# Administrators propose student fees increase

University of Idaho administrators are proposing a \$62 per semester increase in full-time student fees for the 2000-2001 school year.

This 5.3 percent increase over last year will raise student fees to \$1174, said UI President Bob

The increase, he said, is due to inflation and the need for additional program funding. This year's increase is different than recent history — student fees have gone up 45 percent since 1995, according to a UI budget office report on student fees.

The State Board of Education has authority over student fees and is scheduled to vote on the increases at its meeting in Idaho Falls.

ASUI President Bart Cochran said he heard the UI increase may be the highest in the state this year. And, although he is not pleased with that comparison, he is waiting to make an official statement against the proposed increase.

"I want to talk with the students if they support the proposals," Cochran said. "I will base my opinion on their

ings."

Hal Godwin, vice president for student affairs, said administrators are aware of the burden an increase can put on students.

"Every time we increase fees we are concerned with balancing access to the university with the need for quality programs," Godwin said.

Administrators wanted to keep fee increases to around 5 percent

(money for classrooms, lab facilities and general campus upkeep), and dedicated activity fees (which pays for things like the ASUI, intramurals and the Student Health Center).

The largest area of increase this year is the matriculation fee. The proposal asks for a \$34.75 increase for full-time students, which is about 5.6 percent higher than last year's fee.

Students from both the U of I and WSU converged on the Kibbie Dome Wednesday for a chance to speak with prospective employers at the Career and Summer Internship Fair.

The west end of the Kibbie Dome was set off for the event, with an array of tables representing approximately 120 companies. According to Alice Pope Barbut, the fair's coordinator, that is around 26% more employers than were represented last year. With that increase, students from a wider range of majors were able to effectively participate in the fair. Barbut said that this year business and engineering majors found a much better selection of possible employers than in previous years. She attributed a part of the increase in participation to a great current job market, but she also anticipates further growth of the fair in the future.

And it does indeed have room to grow. According to Andrew Tuschhoff, an advertiser at the fair, "There just isn't a lot in my area. That's

Practical skills, on-the-job experience and professional applications of classroom theory. Employers look for these qualities in prospective employees. Students will acquire such traits by working through the University of Idaho Cooperative Education Program. The Cooperative Education staff assists students in finding internship positions with local, regional, and national employers.

In 1998-1999 more than 450 students gained relevant experience through internships with over 220 different employers including NASA, Micron Technology, Idaho Governor's Office, Idaho

Department of Health & Welfare, Potlatch Corporation, Microsoft, Boeing, Bureau of Land Management, Battelle Pacific Northwest National Lab, US Forest Service, CSHQA Architects/Planners, Walt Disney World, Honeywell Air Transport Systems, INEEL/Lockheed, United Nations, Telect, and Hewlett Packard.

To assist students in securing internships, the co-op program gives individual advice on preparing resumes, writing effective cover letters, and internship search and networking strategies. Resources are available to help students find internships to fit their

individualized needs. To give students an opportunity to meet regional and national employers, Cooperative Education co-sponsors the annual Summer Job and Internship Fair with Washington State University. To help acquaint students with local opportunities, Cooperative Education annually co-sponsors a Local Internship & Student Employment Fair.

The Cooperative Education Program serves undergraduate and graduate students in all majors. To be eligible for cooperative education experiences, students must be in good academic standing in their degree program.

Placements are typically for

# Tips for success at the Summer Job & Internship Fair

### PREPARING FOR THE FAIR

Have your resume critiqued. Attend a fair workshop.  
Participate in a mock interview. Choose your attire:

Men: minimum of shirt, tie, slacks

Women: skirt/slacks and blouse

Both: jackets are always professional

Gather essential items: copies of your resume, transcripts;  
notepad, pen. Review your strengths: experience, intern-  
ships, projects, technical, team and leadership skills. Review  
employers who will attend the Fair Web Sites: [www.uidaho.edu/cooped](http://www.uidaho.edu/cooped) or [www.careers.wsu.edu](http://www.careers.wsu.edu) Career Fair Guide:  
review the employer profiles & highlight the ones you want  
to visit

### ARRIVING AT THE FAIR

Check in at the registration desk (southwest entrance of  
the UI Kibbie-ASUI Activity Center)

Carefully review the employer information in the Career  
Fair Guide. Note any last-minute changes.

Confirm employers of highest interest and highlight them  
on the map in the Career Fair Guide.

Observe the layout of the fair.

Find opportunities by approaching tables with just a few  
students first!

### APPROACHING RECRUITERS

Listen to what is being said by both the employer and stu-  
dents in front of you. This may help you formulate what to  
say or what not to say in your discussion!

Approach the recruiter with a smile. Take the initiative,  
offer a firm handshake and make eye contact! Do not present  
your resume at his moment—WAIT!

### NETWORKING WITH THE RECRUITER

If you know what the company is looking for in candi-  
dates, briefly discuss your background and how your  
skills/experience may fit THEIR needs.

If you are unfamiliar with the company, you may want to  
open the conversation with "Please tell me about your organ-  
ization," or "What skills are you looking for when hiring  
interns or students for summer or full-time positions?"

Present your resume only when the recruiter has asked for  
it or near the close of the conversation. You might hand your  
resume to the recruiter saying, "I am very interested; please  
consider my resume for the \_\_\_\_\_ position. Some  
recruiters will have "boxes" on their tables for resumes. If  
you do not have a resume, ask for the recruiter's card, and  
state that you will send your resume.

Always ask for a business card or the name and contact  
information of an appropriate contact person. If a recruiter  
offers you candy, pens, and "give-aways" go ahead and take  
some - but don't be greedy!

Thank the recruiter.

### FOLLOWING UP AFTER THE FAIR

Write down notes about the position or organization for  
your records. (Use the back of business cards if necessary for  
easy recall.)

Send a typed, professional thank you letter addressed to  
the recruiter.

If the recruiter has a preference for e-mail, send a brief  
professional e-mail note as follow up.

available?

How many students do they anticipate hiring?

What are they looking for in a candidate?

In what geographical areas are they placing students?

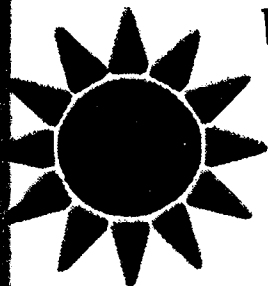



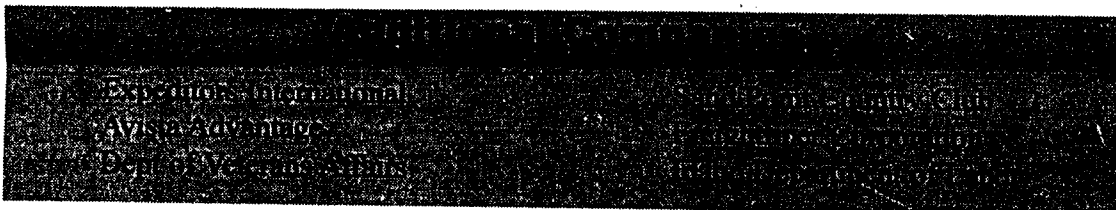

# Administrators propose student fees increase

University of Idaho administrators are proposing a \$62 per semester increase in full-time student fees for the 2000-2001 school year.

This 5.3 percent increase over last year will raise student fees to \$1236 from \$1174, said UI President Bob Hoover.

The increase, he said, is justified by inflation and the need for additional student program funding. This year is no different than recent history — student fees have gone up 45 percent since 1996, according to a UI budget office report on student fees.

The State Board of Education, which has authority over student fees, is scheduled to vote on the increases April 12 in Idaho Falls.

ASUI President Bart Cochran said he heard the UI increase may be the lowest in the state this year. And, although he is pleased with that comparison, he said he is waiting to make an official statement for or against the proposed increase.

"I want to talk with the students to see if they support the proposals," Cochran said. "I will base my opinion on their feel-

ings."

Hal Godwin, vice president for student affairs, said administrators are aware of the burden an increase can put on students.

"Every time we increase fees we are concerned with balancing access to the university with the need for quality programs," Godwin said.

