

The UK import brought their sound to Spokane on their US tour following the release of their first studio album, Settle.

Brothers Guy and Howard Lawrence have been driving the UK funky sound since 2010. In the years since Disclosure's launch, they made it to the top of UK pop charts, secured a Grammy nomination, and collaborated with many award-wining artists on a handful of singles and EPs.

In Moscow, the closest venue for large electronic shows is Spokane's Knitting Factory, where 1,500 ravers turn up to see the latest electronic artist make their way through the Northwest. Disclosure brought their house party vibe to knit; a taste of future garage that is rarely seen this far from the UK.

The gig opened with T. Williams, an iconic garage Producer and DJ who's played for Resident Advisor Podcast and BBC Radio One in his 12 years of DJing. Williams' set the stage for Disclosure, playing his club edit of Disclosure's single Latch, alongside many other Garage Funk choones.

Disclosure's set went off in a much different fashion than most EDM raves held at the Knit. No one was tearing out hair to intense drops that push the limit of the venue's system. People were actually dancing, and it felt like a party. The vibes were positive, the drinks were cold, and the hugs were free as they should be.

THE AGE OF SYNTHESIZER

You may have noticed that this year at our first annual Taste of Treefort concert we've had the opportunity to invite an amazing production duo, Odesza, to join us at the University of Idaho. Odesza began as a collaboration of Harrison Mills (aka Catacomb Kid) and Clayton Knight (aka Beaches-Beaches) when they first met during their senior year. As recent graduates of Western Washington University they came together in the summer of 2012 to create their first album "Summer's Gone", which was self-released for free on September 5th of that same year. The album itself had reached over 1.6 million streams on Soundcloud and their popularity hasn't stopped there. The SoundCloud record, to date, for


streams for Odesza has been 4.7 million and producing bands within this hiphop and electronic genre have been popping up all across the country.

Just to name a few: Phantogram, Animal Collective, Toro y Moi, Beach House and the list could go on for this entire article. It's become more noticeable, whether you are listening from your headphones or to a live performance, that bands within the Indy genre have incorporated a seasoning or a heavy spoon full of electronic sound into their albums. Bands are not just playing guitar, drums, bass or keyboard, they are asked to make the next jump to become competent and imaginative producers both offstage and onstage.

The last concert I was able to attend was AAN (Amor Ad Nauseum) at Mikey's Gyros where they played with Desert

Noises and The Kitchen. The stage had what you'd expect of most concerts, but what had become increasingly interesting to watch throughout the evening was the large collection of synthesizers and stomp-pedals that had corralled the musicians into gridded sections of the stage. Musicians would iump from one hand held instrument to the floor to suddenly kick a pedal and readjust the volume with a toe. The precision these musicians took to make the music that might traditionally be cultivated in a studio and allowed it to burst forth onstage was astounding. From the origins of what would be the Synthesizer, the electronic sounds played with in the 18th century with the invention of the clavecin électrique, the use of technology has come along way with the experimentation of electronic sounds in the music scene today.

DAFT PUNK (ISN'T) DEAD



With an eight-year break out of the studio, Daft Punk definitely showed that they could "Bring Life Back to Music," with their album Random Access Memories.

In the KUOI studio the review given to the album says, "They have disco fever circa 1979. Disco should stay DEAD. However, Daft Punk offers plenty for the modern dance floor and they continue to straddle the Atlantic Ocean with ease. Both Europe and the States get something to groove to."

This review is a great start to what this album is but it does not grasp all the way what this album means to the music community and to me as a listener.

Let us start with the basics. Everyone knows Daft Punk for their sweet mixture of disco and electronic music starting in the nineties, and that is what people expected from another Daft Punk album. This was not the case for RAM, this album is full of disco jams with the sole intent for the robots to show off their musical skill and work with some of their personal idols.

Giovanni Giorgio, the grand daddy of synthdisco music and modern electronic dance music shows up in the album with a song entirely dedicated to him. If that is not enough for you, Nile Rodgers plays in three of the tracks, namely "Get Lucky," and Julian Casablancas provides vocals for the track "Instant Crush." The list of collaborators stretches on with big names and none of them disappoint in the songs they contributed their talents.

