An inclusive election

How, where, when to vote in ASUI election

Election season has rolled around again, but this time students can look forward to some changes in the conventional voting system, ASUI Elections Coordinator James Morrell said.

"We have made changes to the system so that voting is a more accessible and inclusive experience," Morrell said. "It's an online system where students can vote either on campus or at home."

According to Alysha Van Zante, ASUI communications board chair, students will receive personalized ballots through their Vandal email accounts, allowing them to login to a secured voting forum.

Van Zante said voting opens 8 a.m. Monday and will close 5 p.m. Friday.

This year's election includes 10 candidates running for eight open senate seats and three pairs of president and vice president candidates.

The two main changes to the voting system are how students are able to receive ballots directly to their Vandal email accounts and the automatic reminder emails sent out to students who have not voted throughout the course of the week, Van Zante said.

"With this program, we are able to remove students that have already voted from the system and send out reminders to those who have not cast their vote," she said. "We hope this will be easier and more accessible to students, especially those that live off campus."

In addition to voting online, Morrell said there will be tables 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday-Wednesday in the Idaho Commons where students may also vote.

Morrell said students have the opportunity to enter a drawing to win a KindleFire HD6 as an incentive to voting.

"After a student votes, a quick link will appear on the page," he said. "It takes you to the place where you can then enter information into the drawing for the prize."

Morrell said although there is a voting incentive offered to students every year, this year's raffle has been

made more inclusive.

"The prize for the previous elections drawing was

"The prize for the previous elections drawing was also a KindleFire, but last year you had to vote in the Commons to be eligible for the drawing," he said. "This year, you can vote from any location and choose whether you'd like to enter the raffle or not."

Beyond the physical incentive of the KindleFire, Morrell said he views voting as a crucial event on campus.

"Voting is important, because these candidates are going to represent the student body," Morrell said. "We try incentivizing voting and make more inclusive systems like this to ensure as many student voices as possible are being heard."

Morrell said to help students know more about who is running, the candidates will spend the week before voting making one last campaign push.


"If students don't know much about the candidates, now is the time to be asking questions about their goals," Morrell said. "All week, candidates will be tabling in the Commons to not only encourage voting, but also to explain their platforms to students."

Van Zante said she hopes the changes made to this year's voting system will encourage more students from a variety of different backgrounds to vote.

"We hope for a high voter turnout from a diverse range of people," she said. "Voting is so important, because we want students to use their vote to support people who will advocate for them in the best way."

Vandal Entertainment seeks student feedback



Music taste, event preferences to appear as ballot initiatives

Five initiatives will appear on the 2015 ASUI spring elections ballot, said ASUI Elections Coordinator James Morrell, and all five questions posed come from Vandal Entertainment.

Students will be polled on what kind of music they think is the most popular at the University of Idaho, which types of entertainment they'd like to see more of on campus, how much they're willing to pay for Finals Fest tickets, what events they are most likely to attend and how they usually hear about Vandal Entertainment events.

"I think the ballot questions are a

great representation of the students' interests," Morrell said. "Hopefully they will generate new ideas for future events."

Although ASUI has sought feedback on issues and policies from students through ballot initiatives in the past, ASUI Director of Communications Alysha Van Zante said there was nothing ASUI felt they needed to gather student feedback on at this time.

"We've done quite a few individual polls during the election cycles," Van Zante said. "Ballot initiatives are a good way to reach students, but we've been working on stuff much earlier in the semester, so we've already asked their opinions and gathered feedback, and gotten a pretty good response already."

Van Zante said that if a student still wishes to give feedback to ASUI, there are several avenues to do so.

All members of ASUI have their contact information listed on the UI webpage, and students are always welcome to visit the ASUI offices on the third floor of the Idaho Commons, where they can meet with senators or leave feedback in their mailboxes.

Students can also offer anonymous feedback on their ballots, where a field will be available to leave whatever comments they'd like.