Administrators wanted to keep fee increases to around 5 percent this year because of the \$70 increase for the student recreation center that takes effect in the fall of 2001, said Godwin.

The \$70 increase will, by itself, raise fees seven percent, and administrators are expecting a 10 percent total rise in total fees for the 2001-2002 school year. Godwin said that will average to about a seven percent increase for the next two years.

Administrators are also asking for increases in part-time and summer school fees this fall. Part-time fees have a proposed increase of \$6 per semester and summer school fees could go up by \$12 per credit. Godwin said summer school has not been financially self-sustaining and the university would like it to be.

Student fees are divided into three main categories: facility fees (which fund bond issues like the Commons, and recreational and computer costs), the matriculation fees

(money for classrooms, lab facilities and general campus upkeep), and dedicated activity fees (which pays for things like the ASUI, intramurals and the Student Health Center).




The largest area of increase this year is the matriculation fee. The proposal asks for a \$34.75 increase for full-time students, which is about 5.6 percent higher than the current fee. Godwin says this increase can be viewed as comparable to the rate of inflation.

The matriculation fee, which accounts for more than half of total student fees, has increased 44 percent since 1996. It usually increases the most out of the three categories, according to the budget office

"The student response has been very positive. It has been busy all day," Barbut said.

Jan Viney, a representative for Girl Scouts Summer Camp 2000 and a UI graduate, said that she had talked to some great students, and that she thought the fair was a wonderful opportunity for both students and employers.

Students from all levels of study were present at the fair. Some actively searched for jobs, while others, particularly the younger students, took the opportunity to get a feel for what kind of jobs and internships are out there. Plus, even if they couldn't find their dream job, they could still help themselves to their share of candy and cookies, watch informational videos, or acquire pens and various other office supplies.

# Briefs

## The search for Bitterroot Grizzlies

Eight regional conservation and scientific groups have launched a collaborative effort, known as the Great Grizzly Search, to determine the status of grizzlies in the Salmon/Selway/Bitterroot Ecosystem.

This area is the largest piece of intact wildland left in the lower 48 states, and has been targeted by the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) as a potential location for grizzly bear reintroduction.

According to the USFWS, there have been no credible grizzly sightings in the Salmon-Selway ecosystem for over 60 years, but several unconfirmed reports have been made. If grizzlies are present in the proposed recovery area, then the government will need to reconsider its initial grizzly reintroduction strategy and take this into account.

The public is encouraged to join the efforts in searching for Bitterroot grizzlies. Pre-made observation booklets, containing identification information and clip-out observation cards, are available to hunters and hikers and sightings can be reported to the Great Grizzly Search, PO Box 8983, Missoula, MT, 59807.

## UI study published in Neuron

Moscow, ID- Micheal Laskowski, University of Idaho Director of the Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana and Idaho Medical Program has been studying the molecules known as erphins. Erphins, which may someday help doctors reconnect damaged nerves or the spinal cord, have been the focus of a team consisting of several different scientists.

Laskowski worked with researchers from Washington University Medical School at St. Louis, the Medical Nobel Institute at Stockholm and the Harvard Medical School at Cambridge. The group is working to develop treatments for illnesses such as spine and nerve injury as well as muscular dystrophy. Erphins are important to this study because they are the molecules that determine how muscles in the body and spine connect.

The team's work has been published in an article featured in the most recent issue of Neuron, an international publication.

## Danish photographer slide show

Moscow, ID- Jacob Holdt, a Danish photographer, will be presenting "American Pictures: A Personal Journey through the American Underclass." The photography will be presented as a slide-show accompanying a lecture dealing with each aspect of American culture.

The show will be presented free and open to the public on March 7th. It will take place in the Student Union Building Ballroom at 7 p.m. The departments of Sociology and Anthropology, the College of Education, Idaho Commons and Student Union Programs, the Office of Multicultural Affairs, the Women's Center and ASUI Productions are sponsoring the event.

## Sime to lecture on 'Politics, Race and Gender ... and the Discovery of Fission'

PULLMAN, Wash.— Sacramento City College faculty member Ruth Sime will

talk about "Politics, Race and Gender: Lise Meitner and the Discovery of Fission" March 3, on the Washington State University campus.

Sime's 12:10 p.m. lecture in Fulmer Hall, Room 438, is about Meitner (1878-1968), a prominent 20th-century physicist and co-discoverer of nuclear fission.

One dramatic aspect of Meitner's story is that she failed to get proper credit for her share in the fission discovery because she was forced to flee Germany just a few months before the December 1938 discovery took place in Berlin.

Sime said Meitner's collaborators, chemists Otto Hahn and Fritz Strassmann, are generally regarded as the discoverers, and Hahn alone was awarded the 1944 Nobel Prize in Chemistry for the discovery.

In the course of writing her biography ("Lise Meitner: A Life in Physics," University of California Press, 1996), Sime showed that Meitner (and physics) had indeed contributed to the discovery. She also illuminated the circumstances by which Meitner was excluded from it.

Sime said the primary reason that separated Meitner from her colleagues was the racial persecution of Jews in Nazi Germany. There also was a substantial secondary effect of gender bias, in which many people — scientists, journalists and historians — assumed that a woman would be only at the margins of scientific successes.



# Endeavour maps the Earth

Six astronauts aboard the space shuttle Endeavour launched into space February 11 with the goal of collecting radar data to be processed into 3D maps of the earth's surface. The mission was scheduled to last 11 days, 10 of those days for earth mapping.

Several UI professors and area students are especially excited about this mission, as it will provide them with topographical data they can use as participants in the International Global Learning and Observations to Benefit the Environment (GLOBE) Program. "GLOBE will work with NASA, one of our sponsoring agencies, to use these new topography data to complement the Landsat 7 images provided to (GLOBE participating) schools," said Dr. Teresa J. Kennedy, director of the Idaho GLOBE Franchise. Unfortunately, the days of

mapping were cut to nine due to concerns over the safety of the 197-foot radar antenna, used to collect the data, that extended from the ship. Therefore, there was only time to map 70 percent of the earth's surface before returning to earth.

The information gained will establish a baseline for monitoring any kinds of global changes that occur in the coming decades. Data processing is expected to take up to two years, and the maps will be released to the public in 2003.

One of the areas being studied is that of plate tectonics, the shifting of the Earth's crust along fault lines that can cause earthquakes. By mapping the earth again several years from now, and comparing the images, scientists might gain the ability to forecast earthquakes.

The detail these maps entail will provide the Defense Department with a better idea of where to deploy

troops, launch fighter jets and fire missiles. Airline pilots will also gain more information on landing sites, communication companies will learn where to install new towers for cell phones and satellites, and disaster-relief teams will be able to better cope with floods and earthquakes.

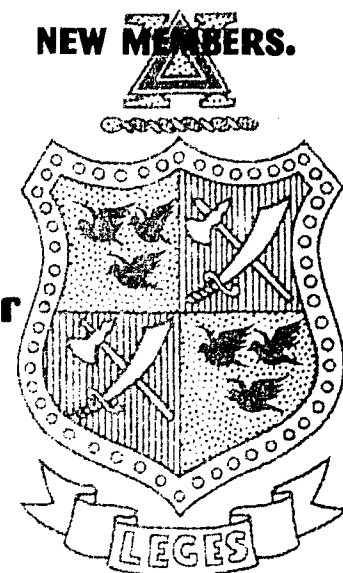
GLOBE is a worldwide network of students, teachers, and scientists working together to better understand the global environment. GLOBE students make environmental observations in their region and report their data through the Internet. Scientist use GLOBE data in their research and provide feedback to the students. Gerhard Thiele, a German astronaut on the Endeavour's international crew, sums this mission up best, stating, "That's the nice thing about this mission. We are doing something that actually affects...most people."