This album is the album that the duo has probably dreamed of making since they started making music. The entirety of the album, save the electronic jam "Doin' it Right," has live instrumentation with awesome solos of several different instruments. Anyone who tells you that this album is sub-par they are blowing smoke up your ass. So go give Random Access Memories a chance if you have not yet and if you have give it another listen. If you keep all this in mind I promise you won't be disappointed.

AAN-TOP OF TREEFORT

Nae and Michael, of the Taste of Treefort radio show sat down with the band AAN to discuss their new album and their Treefort experiences.

Nae: We have an entire show dedicated to Treefort Music Fest and previewing artists that will be at Treefort Music Fest. Right now, in the studio, we have the band AAN, and they are going to talk a little bit with us about their Treefort experiences and what-have-you. And this tour is to promote your newest album?

Bud: Correct. It is the first fulllength record, it's called "Amor Ad Nauseum."

Nae: Great. You guys have played Treefort before, you're kind of Treefort veterans. Would you guys talk a little bit about your experience or how you perceive the festival in general?

Bud: [We've played it] every year. It's fantastic. I think a lot of it has to do with the people that are putting on the show. They have a very good understanding of what an artist wants when they're playing a festival. They put you up in a very nice space, and I think people like Eric and Megan, who are some of the main people – I know there's ten or fifteen people are involved - they are just on it, like all the time. Eric Gilbert, who's one of the promoters and one of the bookers, is just running his tail off the whole time trying to make sure everybody's accommodated. Beyond that, just the booking is outstanding. People from all over the country...there's a couple of international acts, Disco Doom from Switzerland...

Nae: You guys have been written up recently and referred to as experimental pop. Is that what you would describe your music as?

Bud: It's hard to brand the sound. There [are] elements of psychedelic rock, there['re] elements of just straight forward rock and roll, there's obviously an indie thing that going on, which is inevitable.

Reese: More ambient in parts.

Bud: The structures are trying to be pop songs, though. But everything else that goes around it...I think that's what the word experimental is, it's experimenting with song structure, maybe less than experimenting with noise, which I think in this 21st century, when you hear "experimental," you tend to think of the more grinding dissonance, but technically, in our vein, it's more about the structure of the songs.

Nae: Let's talk a little bit about college radio, since we are a student-run and free-format college radio station. 10 years ago...was it ten years ago?

Bud: Yeah, I was a DJ here at 89.3 KUOI from the year 2000 to 2005, and every season I had my own show, of notable titles such as "So Booyah Right Now", was my first one on 2000, and then another one I had was called "Guns, Beers, and Three-Wheelers." Because I hadn't been living in Idaho for very long and I was just like, "God, what am I doing here?" But I actually love Idaho.

Nae: Okay, so I feel like you guys have a tour story.

Reese: One got us in trouble with the super fan site for the Smashing Pumpkins. Keep in mind, if this is person is listening, this is not meant to be slanderous, but he definitely was very disappointed in my interview that I did with a local weekly where I just frankly explained one of the stories which was Billy in a bathrobe

eating a salad...

Bud: It the only time we actually met him-of all the shows and played and he just told it like it was.

Reese: I received a very terse email.

Nae: Oh man, I'm having Pavement flashbacks.

So, let's talk about this cover; it makes me kind of sad for it. I can believe it. It looks like a puppy has gotten in trouble with a porcupine.

John: Somebody on Arteo made a playlist full of scary and gruesome album covers and that was on it!

Reese: Yeah, that dog was nine when it happened though. It was the third time she'd gotten in trouble with a porcupine. Her name is Maya, she's my partner's mother's dog. And she was fine but I feel like it's striking, I don't want to explain it. The idea is that the dog did not do it on one go, that she continued to attack the porcupine for whatever reason. Hence the title of the record, "Amor Ad Nauseum." "Ad Nauseum" being a repetition that will make you sick, and then "Amor" being self explanatory. So the idea being that this creature did what it did knowing it was hurting itself. And the creature is fine and has since gone on and attacked another porcupine.

Nae: So you haven't gotten any angry letters from PETA or anything?

Reese: Angry Facebookers were disturbed, either that or they think it was all photoshopped.

Bud: It's an actual photo of an actual dog that unfortunately had an encounter with a porcupine.

