps and the whine of an amp. To analyze "Jahya" is indicative of the experiences Skinny Puppy went through in order to create the album.
Lyrically beautiful and imaginatively evil, Skinny Puppy creates-a picture of phonic chaos for the listener. While some of the songs sound experimental in their ereation, others hint at a more synthesizer and techno theme. But it is the vocals of Ogre and depraved guitar chords that christen this album with the scent and flavor of darkness.
"Hardset Head," the fourth track on the album, mixes industrial with techno giving the listener something that rarely comes from coined industrial bands anymore: good music.
Every track on The Process is pure genius. It is a proper farewell to a band that held legendary status in the music world. It celebrates both the peace and turmoil that Skinny Puppy brought to the world and gave to themselves.

A little over three years ago, the movie Bodies, Rest and Motion opened in select cinemas across the United States. And, unless you're a diehard fan of actor Eric Stoltz, chances are you missed it.
Thanks to director David Rosenberg and the Collette Theater, however, the once-forgotten script has now been reworked and redone into a play that could be one of Rosenberg's last hurrahs as a University of Idaho undergraduate.
Bodies, Rest and Motion is about a group of people in their 20s trying to figure out love, commitment and coping with the problems which arise from them. "It's really a character-driven play," Rosenberg said. "It also deals with falling in and out of love, endings of relationships and basically improving one's life."
Tonight's show begins at 8 p.m. at the Collette Theater. There is also a Saturday show at 8 p.m. and a Sunday matinee at 2 p.m. Tickets are $\$ 4$ and are available at the door, although buying them in
advance (885-6465) is recommended.
For Rosenberg, it was the piece's theme of life's hardships which drew him to the screenplay. "The characters are about my age," the director stated. "They want to identify with the American dream of two cars, three kids, a good job and retiring. They eventually wake up and realize that it doesn't exist for them."
Bodies, Rest and Motion will be Rosenberg's seventh directorial effort, but it will be one of only a few he wouldn't classify as "short" plays.
Four years ago, Rosenberg was living in New York City and pursuing a career in play direction when he decided he'd had enough of the theater. He moved to Driggs, Idaho, and began working at Grand Targhee Ski Resort.
Still, something drove him back to drama, and, for all intents and purposes, it wasn't some inner calling.
"When I found out I had Idaho residency, I decided to go up to UI to get my degree," the 26 year-old theater arts major said. "I mean, school is really cheap out here."
"Cheap," however, is hardly the word used to describe
Rosenberg's work or the play itself, which was written by Roger Hedden. Hedden, a name presum-
ably unfamiliar to the general public, is a lesser-produced screenwriter whose most popular work is probably the one Rosenberg is directing.

All the parts in the play are stu-dent-acted, mostly by drama majors. "The acting is so realistic, it feels like you're intruding on their lives," Rosenberg said.