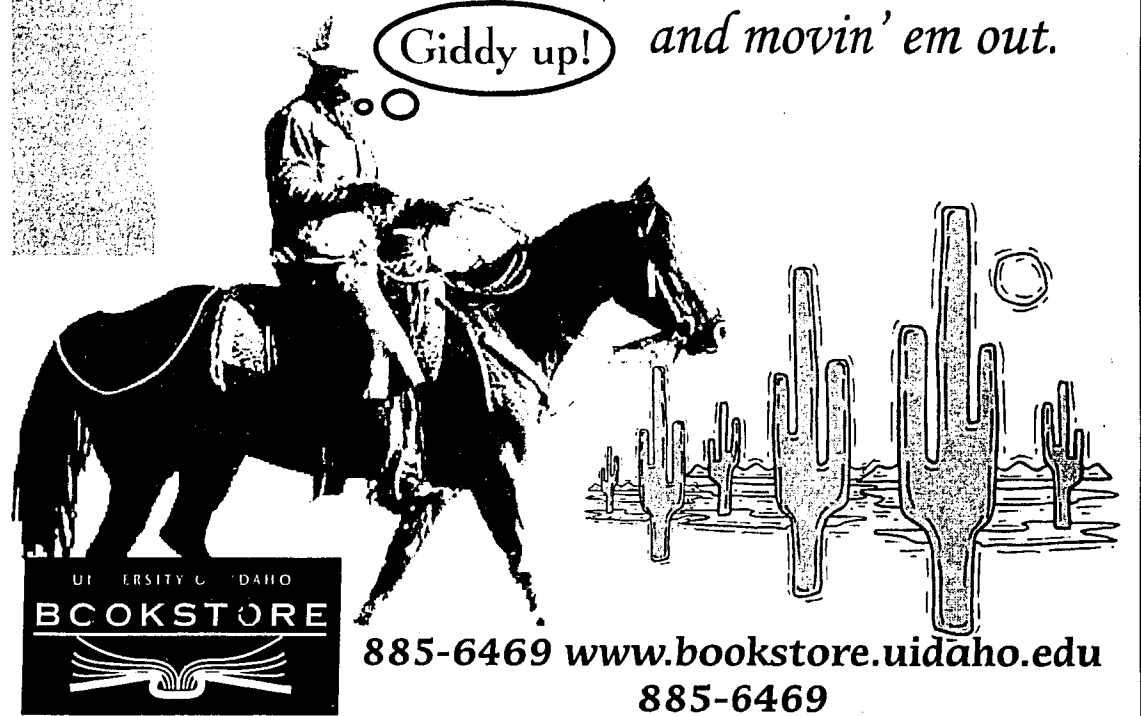

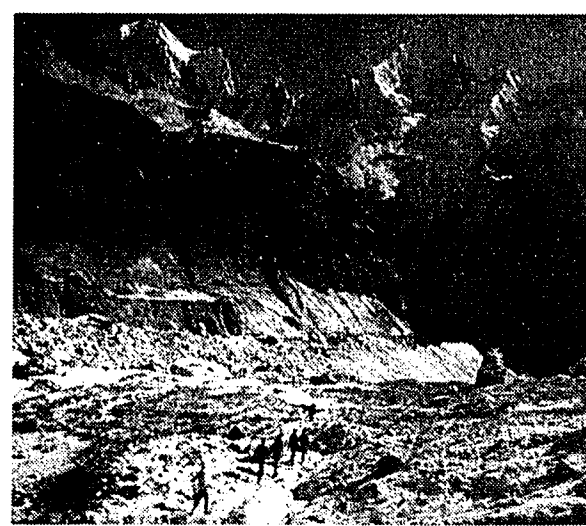

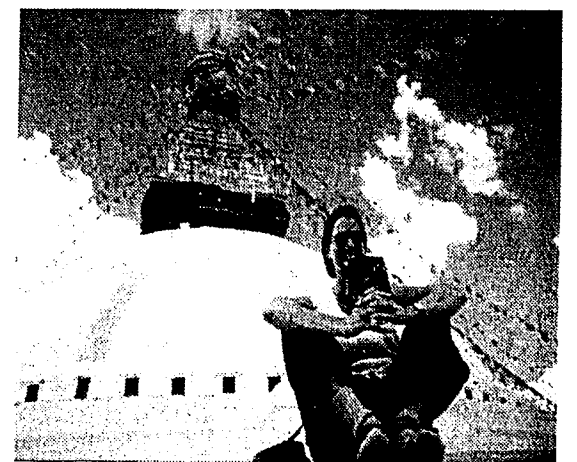

report on student fees.

The second largest proposed increase is in dedicated activity fees. Administrators are seeking to raise the fees by \$22.25, most of which will increase funds for athletics, student recreation center operations and Commons/Union operations.

Godwin said the operation increases are necessary for the two new facilities. He said the recreation center fund will grow over the next few years to a level of about \$20 per semester to pay for operations of that facility, which is scheduled to open in Fall 2001.

Other activity fee increases will go toward intramurals, Kibbie Dome operations, the marching band, Vandal Card improvements, student accident insurance and student advisory services.

Administrators are proposing a \$5 increase in total facility fees. The increases will pay for improvements to Guy Wick's field and construction of soccer fields on Poultry Hill, west of Hartung Theater, Godwin said.

Also, the architecture program, which is considered a professional program, is seeking an additional \$89 increase for its students.

Students will be able to comment on the proposed increases at a hearing scheduled for Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. in the Horizon-Aurora room in the Idaho Commons.

Comments will be recorded and submitted to the State Board of Education.

Boise State University is the only other state university released proposed increases. Administrators at BSU are asking for a \$100 increase to bring total fees to \$1241.25 each semester.

Sandpoint Rep. Jerry Stoicheff is sponsoring a bill in the Idaho Legislature to cap the matriculation fee increase at no more than three percent per year. The bill will be debated in the House Education Committee meeting today.

## Moscow Mardi Gras

p.m., downtown Moscow, from Third to Sixth street will be blocked off for the festivities. Also, starting at 1 p.m., downtown businesses will host a variety of activities for all ages. The carnival's center will be Friendship Square, which will be bustling with mask making, carnival games, food vendors, skateboard demonstrations and a fashion show by Wise Buys.

Main Street will be brightened too, with window displays, volunteers selling Mardi Gras beads, and even a wandering puppeteer. The Kenworthy Performing Arts Centre will offer free showings of the movie Willie Wonka and the Chocolate Factory and Laura's Tea and Treasure will host the Palouse Folklore Society. Also, Bookpeople will offer a storytime and Mikey's Gyros will offer face painting and costume workshops all day.

The annual Mardi Gras parade will be missing this year, for the first time since the festival began in 1979. According to Cathy Sprague, the director of daytime activities for Moscow Mardi Gras, the parade was left out because of a lack of "community support" for it, and because it gets too cold in the evenings for people to party outdoors.

Still, the celebration will continue after 5 p.m. Partygoers may move into Moscow's clubs and bars for live music from 10 different bands. The bands will offer a variety of musical styles for all tastes. In the Moose Lodge grand ballroom, the Big Newtons will dish out swing music, while at Mingles, the Kingpins will play rock. The Snake River Six will be playing Dixieland music in the downstairs of Moose Lodge. Other bands include Stranger Neighbor at the Moscow Social Club, Bamboozle at CJ's, Shiny New Hat at the Garden Lounge, and more. "We try to reach as many people as we can with the various artists," said Jerry Schultz, vice-president of the Mardi Gras Board of Directors. A complete list of the bands is available online at <http://community.palouse.net/mardigras/>.

Adults can gain entrance to all venues by buying a \$10 ticket in advance at Bookpeople of Moscow, Ken's Stationary and Ric O Shay in Pullman, or they can pay \$12 Saturday evening. Link Transportation will offer bus service between the venues, and between Moscow and Pullman, starting at 8 p.m.

Over 75 percent of the proceeds from the festival will go to Latah County youth groups. The 1999 Mardi Gras raised \$7,600, given out as grants and scholarships to groups like Boy Scouts of America and the UI Community Enrichment Program. The entire event is supported by "sponsors, volunteers, and partygoers of Moscow and the Palouse," Schultz said. "It's Moscow's celebration of spring."