Reese: And it is a nice dog.

Bud: And [the dog] is okay.

Reese: The fact that you feel something is part of it. It's supposed to make you feel something.

A HEART TO HEART

Program Director Anthony Saia was given the opportunity to interview Ann Wilson, lead singer of Heart last October on the one-year anniversary of the band's release of their most recent studio record Fanatic.

Anthony Saia: So, today is the one-year anniversary of the release of Heart's album, Fanatic, what has the response been from fans and press to the record so far?

Ann Wilson: Oh yeah, well, Fanatic had a really amazing critical response and then when we got it out on the road, the fans were blown away by the songs we chose to play live. We didn't play the whole album live, but we chose the ones we thought would really reach out and grab them. One song in particular, we started out with called "Mashallah," which they just loved and they would just yell out "Mashallah" when it came. It was very cool. They were very integrated into it. They wan't something new and something big that rocked, and they loved "Dear Old America" a lot.

AS: So I've read and I just wanted to confirm with you, the album itself was recorded in various hotel rooms and studios. In the hotel rooms, what was that experience like? Did you have any issues with the hotels, like noise complaints or anything like that?

AW: [Laughs] Yes! The only time we had an issue with a

working on one of the bigger rockers, and you know, when you're working on something, you have to play it over and over and over, and so, we finally got a knock on the door, and they went to answer and the hotel staff said, 'Your stereo is on.' They though we were playing a stereo, like somebody had forgotten they'd left it on, and left the song on repeat. We had to say, 'No, no, no, that's okay, we're working on something up here. Everything is fine, don't worry.' From that point on, they started putting us in a corner room, that wasn't going to bother people as much. It's not like we ever had any trouble. We just set up a few mics, with a laptop and the right software and you can do a lot of good stuff. The drums and bass, and all the other stuff we did in the studio, but the vocals and some of the guitars, and some of the special stuff we did just about everywhere.

AS: So, are there any bands or vocalists in the past or present that you could do a vocal duet with them, who would it be and why?

AW: Well, I would like to sing with Chris Cornell [of Soundgarden] someday, because I think that he's got a lot of power and great instinct, and of course, he's very intense. He's just a great singer. We've been friends for a long time, but we've never brought it together as singers.

AS: Gosh, that would be cool to hear on that EP!

AW: Yeah!

AS: So, as they might have told you, I work at KUOI, a college radio station at the University of Idaho. I was curious, did you ever listen to college radio when you were growing up?

AW: I probably listened more to FM radio at that age, because I didn't go to college as it is. I went to art school. I went to Cornish School in Seattle, so there was no college radio.

AS: Alright, so that being said, if you had a radio show yourself, what would you name radio show and what would you play?

AW: If I had two hours to play whatever I wanted, I would play some [Lucinda Williams]. I would play Robert Plant's "Angel Dance." I would play Le Noise and "Walk With Me," by Neil Young. I don't know. I would play stuff that's not popular, probably.

AS: So, you mentioned Robert Plant there. Since Heart's performance at the Kennedy Center covering Led Zeppelin's "Stairway To Heaven," with Jason [Bonham] on drums. My question for you, is how does it feel to make Robert Plant weep tears of joy after covering that?

AW: Well, you know, I went into that with no other purpose than to please those guys. I wanted to please Robert and Jimmy and John Paul. If Robert Plant was weeping tears of joy because he was happy, then I'm happy about that. That was such a divine evening. One of the best in my life really. I'll never forget it.

WORLD GROOVE



When living in a country whose main export is culture, it's easy to see why certain other cultures aren't represented at all in our music and movie stores. When we think of movies we think of Hollywood, which is still the highest grossing movie industry in the world. However, Nigeria's movie industry makes far more movies per year, and Bollywood, the Hindi side of India's industry, on average has more annual ticket sales.