"We definitely get a lot of feedback throughout the year, and have made changes based on that feedback," Van Zante said.





Just getting started

First open forum sets spring election cycle in motion

Three pairs of candidates running for ASUI president and vice president presented their campaign platforms alongside six ASUI senate candidates in the Idaho Commons March 25, effectively kicking off the 2015 spring election cycle.

ASUI Elections Coordinator James Morrell said he thought the first open forum went well, considering the bustling atmosphere of the Commons during the mid-afternoon lunch rush.

"I'm happy with today's open forum," Morrell said. "I thought all of the candidates represented themselves well and I think it was a good start to the election."

The three duos of candidates running for president and vice president represented at the open forum include Nate Fisher and Katie Cramer, Max Cowan and Stetson Holman and Alejandra "Vivi" Gonzalez and Izaiah Dolezal. The senate candidates include Kailey Holt, Joe Madsen, Mark Leitner, Shelby Burkhart and Aran Burke.

Sophomore physics and statistics major Burke said while he is new to ASUI, he believes he can make a difference for students as a senator because he brings different ideas to the table.

"I would not only want to better represent Greek life, residence halls and off-campus students, but bring them closer together," Burke said. "I'd like to see if they can get representatives to sit in on each other's meetings and use that to create more student programming for the whole campus."

Burke said he would also like to work with UI Parking and Transportation Services to see if there can be leniency for on-campus parking during late afternoon hours. He said he would like to see ASUI involved with the Moscow-Pullman bus project and work to implement a program called Safe Ride.

"To have a no questions asked ride service on weekends for students throughout Moscow would help bring down drunk driving accidents," Burke said.

Fisher, current ASUI president, said a major reason is he running for reelection is because he believes the learning curve for new ASUI officials often impedes progress from being made. He said because he's already become acquainted for the position, he can get right to work if he's reelected.

"Some of this institutional memory can be regained," Fisher said. "We can keep some of the momentum and carry forward easily."

Running mate Cramer, who has served two terms in the ASUI Senate, said two key components of their campaign are improving safety and ensuring student spaces.

Current ASUI senator Madsen said

if reelected he would work to establish a student-faculty committee to improve relations among students and their instructors, as well as streamline and find creative ways to use UI's current infrastructure to get students more involved on campus.

Holt, current ASUI director of finance, said she is running for senate to better the student experience.

She said if elected she would work on pedestrian safety by implementing safewalk signals, a safety device used at Washington State University. Holt said she would also like to promote the Vandal Culture, ensure the Bruce Pitman Center and other places on campus are student spaces and make sure ASUI is working as an effective representative for the student body.

Cowan, former ASUI president, said he has experience in advocating for keeping the costs of higher education down and would like to continue that work in ASUI.

"We also need to maintain the cost of higher education through more state-funded scholarships and through maintaining the dedicated student activity fee," Cowan said.

Holman said he and Cowan would like to improve the student experience from inside the classroom by ensuring instructors are following UI policy and not making out-of-bound decisions at the detriment of students.

"We can have teachers not introduce new material during dead week," Holman said. "We'd also like to work to require that teachers post grades online."

Senate running mates Leitner and Burkhart said their main focus is student involvement, which can be accomplished through inclusivity and more active, effective advertising of student activities and events.

"All of the posters and promotions for Finals Fest, it should be like that for every event." Leitner said.

The two would also work to better connect the Moscow community with UI students, Burkhart said.


Presidential candidate Gonzalez is a former ASUI senator and ASUI current director of Diversity Affairs. She said she would use her leadership abilities and move the university forward in terms of sustainability, resources and enrollment.

"For example, the university has goals to reach carbon neutrality by 2030," Gonzalez said. "We would work proactively in reaching these goals."

Running mate Dolezal said the Vandal experience can be enriched through an increase of participation among student organizations and individual students in general.

"ASUI holds power — a lot of power — more power than a lot of student governments around the country," Dolezal said. "We would have more people speak up and get involved."