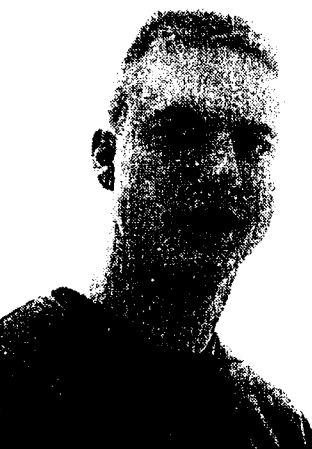

## Reject corpocracy, vote Nader

"We can have a democratic society or we can have great concentrated wealth in the hands of a few. We cannot have both."—Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis

Amidst the raucous whining over which Republican candidate runs the dirtiest campaign, the announcement of consumer advocate Ralph Nader's intention to seek the presidency as the Green Party nominee was largely overlooked last week. There is good reason why the corporate media has greeted Mr. Nader's candidacy with deafening silence: Mr. Nader is an outspoken critic of unrestrained corporate power. Indeed, he speaks the naked truth that even self-acclaimed "reformers" like Senator McCain won't. For example, Mr. Nader states, "Instead of government of, by, and for the people, we have a government of the Exxons, by the General Motors, and for the DuPonts." This statement, in a nutshell, accurately describes the greatest threat our relative form of democracy has ever known. If the reader harbors any doubt regarding the insidious corruptive impacts upon government by corporate cash, take note of the \$67 million (\$7648 per hour, every hour in 1999) Governor Bush raised for his campaign in the year before the election!

Clearly our government has been auctioned to the highest bidders, the transnational corporations. Mr. Nader alludes to this menace, "Abraham Lincoln, Theodore Roosevelt, Franklin Roosevelt, Supreme Court Justices Louis Brandeis and William Douglas, among others, eloquently warned about what Thomas Jefferson called 'the excesses of the monied interests' dominating people and their governments." Corporations have the rights of people, but are shielded from personal responsibility. Ralph Nader concisely illustrates this point; "There are no statutory criminal penalties for manufacturing a defective automobile dangerous to life. An automaker is not within the scope of such laws. But drivers are exposed to criminal fines and imprisonment—manslaughter charges—for gross negligence leading to one or more deaths." Ralph Nader first gained

wide recognition for his 1965 book "Unsafe at Any Speed," which documented that automakers knowingly sold cars that put people at increased risk for injury and death, but did nothing to correct the problems. Mr. Nader has built his reputation by repeatedly advocating for the common good. This stands in stark contrast to the two wings of the big business party (the Democrats and Republicans), that slut themselves to the "monied interests" Thomas Jefferson warned against. Don't agree with me? If the Republi-Crats represent interests other than corporate campaign financiers, how come wealth inequality is greater than at any time since WWII? Why do the wealthy

one-percent of people control more wealth than the bottom 90 percent of Americans combined? Why is average pay for the top 300 CEO's 400 times that of the entry-level worker, compared to 40 times as much in the 1970's? Why do huge transnational corporations like McDonald's and Phillip Morris get subsidies to market products overseas, while our own inner cities crumble? Why do expenditures on taxpayer funded corporate welfare programs, amounting to hundreds of billions of dollars per year, continue to increase along with government giveaways of taxpayer assets such as public forests, airways, minerals and new medicines? Why have personal savings dropped to near record lows in our booming economy? Is it because monopolists like Bill Gates are allowed to amass fortunes equal to the net assets of America's poorest 120 million (40 percent) citizens, and other such obscene (but common) inequalities? The answer, of course, is a resounding Yes! I propose, to all who favor returning to a governing system that at least resembles democracy, that we rally around Ralph Nader's candidacy for the presidency. No, he won't win the rigged (hell, they won't even let him participate in formal debates) election. But he will broaden the overall debate by injecting neglected issues into it. He will also have a female, American Indian environmental activist named Winona LaDuke as a running mate. Candidate Nader argues that "Our country has far more problems than it deserves and far more solutions than it applies. The reason: excessive concentration of power and wealth in a few hands." ### Proposed Medicaid cutbacks in the Idaho Legislature

To the editor:

In the recent articles concerning the proposed Medicaid cut-backs to the developmentally disabled in Idaho, it has occurred to me that understanding the significance of these cuts is not possible without some discussion of who the developmentally disabled are and what the services in question entail. As an employee of a Developmental Disability Agency (DDA), I have worked one-on-one with the developmentally disabled for several years, providing many of the services that are proposed to be cut.

Almost all of the developmentally disabled are unable to drive cars, many are unable to read or write, cannot count change up to a dollar or read a clock. Most are unaware of and have little understanding of the proposals that the Idaho legislature is considering which would change their lives so drastically.

Most developmentally disabled receive SSI or Social Security and some receive Aid to the Aged, Blind and Disabled, from the state. It rarely exceeds \$532 per month. Many also have jobs, usually 2-4 hours per day. When they try to work more, their lives tend to start falling apart.

With the support of DDA's, many of these folks now live in their own apartments in which they take extreme pride, paying their own rent, utilities and clothing from their \$532 per month. The DDA's primary responsibility is to provide "therapies" in which their "consumers" learn by doing the life skills necessary to live

on their own. For most, this is a life-long endeavor. These therapies include budgeting, bill-paying, housekeeping, shopping for groceries and other necessities, cooking and making responsible choices in the myriad of functions involved in daily living. The goal is independence, or more likely, to achieve the highest level of competence possible for each individual given his or her abilities.

Recently, one of our lawmakers stated in reference to these services, that "If a service is free, people will flock to it." To many of our consumers, these therapies are essential to their survival and independence. I have seen no one "flocking" to these services. In our facility, we serve roughly the same number of consumers that we did a year ago and the year before that.

My co-workers are special people who are willing to work for wages usually between \$6 and \$8 per hour at a very difficult and complex job. Our task tends to go far beyond the job description. It is necessary that we become mentors, guides, and friends with our "consumers". We provide encouragement to these individuals who daily face a world that is nearly incomprehensible and sometimes harsh to them.

Services to the developmentally disabled are perhaps the best deal the state of Idaho has ever had. It is apparent, that without these services, most consumers would struggle and require a more intensive and expensive level of support, i.e. state institutions.

## You're a Good Man, Charles Schulz

Good grief! as Charlie Brown would say, What is all the noise about?

The House of Representatives has adopted a resolution to award a Congressional Gold Medal. The astronauts aboard space shuttle Endeavor took time from their important mission to pay tribute. Former CEOs of MetLife have issued an adoring statement. Honorary services have been held all over the country. Famous people have been grieving. Ordinary people have been letter writing. People here and there have been crying. All because of you, Good Ol' Charlie Brown.

We can still hear him sighing as he signs off, Oh brother...

And we will miss him dearly. Charles Schulz, the creator of "Peanuts", with an estimated readership of 350 million in 75 countries in 2,600 newspapers in 21 languages, has drawn his last cartoon. Symbolic to a 'T', he passed away the day before his much publicized final "Peanuts" was to appear in the Sunday morning editions, virtually 50 years to the date since he first started to draw a comic series casting children with oversized heads. When Schulz first began, few cartoonists suspected what they widely, and admirably, acknowledge now: his series has been, by far, the most successful comic strip in history.

In the face of the national sense of loss at his passing, his estimated \$55 million in earnings is irrelevant as a sign of success. The pang we all felt when we first heard the news is the true testimony to Schulz's talent as an artist. And an artist he was, far removed from the taxpayer-funded "artists" who mold dung, collect urine, and desecrate religious symbols in the name of artistic expression. His art didn't have to provoke

people to get their attention, to move them. His art didn't seek to tear down the sacred, but rather to elevate it, illuminate it. He did not take the easy path of destroyer. He was a peaceful creator (small "c"), who chose the road less traveled to becoming an Artist (big "A").

Few artists are able to make such a connection with Middle America with so little fanfare, with illustrations originally considered primitive, with themes at first regarded as simple or childish. Yet we loved them and yearned for more. Just as Mister Rogers possesses that special something, that knack to communicate so well with children while talking right over (or under) the heads of grown-ups, so too did Schulz have the organic ability to communicate directly to us on such an understandable level. To illustrate for us the essence of who we are, adults, at our most innocent and vulnerable, was his calling: his subjects were our fears, our desires, our foibles, our victories, our lives. And he was able to speak to each of these through cartoon characters of—how so insightfully—children. And he did it in such a way so as to make us—how so thankfully—laugh.