Like movies, our hegemony has driven the music industry over the last century, but recent labels are starting to reevaluate America's place in music history. Thanks to the Internet, boutique labels are starting to spring up worldwide and are focused on reissuing important sounds from some of the world's less famous music industries: Burkina Faso, Colombia, Siam, and Angola, to name a few. Many of these countries' industries just didn't have the resources to export tapes to other countries throughout the 20th century, even though they were heavily influenced by psychedelic sounds from both the West and East. And indeed, political anti-Communist propaganda kept a lot of sounds out of America, where owning Colombian or Cuban music would've been, at the very least, frowned upon for a time. Now labels like Analog Africa in Germany and Soundway Recordings in England are dedicated to sorting through forgotten boxes of tapes in certain countries, giving full history and booklets to supplement the music itself. Many of them rival today's biggest pop albums in terms of exhaustive supplemental material with the physical album, and often strive to give an insight into unknown movements.

Many compilations provide a showcase of the beginning of globalization, and incorporate many other styles. In a Ghanaian funk and groove compilation from Analog Africa, the sounds of Fela Kuti and Parliament/Funkadelic intertwine into a distinct afrobeat/funk sound, while on a Siamese psychedelic rock/garage compilation from Soundway Recordings, the main riff from The Rolling Stones' "Jumpin Jack Flash" provides a backdrop for spaced out raw howling from the band's female singer.

Another compilation from Analog Africa, focused on "The Raw Sound of Burkina Faso 1974-1979," is certainly one of the only compilations of Burkinabe to make it to America. In a country where the literacy rate is still only 30% (after a 20 year campaign to raise it from 13% in the 90's), one would not assume there would be a trove of funk and soul from the 70's, much less songs in English, filthy "Sex Machine" guitar parts, and extraordinary syncopation.

While many of these labels have "Africa" in the name, Soundway Records' mission statement is simple: "Music from Planet Earth: Past, Present & Future." Created by an English DJ, Miles Cleret, who sought to increase his trove of samples, the label was born after one illustrious recordcollecting trip to Ghana. Now, he has been to Ethiopia, Benin, Ghana, Colombia, Nigeria, Panama, Trinidad, Kenya, Thailand and more seeking out all kinds of lost cultural relics.

America most certainly deserves a place in the cultural megaliths of history, breeding many famous music styles that the world had never heard of. What we Americans lose sight of is how the world received these styles, and in turn developed them into something new. In today's globalized culture, evaluating the entire picture is increasingly important, and these labels each provide their own educated insight into the universal language of music.

Mother Yeti is about the members' individual ability to play an array of different instruments. This adds a new dynamic nature to the band when the drummer can get up and rock the guitar, or vice versa; Mike Halliday plays a mean keyboard, or so I have been told. Not only are the members of Mother Yeti good friends of mine, but they should become good friends of yours, through their ways of the rock.



EVERGREEN EDIBLES: A TREAT FOR TREEFORT

Taken from a recipe my Mum and I found in a magazine once, this fudge is hands-down the greatest tasting sweet ever. It's super sugary and bad for you obviously, but every once in a while it's a nice treat. It's fairly cheap to make and is excellent for Christmas or birthday presents.

Ingredients:

0.5 cups salted butter

5 cups golden granulated sugar (or any granulated)

1¹/₄ cup of milk

0.8 cups from a can of condensed

milk 2/3 tsp vanilla extract **Method:**

Fill a mug with cold water and put

it in the fridge, and lightly butter a 7 by 13 inch tin tray.

Melt the butter in a large sauce pan (when it boils the mixture tends to creep up the sides of the pan, so try to use a tall one). Add the sugar and milk. Mix together on a low heat until all of the sugar has dissolved. Turn the heat to just below high and boil for 8-10 minutes, frequently stirring.

At this point, take the mug from the fridge and keep it next to you on the kitchen counter. You'll soon need it to test if the fudge is ready.

Add the condensed milk, (usually about half of a can if you don't want to wash any more cups!), and stir. Keep it on a medium heat for further 8-10 minutes and make sure that you constantly stir it.

Once this final 10 minutes is up, drop a bit of the fudge off the spoon and into the cold mug of water. This is called the 'soft ball' stage because you are testing whether the fudge will push into a soft ball in the water.

If your fudge does this, remove it from the heat, add the vanilla and with either a whisk, or electric beaters (it's quicker with electric), beat the mixture for 5 minutes.

Pour the fudge into the buttered tray and leave to cool before cutting into little square pieces. When eaten it should have a crumbly, soft texture.
