## U Of I Plans Experiment In Black Studies Course

MOSCOW — Views will be brought to bear on the problems of the black man in a new course to be taught by a rotating faculty at the University of Idaho this semester, Dr. Siegfried B. Rolland, professor of social sciences, said Saturday.

The course, titled Social Science 103 — Black Identity: Alienation and Affirmation, is being introduced as an experiment in response to needs expressed by students, faculty members and laymen, Rolland said.

"We hope to learn more about what is needed in the black studies area with this first semester of experimentation and then build on this foundation."

Directing the cooperating faculty will be Asst. Prof. Jack L. Davis of the English Department. Visiting faculty members will come from Washington State University. The faculty will include black instructors from both institutions.

Idaho faculty members participating will include professors Rolland and Davis, Prof. Robert E. Hosack, head of political science; Prof. Harry H. Caldwell, chairman of geography; Asst. Prof. Willard Barnes, history; Asst. Prof. Kenneth Johnson, social science; and Corlann G. Bush, English instructor.