For he was one of us, a very intuitive one of us, a decorative seam in our social fabric: son of a barber, religious man, WWII veteran, father of three, stepfather of two, grandfather of 18, and respected by everyone. He reflected, in a vein similar to Norman Rockwell, the angst and self-awareness of a changing yet changeless American society in subtleties of character far more effective than any voluminous speech. In short, what Schulz possessed can never be acquired by training nor replicated by practice. It was a gift, one specially given for, and in, a place and time—America, last half of the 20th century. He was a gift irreplaceable.

Yes, you were truly a good man, Charles Schulz.

# Nation's hottest team trounces Vandals

The Utah State Aggies, in the midst of the longest NCAA winning streak in the nation, rolled over a University of Idaho team that is fighting for its postseason life 73-52 Thursday evening.

The Vandals went into Thursday evening with three legitimate chances to earn a spot in the Big West tournament. A Vandal win Thursday versus Utah State or Nevada loss to Boise State would have placed the Vandals in next week's tournament in Reno. But Idaho lost to Utah State and Nevada held on to defeat Boise State 62-59, which sets up a Saturday showdown in Reno between the Wolf Pack and the Vandals in which the winner would go to the Big West Tournament while the loser would be done for the season. Idaho now faces a must win game in which they will have to hope to play much better than they did last evening.

Idaho suffered through a horrid shooting night while their Aggie opponent was red hot from the all

over the court. The Vandal shooting woes began in a first half that saw them shoot only 25 percent from the floor and score a season low 18 points. For the game, Idaho shot 31 percent with Gordon Scott's uncharacteristic 3-for-14 performance being the most noteworthy.

Conversely, Utah State was hot all evening long, shooting 55 percent from the floor and 56 percent from behind the three-point stripe, led by the outstanding accuracy of Aggie Tony Brown, who nailed seven of nine from long range.

"We got into a hurry," said Idaho senior swingman Devon Ford of the team's shooting slump. "We didn't get our feet set and we tried to shoot a lot with hands in our face instead of working through the offense."

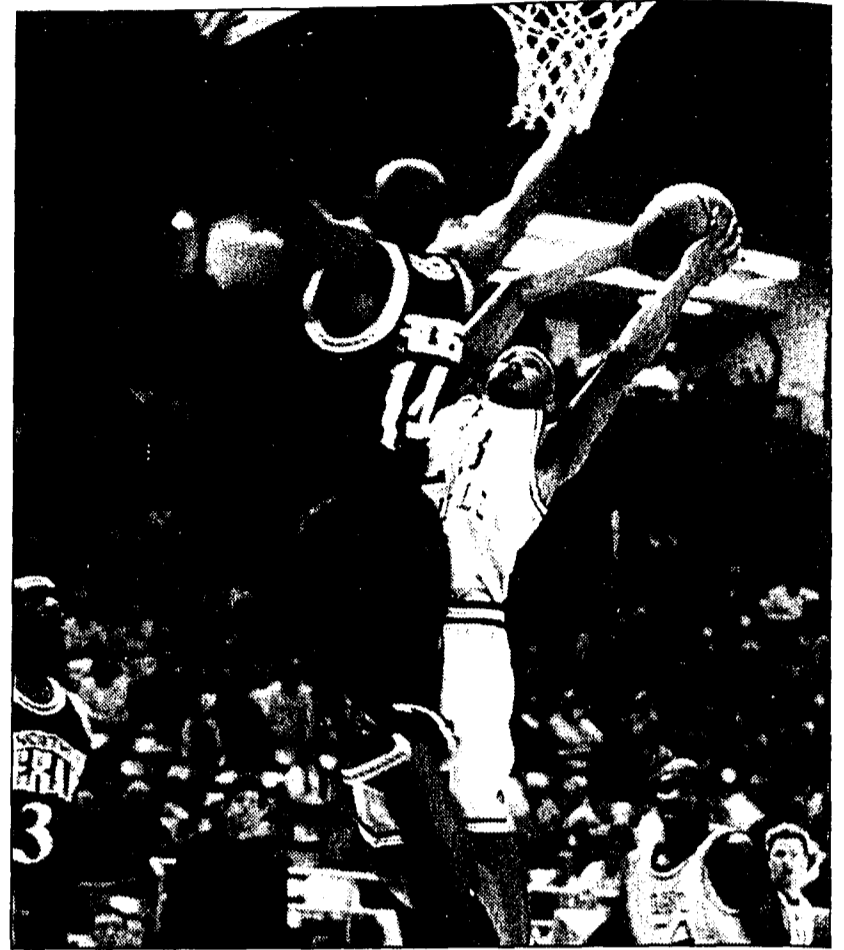
Utah State jumped out to an early 12-3 lead and would hold a comfortable advantage from that point on, leading by 8 to 12 points throughout the first half and then jumping out to a 20 point nod in the second half. The lone hope for the Vandals came early in the first half, when Scott connected on back-to-back three point attempts

to cut the lead to nine points. But Scott, who had shot 0-8 in the first half, would connect on only one more shot all game and Idaho would never get closer than nine points.

The Aggies used a 7-0 run midway through the final half to put themselves up 56-39. A final Vandal charge trimmed the lead back down to a dozen with seven minutes and change to play but Brown's seventh three pointer of the night sparked another USU run that put the contest out of reach.

"I thought going in we had a legitimate chance," lamented Idaho coach Dave Farrar. "I thought we could go into the last five minutes with a chance to win the game. (But) this team beat us a lot of different ways and none of them were pretty. We couldn't have played any worse in the first half."

Utah State improves to 15-0 in the Big West conference, while Idaho falls to 6-9. If the Vandals hope to qualify for the Big West Tournament in Reno, they will have to win there on Saturday night. Game time is 7:05 p.m.

# Vandals women's comeback falls short at BSU

The BSU-UI women's basketball game had all the ingredients to be a classic. Not only was this a

rivalry game, but it also had huge postseason implications. The teams had identical 13-12 records and were both 6-6 in the Big West. The winner automatically qualified for the Big West Tournament in Reno. The loser would need a loss by

NMSU to qualify. The Vandals who were down by as many as 15 points early in the second half fought back valiantly but a great team effort could not overcome the lead that BSU compiled during the beginning of the game. The Vandals got to within one point with eleven seconds left. BSU then widened the lead to 59-56 with a couple of free throws. The Vandals called timeout then took the ball the length of the court only to see an Alli Nieman three pointer, and their remarkable comeback effort fall short 59-56. With the loss the Vandals fall to 6-7 in the Big West, fourth place in the Big West eastern division, and BSU

moves into a second place tie with Nevada at 7-6.

The Bench played a key role for the Vandals Thursday as Alli Nieman was held to only five points, all coming in the final seven minutes of the game. Vandal head coach Hillary Recknor, in an interview with KQQQ radio after the game said, "I really have to give a lot of credit to our bench."

The Vandals had two players in double figures. Susan Woolf led the way with 17, and Laura Bloom had 14. Nieman had 12 rebounds and Darcie Pemberton came off the bench and had nine.

BSU had three players in double

figures. The Broncos were led by Christa Peterson with 15 points, and Stephanie Block with 12. "We didn't expect Peterson to step it up the way she did," Recknor said.

The Vandals started the game very slow. "Where we hurt ourselves was in the first half," Recknor said. They shot 29% in the first half and 1-11 from three point range. Forward Laura Bloom said (also in an interview with KQQQ) "I thought we started off pretty strong, we just got down by too much."

The Broncos' inside offense

# Indoor season concludes with Last Chance Meet

The indoor track season runs to a close this weekend for the University of Idaho team in the McDonald's NCAA Last Chance Meet. For a chosen few, though, this appropriately named event is their final opportunity to qualify for the NCAA Indoor National Championship Meet, held in Fayetteville, Ark., on March 10 and 11.

The men's team has three candidates looking forward to make the push to the national tournament. Sophomore Joachim Olsen, ranked second in the nation currently, has already qualified for the Vandals in the shot put.

NAIA All-American transfer Sherwin James has been extremely close all year to qualifying in the long jump. James is currently working through a knee injury. If he can perform through the injury, he could vault himself into nation-

als.

"He [James] has been within a few centimeters of qualifying," stated coach Wayne Phipps. "His knee injury is the biggest limiting factor right now."

Jeff High is also trying to gain a bid to nationals. Though he has not qualified yet, the senior has been a standout performer in the thirty-five pound weight throw this season. His school record of 60-4 is only three feet short of the provisional qualifying mark of 63-4.

"He [High] has improved every single meet," analyzed Phipps. "Things are coming around for him at the right time."

Adekunle Adejuyigbe, competing in the 400 meter, rounds out the indoor hopefuls. Adejuyigbe has been just fractions of a second away in the past few seasons.

"He [Adejuyigbe] has run solid so far this season," said Phipps. "It's just a matter of putting it together that day."

Adejuyigbe needs to shave just .17 seconds off of his current best to

meet the NCAA's A mark for the 400.

Though the meet offers an opportunity to compete in the indoor nationals, the event is also the final preparation for the men's and women's outdoor season, which begins at the Stanford Relays Mar. 24.

This weekend's meet is a measuring stick for the women's team. The meet will feature a full squad from Boise State. The Vandals intend to gauge themselves against their arch-rival and Big West counterpart.

"We are looking to have another good team meet and improve our marks," coach Yogi Teevens concluded. "It will also be a head to head battle with Boise State."

The meet is held at the ASUI Kibbie Dome on Friday and Saturday. The events start at 4 p.m. on Friday and 9 a.m. on Saturday. There is a five-dollar entrance fee for all spectators, athletes, and coaches.

## Newark team wants Strawberry

If Darryl Strawberry wants to play ball during his one-year suspension, count the Newark Bears in. "If he wants to play somewhere, we want to have him," Dave Popkin, a spokesman for the unaffiliated minor league team in New Jersey's largest city, said Tuesday. The Bears have a new ballpark in Newark, not far from Strawberry's home in Fort Lee.

The New York Yankees outfielder was suspended for a year Monday and cannot play for any major league team or any minor league team affiliated with them.

The Bears are in the independent eight-team Atlantic League, which Popkin said had 64 former major leaguers in its ranks last season, when it fielded six teams.

"The Bears do have interest in Darryl. We know he's gone the independent route before," Popkin said. The team plans to wait a week before contacting Strawberry, Popkin said.

Strawberry played in the independent Northern League for the St. Paul Saints in 1996, hitting .435 with 18 home runs and 39 RBIs in 29 games. He spent two months with the Saints before rejoining the Yankees.

The Bears are owned by Rick Cerone, a former catcher for the Yankees and other major league clubs.

## Smith's former girlfriend asks for half his fortune

A former girlfriend of Emmitt Smith told a judge Wednesday she

was legally married to the Dallas Cowboys running back and argued she is entitled to half his fortune.

Hope Wilson and Smith appeared before a family law judge Wednesday in Dallas to discuss issues surrounding child visitation rights for their 1-year-old daughter, Regan.

In court, Wilson claimed to be Smith's common law wife. Her lawyers called for a jury to hear the matter of what they called a marriage and referred to Wilson in court as "Mrs. Smith."

Smith's lawyers objected and the judge agreed to refer to the two as mother and father in court, for now Smith was unavailable for comment. Smith's lawyer, Angeline Bain; Smith's agent, Eugene Parker; and Cowboys spokesman Rich Dalrymple did not return calls seeking comment Wednesday night.

Under Texas law, if Wilson is legally Smith's common law wife, she might be entitled to up to half his fortune.

It was unclear whether Wilson lives in Texas.

The 30-year-old Smith finished the 1999 season at Dallas with 1,397 yards—eight shy of the NFC lead and his best since 1995.

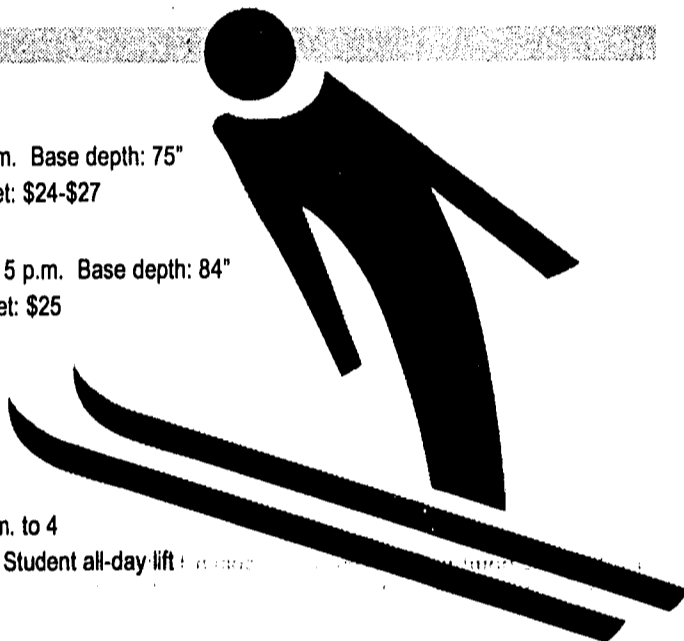

# Sparky Anderson elected to Hall; Mazerowski, Hodges, Harder left

TAMPA, Fla.—Sparky Anderson had a choice.

Would his Hall of Fame plaque show him wearing a Cincinnati Reds cap or a Detroit Tigers hat?

"It was so hard," he said Tuesday after being elected by the Veterans Committee. "I spent nine years in Cincinnati and 17 in Detroit, and they treated me like a king in both places."

In the end, the only manager to win World Series championships in both leagues chose Cincinnati. He did it to thank former Reds general manager Bob Howsam.

"He hired a 35-year-old nobody and he had the courage and fortitude to do that," Anderson said.

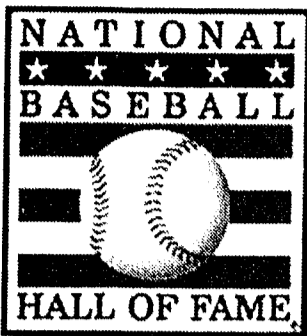
"Had he not done that, I doubt very much in all honesty that I would have managed in the major leagues. And I owe that to him."

Anderson's election ensures a Red-letter reunion on induction day. Big Red Machine first baseman Tony Perez and longtime Cincinnati broadcaster Marty Brennaman were previously selected.

Along with Anderson, the Vets elected Negro leagues outfielder Turkey Stearnes and 19th century

infielder Bid McPhee, who played his entire career in Cincinnati.

But Ted Williams, Stan Musial and the rest of the 14-member panel had a lot more trouble deciding which former big leaguer to elect—be it Bill Mazerowski, Gil Hodges, Dom DiMaggio, Mel Harder or Tony



Oliva.

So for the first time since 1993, it did not choose anyone in that category.

"We hoped someone would be

there, we really did," first-time member Hank Aaron said. "It just got too hard. Maybe next year."

Afterward, the chewed-up pens and half-eaten cake in the meeting room told the story. Despite five hours of discussion and two tough ballots, it was a shutout—it took 11 votes for election, and Mazerowski just missed with 10.

"It built my hopes up, but not to the point where this is a big let-down," said Mazerowski, working as a spring training instructor for the Pirates in Bradenton, about an hour south of Tampa.

"There was a lot of push in Pittsburgh and by the Pirates, and I appreciate all that. It just didn't happen," he said.

Anderson, who turned 66 last week, was elected in his first of eligibility. Third on baseball's career victory list, he is the only manager to post 100-win seasons in both leagues.

"I never wore a World Series ring, but I will wear this one every day until I die," he said from his home in Thousand Oaks, Calif. "That, to me, is how much difference there is between the World Series and Hall of Fame."

Anderson will become the 16th manager inducted into the shrine at Cooperstown, N.Y., on July 23. He has been to the upstate New York village, but has never set foot inside the Hall.

"I didn't ever want to go into the

most precious place in the world unless I belonged there," he said.

Perez and Boston catcher Carlton Fisk, whose Game 6 home run beat the Reds in the 1975 World Series, were both elected in January by the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Anderson was 863-586 with the Reds from 1970-78 and led them to Series titles in 1975-76. He was 1,331-1,248 with the Tigers from 1979-95 and guided them to the 1984 championship.

Anderson, who made two other Series appearances, is the only manager to lead two teams in career wins. He victory total ranks him behind just Connie Mack (3,731) and John McGraw (2,784).

started to click late in the first half and they went on their 10-0 run. While the BSU offense began to find the groove, their defense shut down Senior Allie Nieman. Nieman was held scoreless in the first half and most of the second half as she was double and triple-teamed all game.

With 46 seconds left, the Vandals were down by three when Woolf was apparently fouled on a three-point shot. The referee ruled, however, that she was not in the act of shooting and she got two shots instead of three. She buried them both to bring the Vandals to within one point. The Vandals fouled Stephanie Block of BSU and she hit both shots to widen the lead to three with eleven seconds left, setting up Nieman's last-second shot.

By virtue of UNT's 62-51 victory over NMSU, the Vandals are assured of a berth in the conference tournament, but will most likely occupy fourth position in the Eastern Division. "We don't want to go into the tournament seeded fourth," Bloom said. The fourth seeded team from the Eastern Division will play the Western Division champion, 25-3 UC-Santa Barbara, in the tournament.

The Vandals' last regular season game is against Long Beach State on Saturday at 7 p.m. in Memorial Gym.

While many bands have trouble with people paying a cover charge, Phat Sidy Smokehouse fans have trouble staying covered.

Recent shows of the Seattle-based band at Moscow's John's Alley have been a hedonistic spectacle of debauchery and nakedness, fueled by nitro-injected funk.

"We don't know why our music has that effect in Moscow, but it does," said Bob Lovelace, Phat Sidy's bassist. While the Mardi Gras spirit may inspire such activity, it must be noted that the band or the Alley's management does not encourage it. Now the 7-piece, irrepressible ensemble includes bassist Lovelace, drummer Davee C., guitarist Brian Ray, saxophonist Jon Ryser, trumpeter Chris Littlefield, percussionist Dirk Jackson, and the honey-gasoline textured vocals of Ernest Pumpfrey, Jr.

Jam sessions at "the Greenhouse" in the U-district of Seattle lead to the recording of "Platos Grande Rehersial," a mon-

strous first effort- completed with a mini budget.

"Rehersial" garnered background airplay on MTV's "Road Rules" and "Real World, Seattle." The album also propelled Phat Sidy into opening for national acts such as Fishbone and Digital Underground. In 1997, Phat Sidy co-headlined Seattle's Hempfest with the now defunct SuperSonicSoulPimps- with well over 25,000 in attendance.

Last spring, "Subrabae" was released. This second effort clinched Phat Sidy's place among Northwest bands of any style, and is a consummate favorite in the jukebox of John's Alley. Songs like "Butter" spread easily, and "Make Some Noise" does just that.

While Phat Sidy is reverent of "old school" styles such as Parliament, the band's eclectic palette of styles is very original, thereby creating their new school sound.

"From a basic molecular arrangements of bass, drums, vocals, guitar, and horns arises a new compound which is time tested and approved," said saxophonist Ryser.

"We're working on a new album, (tentatively titled) "Tanzanite," said Lovelace. "Tanzanite is like a diamond ... a valuable mineral," he said.

Expect a few new musical surprises at this Saturday's Alley show: complimenting crowd favorites from "Rehersial," "Suprabae," and hopefully a few unrecorded classics like "Spooze Couch."

"Bigger places like Boise and

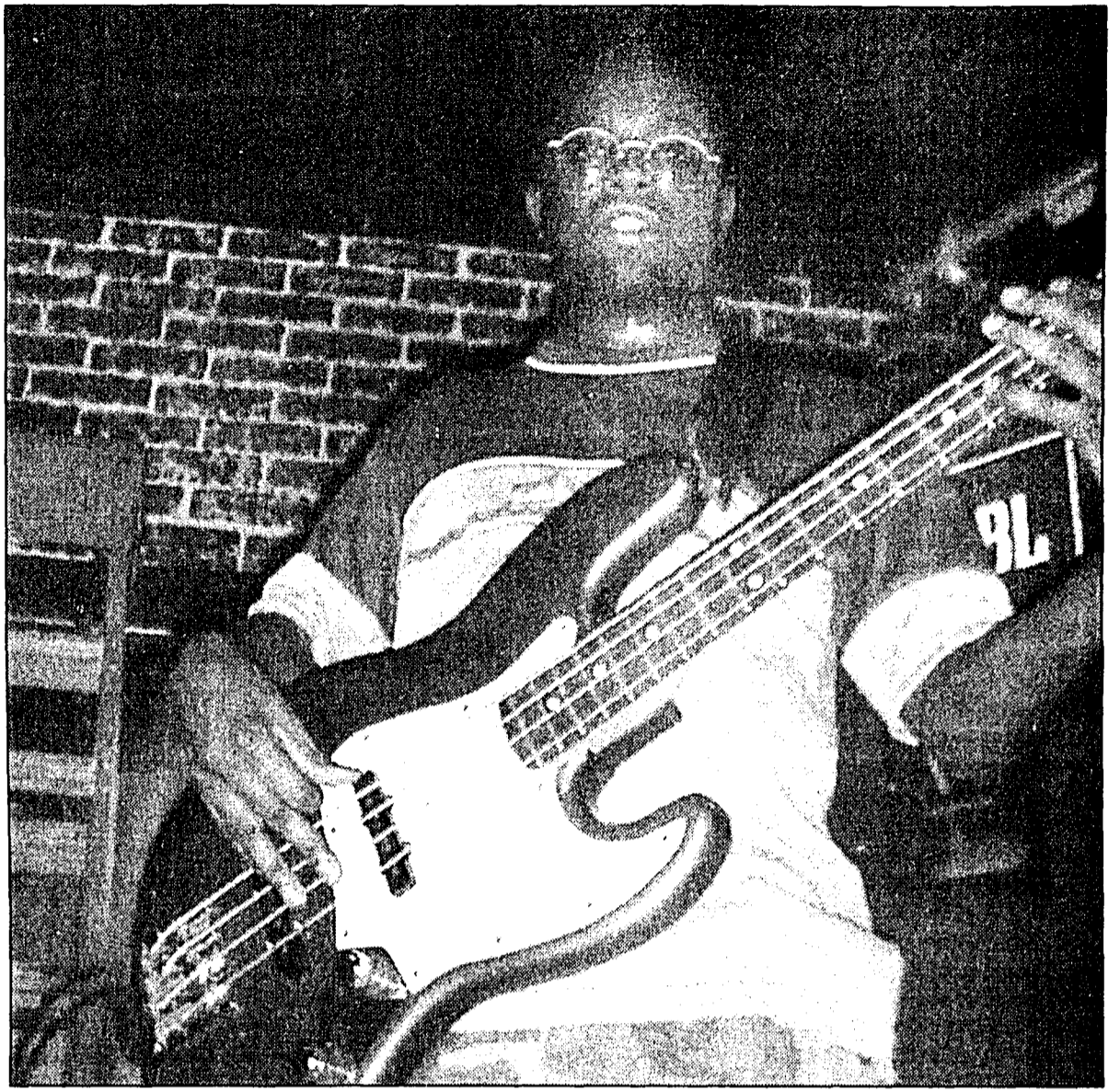

# Musical cheese and mandolin strings

While in the Mardi Gras mood this weekend, consider heading to The Met in Spokane on Monday night for a musical ride with the String Cheese Incident.

Incidentally, the Boulder based quintet's appearance in Spokane is a stop on their Winter Carnival Tour. Following the February release of their live album, "Carnival '99," String Cheese is enjoying success, and a strong following from fans.

"The whole thing was an accident," says Mandolin player Michael Kang about the band's formation seven years ago. Kang, along with guitarist Bill Nershi, bassist Keith Moseley, and percussionist Michael Travis, began entertaining at lift lines of ski mountains around Colorado for free lift tickets and free beer. While being ski bums, the band was invited to open for the Telluride Bluegrass Festival, which, according to Kang, scared them into becoming a real band. Keyboard player, Kyle Hollingsworth, later joined the band, creating the fifth element of String Cheese.

Known for their ability to meld a plethora of musical genres into their own unique style, String Cheese is often compared to Phish. Kang considers the comparison as a great compliment, but says that although both bands share a common approach and similar influences, the music of String Cheese differs, stylistically.

From a blend of bluegrass and reggae to Latin and classic rock, String Cheese manages to keep a high level of communication with their audience while on stage, adding new moments of improvisation to each performance. Electric mandolins with wah-wah pedals, accordions, djembes, hula-hoops,

Records, allowing them many freedoms, including the creation of a grassroots fan base.

"We don't have to worry about pleasing other people - except ourselves, which is hard enough," states Kang.

String Cheese even runs a travel agency so their fans can make travel and accommodation arrangements easier.

"We're kind of control freaks," says Kang, "we like to do it all ourselves and keep it all within the family."

Is the band particularly fond of mozzarella cheese? Kang said that they tried not to take themselves too seriously, so they chose the stupidest name they could think of. However, drummer Michael Travis told the Argonaut at their show in Pullman last spring that the band's name stems from an incident with a cheese-like buildup on Kang's mandolin strings.

If you haven't seen String Cheese, you could be in for a treat - and you don't have to be lactose tolerant.

"A live "Incident" is an outrageous adventure - fabulous music, terrific fans, and an outstanding production," states the band's publicist, Carrie Lombardi. She said audiences can expect large stage backdrops and props involving such motifs as snow and wolves and mountains and festivity, "All with a String Cheese twist..."

After String Cheese's Spokane performance, the Winter Carnival's next stop is Boise's Fat Tuesday celebration on March 7 and 8 in The Rose Room.

## String Cheese Incident 'Carnival '99'

The String Cheese Incident has recently released its fourth album, "Carnival '99." The band's own record label, SCI Fidelity Records, has graced the market with the presence of this live, double-disc album extracted from the "incidents" of their 1999 tour.

"Carnival '99" is an amazing example of the intermingling of musical disciplines. The String Cheese Incident demonstrates a rare talent in their instrumentally oriented songs. The String Cheese Incident's "Carnival '99" ensemble is a display of raw talent and expertise, which should prove to be appreciated on a grand scale. The multitudes of high points leave "Carnival '99" in a formidable class that belittles a vast majority of today's music.



## The Suicide Machines (self titled)

# The spirit of Moscow Mardi Gras past

Just when February seems to go on forever, March comes along, and brings a Moscow tradition with it.

Moscow Mardi Gras is back again, but why did this New Orleans holiday reach the semi-arctic winds of northern Idaho?

"It was a party mostly to shed the winter blues...and it grew," states Moscow local Alvin Warnberg, who says he's been around as long as dirt. And along with that dirt, Warnberg has been around to see some of Moscow's first Mardi Gras celebrations.

He said that Mardi Gras parade used to be huge — thousands of people lined the streets to see acts such as a precision marching kazoo band and UI law school students in a briefcase brigade.

Warnberg recalls that one year, Southern Idaho was quite overrun with jackrabbits, so there was a "bunny bash" march in the Mardi Gras parade. In 1984, Warnberg said, there was even a rendition of Michael Jackson's "Thriller" video marching down Main Street. Another parade act included the church of the "Librarian Nations," sporting spectacles, paperbacks, and signs reading "Better well-read than dead," and "Bright Supremacy." He said that this act was in jest of the Aryan Nations, after Richard Butler had established himself in north Idaho. Warnberg couldn't afford a Mardi Gras ticket one year, so instead he amused himself by riding the shuttle busses all night.

"I didn't have a ticket, but I had a ticket to ride," he joked.

Cope Gale, a coordinator for

some of the first Mardi Gras celebrations, said the tradition began in 1979 or 1980. He said that the festival was designed to be colorful, using the traditional Mardi Gras colors of green, gold, and purple, to help liven up the long, gray winter months. But he said he found it bizarre, when festivities such as Beaux Arts Ball started eliminating colors, and sticking to a black and white theme.

However, in recent years, the color has come back in form of the decorations and posters found around town. Gale said he's happy to see the color back in the carnival.

Micro movie house, the Food Co-op, Renaissance Fair, and Farmers Market, were some of the things that gave Moscow its university town, non-conformist character, said Warnberg.

"University towns are time warps. You are perpetually 20 — you never grow old," he said.

Moscow is way off the beaten path, according to Warnberg. "It's not Texas A&M, or U.C., and that's a lot of its charm." Nowhere else in the country, he said, can you find two major and separate state universities within 10 minutes from each other, in a rural setting. But there is a decent amount of diversity in the "Moscow microcosm," he says.

"If you don't want anything, Moscow's got a lot of that."

The second Mardi Gras, according to Gale, was when "firecracker" Charlotte Buchanan got involved, and the festival began to grow. In its third year, Gale said, UI art professor David Giese became involved as

a coordinator of the paper floats for the parade.

Back in those days most of the proceeds went to the UI Prichard Art Gallery, said Gale. After the university dropped out of Mardi Gras involvement, he explained, the coordinators decided to use the money for local youth projects, as it still does today.

Some of those youth projects in the past have involved funding for high school environmental students' trips, and the Moscow Skate Park fund, according to Cope. He said his only involvement in this year's Mardi Gras is the unfavorable task of collecting the money from the venues, and dropping it off in the Mardi Gras cash box.

Although this year's festivities include everything from a walking puppeteer to 10 bands playing in 10 different venues, it just won't be the same as the old days. Warnberg said that recent Mardi Gras celebrations have lost some of their original essence that was rooted in the 70's hippie mentality. Buchanan, who had "huge energy" no longer resides in Moscow. Warnberg says that this is one of the factors contributing to the demise of Mardi Gras. Another factor, he says, is the changes that took place during the Reagan administration, when Idaho changed the legal drinking age from 19 to 21.

Nevertheless, Mardi Gras is still an event not to be missed, including activities taking place all day and night in downtown Moscow.

"It always rains or snows on Mardi Gras morning," said Warnberg.

So when you head out to party with the Mardi Gras crowds on Saturday, you might want to bring an umbrella.

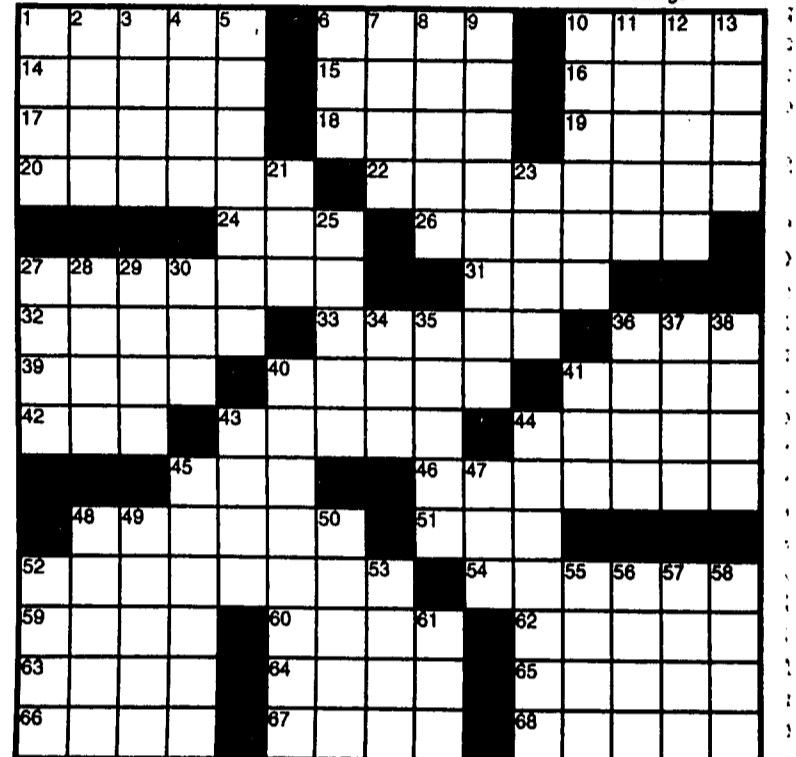
